DEL MAR THOROUGHBREAD CLUB IN THE AMOUNT OF \$152,665
TO 11 BENEFICIARIES

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19550 states the Board shall require each licensed racing association that conducts 14 or less weeks of racing to designate three racing days, and each licensed racing association that conducts more than 14 weeks of racing to designate five racing days during any one meeting, to be conducted as charity days by the licensee for the purpose of distribution of the net proceeds there from to beneficiaries through the distribution agent. No racing association shall be required to pay to a distributing agent for the purpose of distribution to beneficiaries more than an amount equal to two-tenths of one percent of the association's total on-track handle on live races conducted by the association at the meeting. Business and Professions Code section 19555 requires that proceeds are to be distributed to beneficiaries within 12 calendar months after the last day of the meet during which charity days were conducted. Business and Professions Code section 19556 provides that the distributing agent shall make the distribution to beneficiaries qualified under this article. At least 20 percent of the distribution shall be made to charities associated with the horse racing industry. An additional five percent shall be paid to a welfare fund and another five percent shall be paid to a non-profit corporation, the primary purpose of which is to assist horsemen and backstretch personnel who are being affected adversely as a result of alcohol or substance abuse. In addition to the above distributions, a separate 20 percent shall be made to a nonprofit corporation or trust, the directors or trustees of which shall serve without compensation except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses, and which has as its sole purpose the accumulation of endowment funds, the income on which shall be distributed to qualified disabled jockeys.

ANALYSIS

The Del Mar Thoroughbred Club is requesting approval to distribute its race day charity proceeds generated during the 2013 race meeting. The Del Mar Thoroughbred Club is distributing \$152,665 to 11 designated charities.

Staff notes that 100% of the charity distribution is Equine Related Charities.

Permanently Disabled Jockeys Fund – Founded in 2006, it is a collaborative effort of many leaders in the horse racing industry, including racetracks, jockeys, horsemen and others. It is a public charity that currently provides financial assistance to approximately 60 former jockeys who have suffered catastrophic on-track injuries. It recently was the winner of the National Turf Writers and Broadcasters prestigious Joe Palmer Award for its exceptional work. Nancy LaSala is the group's president. (Contact phone: 630-595-7660; www.pdjf.org/)

CARMA – CARMA is a charitable 501 (c) (3) organization that was created to raise money for retired California racehorses. It is dedicated to the goal of providing funding for their rehabilitation, retraining and/or retirement. CARMA collects funds from racehorse owners, racetracks and other racing groups and organizations, then redistributes the funds to those farms and facilities that prove themselves worthy and capable of fulfilling the group's goal. Two of Del Mar's previous charity recipients -- California Equine Retirement Foundation and Tranquility Farm – now receive aid directly through the CARMA arrangement. California Center for Equine Health and Performance – The Center for Equine Health (CEH) was established at University of California Davis School of Veterinary Medicine in 1973. The primary purpose of CEH is to serve as an administrative and academic umbrella for research into means and methods of improving equine health and performance. In conjunction with this, it produces a series of publications that disseminate its findings and pertinent information. Additionally, it serves as the West Coast's quarantine and treatment station for the potentially devastating venereal disease contagious equine metritis. Race Track Chaplaincy/Southern California (RTCA/SC) – The RTCA/SC is a nonprofit organization that was established in 1971 and ministers to the spiritual, emotional, physical and social/educational needs of horse racing's workers. RTCA/SC is an affiliate of Race Track Chaplaincy of America, which has 77 chaplains serving over 117 race tracks throughout the United States and Canada. Edwin J. Gregson Foundation – The foundation has a primary goal of benefitting and enhancing the quality of life of California's backstretch workers and their families. Gregson, who was the driving force behind its start. Notable among its benefits are the college scholarships it provides annually to family members of backstretch workers. Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO OPERATE A MINISATELLITE WAGERING FACILITY BY S&S VENUES CALIFORNIA, LLC, NORCO.

S&S Venues California, LLC (S&S), applied for a license to operate a minisatellite wagering site at 2895 Hamner Avenue, Norco, CA; a name for the facility has not yet been chosen. Southern California Off-Track Wagering Inc. (SCOTWINC) has acted as the coordinator during the application process. S&S proposes to begin operations April 9, 2014, and requests a license through April 9, 2019, for a period of five years.

- The facility is located in Norco, California. The proposed wagering site will be located in the Southern zone.

Business and Professions Code section 19605.25 (a) (1) provides no minisatellite may be within 20 miles of a racetrack, a satellite wagering facility, or a tribal casino that has a satellite wagering facility. If the proposed facility is within 20 miles of one of the above-referenced satellite facilities, then the consent of each facility within a 20-mile radius must be given before the proposed facility may be approved by the Board.

- SCOTWINC has provided that Fairplex Park and National Orange Show (San Bernardino) are the only Satellite Wagering facilities located within the 20 mile radius of 2895 Hamner Avenue, Norco. Fairplex Park and National Orange Show have waived the 20 mile radius provision.

S&S has contracts/agreements with the following racing associations:

- California Authority of Racing Fairs
- Del Mar Thoroughbred Club
- Los Angeles County Fair
- Los Angeles Turf Club
- Pacific Racing Association
- Sonoma Fair
- Watch and Wager LLC/Golden Bear Racing/Cal Expo

The Simulcast organization engaged by the contracted associations to conduct simulcast wagering is Southern California Off Track Wagering, Inc., SCOTWINC.

Applicant proposes to operate the minisatellite wagering site 10:00 a.m. until 11:00 p.m. depending on host program.

Estimated number of pari-mutuel terminals machines available: 14 Sportech Racing, LLC wagering terminals will be available. Seating Capacity will be 116; the wagering area will have 27 tables. 83 flat screen televisions will be installed as follows: two video walls made of 4 x 46" LCDTVs, 18 x 55" LCDTVs, and 57 x 42" LCDTVs.

Staffing: The host track mutual manager will assign from one to four mutual clerks according to the projected daily handle. A security officer will be present during business hours at the security station, located at the entrance to the minisatellite area, to restrict access to persons 21 and older. All wagering terminals will be within sight of the security officer.

Specific information still needed to complete this application include:

1. Association approval from the Los Alamitos Quarter Horse Racing Association

SCOTWINC has stated that the following outstanding items below will be available after construction is complete and before minisatellite operations begin:

3. Workers Compensation Certificate
4. Occupancy Permit, City of Norco
5. Facility Photos

Minisatellite Application for:

2895 Hamner Ave.
Norco, CA

1. **Ownership:** The Norco location will be a joint venture between Sportech Venues California, LLC, and Silky Sullivan's Group LLC (previously licensed by the CHRB in February for a minisatellite in Carlsbad). This will be the first minisatellite in California to receive Sportech branding. As such, it will combine dramatic video presentation of racing and sports together with upscale food & beverage, including signature wood-fired pizza ovens. The facility, formerly a bank, will be purpose-built for minisatellite wagering within a full service sports bar and restaurant. Sportech will bring aboard Food & Beverage expertise to design and implement the concept at Norco and subsequent locations.
2. **Conditional License.** The entity is seeking a conditional license, as several required components cannot be furnished to the CHRB until the build-out is completed. If the conditional license is granted by the Board, the parties will complete the design work and begin construction. If licensed in December, the projected opening date is April, 2014 in time for the Triple Crown.
3. **Property.** The location is at 4th and Hamner, one of the busiest intersections in Norco and nearly adjacent to Interstate 15. It is located just 3 miles north of the I-15 and I-91 interchange. The site is expected to draw significant patronage from Corona to the south, San Bernardino to the north and Riverside County to the east.
4. **Dedicated Seating / Capacity.** The minisatellite area will seat 116, with another 88 seats on the adjacent, semi-enclosed patio. The dining room and bar will seat 168, for a total restaurant capacity of 372.

5. **Food & Beverage.** The menu, still in development, will feature burgers & steaks, plus upscale small plates, brick oven pizzas and much more. The bar is the centerpiece of the large dining room.
6. **Waivers.** The site is located within the 20 mile circles of Fairplex Park and National Orange Show (San Bernardino). Waivers have been received from both.
7. **City of Norco.** After the applicants were rudely rebuffed by the adjacent city of Corona, Norco officials invited them to invest in their city, dubbed "Horsetown U.S.A." There are more horse trails than sidewalks. Interestingly, the median household income is one of the highest in the county.
8. **Population & Demographics.** There are 278,000 people within five miles of the location, 621,000 within ten miles and 3,014,271 within 20 miles. Median household income for Norco is \$78,141.00
9. **ADW Handle.** In 2011, \$1.9 million was wagered within five miles; \$4.6 million within ten miles; and \$36.4 within 20 miles.
10. **Outstanding Items:** The applicant is seeking conditional approval of its minisatellite application subject to the following requirements:
 - 1) Evidence of Workers Compensation Insurance (for mutual clerks)
 - 2) Clearance from the local fire authority
 - 3) Occupancy permit from the city of Norco

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORCO, CALIFORNIA APPROVING CODE CHANGE 2013-04 AMENDING CHAPTER 9.24 "PEACE, SAFETY, AND MORALS" WITH ANY RELATED CROSS-REFERENCES IN OTHER CHAPTERS AS NEEDED TO ALLOW MINI-SATELLITE OFF-TRACK PARI-MUTUEL WAGERING FOR HORSE RACES AS AN ANCILLARY USE TO AN OTHERWISE PERMITTED PRIMARY USE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING ACT AS REGULATED BY THE CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING BOARD. CODE AMENDMENT 2013-01.

WHEREAS, S&S VENUES, CA LLC initiated Code Change 2013-04 to amend Chapter 9.24 "Gaming" with any related cross references in other Chapters as needed, to amend and update to allow mini-satellite off-track pari-mutuel wagering for horse races as an ancillary use to an otherwise permitted primary use in accordance with the requirements of the California Horse Racing Act as regulated by the California Horse Racing Board; and,

WHEREAS, Code Change 2013-04 was duly submitted to the City of Norco City Council for decision at a public hearing for which proper notice was given; and

WHEREAS, said Code Change was scheduled for public hearing on November 6, 2013 on or about 7 p.m. in the City Council Chambers, 2820 Clark Avenue, Norco, California; and

WHEREAS, at the regular meeting, said City Council held a public hearing and considered both oral and written testimony pertaining to said Code Change; and

WHEREAS, the City of Norco, acting as the Lead Agency, has determined that the requested Code Amendment is exempt from the City of Norco Environmental Guidelines pursuant to Section 3.13 and the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the City of Norco Environmental Guidelines.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Norco, does hereby find as follows:

- A. The proposed Code Change will not be inconsistent with, or contrary to, the General Plan or the Municipal Code since the project updates existing regulations regarding mini-satellite off-track pari-mutuel wagering facilities as ancillary facilities.
- B. The project (proposed amendment) has been determined to be exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act and the City of Norco Environmental Guidelines.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Norco, does hereby approve as follows:

SECTION 1: Chapter 9.24 "Gaming", Section 9.24.30 "Poolrooms-Bookmaking" of the Norco Municipal Code is hereby amended as follows:

Section 9.24.030 Pool rooms--Bookmaking.

No person either as principal, agent, employee or otherwise, shall let or lease any telegraph or telephone line or wire knowing that it is to be used for the purpose of conducting or carrying on a pool room, or for the purpose of conducting the business of making books or selling pools on races or other contests, or of betting or laying of wagers upon the result of any race or contest. No person shall transmit any message over any telephone or telegraph line or wire owned, controlled or leased by any person engaged in conducting or carrying on a pool room or in conducting the business of making books or selling pools on races or other contests, or of betting or laying of wagers upon the result of any race or contests, knowing that such message is to be used in conducting or carrying on such pool room or business. Section 9.24.030 shall not apply to any activity related to the operations of a mini-satellite facility for pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing operating as an ancillary use to a full-service restaurant that is otherwise permitted by the City Zoning Code, and for which all required City permits have been issued. For purposes of this Section, ancillary shall be defined as not more than 30 percent of the total floor area open to the general public.

Chapter 9.24 "Gaming", Section 9.24.40 "Horse Racing Lists" of the Norco Municipal Code is hereby amended as follows:

9.24.040 Horse racing lists.

It is unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to have in his or its possession in the city any written or printed form, chart, table, list, sheet, circular or publication of any kind, giving or purporting to give, or represented as giving, any list or probable or possible list, of entries for any horse race or other contest thereafter anywhere to take place or which is anywhere taking place, if there be written or printed or published as part thereof, or in connection therewith, or in any other publication, printing or writing accompanying the same or referring thereto or connected therewith, any tip, information, prediction, or selection of, or advice as to, or any key, cipher, or cryptogram indicating, containing or giving any tip, information, publication or selection of, or advice as to the winner or probable winner, or a loser or probable loser, or the result or probable result of any such race or other contest or the standing or probable standing of any horse or other contestant, or the actual, probable or possible state, past, present, or future, of the betting, wagering or odds upon or against any horse or other contestant named in such list, or probable or possible list, of entries unless the names of such horses or other contestants shall be arranged in such list, in alphabetical order, and shall all be printed in type of the same size and face and of identical

appearance, and shall all be printed flush with the left side of the column in which the same are printed, or all an equal distance therefrom. Section 9.24.040 shall not apply to any activity related to the operations of a mini-satellite facility for pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing operating as an ancillary use to a full-service restaurant that is otherwise permitted by the City Zoning Code, and for which all required City permits have been issued. For purposes of this Section, ancillary shall be defined as not more than 30 percent of the total floor area open to the general public.

SECTION 2: EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days after final passage thereof.

SECTION 3: SEVERABILITY: If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Ordinance. The Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, and phrase, hereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more of the sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, or phrases hereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4: POSTING: The Mayor shall sign this Ordinance and the City Clerk shall attest thereto and shall cause the same within 15 days of its passage to be posted at no less than five public places within the City of Norco.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) provides that notwithstanding any provision of this section to the contrary, the distribution of market access fees pursuant to this subparagraph may be altered upon the approval of the Board, in accordance with an agreement signed by all parties whose distributions would be affected.

In April 2009 the Board approved a modification of California's advance deposit wagering (ADW) distribution on thoroughbred races as permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E). In requesting the modification the industry represented that for several years Southern California Off Track Wagering, Inc. (SCOTWINC) and Northern California Off Track Wagering, Inc. (NCOTWINC) ran shortfalls in funding due to handle moving from traditional satellite wagering to ADW, and a general decline in wagering activity at "brick and mortar" wagering sites. The distribution from satellite facilities was fixed, and 2.5 percent of that funding went to SCOTWINC and NCOTWINC for pari-mutuel expenses. Instead of asking for an increase in the takeout, the industry requested the creation of a new distribution from ADW source market fees to fund the SCOTWINC and NCOTWINC shortfalls over a two-year period. The requested distribution for SCOTWINC was 4.12 percent of the ADW source market fee and 4 percent of the ADW source market fee was requested for NCOTWINC. The funds would come from ADW wagers placed by California residents on California thoroughbred races. Pursuant to Business and Profession Code section 19604(f)(5)(E), the Board approved a motion to alter for a two year period - commencing July 2009 and ending June 2011 - the market access fees from ADW wagers made by California residents on California thoroughbred race meetings by the creation of an additional deduction for distribution based on 4.12 percent of handle in Central and Southern zones to the SCOTWINC Trust, and 4 percent of handle in the Northern Zone to the NCOTWINC Trust.

At the January 2010 Regular Board Meeting the Los Angeles Thoroughbred Club (LATC) and Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) submitted a SCOTWINC shortfall agreement for Board approval. The agreement altered the distribution of market access fees from ADW wagers placed on all racing hosted by LATC at its winter race meeting, effective December 26, 2009 through April 18, 2010. The Board accepted the agreement as an addendum to the LATC winter

race meeting. At the February 2010 Regular Board Meeting the NCOTWINC shortfall agreement between Pacific Racing Association and TOC was approved.

At the February 2010 Regular Board Meeting a presentation by SCOTWINC and NCOTWINC regarding their organizational background and financial position was heard. NCOTWINC and SCOTWINC stated they were experiencing a long-term decline in revenue that was exacerbated by the advent of ADW wagering. From 2007 through 2009 the organizations saw serious deficits. The Board expressed concern over the future of the SCOTWINC/NCOTWINC business model, as it did not appear to be sustainable in the current environment. The Board stated it would like to know what changes the organizations would propose that would give it confidence the deficits would not become permanent, and that SCOTWINC/NCOTWINC would not go to the Legislature every time it needed funds, as running bills to take money from somebody else would not solve the deficits. The Board also cautioned that its recent actions with regards to SCOTWINC/NCOTWINC funding were "short term band aids." Chairman Brackpool stated the organizations should work with the Board's Committee on Budget, Finance and Audits to determine how the organizations would be funded for 12 months going forward, and then return to the Board not later than June 30, 2010 with a five year business plan with absolute structural changes to the business model.

In June 2010 representatives of SCOTWINC and NCOTWINC appeared before the Board to report on their operating results, financial condition and strategic planning. The organizations also requested a modification of the distribution of takeout for thoroughbred racing associations permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19601.01, and to modify the distribution of market access fees from ADW wagering as permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E). The Board voted to modify the distribution of market access fees from the ADW wagers made by California residents on races conducted and hosted by thoroughbred racing association to 1.75 percent of ADW wagers made in the central and southern zones of SCOTWINC and 2.9 percent of ADW wagers in the northern zone of NCOTWINC. The Board also voted – pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19605(a)(2)(A) - to alter the distribution of the takeout from 2.5 percent to 2.9 percent of the handle in the northern zone on races conducted and hosted by the thoroughbred association in the northern zone. The effective period of the modifications was from July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011.

In June 2011 the Board approved a request by NCOTWINC and SCOTWINC for approval of an expense fund agreement to be effective July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012. The parties state additional funding to NCOTWINC and SCOTWINC was necessary to cover the pari-mutuel and simulcast costs incurred in the operation of brick and mortar simulcast wagering in California. Such expenses include the cost of labor for pari-mutuel clerks and charges for totalizator, data lines, signal dissemination and similar costs. The new agreement provided for a distribution to SCOTWINC of 2.15 percent of ADW wagers generated in the central and southern zones. The modification of the distribution of market access fees from ADW was permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E). The agreement also provided for a distribution to NCOTWINC of 2.9 percent of ADW generated in the northern zone. Pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19605.7(a)(2)(A), a 2.9 percent distribution to NCOTWINC for brick and mortar simulcast wagering in the northern zone was requested. If the funding provided by the agreement was in excess of the actual pari-mutuel/simulcast costs, the excess would be split

between track and purse commissions. In May 2012, the Board approved an extension of the agreement, as requested by NCOTWINC and SCOTWINC.

In May 2013, NCOTWINC; in conjunction with Pacific Racing Association (PRA) and TOC requested a six month extension of the agreement approved by the Board in May 2012. The extension of the agreement between PRA and NCOTWINC provided for a distribution to NCOTWINC of 2.15 percent of ADW wagers generated in the northern zone and is permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E). This was lower than the existing distribution of 2.9 percent. The parties stated that they were not requesting an increase pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19605.6(a)(2)(A) for brick and mortar simulcast wagering in the Northern Zone. Any funding in excess of the actual pari-mutuel/simulcast costs would be split between track and purse commissions. After discussion, the Board approved a six month extension of the agreement to expire December 31, 2013.

ANALYSIS

NCOTWINC is seeking an approval of an agreement between PRA and TOC for the period January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014. The new agreement provides for a distribution of market access fees from ADW at a rate of 2.9 percent as permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) for wagering conducted by thoroughbred associations in the Northern Zone. NCOTWINC is not requesting an increase pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19605.7(a)(2)(A) for brick and mortar simulcast wagering in the northern zone. The previous (brick and mortar) increase of 2.9 percent expired on June 30, 2013 and reverted back to a rate of 2.5 percent. NCOTWINC has stated that if the funding provided is in excess of the actual pari-mutuel/simulcast costs, the excess would be split between track and purse commissions.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action. Staff recommends the Board hear from a NCOTWINC representative.

Submitted to the CHRB for the December 12th, 2013 meeting agenda:

Pacific Racing Association (PRA) and the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), parties to an existing agreement (which expires December 31, 2013) approved by the CHRB in May 2013, are seeking approval of a similar agreement for the period January 1 through December 31, 2014. Additional funding to Northern California Off Track Wagering, Inc. (NCOTWINC) is necessary to cover the pari-mutuel and simulcast costs incurred in the operation of brick and mortar simulcast wagering in California. Such expenses include the cost of labor for pari-mutuel clerks and charges for totalizator, data lines, signal dissemination and similar costs.

The new agreement between PRA and TOC provides for a distribution to NCOTWINC of 2.9 percent of ADW wagers generated in the northern zone. The modification of the distribution of market access fees from ADW is permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E).

We are not, in the current agreement, requesting an increase Pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19605.7(a)(2)(A) for brick and mortar simulcast wagering in the northern zone.

If the funding provided by the agreement is in excess of the actual pari-mutuel/simulcast costs, the excess will be split between track and purse commissions.

2014 Expense Fund Agreement

This Agreement is entered into as of this 27th day of November, 2013 by and between Pacific Racing Association ("PRA") and the Thoroughbred Owners of California ("TOC"), with reference to that certain 2012-2013 Expense Fund Agreement among the parties hereto and the need for terms of such agreement to be renewed:

IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. The distribution of Market Access fees from ADW placed on all live and Imported races hosted by PRA shall be altered by the creation of an additional deduction for a distribution therefrom based upon 2.9% of handle in the Northern Zone, that would otherwise be payable as thoroughbred purses and commissions, and such deduction from ADW Northern Zone shall be payable to NCOTWINC.
2. The percentage distributable to NCOTWINC pursuant to Section 19605.7(a)(2)(A) shall remain at 2.50%.
3. The parties shall immediately file this Agreement with the CHRB for the purposes of securing its approval of the deduction contemplated from market access fees placed on races hosted by PRA and modification of the percentage distributable under Section 19605.7(a)(2)(A).
4. Subject to the requisite approval of the CHRB, the modification of the percentage in Section 19605.7(a)(2)(A) as set forth in 2 above shall be effective January 1, 2014 as shall the deduction from ADW set forth in 1 above.
5. Notwithstanding the distributions from the ADW Deduction set forth hereinabove, the distribution to the Incentive fund administered by the California Thoroughbred Breeders Association shall be calculated at the rate of 0.463% of ADW handle in California on races hosted by PRA. In addition to the distributions set forth above, there shall be a distribution from the ADW Deduction in order to pay administrative expenses that would otherwise have been distributed to TOC, CTT, and the Backstretch Workers Pension Plan.
6. The Terms of this Agreement shall be effective from January 1, 2014 to December 31, 2014.
7. PRA and TOC agree to redistribute any funds accumulated in excess of the expense back to purses and PRA Commissions, 50% to each. Such redistribution will be made every six months beginning June, 30 2014. Any redistribution will be made by NCOTWINC within 30 days following the schedule set forth above. A full accounting of any redistribution or deficit will be provided to PRA, TOC, and the NCOTWINC Board on the same timetable.
8. PRA and TOC agree to jointly continue to work toward improving the productivity and efficiency of the off-track satellites and NCOTWINC.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) provides that notwithstanding any provision of this section to the contrary, the distribution of market access fees pursuant to this subparagraph may be altered upon the approval of the Board, in accordance with an agreement signed by all parties whose distributions would be affected.

In April 2009 the Board approved a modification of California's advance deposit wagering (ADW) distribution on thoroughbred races as permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E). In requesting the modification the industry represented that for several years Southern California Off Track Wagering, Inc. (SCOTWINC) and Northern California Off Track Wagering, Inc. (NCOTWINC) ran shortfalls in funding due to handle moving from traditional satellite wagering to ADW, and a general decline in wagering activity at "brick and mortar" wagering sites. The distribution from satellite facilities was fixed, and 2.5 percent of that funding went to SCOTWINC and NCOTWINC for pari-mutuel expenses. Instead of asking for an increase in the takeout, the industry requested the creation of a new distribution from ADW source market fees to fund the SCOTWINC and NCOTWINC shortfalls over a two-year period. The requested distribution for SCOTWINC was 4.12 percent of the ADW source market fee and 4 percent of the ADW source market fee was requested for NCOTWINC. The funds would come from ADW wagers placed by California residents on California thoroughbred races. Pursuant to Business and Profession Code section 19604(f)(5)(E), the Board approved a motion to alter for a two year period - commencing July 2009 and ending June 2011 - the market access fees from ADW wagers made by California residents on California thoroughbred race meetings by the creation of an additional deduction for distribution based on 4.12 percent of handle in Central and Southern zones to the SCOTWINC Trust, and 4 percent of handle in the Northern Zone to the NCOTWINC Trust.

At the January 2010 Regular Board Meeting the Los Angeles Thoroughbred Club (LATC) and Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) submitted a SCOTWINC shortfall agreement for Board approval. The agreement altered the distribution of market access fees from ADW wagers placed on all racing hosted by LATC at its winter race meeting, effective December 26, 2009 through April 18, 2010. The agreement under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) provided for a 2.15 percent distribution from ADW wagers placed in the central and southern zones on races hosted by DMTC, HPRA and LATC. Any funding in excess of the actual pari-mutuel/simulcast costs would be split between track and purse commissions.

ANALYSIS

SCOTWINC is requesting approval of an agreement under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) for calendar year 2014 which will continue modification of market access fee distributions for ADW wagers placed in the Central and Southern zones on races hosted by the signatory host tracks. The parties to the agreement include TOC, CTBA and all Southern California thoroughbred host tracks scheduled to conduct racing in 2014. SCOTWINC provides that any funding in excess of simulcast costs would be split between track and purse commissions.

RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

At its September 2013 Regular Meeting the California Horse Racing Board tentatively allocated racing dates for 2014 and 2015. Given the imminent closure of Hollywood Park for both racing and stabling, the allocation of race dates was conditioned upon stakeholders working out adequate stabling plans to meet the needs of the Southern California thoroughbred circuit in coming years. The Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), Santa Anita Park (The Stronach Group), Del Mar, and Los Alamitos – the four principals to such arrangements – conducted months of negotiations among themselves and with participation by Fairplex Park, the California Thoroughbred Trainers, and the CHRB. The principals reported at the September 19, 2013 Regular Board Meeting that they had finalized details associated with stabling and off-site training for the years 2014 and 2015. The Board approved those plans as outlined pending a review of the signed agreement. At its October 24, 2013 Regular Meeting the Board discussed a technical approval of the Southern California auxiliary stabling and Vanning agreement for the 2014/2015 racing years. At that time, the Board voted to endorse a final approval of the Southern California 2014/2015 racing calendar.

Hollywood Park has agreed it would remain open for stabling until January 31, 2014. The Stabling and Vanning Committee is prepared to update the Board regarding the status of preparations being made to van horses to the various training facilities upon the closure of Hollywood Park.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board hear from the Stabling and Vanning Committee.

THE STABLING AND VANNING COMMITTEE

BACKGROUND

The Board of Directors of the California Thoroughbred Trainers organization (CTT) requests the Board to require inclusion of their organization as a voting member of the Stabling and Vanning Committee.

The Stabling and Vanning Committee for the Southern and Central Zones was established by statute (Business and Professions Code section 19607) in 1990. Also in 1990, a separate statute established a similar Committee for the Northern Zone (Business and Professions Code section 19607.2). The Stabling and Vanning funds are specifically to be used for thoroughbred races only.

Both enabling statutes reference a Committee to administer the funds generated for off-site stabling and vanning. The Committee is to be composed of representatives of the thoroughbred racing associations, fairs conducting thoroughbred racing and **the organization representing thoroughbred horsemen and horsewoman**, with each party to have meaningful representation on the board of the organization. The stabling and vanning funds are to be used to reimburse racing associations for offsite stabling of thoroughbred starters at board approved auxiliary training facilities and for the vanning of those starters on race days.

Business and Professions Code sections 19607 and 19607.2 do not define the terms "horsemen" and "horsewomen." Nor are those terms defined in any other provision of the California Horse Racing Law, Business and Professions Code section 19400, et seq.

In the aftermath Stabling and Vanning Committee being established in 1990, Business and Professions Code section 19613.1 was enacted in 1994 which mandated that the California Horse Racing Board shall determine what matters are to be negotiated between the owners' organization and racing associations, and which matters are to be the subject of negotiation and contract between the trainers' organization and racing associations. The owners' organization is generally responsible for negotiating purse agreements, satellite simulcast agreements and all other business agreements relating to the conduct of racing that affect owners. The trainers' organization is generally responsible for negotiating matters related to backstretch, track safety and the welfare of backstretch employees.

Prior to the formation of the Thoroughbred Owners' of California in 1993, the owners and trainers were represented under one organization, the California Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association. Thereafter, the trainers reconstituted themselves as the California Thoroughbred Trainers organization.

RECOMMENDATION

The item is presented for Board discussion and action.

Dear Chairman Israel and Commissioners,

I am writing on behalf of the Board of Directors of California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT), the trainers' organization for Thoroughbred racing in California as described in the Horse Racing Law.

As you know, we have previously written the Board as to Section 19613.1 within Division 8, Chapter 4, of the Business and Professions Code, relating to the division of responsibilities between the owners' organization and the trainers' organization. Section 19613.1 (a) reads in part, "the board shall determine which matters shall be the subject of negotiation and contract between the owners' organization and the association, and which matters shall be the subject of negotiation and contract between the trainers' organization and the association." Subdivision (b) reads in its entirety, "The owners' organization shall generally be responsible for negotiating purse agreements, satellite simulcast agreements, and all other business agreements relating to the conduct of racing that affect the owners. The trainers' organization shall generally be responsible for negotiating issues relating to the backstretch, track safety, and the welfare of backstretch workers."

As to matters of stabling and vanning at and from auxiliary locations to the operating track, including financing required, the owner's organization (Thoroughbred Owners of California, or TOC) has excluded the trainers' organization, CTT, from its formal deliberations and decision-making in Southern California since 2012. In 2010 and 2011, the CTT had been occasionally invited to meetings of the Stabling/Vanning Committee but did not have a vote in decision-making.

We call this to your attention because this situation should be changed, as a matter of equity but also as a matter of law. Now is an appropriate time to address it formally, since the Stabling/Vanning Committee itself is a creature of law (Section 19607), and requires meaningful representation of Thoroughbred horsemen and horsewomen on its board. We have previously demonstrated in our correspondence with you that this section of the law preceded dividing such representation which had previously come from one organization, into two separate organizations, one for owners and one for trainers. In correspondence dated October 27, 2009 [attached], Counsel Robert Miller opined that CTT should consider approaching the Board to have this matter agendized, and it appears that this is the correct time to do so.

We wish to emphasize that we do not seek to remove or supplant the TOC's own representation on this important Committee. Instead, we seek the addition of the CTT's formal representation into the evolving structure of the Stabling/Vanning Committee, since restructuring is now required in any event, owing to the closure of Hollywood Park, and the resulting changes that must be made to this and other organizations specified in current law.



We believe there can be no question that matters under the jurisdiction of the Stabling/Vanning Committee, including vanning issues and stabling facilities and amenities, described in Section 19607, are all clearly within the meaning and scope of "issues relating to the backstretch, track safety, and the welfare of backstretch workers," the specific responsibilities in the law designated for the trainers' organization.

We hereby request this matter be placed on the California Horse Racing Board's next agenda for discussion and decision.

Re: Business and Professions Code section 19607

Dear Mr. Halpern:

Your letter on behalf of the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) to California Horse Racing Board Executive Director Kirk Breed has been referred to me for review and response. The CTT contends the reference in Business and Professions Code (B&P Code) section 19607 to an "organization representing thoroughbred horsemen and horsewomen" should include the Thoroughbred Trainers organization, in the absence of additional statutory language. The cited portion of Code section 19607 refers to one segment of a three part board which is responsible for administering the Stabling and Van Fund in the Central and Southern Zones. Similar language is set forth in B&P Code section 19607.2 regarding the composition of a board responsible for administering the Stabling and Van Fund in the Northern Zone.

The phrase "organization representing thoroughbred horsemen and horsewomen" is not defined within section 19607, nor by any other code section of the Horse Racing Law, B&P Code section 19400 et seq. Various provisions of the Horse Racing Law separately refer to "horsemen's organization," "owner's organization," and "trainer's organization." See, B&P Code section 19613.2, for example.

In the absence of a definitive legislative history for B&P Code section 19607, the phrase in question would appear to be open to differing interpretations. While present day usage of the term "horsemen's organization" may refer to an organization composed of only horse owners, as distinct from horse trainers, such usage is not conclusive when determining the intent of B&P Code section 19607.

As you know, the purpose of section 19607 is to fund the off-site stabling of thoroughbreds at CHRB approved auxiliary training facilities and the vanning starters to race meets. No doubt thoroughbred trainers have a legitimate interest in those activities. Moreover, section 19607 mandates the CHRB have supervisorial responsibility for administering those funds.

Consequently, in the absence of a legislative definition of the phrase "organization of thoroughbred horsemen and horsewomen," the CTT should consider approaching the California Horse Racing Board and having the matter placed on the Board's meeting agenda. Such a forum will afford all interested industry stakeholders to state their respective positions as to the intended meaning of the phrase.

CALIFORNIA OWNERS GROUPS REACH ACCORD, SET CONDITIONS FOR ELECTION
OF DIRECTORS

SACRAMENTO, CA – The two thoroughbred owners' organizations in California reached an agreement Wednesday between themselves and the California Horse Racing Board whereby after certain conditions are met, the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) will conduct an election for all seats on its Board of Directors, and all California thoroughbred owners will be eligible to vote in that election regardless of whether they hold a second license in some other occupational category.

Provided the current voting members of the TOC first approve several bylaw changes, the open election for all 15 seats on the TOC Board will begin February 1, 2012, with votes accepted through March 1. This election would eliminate the need for a separate election on the proposed decertification of the TOC as the organization officially representing thoroughbred owners in California. "We're pleased that both sides have come together with a reasonable solution," said CHRB Chairman Keith Brackpool, who hosted several meetings with representatives of the two groups in an effort to bring them closer together. "With this issue behind us and the industry working in greater harmony, we hope to resolve other pressing issues as the new year progresses."

"The TOC is glad that this matter is resolved and urges all its members to support the proposal," said TOC Chairman Jack Owens, who – like all TOC board members – will voluntarily step down under the agreement to allow for the election of all seats on the board. Owens and the other current directors will be eligible to run for the open seats.

"The CTHA's primary goal was to end the discriminatory and exclusionary policies of the TOC and provide free and open elections, so that California thoroughbred owners would be able to choose how they are represented. That goal has been achieved through this negotiated settlement," said David Wilson, president of the California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association (CTHA), the newly formed horsemen's group that submitted a petition to the CHRB in August to begin the TOC decertification process. Under the agreement, the CTHA will name up to 10 candidates on the election ballot.

Now that agreement has been reached, the next step in the process will be for the CHRB to approve proposed amendments to the TOC bylaws designed to expand the membership of the TOC and diversify its Board of Directors and Executive Committee. The Board will consider this matter at the November 17 meeting.

If the racing commissioners approve the bylaw amendments, the TOC will begin disseminating ballots on November 23 to its current voting membership asking them to approve the bylaw changes. That voting will conclude December 27.

The February election can only take place if the TOC membership first approves the proposed bylaw amendments. A rejection of those bylaw changes would automatically restart the TOC decertification process.

In such a case, the CHRB would begin disseminating decertification election ballots on or before January 30, 2012. Decertification voting would continue through February 29.

The five proposed bylaw changes fall into two categories. The first category pertains to membership in the TOC. The current bylaws contain certain restrictions on membership. Current TOC members will be asked to open the membership – with full voting rights – without restriction to any person licensed by the CHRB as an owner of a thoroughbred racehorse. The second category pertains to membership on the TOC Board of Directors and Executive Committee. One of the bylaw changes would create two classes of members. The Owner Class would consist of thoroughbred owners who are not licensed by the CHRB to train horses. The Owner/Trainer Class would consist of thoroughbred owners who also are licensed as trainers or who may be the spouse of a trainer. Under proposed bylaw amendments, members in the Owner/Trainer Class and their spouses can run for up to 40 percent of the seats on the TOC Board of Directors (six of the 15 seats), and at least one of the five directors serving on the Executive Committee must be in the Owner/Trainer Class. At least one of the Owner/Trainer Class directors must be from Northern California and at least one must be from Southern California, as opposed to all six being from one part of the state.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this State where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board/CHRB). Business and Professions Code section 19460 states all licenses granted under this chapter shall contain such conditions as are deemed necessary or desirable by the Board for the best interests of horse racing and the purposes of this chapter.

During the process involved in determining the allocation of 2014/2015 Southern California race dates the Board imposed several conditions on the Southern California thoroughbred race venues. With regards to Santa Anita Park Race Track (SA), the Board determined that SA must submit a backstretch improvement plan. The condition was based on the CHRB's long and consistent demand that the SA backstretch area be improved. At its November 2013 Regular Meeting the Board acknowledged that SA had spent considerable funds repairing individual barns and for general maintenance of the stable area, but it indicated that such maintenance was not the equivalent of the substantial improvements the Board and industry were seeking. SA representatives stated SA was working with water resources officials over wastewater issues. SA believed the water improvements were tied to stable area improvements in that it would not make economic sense to replace barns without simultaneously completing the water work. The Board indicated it understood the SA position, but it had been seeking improvement of the SA backstretch area for a considerable period of time. The Board asked SA to present at least a basic outline of a plan, including a calendar for renovating the backstretch, as well as general benchmarks that would need to be met, at the December 12, 2013 Regular Meeting.

With the closure of Hollywood Park, SLRD will become an important element in Southern California's thoroughbred racing industry, as the facility will be used to help offset the loss of Hollywood Park's approximately 1,000 stalls. Since mid 2013, SLRD has been undergoing a refurbishment of its stables and dirt track. It is anticipated that the training center will accommodate over 500 horses. The SLRD dirt track is one mile in circumference.

San Luis Rey Downs to refurbish track, stables

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The San Luis Rey Downs training center in northern San Diego County is expected to be closed for four months beginning June 2 for a refurbishment of its stables and dirt track, according to Santa Anita president George Haines.

San Luis Rey Downs is owned by The Stronach Group, which also owns Santa Anita. The facility had been leased to a group of horsemen until late March, when Santa Anita officials resumed management and began making plans for the refurbishment.

The training center has capacity for approximately 575 horses, but currently houses about 100 horses, Haines said.

San Luis Rey Downs could soon take a more prominent role in Southern California Thoroughbred racing. Hollywood Park has told its employees it will close as a racing and year-round training center at the end of this year, creating the need for stabling at other locations.

There are approximately 3,000 Thoroughbreds in training in Southern California. Santa Anita's stable area has capacity for 1,900. Barretts Racing at Fairplex Park in Pomona has capacity for 1,200. Fairplex Park officials said last month they would like to host year-round training in the event that Hollywood Park closes at the end of this year.

Jim Cassidy, president of the California Thoroughbred Trainers, said Wednesday that several trainers based at Santa Anita and Hollywood Park have expressed an interest in having horses at San Luis Rey Downs after the facility is renovated.

Haines said there have been discussions about constructing a seven-furlong turf course for training as well as building turf gallops on the property, but that has not been finalized. The main track is one mile in circumference.

"San Luis Rey Downs has a chance to be a world-class training center," Haines said. "We have every chance to restore it to the top level."

Trainers with horses based at the track have been asked to relocate by June 1. They are expected to move their horses to Hollywood Park and Santa Anita, which is open for training.

For many years, trainers based at San Luis Rey Downs have used the facility to prepare 2-year-olds for their racing careers. Some trainers are based there on a year-round basis and ship to Southern California tracks.

Del Mar kicks off \$5M turf course expansion

Project will make venue eligible to one day host Breeder's Cup

DEL MAR — A roughly \$5 million expansion of the turf course at the Del Mar racetrack kicked off Friday, putting the seaside venue on the path to potentially host the Breeder's Cup Championship, horse racing's most prestigious event.

The expansion work will include widening the turf portion of the course to 80 feet, which will allow it to accommodate 14 horses versus the eight to 10 thoroughbreds that can safely run on the track now. (The current width of the course varies from between 52 and 63 feet on the straightaways and between 54 and 56 feet on the turns.)

The project will also soften the turns, making it safer for horses and jockeys, said Adam Day, board president for the 22nd District Agricultural Association, the state agency that owns the fairgrounds.

"This is a tremendous opportunity for the future of horse racing in California," Day said Friday afternoon.

He said the new course would have a huge economic impact on San Diego and would make Del Mar eligible to host the Breeder's Cup — considered the Super Bowl of horse racing — as early as 2015.

Del Mar's original turf course — using about 7.7 acres of grass — was installed before the 1960 racing season.

The new turf course will use 10 acres of Bermuda grass now being grown in the Coachella Valley.

Heavy equipment began moving at the racetrack as soon as the racing season ended Sept. 4 and the old turf course should be gone within a month, Del Mar turf superintendent Leif Dickinson said in a news release. The work is being done by Koch-Armstrong of El Cajon, the same company that installed Del Mar's synthetic track in 2007. The synthetic portion of the track will remain untouched.

The new turf is set to be installed in January and the track should be ready for business by the July 16 start of the 2014 racing season.





On September 30, 2013, the Governor signed Assembly Bill (AB) 1074 (Atkins), Chapter 428, Statutes of 2013, to amend the horse racing law to allow the Board to allocate a maximum of five weeks per year to a thoroughbred racing association to conduct thoroughbred racing at a racetrack in the southern zone that was not used to conduct a thoroughbred race meeting in the southern zone prior to 2012. AB 1074 will allow the Los Alamitos Racing Association (LARA) to run thoroughbred race meetings using dates previously allocated to Betfair Hollywood Park, which is scheduled to close at the end of 2013.

Business and Professions Code section 19604(a)(7) states that "Hub agreement" means a written agreement providing for contractual compensation paid with respect to advance deposit wagers placed by California residents on a particular breed of racing conducted outside of California. Business and Professions Code section 19604(b)(2) provides that no advance deposit wagering (ADW) provider shall accept wagers or wagering instructions on races conducted outside of California from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met: (A) The ADW provider is licensed by the Board. (B) There is a hub agreement between the ADW provider and one or both of (i) one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing on the breed on which wagering is conducted during the calendar year during which the wager is placed, and (ii) the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which wagering is conducted.

In September 2013, Lien Games Racing LLC, dba BetAmerica, and California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) entered into a Hub Agreement to be effective through December 31, 2014. In November 2013 Lien Games received approval by the Board to conduct ADW as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub.

CARF reports that it has negotiated an agreement for ADW services with Lien Games. The agreement has been forwarded to Thoroughbred Owners of California for review.

BACKGROUND

Proposals for the Northern California thoroughbred and fair racing calendars for 2014 and 2015 were received in May and June from Pacific Racing Association (PRA); Santa Rosa Country Fair at Sonoma, California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) on behalf of the Northern California CARF fairs; California Exposition and State Fair (Cal Expo State Fair) that reflected disagreement among the various stakeholders over the allocation of race dates. The Board postponed action on the northern calendars to give stakeholders more time to resolve their issues. When the matter was considered again by the Board at its September 19, 2013 regular meeting, continuing disagreement among stakeholders prompted Chairman Israel to form the Northern California Racing Ad Hoc Committee (Ad Hoc Committee) chaired by Commissioners Beneto and Choper to work with the northern California stakeholders in an effort to bring about consensus. However, the Board approved the initial part of the 2014 racing calendar in Northern California by allocating dates to PRA from December 26, 2013, through June 15, 2014.

The Ad Hoc Committee met with northern stakeholders at Golden Gate Fields in early October and again in late November. The resulting proposed calendars are before the Board for consideration.

ANALYSIS

The following 2014 and 2015 racing calendar proposals were discussed at the November 26, 2013 meeting of the Ad Hoc Committee.

However, the Humboldt County Fair would prefer to have another date on which it would run alone without being overlapped with Golden Gate Fields, and Cal Expo would have preferred to have added a third week of racing in 2014 but appears resigned to waiting until 2015 for this to occur.

A majority of the northern interests do not approve of the proposed calendar for 2015. The addition of a third week of racing for Cal Expo forces the race meet in Santa Rosa to begin one week later in July, which means extending the conclusion of the Santa Rosa race meet later into August. The Sonoma County Fair Board will meet in January 2014 to discuss this proposal. The Humboldt County Fair has a similar concern. The California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) will not support a 2015 calendar before the Sonoma County Fair Board makes a decision on whether to run its proposed race dates. The Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) believes it is too early to adopt a 2015 calendar for Northern California.

Staff recommends the Board hear from the Ad Hoc Committee and the interested stakeholders.
