MINUTES

Chairman Brackpool asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of June 23, 2011. Commissioner Rosenberg said a sentence needed to be completed on page 17 of the minutes. The words "race meeting" should be added to complete the sentence. Chairman Brackpool stated the correction would be made. Commissioner Choper motioned to approve the minutes, as corrected. Commissioner Moss seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Chairman Brackpool stated there were no persons wishing to make a public comment.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1658, VESTING OF TITLE TO CLAIMED HORSE, TO VOID A CLAIM IF A CLAIMED HORSE SUFFERS A FATALITY DURING THE RUNNING OF THE RACE OR BEFORE IT IS RETURNED TO BE UNSADDLED.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposed amendment to Board Rule 1658, Vesting of Title to Claimed Horse, would void a claim if the horse suffered a fatality during the running of

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the race, or before it returned to be unsaddled. Ms. Wagner stated seven comments were received during the 45-day public comment period. Three comments opposed the amendment, three were in favor of the amendment and one comment described claiming insurance services available to horse owners and trainers. The favorable comments were from the Environmental Training Practices Committee of the Welfare and Safety of the Race Horse Summit, and The Jockey Club Thoroughbred Safety Committee. The comments against the proposed amendment were from a horse owner who stated claiming was a naturally self-regulating process, so there was no need to amend Rule 1658. Another horse owner wrote that while the proposed amendment might have some benefit it was flawed in determining precisely how and when title of ownership would be transferred. Vice-Chairman Israel stated he was in favor of the proposed amendment, but he felt the language about the horse returning to the unsaddling area was ambiguous. It might be possible to construe that exception to include horses placed in an ambulance or van and taken to the unsaddling area where the claim would stand. Vice-Chairman Israel said the phrase "under its own power" could be added to the text to remove any ambiguity. Staff counsel Robert Miller said the language of the regulation used a term of art, which was defined by industry practice. Vice-Chairman Israel stated he thought the rule would be contentious without the clarification. Chairman Brackpool said the Board did not believe owners or trainers would play such games, and the rule was clear in terms of industry practice. Commissioner Moss commented the proposed regulation was the result of one trainer perhaps celebrating a little too vigorously when he moved a horse that was not doing well. Chairman Brackpool stated the issue had been debated for some time. The rule was not being changed because of the behavior of one trainer. Richard Mandella, a trainer, said he was very familiar with the claiming game. He stated the proposed regulation would remove the temptation for a

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trainer to drop a horse in a claiming race in the hopes it would be claimed. Mr. Mandella added he also supported the proposed amendment of Rule 1844, which would lower the allowable level of phenylbutazone. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if Mr. Mandella was referring to a trainer knowingly entering a horse that could possibly break down during a claiming race, or was he referring to entering a horse with a problem, but the trainer did not necessarily believe the horse would break down. Mr. Mandella said if a horse that just finished second in a \$50,000 claiming race were x-rayed and the veterinarian said there was possibly one or two more races left in that horse, a trainer might be tempted to drop the horse to \$32,000 so it would get claimed. If the horse was claimed, the trainer would be \$32,000 ahead of the game. Mr. Mandella commented that in his 35 years of experience he heard of such scenarios more than once. He added trainers often dealt with lameness and problem horses, but once in a while trainers were warned that a horse had one or two races before such problems appeared. Lou Raffetto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) stated he had been a trainer, racing official and a track operator, so he had seen many injuries. He said he believed the Board was asking for problems if it approved the proposed regulation. For example: who would make a decision about putting down a horse that broke down on the track? Would it be the current trainer or the new trainer? There were many reasons a horse could suffer a fatality on the track that were not the fault of the trainer. It did not make sense to change a regulation simply because there may have been one trainer with a certain situation. A horse might be put in a claiming race because it was slow or had minor issues, but it was not as if the trainer was sending the horse out thinking it would break a leg. Mr. Raffetto stated he did not believe Rule 1658 needed to be amended, and if it were there would be problems at some point in the future. Commissioner Derek said it was her understanding that the owner of the horse at the time the horse went into the starting gate would

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make any decisions about the fate of a horse that broke down on the track. Mr. Raffetto said the trainer represented the owner on the track, and if he were the trainer, he would have a boot put on the horse and have it vanned back to the barn. The horse would not be put down on the track, so the claim would stand. Dr. Rick Arthur, Equine Medical Director, said the racetrack veterinarian or the official veterinarian had the authority to make the decision as to whether a horse was put down during or subsequent to the running of the race; owners were rarely consulted. Commissioner Derek stated she did not find the rule ambiguous. If a horse was put in a boot it would remain the property of the original owner because it would not return to the unsaddling area. Mr. Raffetto said that was not his interpretation. To void the claim the horse would have to be put down on the track. There could be a situation where a filly needed to be put down, but the trainer may try to save it for breeding purposes. Chairman Brackpool said the same issue currently occurred. The only issue the Board was addressing was the transfer of the claiming price. The racetrack veterinarian had the authority to put the horse down and they generally did not consult the owner. Commissioner Choper stated the persons who stood to gain or lose due to the proposed amendment were horse owners who claimed horses. It would seem that if one was in the claiming game as a general matter the issue was the distribution of the risk; there would always be a winner and a loser. Many of the things that had been said on both sides of the issue were correct. Most people never knowingly ran a compromised horse, but one could get stuck claiming such a horse. So, in the end the process worked itself out evenly. Given the public impression the rule created, Commissioner Choper stated he would be in favor of adopting the proposed regulation. Mr. Raffetto stated the point of the matter was that horses would break down through no fault of the prior trainer. It did not seem fair to penalize the trainer or owner for the one or two situations that may arise. Commissioner Choper said Mr.

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Raffetto was right. However, sometimes the trainer who lost a claim was stuck with a horse that broke down. On the other hand, in some cases, the rule would have the opposite effect; the trainer would be spared the claim, even though it was not the fault of the other trainer. Generally, the rule would work. Commissioner Harris stated the proposed rule was a minor step forward that encouraged owners and trainers not to run horses that were suspect. He asked how the TOC arrived at its position. Mr. Raffetto said he formulated his position based on his experience and envisioning the issues that could arise. Commissioner Harris stated he appreciated Mr. Raffetto's position, but the TOC represented all thoroughbred owners, and he was not aware that the issue had been debated amongst the membership. Mr. Raffetto said the issue had not been debated at the board level or amongst the membership; it was his recommendation. Commissioner Rosenberg commented that the Board materials indicated the Equine Injury Database summary for California (excluding Los Alamitos) demonstrated that only six horses had fatalities during a claiming race in a period of not quite a year. It was interesting that the objections of some in the industry were being discussed when it only affected a few horses. He asked if the rule would have changed the claiming game in the period covered by the Equine Injury Database summary. Chairman Brackpool said there were two issues: the first was the number of horses or claims that would have been voided; it changed every year, but it was a very small number. The second issue was one of perception. Over the past couple of months the Board received a lot of comments from those who believed the Board should not look at the issue of perception; instead, it should only look at the reality issue. Chairman Brackpool stated he believed the Board had to look at the issue of perception because it affected the public's overall view of the sport. Commissioner Rosenberg said he could also argue that perception would not change that much. Darrell Haire of the Jockey's Guild (Guild) stated his organization

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supported the proposed amendment to Rule 1658. Mr. Hair said he rode for 15 years and could not count the times he walked into a paddock and was put on a horse with problems. He added trainers dropping horses with problems occurred more frequently than some stated, and for the safety of riders and the integrity of the sport the rule needed to be amended. Commissioner Rosenberg asked why the Guild believed the proposed amendment would change anything. Mr. Haire said trainers would understand they could no longer drop problem horses just to lose them. Commissioner Rosenberg commented trainers also dropped horses because they had problems they could not figure out, not because they thought they would break down. Mr. Haire said that was true; there were many reasons for dropping a horse. Commissioner Harris stated there were dozens of reasons why a horse might be dropped, but the focus of the regulation was the owner or trainer who thought his horse was very near the end of its career. That did not happen often, but it did happen. Michael Wellman, an owner/breeder, stated all horses were vetted prior to racing, and the reality was that sound horses could break down, as well as horses that had something a little bit questionable. Mr. Wellman said the rule had gray areas when it came to who had ownership of the horse. The current rule provided that ownership passed as soon as the gate opened. However, if something happened to the horse on the track, ownership passed back to the original owner who did not have any say in the fate of the horse. He repeated the rule was flawed and there would be problems in its implementation. Alan Balch of the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) said his organization opposed the amendment. He stated Mr. Raffetto was correct in his belief that the claim was not voided unless the horse suffered a fatality. Mr. Balch said the CTT agreed about the problem of perception, but perhaps the European system, which was essentially an auction, might be something the Board could look at if it wished to reform the claiming process. The CTT believed such a system might provide a

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disincentive for nefarious behavior. John Saddler of the CTT said his organization was concerned with the unintended consequences of the proposed regulation. It was possible for a trainer to instruct the jockey not to pull up a bad horse, so it would not break down. The CTT would like to delay implementation of the regulation to work on its language, as it felt that making a sweeping change was a mistake. Commissioner Harris said the rule might not be perfect, and there were a lot of ways to improve the claiming game, but it did send a signal that California did not want to encourage the running of horses that had a high likelihood of breaking down. Horse racing was a sport, and one was not supposed to try to dump a horse that might not be 100 percent sound. The Board wanted to prevent behavior that was not becoming of the sport. Commissioner Moss stated claiming races were a large part of horse racing. The interesting part of claiming was its finality. It should be kept in mind that prior to making a claim, the owner or trainer could watch the horse work and study its past performance. The trainer had knowledge of the horse and made the claim because he believed it was a bargain or perhaps a mare he would keep for potential breeding. Commissioner Moss stated the rule was well intended, and there were issues with the safety of the jockey, but the rule had a long history, and most trainers understood their responsibilities and conducted themselves with honor. Commissioner Derek stated she believed some trainers did drop horses primarily to lose them, and the current rule encouraged such behavior. The proposed amendment would not impose a hardship on the industry, as the statistics demonstrated only six horses died in a claiming race over nearly a 12 month period. In addition, new owners who entered horse racing by making claims would be assured they had a better chance of claiming a sound horse. Commissioner Rosenberg said the proposed rule represented over-regulation. The public perception issue would not change much, and California would still have great racing. Commissioner Harris

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motioned to adopt the proposed amendment to Rule 1658. Commissioner Choper seconded the motion, which was carried with Commissioner Moss and Commissioner Rosenberg voting “no.”

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1843.3, PENALTIES FOR MEDICATION VIOLATIONS, TO 1) CHANGE THE PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS DUE TO THE OVERAGE FOR THE PERMITTED NON-STEROIDAL ANTI-INFLAMMATORY DRUG SUBSTANCE (NSAID), PHENYLBUTAZONE, AS DEFINED IN RULE 1844(C)(1), AND FOR DRUG SUBSTANCES IN AN OFFICIAL TEST SAMPLE, WHICH CHRB CATEGORIZES AS WARRANTING A CATEGORY “D” PENALTY; AND 2) TO CHANGE THE ALLOWABLE LEVEL OF FLUNIXIN IN AN OFFICIAL TEST SAMPLE FROM 50 NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM TO 20 NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposed amendment to Rule 1843.3, Penalties for Medication Violations, would change the penalties for phenylbutazone (bute) violations under Category “C” as well as for Category “D” violations. These changes are aligned with the proposed changes in the allowable levels of bute under Rule 1844, Authorized Medication. In addition, the proposed amendment will change the level of flunixin in an official test sample from 50 nanograms per milliliter of blood plasma or serum to 20 nanograms. Again, the proposed change was aligned with the proposed amendment of Rule 1844. Ms Wagner stated the proposal had been noticed for a 45-day public comment period, and no comments were received. Chairman Brackpool said the important point was that the penalties were lowered in anticipation of lowering the allowable levels under Rule 1844. He stated the item would be postponed until the fate of the proposed amendment of Rule 1844 was decided. After the hearing on Rule 1844, the Board would revisit the proposed amendment of Rule 1843.3.

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PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1844, AUTHORIZED MEDICATION, TO REDUCE THE PERMITTED LEVEL OF PHENYLBUTAZONE IN AN OFFICIAL TEST SAMPLE FROM FIVE MICROGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM TO TWO MICROGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM, AND TO REDUCE THE PERMITTED LEVEL OF FLUNIXIN IN AN OFFICIAL TEST SAMPLE FROM 50 NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM TO 20 NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposed amendment of Rule 1844, Authorized Medication, would reduce the permitted level of phenylbutazone (bute) in an official test sample from five micrograms per milliliter of blood plasma or serum to two micrograms per milliliter. The proposed amendment would also reduce the permitted level of flunixin in an official test sample from 50 nanograms per milliliter of blood plasma or serum to 20 nanograms per milliliter. During the 45-day public comment period staff received numerous comments. Those in opposition included the California Exposition and State Fair, the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT), Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) and Dr. Don Shields. Those in support included The Breeders' Cup. All of the letters were available to Commissioners. Dr. Don Shields, a veterinarian and member of the CTT medication committee, said he was not present to argue for more medication. Not all horses needed bute on race day. Additionally, Dr. Shields stated he did not consider the current allowable level of five micrograms of bute per milliliter of blood serum or plasma as sacred or untouchable. However, medication regulations should be based on scientific fact and medical knowledge, not fiction or opinion. Dr. Shields cited a couple of studies that (depending on circumstances, and if the standard 2 gram IV dose of bute was still considered to be a 24 hour medication) demonstrated there would be somewhere between 5 percent and 17 percent more overages of bute if the drug were administered within the currently recommended timelines. He stated the Pennsylvania Horse Racing Commission

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recommended that two grams should be given at 36 hours. Dr. Shields also spoke at length about whether it had been demonstrated that higher levels of bute caused injuries. He quoted one study, which stated there was scant objective evidence that a combination treatment with bute and flunixin allowed horses with lameness to perform as if they were sound, such that veterinarian inspection was compromised. Dr. Shields concluded by stating Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, wrote in 2006 that the levels of non steroidal anti inflammatory drug substances (NSAID) permitted on race day were well below clinically active dosage. In California, where the five micrograms per milliliter in plasma level has been in place for nearly 20 years the vast majority of horses tested below the two microgram level. The five microgram level provided a safety margin to avoid inadvertent positives. Dr. Shields asked the Board to consider the science and if the Board did not feel it had enough information, the UC Davis program could examine the pre-race exam cards and past performances to determine if perhaps it was more of a decrease in performance than a unilateral lameness that could be detected in pre-race exams. Dr. Mark Dedomenico, a cardiovascular surgeon, stated he had 160 persons working full time on research. He stated he had some of those persons conduct a medical analysis on bute. No scientific study could be found to demonstrate that bute levels of 5 micrograms or less were associated with catastrophic breakdowns or injuries. Dr. Dedomenico said he also read the materials supplied by Dr. Shields. He stated he believed the proposed amendment to Rule 1844 would lead to a lot more positives. In addition, it would increase the perception that horses were drugged, as there would be findings of 2.1, 2.4 or 2.5 micrograms per milliliter. The increased instances of positive drug violations would cause the media to state the industry did bad things to horses. There would also be more lawsuits, which were costly to trainers and the state, and which were reported in the media. Finally, an unintended consequence

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of the lower bute levels could be more use of steroids, or corticosteroids, which was something no one wanted to talk about. The issue could be looked at emotionally or scientifically. If the Board took the scientific route, and closely looked at what Dr. Shields had to say, it would reject the proposed regulation. Alan Balch of the CTT stated his organization endorsed Dr. Shield's comments. He added no one was more dedicated to the welfare of the horse than the CTT horsemen. The CTT believed therapeutic medication was essential to the wellbeing of the horse and that irresponsible use of such medication was harmful. However, attacks on therapeutic medication were largely misplaced because they led to the unfavorable public perception. There was no evidence that the present regulation contributed to racing fatalities. The proposed changes in threshold levels effectively changed the treatment time for bute, which was an issue for horsemen who fed bute or administered it orally. The CTT respectfully requested the Board study the issue further or vote against the regulation for the time being, as funds were available to pursue the scientific study that Dr. Shields proposed. John Sadler of the CTT stated the vast majority of California's thoroughbred trainers did not believe the proposed amendment to Rule 1844 was necessary. The trainers were the ones who had to make the levels work on a daily basis, and they believed the present rule was fine and did not need to be changed. Chairman Brackpool asked if there had been any debate within the CTT on the issue. Mr. Sadler stated the CTT held two meetings in Northern California where the trainers were very firm in their conviction that the rule amendment was not necessary. Darrell Haire of the Jockey's Guild (Guild) stated his organization supported the proposed amendment to Rule 1844. The Guild believed that the less medication in the horse's system, the better. Dr. Jeff Blea, a veterinarian, stated therapeutic medications were needed on the backside. Such medications were used to keep horses as athletes and to look after their welfare on a day-to-day basis. However, he said

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there was a lot of gray areas in research on the effects of therapeutic medications. The real problem was with the regulatory veterinarians feeling they could not get a good assessment or pre-race examination of a horse that was on bute early in the morning the day of the race. That was because the level was higher than what would be a five microgram level. The American Association of Equine Practitioners Racing Committee looked at the issue for well over a year. The question was whether race horses needed the current allowable level of bute. Dr. Blea stated he did not believe horses needed the current allowable level, and he was comfortable with a level of two micrograms. The real problem was the need for a guideline for trainers and veterinarians on when and how to treat with injectable or oral medication so there would be fewer positives. If there were a grace period to implement the changes, and guidelines to follow, the proposed amendment was workable. John Barr of the Jockey Club read a letter from his organization. The letter outlined the Jockey Club's research regarding the effects of bute and its ability to disguise a preexisting lameness or other discomfort in a horse which might otherwise have exhibited itself during a routine race day inspection. Following the studies, the Jockey Club recommended to the Racing Medication and Testing Consortium (RMTC) that it conduct further studies. Following the RMTC examination of existing evidence it was the RMTC's final decision to recommend the allowable levels of bute be lowered to two micrograms per milliliter to be administered no sooner than 24 hours before race time. Mr. Barr stated there was no contention that the presence of bute or other NSAIDs caused fractures and other breakdowns. The contention is that by virtue of their pain-killing properties, they disguised normal physical evidence which would be evident in a pre-race examination. The lower recommended thresholds were recommended by the RMTC, and adopted by the Racing Commissioners International, the Jockey Club Safety Committee, The Breeders' Cup, the Jockey Club, the Thoroughbred Owners

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and Breeders Association (TOBA) and its Graded Stakes Committee. The levels were also adopted by the American Association of Equine Practitioners, the states of Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Virginia. Mr. Barr said effective January 1, 2012 any racing association that offered graded level stakes must require horses to test at the new levels or any graded ranking would not be allowed or recognized. The purpose was to try to prevent catastrophic incidents on the track, and any chemical or substance that might disguise lameness or other evidence during a pre-race examination or in the gate should be prohibited. Mr. Barr added 80 percent of the existing California tests currently fell within the new thresholds and should not present a problem for all but a few California trainers. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if the Graded Stakes Committee would require a track to implement its required levels for all of its races to maintain its graded stakes or just the graded stakes races. Vice-Chairman Israel commented there was no analysis of the economic impact; how the mandate would affect field size and whether it would adversely affect the business. Mr. Barr said he understood, but he could not answer the question. Dr. Arthur stated the TOBA graded stakes were the only races that were required to adopt the revised bute level. Vice-Chairman Israel said that meant that if the proposed regulation were not adopted, Santa Anita could run six races at the current allowable level and only the graded stakes races would require the revised level. Dr. Arthur said that was correct. Commissioner Choper asked if Dr. Arthur could state his conclusion regarding the proposed amendment. Dr. Arthur stated that the two microgram level was necessary to allow the examining veterinarians to do the job required by the Board. The proposed regulation had to do with levels at the time of examination, which depending on whether it was day or night racing, would be anywhere from 8 to 14 hours prior to post time. That meant bute levels would be much higher than at race time. Dr. Arthur commented that the issue was not the average

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horse, it was the outliers. Most trainers abided by the Board's regulations and were very responsible, but there were trainers who pushed the limits. With regards to effective plasma concentrations, Dr. Larry Soma published an article in a peer-reviewed journal in which he concluded that after 24 hours there were still effective plasma concentrations of bute with a two gram dose. That correlated to roughly a one microgram level of bute. The conclusion was that the drug was still effective at 24 hours. Dr. Arthur said Dr. Shields was correct in stating there was no scientific article that could be found that demonstrated bute caused catastrophic breakdowns. Conversely, there were no articles that showed bute was safe for racing. Vice-Chairman Israel stated the Board was told 80 percent of horses raced under the proposed limit, and only 20 percent raced over the limit. Was there any statistical analysis of the injury rate in the two groups? Was there evidence that the 20 percent were injured at a significantly higher rate? Dr. Arthur said the study was done in Kentucky and it found that horses that were injured had a higher bute and NSAID rate. He added he agreed with Dr. Shields that the drugs did not cause the injury. Vice-Chairman Israel said to understand the impact of the proposed regulation the Board needed to know the injury rates for horses running at the lower level and horses running at the higher level. If 80 percent were running at one level and 20 percent at the other, were they injured at different rates? He commented that the argument that 90 percent of fatalities were due to preexisting injuries was an emotional appeal that did not reveal anything about whether bute was relevant. Dr. Arthur said the Kentucky paper tried to look at that, and the most important factor was that the injured horses did have higher bute, banamine and NSAID levels than the control horses. However, the issue was not that the drugs caused the problems, it was that the trainers knew the horses had problems and gave them more bute. Vice-Chairman Israel said the Board was engaging in the one dose or two dose arguments, and the question was

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whether there should be any dose at all; however, there was no statistical evidence about whether two doses was more deleterious than one dose. Dr. Arthur stated that was correct, but it could be demonstrated that when Iowa and Virginia went from two micrograms to five micrograms their fatality rates increased. At the higher level Iowa went from 1.29 to 1.99 and Virginia went from 0.96 to 1.5. Commissioner Choper said he did not know who was right and who was wrong, and when studies involved living things, they were often flawed. However, the Board had an equine medical director who was a distinguished veterinarian, and he arrived at the conclusion that something ought to change. So, Commissioner Choper stated he was inclined to support the proposed amendment. Commissioner Moss said race horses were similar to human athletes in that they had certain aches and pains. The Board also had an opportunity to watch what would happen with the new level without having to rush into a rule change. He stated many jurisdictions were currently involved with the new level, so why not wait and observe how they would fair? Commissioner Moss added he believed the Board was over regulating the issue, and he was concerned the opinions of industry organizations were being overlooked. He stated he did not support the proposed amendment to Rule 1844. Commissioner Rosenberg said he was bothered by the groundswell of national organizations talking about eliminating race-day medications altogether. The Jockey Club Graded Stakes Committee rule would be in place in January 2012, so the proposed amendment was a temporary fix that was not necessarily the right thing. Commissioner Rosenberg stated he agreed with Commissioner Moss, and would prefer to wait and see what happened with other racing states. Commissioner Harris said the rule did not need to be implemented immediately, but could become effective at a date certain. The key was the promulgation of information about how different doses would result in varying levels. Bute was a valuable therapeutic medication; it was fairly cost effective and had been around for a long

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time. The issue involved a very minor change in the allowed level that may on certain instances enable the examining veterinarian to do a slightly better pre-race examination. Vice-Chairman Israel stated he was concerned with the economic impact of the regulation. The graded stakes were only 1 percent of the race program, so what would the impact be on the remaining 99 percent? What was the effect on trainers whose livelihood was claiming horses; people who were trying to get a start in racing by claiming; allowance races and racing between Wednesday and Friday? What would happen to field size and would people leave the state? Further, if bute were so deleterious why not eliminate it altogether? No evidence had been presented that the higher allowable rates caused more horses to break down. Vice-Chairman Israel stated that a study needed to be done before he would vote for the regulation. Commissioner Derek said the proposal was the result of virtually all the national organizations, including the American Association of Equine Practitioners and the Jockey Club Graded Stakes Committee, determining there was valid evidence and voting to lower the threshold for bute. Commissioner Derek stated the argument that the proposed regulation would have a greater effect on small trainers did not make sense. If trainers did not wish to spend the extra funds to inject bute, they had the option of giving powder or pills at little earlier out. She added there were many views on every medical issue, but the national racing organizations found the evidence to be valid; bute had an effect on pre-race examinations. Commissioner Derek said she did not know why California would want to be different and allow a higher threshold of a pain-masking drug during its pre-race examinations. Chairman Brackpool stated it seemed the comments received by the Board were substantially more about the possibility of violations of a two microgram limit than how such a limit could harm a horse. He said he had not heard many comments stating it would be bad for the horse to go from five to two micrograms. Vice-Chairman Israel might have been correct

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when he stated the stakes races were only 1 percent of the industry, but the big races brought out the fans and generated more handle. The industry wanted to do whatever it could to attract the best races to California. The Graded Stakes Committee stated that commencing January 1, 2012, the proposed level will be its rule. Chairman Brackpool added many had commented that the vast majority of horsemen were honest. That was true, but laws and regulations were not written because the vast majority of people were dishonest. Most people understood and followed the code of conduct within which they lived. Passing the proposed amendment was not an action against the horsemen; it was to ensure that those who might not otherwise comply also followed the code. Chairman Brackpool said he was in favor of the proposed regulation, but only if it had a grace period. If the rule were approved, it would not be implemented until January 1, 2012, and there would be an education program that explained what would be happening. Chairman Brackpool asked if there was a way for the implementation of the regulation to be delayed. Ms. Wagner stated the timing of the completion of the rulemaking file could be such that when the Office of Administrative Law (OAL) finished its review, the effective date would be the beginning of 2012. Chairman Brackpool asked if the new guidelines were in place on January 1, 2012, was it possible to also implement the penalties at a date several months later? Ms. Wagner said that was possible. Commissioner Moss asked how the Board's lab rated in comparison to labs in states where the reduced levels were in effect. Dr. Arthur said they were very good laboratories, and Pennsylvania was equal to the UC Davis laboratory. Commissioner Moss stated that meant the Board could watch what happened with those laboratories. He said he was concerned that trainers would turn to something else if the Board lowered the current level of bute. What would they use, and could California test for such substances? Dr. Arthur said California was very capable of testing for other drug substances. Commissioner Derek asked if

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Chairman Brackpool's comments meant there would be a grace period until January 1, 2012. Chairman Brackpool said he meant the regulation would not be implemented until January 1, 2012, so there could be an educational period. There could be a grace period until March 1, 2012 when the penalties would take place. Commissioner Derek said that was problematic because some trainers may attempt to take advantage of the grace period. She commented there were suspicions about what happened when there was a grace period with steroids. Dr. Arthur commented there was a problematic grace period with anabolic steroids. He stated, however, the Board's approach was reasonable, and it could move ahead and vote on the regulation, and then submit to the OAL it at the appropriate time. Commissioner Harris commented the vast majority of horses would not be affected by the regulation, but there would be ample warning for those trainers whose normal protocol was more than two micrograms. Commissioner Derek **motioned** to adopt the amendment to Board Rule 1844 with the provision that staff not submit the regulation to the OAL until such time as the implementation date would fall on January 1, 2012. Commissioner Harris **seconded** the motion, which **carried** with Vice-Chairman Israel, Commissioner Moss and Commissioner Rosenberg voting "no." Commissioner Derek **motioned** to adopt the proposed amendment to Rule 1843.3 with the provision that staff not submit the regulation to the OAL until such time as the implementation date would fall on January 1, 2012. Commissioner Harris **seconded** the motion, which was carried with Commissioner Moss **abstaining**.

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DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE UPDATE FROM THE CALIFORNIA MARKETING COMMITTEE (CMC) AND ITS WORK WITH THE BAILEY GARDNER AGENCY ON THE BRANDING AND MARKETING OF CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING.

Robert Hartman of the California Marketing Committee (CMC) said his organization worked with the Bailey Gardner advertising agency for over six months to embark on an ambitious marketing program. The parties did consumer research as well as research among horsemen to develop a strategic plan and an advertising campaign. Mr. Hartman added Bailey Gardner also helped with logos, tag lines and messaging. John Bailey of Bailey Gardner stated he would give an overview of the marketing plans that his organization was developing on behalf of the CMC. He would also review the research findings and statistics and discuss how they were used to form strategic marketing plans. Mr. Bailey added he would talk about target audiences, brand positioning, a new logo, the advertising campaign and the public relations and social media strategy. Ryan Thompson of Bailey Gardner spoke about the primary and secondary consumer research conducted in February 2011 through April 2011. The research allowed Bailey Gardner to use data to develop cluster segments that would be looked at for consumer target audiences. Bailey Gardner also did some horsemen research that was passed on to the CMC. Bailey Gardner found that high frequency players made up 3 percent of the market size. On the opposite side of the spectrum were those who focused on entertainment and socialization, while the mid-spectrum represented moderate core and horse lovers. That was where there was opportunity to develop consumers. Bailey Gardner found that the industry had to reach a consumer audience before the age of 34. If consumers were not cultivated before that age, they were lost. The median age to target in terms of marketing and buying media was 21. The three middle cluster segments were females ages 18 to 55 and males ages 18 to 35. The campaign would be launched in California and directed at households with income of \$50,000 to \$100,000.

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Greg Joumas of Bailey Gardner spoke about creating a brand for California horse racing. In creating a brand the company had to think about what California racing was, and how it could be positioned to get younger persons involved and engaged in the sport so they became lifelong fans and participants, and moved on the scale to frequent enthusiasts and users of the sport. Bailey Gardner did brand workshops where it worked on the brand positioning and the relationship with the consumer. Horse racing was an active sport in that with pari-mutuel wagering the consumer was often at the live racetrack, and so the consumer became part of the sport. Another item was that horse racing was timeless; it was infectious and got in one's blood. Mr. Thompson said Bailey Gardner developed 14 strategies as part of its marketing plan. All of the strategies had tactics supporting them from public relations, social media and paid advertising perspectives. The goal was to drive interaction with the brand, create awareness and a shared voice in the marketplace for California racing as an entertainment, social and gaming option. From the paid media perspective, a campaign would be launched in mid-August through December, 2011 targeting the San Diego, Los Angeles and San Francisco markets. Seventy five percent of the media spend would be online and video, while 25 percent would be billboard or outside posting. Mr. Joumas said with the logo development it was important to touch upon the creative aspect of the sport. It had a live component wherein people were not passive observers; they were engaged and participated when they gambled. He said the logo stated "Cal Racing, Fun Runs Here." The logo referred to the classic heyday of the sport, while making it more current, modern and vibrant. The video commercials would address everyone's inner jockey; that little voice in one that pushes to have fun and to go for it. Mr. Joumas discussed two commercials that talked about the "inner jockey." One commercial was aimed at women, while the other was male oriented. Carrie Jones of Bailey Gardner spoke about the social media component of the

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proposed advertising program, which included a Cal Racing Facebook page, Twitter and Youtube. She also spoke about targeting audiences that normally did not engage in horse racing and creating cohesive programs that carried the brand as a whole throughout California. Mr. Joumas said Bailey Gardner wanted to leverage an HBO series called "Luck." Chairman Brackpool asked if the abbreviation "Cal" was kept because of the previous website, or was it such an obvious abbreviation that it was okay. Mr. Joumas said "Cal" was a great mnemonic and was highly recognizable. Money did not have to be spent educating consumers about something they already understood. Vice-Chairman Israel asked what the value was in the term "Cal Racing" when the public thought about going to the track by the name of the race track. Mr. Hartman said it was like a seal. Golden Gate Fields might advertise under its own name, but it would also have the Cal Racing logo in its advertisement – like the Good Housekeeping seal of approval. Golden Gate Fields would be stating it was part of Cal Racing; part of the best. There would be a campaign for Cal Racing in general, but it would feature the track that was running at the time. Commissioner Harris asked what the budget was for the campaign. Shannon McDonald of the CMC said the budget was \$500,000 for 2011. Commissioner Harris said it seemed as if that were not very much money for an advertising campaign. Mr. Thompson stated that was why Bailey Gardner selected the mediums such as online video for the campaign. Social Media represented high engagement and made the brand a lot larger than it would seem using traditional advertising. Mr. Hartman said the key question was how much would be spent in 2012. The \$500,000 spent in 2011 also included getting the campaign formalized and ready to go, and the budget for 2012 could be determined for a bigger launch. Commissioner Harris asked if there were ways to monitor the response to the advertising campaign. Mr. Thompson said a pre-awareness study was conducted so a post campaign survey could be done to measure

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awareness of the brand. In addition, there were measureable entities online through the social media networks and website traffic, microsite traffic for the campaign and performance metrics. There would be monthly reports measuring all of the measurements. Mr. Joumas added that part of the research was the campaign to shift peoples' consideration for the sport, as it was important to get them engaged before they were 30 years old. Vice-Chairman Israel commented almost every dollar of the campaign should be spent on social media because that was the most important source of information for people in that age group. He asked if a variety of logos were test marketed. Mr. Joumas said there was not a lot of money spent on focus groups because logos were very subjective. Instead, the committee relied on its expertise in the area, and used creative exercises to arrive at the logo. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if there were any copyright issues. Mr. Joumas said a full search was conducted. Commissioner Choper said there was a substantive message that could be delivered that was not very complicated. The first part was stressing the fun or thrill of a stretch run. The second aspect was the fun of gambling. There were many levels of gambling available in horse racing and in the end one got to cash tickets, which was fun. Commissioner Harris said the key was figuring out how much money it would take to change the public perception of horse racing. However, it should be in conjunction with the tracks that were running because it all benefited them. The funding source was all from satellite wagering, but that was a shrinking resource. Assuming the advertising campaign was a good thing and it generated a return, the industry needed to look at other ways to fund it going forward. Chairman Brackpool said there would be a Board workshop on the advance deposit wagering structure, and the issue of funding such campaigns could be part of that. The industry needed to ensure funding sources were related to the overall handle. Chairman Brackpool added he could not count the times he heard people at the race track state they had no idea how to place

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a wager. That meant the industry was not doing something right because people struggled with placing pari-mutuel wagers. He stated the CMC would continue to develop its plans, and make another report in the near future. John Bucalo of the Barona Casino spoke about his concerns regarding the CMC marketing plans.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1846.5, POSTMORTEM EXAMINATION, TO REQUIRE THE PRECEDING SIX MONTHS OF VETERINARY RECORDS BE SUBMITTED WITHIN 48 HOURS AFTER SUBMISSION OF THE NECROPSY SUBMISSION FORM.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposed amendment of Rule 1846.5, Postmortem Examination, would require the owner's or trainer's veterinarian to provide the veterinary medical record for the preceding six months of any horse that died or was euthanized on the grounds of a facility under the jurisdiction of the Board. Ms. Wagner stated numerous comments were received during the 45-day public comment period. She said all the comments were in opposition to the proposed amendment. Dr. Mark Dedomenico of the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) stated his organization requested that the equine medical records be anonymous with no repercussions for any of the parties involved. Dr. Jeff Blea, a private veterinarian, stated he had more questions than objections to the proposed amendment. He said the California necropsy program was the gold standard. The industry learned a lot from the work of the necropsy program and it would be detrimental if it were forced to cease operation because of litigation. Dr. Blea stated the regulation required veterinary records to be provided within 48 hours of the death of the horse. That timeframe was not practical for most veterinarians due to staffing and the ability to collect records and deliver them. He also asked in what format the records would be required. Dr. Blea said practitioners were comfortable with the statement in

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the regulation that the records would remain confidential. If the necropsy program were going to do a study on injury and an analysis of injuries, the practitioners would like to be included. If the Board was looking for causal relationships most veterinarians would be fine with transparency, but they would also like to be included. The veterinarians would like to meet with some of the Commissioners and become involved in the process. Dr. Blea said his recommendation would be to table the proposal until the veterinarians could meet with Commissioners. Dr. Joe Dowd, a private veterinarian, stated his main objection to the regulation was the requirement that records be produced within 48 hours. He added he agreed the regulation should be tabled and a committee be formed with veterinarians to organize exactly how the data would be collected and utilized. Commissioner Harris said he tended to agree with the specific suggestions of the veterinarians. The time-frame for delivering the records could be modified. He commented the CHRB had the power of subpoenaing records, so the regulation was not that dramatic a change. Commissioner Moss asked if there would be penalties if during the necropsy it was found that an illegal drug substance had been administered to the horse. He stated he was trying to decrease the possibility of litigation. Commissioner Moss said he agreed that the veterinarians should have the opportunity to work with the Board in developing the regulation. He added the 48 hour requirement could be modified. Commissioner Derek stated the Board currently held subpoena powers, and all the logistics seemed to work when records were subpoenaed. The proposed regulation would save all parties money because issuing and acting on a subpoena was expensive. Further, Commissioner Derek said she did not know why an owner or trainer would not wish to provide the records for the benefit of research. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if a veterinarian had the same client privilege as a medical doctor who worked on people. Robert Miller, CHRB staff counsel, said the holder of the veterinarian privilege was the owner. The

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veterinarian was only the agent of the owner. Chairman Brackpool stated the regulation was not meant to create a witch hunt. It was intended to foster research because the industry wanted to do the right thing by the horses. He said the regulation would be put over until the October 2011 Regular Board Meeting. In the mean time, a working group comprised of the CHRB staff counsel, veterinarians and the TOC could vet the proposal. Commissioner Choper said he would like to know with respect to litigation what happened to the veterinary medical information once it got to the Board. Commissioner Rosenberg added the language should be clear about the information being used for research. Dr. Dedomenico said the veterinarians believed the rule was meant to foster medical research, not illegalities. He asked if his impression was correct, or was the Board looking at a combination of both issues? Vice-Chairman Israel said the rule was intended to foster research. Dr. Dedomenico said the Board was stating on one side that it had a right to get the information, which it did if it thought something was wrong. On the other hand, if nothing was wrong, and the Board wanted the records of a number of horses, then it was conducting research. A research project had to be dealt with differently from an investigation into misdeeds. He added he thought the rule was a research project, and that was the view of the TOC.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES TURF CLUB (T) AT GOLDEN GATE FIELDS, COMMENCING AUGUST 19, 2011 THROUGH OCTOBER 2, 2011,

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Los Angeles Turf Club (LATC) proposed to run August 19, 2011 through October 2, 2011, or 22 days, at Golden Gate Fields Race Track. LATC would run 205 races, or 9.32 races per day, which was contrary to the usual 8.6 races. The first

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post time would be 12:45 p.m. Ms. Wagner said the application was complete, as presented. Robert Hartman of LATC stated that due to field size his organization was cutting the race week to three days a week. That would also allow LATC to hold a promotion every race day, so whether one attended Friday, Saturday or Sunday there would be a special event. Vice-Chairman Israel said his issue with the application was that MI Developments (MID) was essentially applying for the license. Of the 363 pages, 350 was MID financial information; however, MID no longer existed as a California racing entity. He asked how the Board would know LATC could fulfill its financial obligations if all it had were MID financials. Chairman Brackpool said the Board was approving LATC, which was a wholly owned subsidiary of the Stronach Group to which the Board gave a waiver at its June 2011 Regular Meeting. The waiver included requirements for audited financials and a letter of credit, among other items. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if the items required by the waiver were received. Ms. Wagner stated staff received the letter of credit. Commissioner Moss asked what LATC's biggest race was. Mr. Hartman said LATC decided not to run any stakes races over the short period of time to put more money towards the claiming and allowance races. Traditionally the lower level races supplemented the stakes races. If the stakes race had a field of six horses and a \$4,000 claiming race had a field of ten horses, the handle would be larger on the claiming race. Commissioner Moss asked if the attendance would suffer without stakes races. Mr. Hartman said that was something LATC would learn. Commissioner Moss stated that from a marketing point more fans may appear for an event. Mr. Hartman said LATC was currently planning a fall meeting, and it had a heavy stakes schedule. If it appeared that the no stakes meeting did not work LATC would alter its fall schedule. Commissioner Harris said he appreciated the new racing schedule but he questioned the lack of stakes races. Stakes races were important to Northern California

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owner-breeders because of the black type that accompanied the stakes. He urged LATC to take another look at stakes. They did not have to have big purses, but Northern California racing in general could suffer because of a lack of stakes opportunities. Commissioner Rosenberg referenced recent press reports about the possible sale of the property on which Golden Gate Fields sat. He stated there were also comments about building another track. There was already a shortage of horses and racing opportunities in Northern California, and a lot of owners and trainer would be concerned about timing of such actions. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if Mr. Hartman could give an idea regarding how long such a process would take. Mr. Hartman said the University of California Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory project was a possible project. The Golden Gate Fields property was one of six finalists for the project and the laboratory should make a decision by the end of 2011. It would not break ground until 2014 or 2015. That meant racing was secure at Golden Gate Fields for at least the next three years. Mr. Hartman stated the Stronach Group was committed to horse racing in Northern California. However, the current business model was broken. The Stronach Group wanted to fix the model. It was also actively looking at alternate sites for a new racetrack in the event Golden Gate Fields was chosen by the laboratory. Commissioner Rosenberg asked if there had been a discussion about a new business model for horse racing. Mr. Hartman said his organization was currently thinking about that. The issue presented an opportunity to build a racetrack of the future. He commented Golden Gate Fields was 95 percent empty on a daily basis. It was built during a time when it saw 30,000 fans, but now on a week day there were only 1,200 fans; some days it felt like a ghost town. The Stronach Group had to look at the current model and determine where a new track might be located and what a new business model might include. Commissioner Choper asked where horses for the meeting were going to come from and how the purses would

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compare to other meetings. Mr. Hartman stated horses would come from Arizona and Minnesota. Horses would also come from Emerald Downs and Vancouver. He said the problem in California was not purses, it was the cost of doing business. Even if purses were raised a little it was still difficult to break even. Mr. Hartman added purses at Golden Gate Fields were higher than those in Arizona and other states. Commissioner Choper said if LATC were to hold some \$20,000 claiming races it would be as good as stakes races for wagering fans. Mr. Hartman commented that the middle claiming rank had disappeared throughout the state. The Southern California tracks had the lower and higher claimers, but the middle was gone. Chairman Brackpool said the meeting was 27 days in 2010, and would be 22 days in 2011. He asked what the total number of races was. Mr. Hartman said only 26 races would be lost; there would be 205 races versus 231. Chairman Brackpool asked if LATC was trying to get back an overpayment as part of its agreement with Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC). Mr. Hartman said there was currently a significant overpayment. However, LATC was not trying to get it back during the meeting. Mr. Hartman said LATC hoped the purses would match the handle so the meeting would break even. Chairman Brackpool asked why LATC was projecting being down when Hollywood Park, Pleasanton and Stockton were up. Mr. Hartman said when the application was submitted business was off between 12 percent and 15 percent. The projected numbers were based on the data available at that time. Commissioner Moss asked if the Stronach Group was participating in any satellite opportunities in San Francisco. Mr. Hartman said the group was looking at locations. Chairman Brackpool **motioned** to approve the application for license to operate a race meeting of LATC at Golden Gate Fields. Commissioner Moss **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

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DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY FAIR (F) AT FAIRPLEX, COMMENCING SEPTEMBER 9, 2011 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 24, 2011, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Los Angeles County Fair (LACF) proposed to race from September 9, 2011 through September 25, 2011, for 13 days, which was two days less than in 2010. The first post time would be 1:00 p.m., daily. The advance deposit providers were TVG and XpressBet and Twinspires. Ms. Wagner stated staff recommended the Board approve the application as presented. Mike Cedar of LACF said the meeting would run concurrent with the Los Angeles County Fair. The number of race days was reduced to increase the field size over the 2010 meeting. Mr. Cedar stated LACF was anticipating a lower handle, so it reduced the purse size and had fewer races per day. He commented LACF was wrestling with an overpayment. LATC hoped to recapture about half the overpayment and did not have the luxury of being able to recoup the funds at any other time. Michelle Demott of LACF spoke about her organization's marketing plans. She stated enhancements had been made to the facility, such as the Long Board Bar, and the removal of walls to create a breezeway extending from the main thoroughfare of the fair directly into the racetrack. LACF was also capitalizing on the popularity of food trucks by bringing more than 50 trucks into the infield on the opening weekend. LACF was also offering more wagering education for new fans, as well as providing walk around clerks in the food truck area. Chairman Brackpool said he was disturbed by the fact that LACF had such an ambitious marketing plan while it projected a decline in the handle. He stated the industry was not seeing the same decline in other racing venues. Pleasanton was up 16 percent to 17 percent over 2010. Chairman Brackpool said he did not understand how LACF reconciled its marketing with a decline. Mr. Cedar stated LACF looked at historical data and used it as the benchmark for its application. That did not mean LACF would not try everything possible to

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bring in new fans. Chairman Brackpool said he understood that, but the Board was struggling with the contrast between an ambitious marketing plan and a projected decline in handle. All the other fairs were increasing handle, so how much lower would the LACF handle be if it were not doing all of its marketing? Commissioner Choper asked if LACF was communicating with the other fairs to discover how they increased attendance. Cliff Goodrich, representing LACF, said he believed LACF was a bit leery because it had over projected its handle for the past three meetings. If LACF did better than projected Mr. Goodrich stated he assumed the overpayment would be further reduced after consulting the Thoroughbred Owners of California. Chairman Brackpool said that meant LACF hoped to do better, and if it did better it would reduce the overpayment but not increase purses. Mr. Goodrich said LACF would want to decrease the overpayment so in 2012 it could start with a clean slate. Commissioner Rosenberg asked how LACF determined the amount it would spend for promotion and advertising, and if LACF broke out its profit and loss for the race meeting on behalf of the overall fair entity. Mr. Cedar said the profit and loss for the race meeting was broken out. The marketing budget was determined by the total rating LACF wanted to make in the marketplace for its meeting. In addition, \$2.5 million was spent marketing the Los Angeles County Fair and part of that message was that there was live racing at the fair. Commissioner Moss asked if moving the fair dates had ever been discussed. Mr. Cedar stated the fair had been held in September since 1922, so it was deeply rooted in the community. It would be financial suicide to move the fair to another month. Vice-Chairman Israel asked how many people would attend the fair the weeks the track was operating. Mr. Cedar said about a million persons would attend the fair and probably 50 percent of those attendees would make it to the racetrack. Vice-Chairman Israel asked if there was a way for LACF to count the number of people attending the races. Mr. Cedar said that was difficult

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because the admission was not separate. There was a turnstile count for the outer gate, but not for the racetrack. Vice-Chairman Israel stated having an actual count of people who walked in and stayed at the races would be valuable. Mr. Cedar said exit surveys were conducted so it was possible to extract the number of people who attended the races. Vice-Chairman Israel said LACF had an advantage because it had walk-up customers which should correspond with a financially sound race meeting. However, the equation was not working, which was difficult to understand. Mr. Cedar said the biggest challenge was getting people from one side of the grandstand to the other. He stated LACF even handed out vouchers for a \$2.00 wager. Commissioner Harris said it was discouraging that LACF was not getting more people to enjoy its races. There needed to be an analysis of the fair race meetings so the different parties could try to figure out how to attract more race fans. Commissioner Moss motioned to approve the application for license to operate a race meeting of LACF. Commissioner Harris seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO OPERATE A MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY BY THE ORG RESTAURANTS, LLC, SANTA MARIA, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO BUT NOT EXCEEDING TWO YEARS.

Chairman Brackpool said the item was withdrawn.

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD REGARDING A REPORT ON THE PROGRESS OF THE DIRT AND TURF RACE COURSES AT SANTA ANITA PARK RACE TRACK.

George Haines of Santa Anita Park Race Track (SA) said the racetrack at SA was doing well. A new blend was mixed and installed and the new surface was half way completed. SA hoped to be open for training by July 26, 2011. CHRB Executive Director Kirk Breed said the CHRB was

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satisfied with the progress at the SA racetrack. Commissioner Harris asked when Hollywood Park would close and the stabling resume at SA. Mr. Haines said the parties were currently discussing that issue. Chairman Brackpool stated he wished to thank Hollywood Park for making extra allowances and staying open while SA worked on its racetrack.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE DISTRIBUTION OF RACE DAY CHARITY PROCEEDS OF THE LOS ALAMITOS QUARTER HORSE RACING ASSOCIATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$42,574 TO FOUR BENEFICIARIES.

Commissioner Derek said she understood that it was not required, but she saw nothing in the request for the retirement and welfare of horses. Chairman Brackpool commented he had a slightly different view in that he was pleased all of the funds were going to horse racing related organizations. Rich English, representing Los Alamitos Quarter Horse Racing Association (LAQHRA), said the request was the first time in a number of years there had been profits on the charity race day. In 2012 LAQHRA would certainly consider retired horses as part of its distribution. Chairman Brackpool motioned to approve the request by LAQHRA to distribute race day charity proceeds. Commissioner Harris seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPROVAL OF THE 2010/2011 AGREEMENT PROVIDING FUNDING SUPPORT FOR THE BOARD.

CHRB Executive Director Kirk Breed said the CHRB worked closely with the industry to develop the 2010/2011 agreement that provided funding support for the Board. He stated the number was 57.83 percent of the savings as developed under Senate Bill 16. Chairman Brackpool asked how much the projected savings were. Francisco Gonzales stated the projected

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savings were \$20,257,000. The CHRB budget would be approximately 57.83 percent of that number. Commissioner Harris commented it was important for the public to understand the Board's budget came entirely from the industry and not the General Fund. Vice-Chairman Israel motioned to approve the 2010/2011 agreement providing funding support for the Board. Commissioner Moss seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.

Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO OPERATE A MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY BY THE ORG RESTAURANTS, LLC, SANTA MARIA.

ORG Restaurants, LLC, filed an application for a license to operate a minisatellite wagering site in their Original Roadhouse Grill restaurant in Santa Maria. Southern California Off-Track Wagering Inc. (SCOTWINC) has acted as the coordinator during the application process. ORG's minisatellite application proposes to begin operations September 1, 2011, through August 31, 2013, for a period of up to two years. ORG's application indicates there were no city or county requirements that affect the proposed minisatellite facility. ORG is modifying its existing business license with the City of Santa Maria.

At the May 26, 2011, regular Board meeting SCOTWINC filed an application for a license to operate a minisatellite wagering facility at The Horse Man's Club in Santa Maria. The Board approved SCOTWINC's application to operate a minisatellite in the interim, until a minisatellite located in the area was licensed and operational.

- The Original Roadhouse Grill is a restaurant located in Santa Maria, California. The proposed wagering site will be located in the Southern zone.

Business and Professions Code section 19605.25 (a) (1) provides no minisatellite may be within 20 miles of a racetrack, a satellite wagering facility, or a tribal casino that has a satellite wagering facility. If the proposed facility is within 20 miles of one of the above-referenced satellite facilities, then the consent of each facility within a 20-mile radius must be given before the proposed facility may be approved by the board.

1. Security Personnel

A uniformed security guard will be deployed during all hours of mini-satellite wagering. Staffing will be increased as necessary to maintain proper operational control.

One uniformed security guard will be deployed on a stationary basis at the entrance to the mini-satellite. This individual will check the identification of everyone entering the mini-satellite to ensure age compliance and will hand stamp those patrons that meet the age restriction requirements. NO ONE UNDER THE AGE OF 21 WILL BE ALLOWED TO ENTER THE MINI-SATELLITE.

2. Mini-Satellite Mutuel Personnel

Mini-Satellite personnel (ticket sellers) are licensed by the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) and will have their CHRB license on their person at all times while performing duties.

Industry regulations require them to be attired in a white shirt and black slacks while on duty.

3. Security Cameras

There are a total of seventeen security cameras located throughout the ORG, two of which is trained on the mini-satellite wagering area and on the mutuel counter area that contains teller operated wagering terminals and a small office for counting money and storing supplies.

5. Security Signage

Prominent signage will be placed in entrances and inside the mini-satellite wagering areas indicating:

YOU MUST BE 21 OR OLDER TO WAGER

6. Ticket Cashing Policy

Individual winning tickets (or multiple winning tickets on the same race) presented for payment will be subject to a maximum cash outlay of Five Thousand dollars (\$5,000). Amounts owed a customer in excess of this maximum will be paid by either same day check or voucher, at the discretion of the customer.

If a customer wishes to be paid in cash in excess of the \$5,000 maximum, he/she has two options:

- a. The ticket can be immediately taken to any racetrack in Southern California that is open for business at that time and cashed for the full amount of the winnings, or
- b. The ORG Mini-Satellite will arrange to remit the entire winning amount in cash within three (3) days of the date of initial presentation for payment. The payment will be made at a time to ensure optimum security and will include security escort to the individual's car.

7. Armored Car Service

Mini-Satellite armored car pickup and drop off service will be conducted once or twice a week, as necessary, on a random schedule, between the hours of 8am and 5pm.







Business and Professions Code section 19605.25 provides that the Board may approve an additional 15 minisatellite wagering sites in each zone if, among other requirements, an agreement in accordance with section 19605.3 has been executed and approved by the Board. Business and Professions Code section 19605.3 states that the organization described in section 19608.2 is the party that executes the agreement approved by the Board with the association conducting a racing meeting and the satellite wagering facility. The organization described in 19608.2 is Southern California Off-Track Wagering, Inc. (SCOTWINC). In addition to executing the minisatellite wagering agreements, SCOTWINC has assumed the task of locating and developing minisatellite wagering sites. At the May 26, 2011 Regular Board Meeting the Board heard from Rick Baedeker of SCOTWINC regarding his efforts to develop minisatellite wagering sites in California. The Board requested that in the near future SCOTWINC give a presentation regarding what it would take to foster a quicker growth of minisatellite wagering sites, as well as a specific report on locations being considered and any impediments, if any, that might exist.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19605.73 states thoroughbred racing associations, fairs, and the organization responsible for contracting with thoroughbred racing associations and fairs with respect to the conduct of racing meetings, may form a private, statewide marketing organization to market and promote thoroughbred and fair horse racing, including, but not limited to, establishment and maintenance of an Internet Web site featuring California thoroughbred and fair racing, the establishment and administration of players incentive programs for those who wager on thoroughbred association and fair races, and promotional activities at satellite wagering facilities to increase their attendance and handle. The California Marketing Committee (CMC) is the private organization formed pursuant to the statute.

Senate Bill (SB) 1072 (Calderon), Chapter 283, Statutes of 2010, extended the operation of the CMC until January 1, 2014. SB 1072 also changed the amount to be distributed to the CMC from an amount equal to 0.4 percent of the total amount handled at each satellite wagering facility, to 0.2 percent of the total amount handled by satellite wagering facilities for thoroughbred and fair meetings only. Under SB 1072, the amount distributed to the CMC may be adjusted by the Board, but it may not exceed 0.25 percent of the total amount handled by satellite wagering facilities for thoroughbred and fair meetings. The legislation also deleted the provision that allowed CMC funds to be used to defray the cost of workers' compensation coverage for stable employees and jockeys of thoroughbred trainers.

In March 2010 the Board heard a report by the CMC on its budget for 2010 and 2011 and its marketing and promotion plans. A CMC representative reported there was no budget for 2011 because of the existing sunset clause. The 2010 CMC budget, which was finalized in January 2010, projected a year end deficit of \$199,952.

Subsequent to the passage of SB 1072, and prior to its implementation on January 1, 2011, the CMC requested that the Board consider increasing the amount distributed to the CMC from 0.2 percent to 0.25 percent of the total amount handled by satellite wagering facilities for thoroughbred and fair meeting. At its December 2011 Regular Meeting the Board voted to increase the amount distributed to the CMC from 0.2 percent to 0.25 percent. Robert Hartman, representing the CMC, stated the requested increase would be used to run a public relations and branding campaign.

The CMC is prepared to present an update on its 2011 operating budget.



EMERGENCY MEDICAL PLAN PROCEDURE

In case of an accident to a jockey on the racetrack during the Big Fresno Fair's Race Meet, October 6-16 2011, or at any time during the meet, the jockey is to immediately report injury to the track physician and/or the American Ambulance EMT's.

When a horse and jockey go down during workouts and/or during the race meet, the track ambulance, horse ambulance, and the track veterinarian go immediately to the scene of the accident. Depending on the severity of the injury, the jockey will either be transported to the Hospital and/or taken to the Jockey's Quarters for the track physician to evaluate the severity of injuries. When it is known that the horse is severely injured, the horse ambulance travels immediately to the scene of the accident and a screen blocking the public's view of the injured horse will be set up prior to be taken off the track by the horse ambulance.

A Fair staff official will be advised immediately when a horse and jockey go down during a workout and/or during the race meet in order to obtain the necessary information regarding the accident and notifying the owner/trainer and family member of the injured. This will help to facilitate the expediency of the paperwork for the employee, owner/trainer, and file the required information to the hospital in order for them to get reimbursed.







Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE PACIFIC RACING ASSOCIATION AT SANTA ANITA SEPTEMBER 30, 2011 THROUGH NOVEMBER 6, 2011.

Pacific Racing Association (PRA) filed its application to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Santa Anita:

- September 30 through November 6, 2011, or 24 days. The association proposes to race 207 races, or 8.63 per day. The PRA did not conduct a Southern California race meet during the prior year time frame. In 2009 Oak Tree Racing Association ran a race meet at Santa Anita during this time frame. In 2010 Oak Tree ran its race meeting at Hollywood Park during this time frame. It ran a total of 253 races, or 8.16 races per day with an average of 7.82 runners per race during the 2009 meet. The (actual) Oak Tree Racing Association average daily purse for the 2009 meet was \$359,798. The (estimated) PRA average daily purse for this meet is \$420,666.
- The race dates proposed are the dates the Board allocated.



EMERGENCY MEDICAL PROCEDURES FOR ON-TRACK INJURY TO JOCKEYS

"FIRST RESPONSE"

- In the event of an accident, SANTA ANITA Trackside Human Ambulance "Unit 41T" which is manned by SANTA ANITA-contracted EMTs and is following the horses and jockeys in the race will respond immediately to the site of the accident. The attending EMT's shall arrive equipped with basic cardiac life support (BCLS), AED, and full C-spine equipment
- An "on-site evaluation" of injuries to the jockey(s) shall be made by Unit 41T.



"ON-SITE EVALUATION"

- Based on the EMT's "on-site evaluation" of injuries, a decision shall be made to either treat the injured jockey(s) on-site or to transport to Methodist Hospital Emergency Room.
 - If on-site treatment is deemed sufficient, Unit 41T shall transport the injured jockey(s) directly to the First Aid Office where the Track Physician will be primary care provider or,
 - If off-site treatment is deemed necessary Unit 41 will have the Security Department (channel 1) contact the emergency room and advised them of the situation. Unit 41 will then transport jockey(s) to Methodist Hospital Emergency Room.



"INJURY TREATMENT"

- If the injured jockey(s) is treated at the First Aid Office the Track Physician shall be the primary care provider unless or until the Track Physician surrenders custody of the patient based on his/her medical judgment;
 - If deemed necessary Unit 41T will transport the injured jockey(s) to Methodist Hospital.





Pacific Racing Association (PRA) filed its application to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Golden Gate Fields:

- October 19, 2011 through December 18, 2011, or 36 days. PRA proposes to race a total of 306 races, or 8.50 races per day. In the fall of 2010, PRA ran 42 days at GGF from October 20, 2010 through December 19, 2010. It ran a total of 354 races, or 8.43 races per day with an average of 6.76 runners per race during the 2010 fall meet. The average daily purse for the 2010 fall race meeting was \$144,657.67. The (estimated) average daily purse for this meet is \$147,705.69.



SECURITY CONTROLS

Graded Stakes and Races of \$100,000 or more

The following procedures have been put in place at Los Angeles Turf Club / Golden Gate Fields to ensure that proper security surveillance guidelines for races of \$100,000 or more are followed:

- Carrie Fawcett, Stable Superintendent, provides a list of starters to T. W. Johnson, Director of Security which includes the following information:
 1. Name of horse
 2. Name of trainer
 3. Barn number
 4. Stall number
- Supplemental security staff, provided by a licensed security contractor and licensed by the CHRB, are called in the morning of the race to meet with the Director of Security for the following instruction:
 - A. An overview of the race track operating procedures
 - B. A briefing of their duties throughout the day
 - C. All guards are asked to sign out for their specific video camera
 - D. A form is provided by the CHRB to each guard which is to be signed by the attending veterinarian when administering medication to bleeders.
 - E. Each guard is given a video camera to record ALL activities involving individuals entering and exiting their assigned stall. Instruction is given to first record the posted number on the stall to confirm that the camera is directed at the assigned horse.
 - F. Instruction is given to monitor any and all suspicious activity and to contact the Director of Security if and when suspicious activity occurs.
 - G. Guards are instructed to position themselves as close to the horse's stall without jeopardizing safety.
 - H. The horse and handler will be followed on foot by each guard to the receiving barn before the race.
 - I. After all horses are safely in the receiving barn, the guards are instructed to meet in the Security office with the Director of Security. The guards sign that they have returned their video camera and participate in a discussion of the day's surveillance activities.
- Surveillance videotapes are saved until all test results have received a negative result.

"FIRST RESPONSE"

- In the event of an accident, the Stewards and/or Outriders shall immediately contact the Track Physician ("Jockey Down") using Radio Channel #7 (*or the accident may very well be witnessed directly by the Track Physician*);
- The on-track GGF Human Ambulance (manned by GGF-contracted EMTs) and the Track Physician (transported via the GGF "chase" or "Vet" truck) shall respond immediately to the site of the accident;
- The attending medical professionals shall arrive equipped with advanced cardiac life support (ACLS) and other necessary acute medical treatment equipment & supplies;
- An "on-site evaluation" of injuries to the jockey(s) shall be made by the Track Physician.



"ON-SITE EVALUATION"

- Based on the Track Physician's "on-site evaluation" of injuries, a decision shall be made to either treat the injured jockey(s) on-site or to request emergency medical transport for off-site treatment at a hospital trauma center;
 - If on-site treatment is deemed sufficient, the GGF Human Ambulance shall transport the injured jockey(s) directly to the GGF Medical Clinic; or,
 - If off-site treatment is deemed necessary, "911" shall be used to summon a City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance (*a Fire Dept. truck shall also respond*).



"INJURY TREATMENT"

- If the injured jockey(s) is treated at the GGF Medical Clinic, the Track Physician shall be the primary care provider unless (or until) the Track Physician surrenders custody of the patient based on his/her medical judgment;
- If the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance is summoned to respond, the injured jockey(s) shall be transferred to this ambulance (*accompanied by the Track Physician*) at either of the two following locations for transport to a local hospital;
 - If the injuries are deemed less severe, the jockey will be transported by the GGF Human Ambulance to an off-track location for pick-up by the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance; or,
 - If the injuries are deemed severe and the jockey(s) cannot be moved, the City of Albany Fire Dept. ambulance will be escorted by GGF security personnel directly onto the track for patient pickup.

In consultation with the Track Physician, an "Accident/Injury Investigation Report" must be completed by track management following completion of the above-noted procedures.

"PRIMERA RESPUESTA"



(b) Each racing association and racing fair shall adopt and maintain an emergency medical plan detailing the procedures that shall be used in the event of an on-track injury. The plan shall be posted in each jockey room in English and Spanish. (c) Prior to every race meeting, the racing association or racing fair shall contact area hospitals to coordinate procedures for the rapid admittance and treatment of emergency injuries. (d) Each racing association or racing fair shall designate a health and safety manager and assistant manager, who shall be responsible for compliance with the provisions of this section and one of whom shall be on duty at all times when live racing is conducted. The health and safety manager may, at the discretion of the racing association, be the person designated to perform risk management duties on behalf of the association.



LOS ALAMITOS RACE COURSE FOR 12 MONTHS PURSUANT TO
THE PROVISIONS OF
CHRB RULE 1844.1, SUSPENSION OF AUTHORIZED MEDICATION

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this State where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the CHRB. Business and Professions Code section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Business and Professions Code section 19562 states the Board may prescribe rules, regulations and conditions consistent with the provisions of this chapter, under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in this state. Business and Professions Code section 19580 states the Board shall adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines, and penalties relating to equine medication in order to preserve and enhance the integrity of horse racing in the state. Business and Professions Code section 19581 provides that no substance of any kind shall be administered by any means to a horse after it has been entered to race in a horse race, unless the Board has, by regulation, specifically authorized the use of the substance and the quantity and composition thereof. Board Rule 1844.1 provides that the Board may temporarily suspend the authorized administration of a permitted drug, substance or medication after a public hearing has been noticed in accordance with Government Code section 11125(a). The temporary suspension may be for a race, breed, or race meeting, provided all horses in the same race compete under the same conditions. The Board shall notify in writing the racing association and the trainer's organization of any temporary suspension, as specified.

Board regulations prohibit the administration of any drug, substance or medication after entry time with a few specific exceptions. The exceptions were established after due consideration by the Board based on information available at the time the regulations were adopted. Scientific information and practical experience in managing the threshold levels for the exceptions change over time as unintended consequences become apparent. Clenbuterol in quarter horse racing is an example. Clenbuterol is a beta-2 agonist approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in equines as a bronchodilator.

The Board established threshold levels consistent with therapeutic use to treat small airway disease. Clenbuterol, like all beta-2 agonists, has an adrenergic effect on muscle somewhat similar to anabolic steroids. Only the Ventipulmin brand of Clenbuterol is approved by the FDA. Non-FDA approved Clenbuterol at extremely high concentrations is being used in quarter horse racing for the adrenergic effect. The CHRB has confiscated and otherwise obtained samples of this illicit formulation. Clenbuterol violations have occurred at levels unattainable with the FDA approved formulation at FDA approved dosages.

At its February 17, 2011 Regular Meeting, the Board heard from the Equine Medical Director that non-FDA approved Clenbuterol was becoming a problem in quarter horse racing, and that the American Quarter Horse Association, the Los Alamitos Racing Association and the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association were considering asking racing jurisdictions to prohibit Clenbuterol in quarter horse racing. At that time the board initiated the process to adopt Rule 1844.1, which would allow it to temporarily suspend an authorized medication for horses entered to race. The rule was approved by the Office of Administrative Law and became effective July 21, 2011.

ANALYSIS

The Los Alamitos Race Course and the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association requested that the CHRB consider enacting Rule 1844.1 to suspend the authorized administration of Clenbuterol to horses entered to race at the Los Alamitos Race Course for a period of 12 months effective October 14, 2011. The Equine Medical Director reports that since February 2011 there have been eight confirmed Clenbuterol violations, with one pending. The delay in the effective date of the suspension will allow time for any Clenbuterol that may have already been administered to a horse to "wash out" of its system.

RECOMMENDATION

RULE 1844.1. SUSPENSION OF AUTHORIZED MEDICATION

1844.1 Suspension of Authorized Medication

(a) After a public meeting that has been noticed in accordance with Government Code section 11125(a), the Board may for any cause temporarily suspend the authorized administration to a horse entered to race of any drug, substance or medication that is otherwise permitted under Rule 1844, Authorized Medication.

(b) The temporary suspension of the authorized administration of a drug, substance or medication may be for a race, breed, or race meeting, provided all horses in the same race compete under the same conditions.

(c) The Board shall notify in writing the racing association and the trainer's organization of any temporary suspension of authorization to administer a drug, substance or medication to a horse entered to race. The written notification shall at minimum:

- (1) State the authorized medication whose use is temporarily suspended,
- (2) The period of time for which the use of the authorized medication is temporarily suspended, and
- (3) Whether the temporary suspension is for a specific breed or a race meeting.

(d) A suspension of authorization to administer a drug, substance or medication to a horse entered to race shall not exceed 12 months.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19550 states the Board shall require each licensed racing association that conducts 14 or less weeks of racing to designate three racing days, and each licensed racing association that conducts more than 14 weeks of racing to designate five racing days during any one meeting, to be conducted as charity days by the licensee for the purpose of distribution of the net proceeds therefrom to beneficiaries through the distribution agent. No racing association shall be required to pay to a distributing agent for the purpose of distribution to beneficiaries more than an amount equal to two-tenths of one percent of the association's total on-track handle on live races conducted by the association at the meeting. Business and Professions Code section 19556 provides that the distributing agent shall make the distribution to beneficiaries qualified under this article. At least 20 percent of the distribution shall be made to charities associated with the horse racing industry. An additional five percent shall be paid to a welfare fund and another five percent shall be paid to a non-profit corporation, the primary purpose of which is to assist horsemen and backstretch personnel who are being affected adversely as a result of alcohol or substance abuse. In addition to the above distributions, a separate 20 percent shall be made to a nonprofit corporation or trust, the directors or trustees of which shall serve without compensation except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses, and which has as its sole purpose the accumulation of endowment funds, the income on which shall be distributed to qualified disabled jockeys.

ANALYSIS

Los Angeles Turf Club (LATC) is requesting approval to distribute race day charity proceeds generated at its December 26, 2010 through April 17, 2011 race meeting at Santa Anita. From the net race day charity proceeds LATC is proposing to distribute \$136,770. The list of organizations selected and amount to be distributed is listed on the attachment. Staff notes that approximately 78.8 percent of the proceeds will be given to horse racing related organizations.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action. Staff recommends the Board approve the charity race day distribution as presented.

ADDENDUM TO LOS ANGELES TURF CLUB, INCORPORATED
REQUEST FOR AUTHORITY TO DISTRIBUTE
2010-2011 CHARITY DAY PROCEEDS

California Equine Retirement Foundation, Inc. – CERF is an organization that has developed into a full-care ranch to provide a full range of services to former race horses in need of rehabilitation toward retirement or placement in to a new career. CERF maintains 75 plus horses ranging in age from one year to 35 years, each having specific needs to insure proper health and optimal fitness. Each horse has its own paddock where appropriate portions are placed in feeders in the morning and again in the late afternoon. During the day hay is placed in outside feeders for grazing while the horses are turned out. Periodic re-evaluations are made to determine if any changes are needed in any individual's dietary regime. This program provides horses with proper nutrition to maintain health, fitness and longevity.

California Thoroughbred Foundation – CTF is a 503(c)(3) nonprofit organization that provides multiple benefits to individuals involved in the Thoroughbred industry. These include scholarship programs for veterinary medicine students at UC, Davis and maintenance of the Carleton F. Burke Memorial Library.

California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation – CTHF is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit foundation that provides assistance to the low income backstretch community occupied with the care of Thoroughbred race horses at California's major race tracks and fair circuits and CHRB recognized off-track training centers. The organization maintains three clinics throughout the state which see over 10,000 people each year, including numerous children who are prepared medically to return to school each year.

CARMA – The California Retirement Management Account is organized to raise money for retired California race horses. Their mission statement provides that they assist Thoroughbred retirement facilities that care for and retrain horses whose careers have ended after competing in California Thoroughbred races. Their services include tracking of retired California race horses and in working to find homes for retired equines. CARMA also manages a grant request process and distributes funds to qualified retirement facilities caring for such horses. CARMA is dedicated to the goal of providing funding for the rehabilitation, retraining and/or retirement of Thoroughbred horses that have raced in California.

Edwin Gregson Foundation – A nonprofit charitable foundation organized for the purpose of improving the lives of backstretch workers and their immediate family members at California race tracks. The organization provides backstretch workers with many educational programs, including "English as a second language," bible studies and provides numerous programs, including computer training programs at its recreation facility, computer games and various magazines in English and Spanish. It organizes family outings for the workers and their children, including trips to Magic Mountain in Valencia, California, Raging Waters, Galaxy soccer games, Dodger baseball games and excursions to the Long Beach Aquarium. The organization also maintains a recreational hall at Santa Anita Park for the benefit of the backside workers and their children.

Holy Angels Church (Backside Permanent Deacon) – This parish church is immediately adjacent to Santa Anita Park and is a place of worship for many of the backside workers and their families. In addition this parish provides the backside with a permanent deacon on-site to administer sacraments and counseling to the backside workers and their families who are predominantly of the Catholic faith. This donation helps to defray the costs incurred by the parish in administering this program.

Racetrack Chaplaincy of America (Southern California Council) – The Race Track Chaplaincy also administers to the spiritual, emotional and physical needs of the men, women and children of the race track's backstretch communities. The chaplaincy provides counseling for alcoholism and domestic violence situations, as well as support for those accused of crimes.

Southern California Equine Foundation, Inc. – SCEF is a nonprofit charitable organization providing hospital and equine ambulance services on the Southern California Thoroughbred racing circuit. Commonly known as the Equine Hospital, SCEF has a long history of service to the racing industry and the equine athlete. This is an organization “dedicated to the care of the injured horse.”

Tranquility Farm – This organization is a 501(c)(3) charity whose principal activity is to accept the donation of Thoroughbred horses from the race tracks and breeding farms and whose goal is to give such horses the best opportunity to find an adoptive home. For those Thoroughbreds that are not readily adoptable, the organization offers comfortable retirement wherever possible, giving priority to horses that were significant competitors or producers. Tranquility Farm requests, but does not require, that owners contribute sponsorship to help defray the costs of rehabilitation and retraining. No horse is denied acceptance at Tranquility Farm based upon its owner’s financial contribution.

United Pegasus Foundation – This is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization that aids the rescue of superannuated Thoroughbreds and provides care for such animals at its farm in Tehachapi, California. On occasion the organization purchases older horses at auction and acquires other Thoroughbreds at the request of owners and trainers. The retired Thoroughbreds are maintained in pleasant quarters and peaceful surroundings to live out the balance of their lives. This organization depends entirely upon donations for the purchase of food and other amenities required to maintain the Thoroughbreds.

Winners Foundation – The Winners Foundation provides confidential assistance on a one-to-one basis to employees and family members of California race tracks who are seeking help for alcohol, gambling and drug addiction. Each situation is geared to best support an individual’s desire to change his or her life for the better. The Foundation has developed a large referral base and maintains close relationships with community based services such as anonymous 12 step groups, city and county assistance agencies, detox centers, halfway houses and out-patient and in-patient hospital treatment programs. This service is provided to any employee or family member of anyone involved in the California Thoroughbred horse racing community, free of charge. This includes backstretch workers, as well as all employees of Del Mar, Fairplex, Golden Gate Fields, Hollywood Park, Oak Tree, Santa Anita and the California Association of Racing Fairs.

Permanently Disabled Jockeys’ Fund – This is a statutorily mandated distribution per Business and Professions Code Section 19556 (c). It provides support to disabled jockeys, as it name implies.

American Red Cross-Arcadia – The Arcadia branch of the nationally known and recognized American Red Cross aids victims of local disasters.

Arcadia Coordinating Council – Created to encourage the voluntary cooperation of organizations, agencies and individuals in the area to develop community responsibility for meeting the needs of the children and youth in Arcadia and neighborhoods nearby. This not-for-profit organization is comprised of individuals, all volunteers, from city and state government, civic welfare organizations, churches, service clubs, character building organizations and schools. It sponsors Campside Program, a program that seeks financial support from the community to enable deserving children to attend summer camp and to provide needed clothing for them.

Arcadia Educational Foundation – The Arcadia Educational Foundation is a nonprofit organization that was founded in 1981 by parents and community volunteers committed to preserving excellence in the Arcadia Unified School District. Over the past 30 years the Foundation has contributed in excess of \$7 million to items such as instructional materials, computers, science lab renovations, musical instruments, library media center improvements and the renovation of the high school athletic field. The organization provides \$25,000 in

teacher grants to add valuable equipment and instrumental aid in the classroom. The Foundation's main purpose is to raise funds for the district and it is the sole fundraiser for the Arcadia Unified School District. The Foundation is a qualified 501(c)(3) charitable organization.

Arcadia Meals on Wheels – Arcadia Meals on Wheels is a division of San Gabriel Valley YWCA. This organization provides assistance to the needy in the San Gabriel and Pomona Valleys. Each year they serve almost 6,000 older adults through case management and meals programs which help seniors to live independently in their own homes. In the past year the organization served 28,576 Asian style and 202,278 American style congregate meals, as well as 153,184 home delivered meals to older adults in the community.

Arcadia Mounted Enforcement Team – This organization was formed 14 years ago by the Arcadia Police Department in response to a request from the California Horse Racing Board for an increase in police presence on the backside of Santa Anita Park. The new unit made its debut at Santa Anita Park on Derby Day, 1997. The program includes members of the local police department and a group of Mounted Volunteers to assist the full-time officers. Six civilian volunteers and their horses were added to the program and were given classroom and field training in crowd control and security.

California Council on Problem Gambling – California Council on Problem Gambling is a nonprofit organization dedicated to support programs to assist problem gamblers and their families. At Santa Anita we encourage persons with gambling addictions to consult with this group.

Children's Hospital of Los Angeles – CHA has been recognized as one of the top ten medical facilities dedicated to caring for sick and disabled children and their families. Santa Anita Park has been a major contributor to this hospital since 1934 and has an honorary plaque dedicated to Santa Anita on its premises. The hospital's mission is to make a world of difference in the lives of children, adolescents and their families by integrating medical care, education and research to provide the highest quality care and service to the diverse Los Angeles community.

Children of the Night – Since 1979 Children of the Night has developed ground breaking programs for children ravaged by prostitution. The organization maintains a special home and on-site school, case management, recreation and a sports program for children who have no where else to turn for help. It maintains the most comprehensive program in North America, providing life saving and life changing services to children who have been forced to prostitute for food to eat and a place to sleep.

Cystinosis Research Foundation – This 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization raises funds dedicated entirely to research designed to find a cure for cystinosis, a rare disease affecting children at birth. The disease requires 24-hour, hour by hour treatment of children afflicted with the disease. All monies contributed to this organization are used for research only. No administrative expenses are deducted from funds raised. The organization is run totally by volunteers.

Fairplex Child Development Center – This section 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization contains a Child Development Center at Fairplex Park in partnership with the University of La Verne and continues to flourish and provide a high-quality learning environment where young children, their teachers and parents experience creative, hands on lessons day by day.

ICAN Associates – This tax exempt organization is dedicated to the prevention of child abuse. The organization is involved in many projects to assist children who are victims of abuse and neglect, including

work with prenatal substance exposed babies, family violence and its affects on children, child abduction, pregnant and parenting teens and reviews of child abuse fatalities.

Kids Community Dental Clinic – This organization provides dental treatment for children of low income families. The organization provides over 1,500 free dental screenings and fluoride treatments to children at ten different schools in the area.

La Salle High School Financial Aid Program – This nonprofit high school conducts a program to provide aid for families who cannot afford the school's tuition, thus giving underprivileged children the chance to participate at a private school of higher education.

Methodist Hospital Foundation – This tax exempt, nonprofit organization provides funds for the maintenance of Methodist Hospital of Southern California in Arcadia. The hospital depends entirely upon charitable support from individuals in the community to maintain its position as a leader in cancer services, cardiac care and other specialized medical services. This hospital provides a substantial benefit to Santa Anita Park by providing immediate emergency assistance to individuals injured on the premises, such as race track patrons, jockeys, backside personnel and employees.

Pacific Asian Community Services – This 501(c)(3) nonprofit community organization was established to enrich the lives of children and families through counseling and caring. It provides culturally sensitive and language specific services with expertise in the immigrant Asian Pacific islander populations. Many of its clients are refugees or immigrants who have suffered greatly to reach this country. It provides counseling services, educational services such as premarital counseling, marriage enrichment programs and parent education and generally is dedicated to improving members of the Asian Pacific community.

Santa Anita Family YMCA – The local branch of the nationally known and recognized Young Men's Christian Association provides facilities for health and recreation activities for members of the community.

USC Norris Cancer Hospital (Andrew Kure Memorial Fund) – Located in Los Angeles, the USC Norris Comprehensive Cancer Center is one of forty comprehensive cancer centers in a national network mandated by the National Cancer Act of 1971. USC Norris scientists and researchers advance the knowledge of cancer prevention, detection, diagnosis and treatment through programs involving basic research, clinical investigations and education. At USC Norris teams of physicians and researchers from various disciplines are working together to achieve a future without cancer.

ON THE NOMINATION OF MEMBERS TO THE
BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE
CALIFORNIA THOROUGHBRED HORSEMEN'S FOUNDATION, INC.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper for it to carry out the purposes of the Horse Racing Law. Business and Professions Code section 19641 states that any redistributable money in a pari-mutuel pool subject to payment to a claimant pursuant to section 19598, but not successfully claimed within that period, shall be paid as specified, and an estimated payment equal to 20 percent of the preceding year's unclaimed redistributable money shall be distributed to the welfare fund as specified. Board Rule 2049, Designation and Approval of Horsemen's Welfare Fund, sets forth the requirements for the establishment and designation of a charitable corporation to administer the horsemen's welfare fund for the benefit of horsemen. Rule 2049 requires that the charitable corporation have a minimum of five, and a maximum of nine directors who are subject to Board approval. At least 40 percent of the directors must have no financial interest in horse racing as a licensed horse owner, trainer, or assistant trainer. Additionally, they may not be current members of the horsemen's organization.

The California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation (CTHF) is a self-administered charitable program dedicated to assisting financially needy backstretch workers and their primary dependents. The CTHF offers medical and dental care; prescriptions; eye testing and glasses; financial aid; social programs; free clothing and household items. The CTHF also provides services and support through the California Thoroughbred Trainers, the Winners Foundation and the Chaplaincy program. The CTHF is regulated by the CHRB and is funded principally through the receipt of unclaimed winning pari-mutuel ticket revenues. Additionally, donations and support are received from thoroughbred tracks, the Thoroughbred Owners of California and individual donors.

ANALYSIS

The CTHF has nominated four individuals for open board member positions. The four nominations will bring the CTHF board to a total of nine members, which is the maximum under the provisions of Rule 2049. In accordance with Rule 2049(a) the nominations have been submitted to the CHRB for approval.

The following individuals were nominated for a two-year term, which will expire on June 30, 2013:


