CLOSED SESSION

Chairman Winner stated the Board would go into closed session. After closed session Chairman Winner stated the Board made a conditional employment offer to Frederick M. "Rick" Baedeker to be the Board's Executive Director, conditioned on the completion of the state's hiring process. Chairman Winner said he had been delegated by the Board to take any and all steps necessary to finalize Mr. Baedeker's appointment as Executive Director following the completion of the state's hiring process.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF NOVEMBER 21, 2013

Chairman Winner asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of November 21, 2013. Vice-Chairman Rosenberg **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Krikorian **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF DECEMBER 12, 2013

Chairman Winner asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of December 12, 2013. Vice-Chairman Derek **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Choper **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Richard Castro, representing Pari-Mutuel Employees' Guild, stated he previously requested discussion on the pension plan for non-union track employees be made an agenda item. He wished to add to this request that the Board consider the issue of unfunded pension contributions for the last five years. Mr. Castro asked the Board to look into what was holding up the distributions to the pensions. He stated he would be filing a federal action against Brian Waite, the mutual manager at Golden Gate Fields, for creating a hostile work environment. John Bucalo, of Barona Casino (Barona), stated satellite wagering facilities were closing down; Barona's business was down 40 percent from what it was a few years earlier. He said the creation of new minisatellites, without increasing demand, was not helping the industry.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1658, VESTING OF TITLE TO CLAIMED HORSE, TO PROVIDE THAT A CLAIM SHALL NOT BE VOIDED BY THE STEWARDS IF PRIOR TO THE RACE THE CLAIMANT ELECTS TO CLAIM THE HORSE REGARDLESS OF WHETHER THE RACING OR OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN DETERMINES THE HORSE WILL BE PLACED ON THE VETERINARIAN'S LIST AS UNSOUND OR LAME.

CHRB Equine Medical Director Dr. Rick Arthur stated the proposed amendment to Rule 1658, Vesting of Title to Claimed Horse, was requested by horsemen who wanted the option to keep a claimed horse regardless of its post-race condition. Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB Assistant

Executive Director, stated there were no comments during the 45 day notice period; staff recommended the Board adopt the proposal as presented. Vice-Chairman Derek **motioned** to adopt the proposed amendment to Rule 1658. Commissioner Auerbach **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING A REPORT FROM THE CALIFORNIA MARKETING COMMITTEE (CMC) REGARDING ITS 2014 MARKETING AND PROMOTION PLANS PURSUANT TO BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 19605.73 (B).

Craig Dato, representing the California Marketing Committee (CMC), stated the annual budget for the CMC was \$1.75 million, which was small considering the 2014 annual CMC budget was \$5.7 million. He said the CMC was funded entirely by distributions from satellite wagering; the reduction in the CMC budget was due to migration from satellite wagering to advance deposit wagering, and the 2011 reduction in the satellite wager distributions from .4 percent to .25 percent. Mr. Dato said the CMC, with its limited budget, focused on product enhancement, and marketing to big money wagering customers. He said the product enhancement included funding for two-year-old turf stakes, the Golden State Series, and statewide horse recruitment. The marketing program was called the Significant Player Program, which was an incentive program of up to three percent for customers who wager more than \$20,000 in a calendar month. In 2013 there were 368 players in the program, wagering over \$48 million. Commissioner Choper asked what the CMC incentive program looked like compared to other states or overseas. Mr. Dato said there were incentive programs ranging from eight to twelve percent. Commissioner Choper asked how was it possible the CMC three percent incentive was effective. Mr. Dato stated the three percent the CMC offered was a base that the associations supplemented with their own

incentives. Commissioner Krikorian asked for specifics on 2013 satellite marketing. Shannon McDonald, of the CMC, stated the satellite marketing 2013 budget was \$180,000, but the amount spent was more like \$140,000. She said it was used on statewide giveaways with all satellites and minisatellites participating. Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked if the giveaways were successful in bringing in patrons. Ms. McDonald said the giveaways were being reduced in the 2014 budget making room for the statewide handicapping contest. Commissioner Choper asked if satellites and minisatellites were considered as equal for marketing purposes. Ms. McDonald said yes, the giveaways were distributed based solely on the wagering facilities historical attendance. Commissioner Auerbach asked what the .15 percent drop in revenue was in relation to. Mr. Dato stated there was legislation in 2010 that returned some of the CMC budget to purses and commissions. Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked why not spend less money on giveaways, which had not increased attendance, and more money on horse recruitment, which had been very successful. Mr. Dato said that was a debated point at the CMC meetings; however, like most budgets passed by a vote, the CMC budget contained the results of compromise. Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked if the representatives of the CMC thought the horse recruitment efforts were successful. Mr. Dato stated they did. Tom Robbins, of the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club, stated horse population reductions had been a nationwide issue for horseracing. He said the horse recruitment focused on areas that had proven successful getting younger horses into California. He stated the California recruitment programs were helping to level off horse populations, with expectations for the numbers to soon rise; this was something that had not happened in other states. Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked if the CMC could increase its budget, how would it spend the additional funds. Mr. Robbins stated he would use the money to directly help trainers who were interested in relocation to California.

Commissioner Choper asked if the Board had any influence on or power to increase the CMC budget. Chairman Winner stated the CMC was presenting its budget to the Board for informational purposes only. He said legislation was required to increase the CMC budget. John Bucalo, of the Barona Casino, stated the original intension for the creation of the CMC was to promote satellite wagering; he said it should return to that focus.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE REPORT AND UPDATE FROM THE NIGHT INDUSTRY CONCERNING THE STATUS OF THE AGREEMENT REGARDING 1) THE NIGHT INDUSTRY'S ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) IMPORTS SPLIT RATE ON RACES CONDUCTED AFTER 6:00 P.M. DURING THE 2013 RACING YEAR AND 2) THE ALLOCATION AND DISTRIBUTION OF ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) HARNESS FUNDS GENERATED PURSUANT TO BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 19604(F)(5).

Dan Schiffer, representing the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association, stated there was an agreement and it had been signed. Ben Kenney, of Watch and Wager, and Rick English, of Los Alamitos Quarter Horse Racing, concurred there was a signed agreement. Mr. Schiffer thanked Vice-Chairman Rosenberg and Commissioner Choper for their help in getting the agreement completed.

REPORT FROM THE MEDICATION AND TRACK SAFETY COMMITTEE.

Vice-Chairman Derek stated the Medication and Track Safety Committee (Committee) discussed Dr. Rick Arthur's proposal to place quarter horses, stabled at Los Alamitos Race Course (Los Alamitos), on the Veterinarian's List for 15 days after clenbuterol treatment. Removal from the Veterinarians' list for horses treated would also require a clear blood and urine test. She said Dr. Allred and the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association favored the proposal; however, it was still being decided whether it would be a rule or a directive. If the decision was to make it a rule, a draft text of proposed Rule 1843.7, Administration of Clenbuterol to Quarter Horses, had been prepared. Vice-Chairman Derek said that Dr. Arthur also proposed an amendment to Rule 1858, Test Sample Required, which would allow for out-of-competition testing on horses that were trained off-site and shipped in the day of racing, as well as eliminating the upper limit of nine horses per day, per association, that could be tested. She said there was discussion on the proposal for the administration of lasix to be done by third party veterinarians, and for improvements in backside security. On the later, the Thoroughbred Owners of California offered \$150,000 towards finding the best solution. Vice-Chairman Derek stated Chairman Winner directed the Committee to pursue a goal of limiting the use of medications to their intended purposes. She said this would be addressed by the Committee in the months ahead.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19550 states the Board shall require each licensed racing association that conducts 14 or less weeks of racing to designate three racing days, and each licensed racing association that conducts more than 14 weeks of racing to designate five racing days during any one meeting, to be conducted as charity days by the licensee for the purpose of distribution of the net proceeds therefrom to beneficiaries through the distribution agent. No racing association shall be required to pay to a distributing agent for the purpose of distribution to beneficiaries more than an amount equal to two-tenths of one percent of the association's total on-track handle on live races conducted by the association at the meeting. Business and Professions Code section 19555 requires that proceeds are to be distributed to beneficiaries within 12 calendar months after the last day of the meet during which charity days were conducted. Business and Professions Code section 19556 provides that the distributing agent shall make the distribution to beneficiaries qualified under this article. At least 20 percent of the distribution shall be made to charities associated with the horse racing industry. An additional five percent shall be paid to a welfare fund and another five percent shall be paid to a nonprofit corporation, the primary purpose of which is to assist horsemen and backstretch personnel who are being affected adversely as a result of alcohol or substance abuse. In addition to the above distributions, a separate 20 percent shall be made to a nonprofit corporation or trust, the directors or trustees of which shall serve without compensation except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses, and which has as its sole purpose the accumulation of endowment funds, the income on which shall be distributed to qualified disabled jockeys.

ANALYSIS

Los Angeles Turf Club II (LATC II) is requesting approval to distribute race day charity proceeds generated at its 2013 autumn meet from September 27, 2013 through November 3, 2013. From the net race day charity proceeds LATC II is proposing a total distribution of \$37,403.38. The charitable organizations selected and amount to be distributed is listed on the attachment. Staff notes that 100 percent of the proceeds will be given to 13 horse racing related organizations.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action. Staff recommends the Board approve the charity race day distribution as presented.

ADDEMDUM TO REQUEST FOR AUTHORITY TO DISTRIBUTE
2013 CHARITY DAYS PROCEEDS

California Equine Retirement Foundation, Inc. – CERF is an organization that has developed into a full-care ranch to provide a full range of services to former race horses in need of rehabilitation toward retirement or placement in to a new career. CERF maintains 75 plus horses ranging in age from one year to 35 years, each having specific needs to insure proper health and optimal fitness. Each horse has its own paddock where appropriate portions are placed in feeders in the morning and again in the late afternoon. During the day hay is placed in outside feeders for grazing while the horses are turned out. Periodic re-evaluations are made to determine if any changes are needed in any individual's dietary regime. This program provides horses with proper nutrition to maintain health, fitness and longevity.

California Thoroughbred Foundation – CTF is a 503(c)(3) nonprofit organization that provides multiple benefits to individuals involved in the Thoroughbred industry. These include scholarship programs for veterinary medicine students at UC, Davis and maintenance of the Carleton F. Burke Memorial Library.

California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation – CTHF is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit foundation that provides assistance to the low income backstretch community occupied with the care of Thoroughbred race horses at California's major race tracks and fair circuits and CHRB recognized off-track training centers. The organization maintains three clinics throughout the state which see over 10,000 people each year, including numerous children who are prepared medically to return to school each year.

CARMA – The California Retirement Management Account is organized to raise money for retired California race horses. Their mission statement provides that they assist Thoroughbred retirement facilities that care for and retrain horses whose careers have ended after competing in California Thoroughbred races. Their services include tracking of retired California race horses and in working to find homes for retired equines. CARMA also manages a grant request process and distributes funds to qualified retirement facilities caring for such horses. CARMA is dedicated to the goal of providing funding for the rehabilitation, retraining and/or retirement of Thoroughbred horses that have raced in California.

Edwin Gregson Foundation – A nonprofit charitable foundation organized for the purpose of improving the lives of backstretch workers and their immediate family members at California race tracks. The organization provides backstretch workers with many educational programs, including "English as a second language," bible studies and provides numerous programs, including computer training programs at its recreation facility, computer games and various magazines in English and Spanish. It organizes family outings for the workers and their children, including trips to Magic Mountain in Valencia, California, Raging Waters, Galaxy soccer games, Dodger baseball games and excursions to the Long Beach Aquarium. The organization also maintains a recreational hall at Santa Anita Park for the benefit of the backside workers and their children.

Holy Angels Church (Backside Permanent Deacon) – Holy Angels Church is a Catholic Church across the street from Santa Anita Park. A deacon from the church performs a weekly Mass in the recreation room at the track on Monday nights for the workers on the backside. He walks down the shed rows daily in the morning and assists the workers in an endless variety of ways. Examples of the assistance provided include counseling, organizing religious and recreational activities, the collection and distribution of clothing, help with Medicare, Medi-Cal and immigration forms, officiating at holiday gatherings at Santa Anita, etc.

Methodist Hospital Foundation – The Foundation supports Methodist Hospital, a major local hospital with a full service emergency trauma center directly adjacent to Santa Anita Park that serves as the first emergency responder for any jockey or rider fall at the track, as well as for patrons requiring emergency attention, and is thus extremely important to Santa Anita's horse racing operation.

Racetrack Chaplaincy of America (Southern California Council) – The stated mission of the organization is "The overall mission of RTCA, through its councils and chaplains, is to make disciples for Jesus Christ through teaching, preaching, and ministering to the spiritual, emotional, physical, social, and educational needs of those persons involved in all aspects of the horse racing industry."

Southern California Equine Foundation, Inc. – SCEF is a nonprofit charitable organization providing hospital and equine ambulance services on the Southern California Thoroughbred racing circuit. Commonly known as the Equine Hospital, SCEF has a long history of service to the racing industry and the equine athlete. This is an organization "dedicated to the care of the injured horse."

Tranquility Farm – This organization is a 501(c)(3) charity whose principal activity is to accept the donation of Thoroughbred horses from the race tracks and breeding farms and whose goal is to give such horses the best opportunity to find an adoptive home. For those Thoroughbreds that are not readily adoptable, the organization offers comfortable retirement wherever possible, giving priority to horses that were significant competitors or producers. Tranquility Farm requests, but does not require, that owners contribute sponsorship to help defray the costs of rehabilitation and retraining. No horse is denied acceptance at Tranquility Farm based upon its owner's financial contribution.

United Pegasus Foundation – This is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization that aids the rescue of superannuated Thoroughbreds and provides care for such animals at its farm in Tehachapi, California. On occasion the organization purchases older horses at auction and acquires other Thoroughbreds at the request of owners and trainers. The retired Thoroughbreds are maintained in pleasant quarters and peaceful surroundings to live out the balance of their lives. This organization depends entirely upon donations for the purchase of food and other amenities required to maintain the Thoroughbreds.

Winners Foundation – The Winners Foundation provides confidential assistance on a one-to-one basis to employees and family members of California race tracks who are seeking help for alcohol, gambling and drug addiction. Each situation is geared to best support an individual's desire to change his or her life for the better. The Foundation has developed a large referral base and maintains close relationships with community based services such as anonymous 12 step groups, city and county assistance agencies, detox centers, halfway houses and out-patient and in-patient hospital treatment programs. This service is provided to any employee or family member of anyone involved in the California Thoroughbred horse racing community, free of charge. This includes backstretch workers, as well as all employees of Del Mar, Fairplex, Golden Gate Fields, Hollywood Park, Oak Tree, Santa Anita and the California Association of Racing Fairs.

Permanently Disabled Jockeys' Fund – This is a statutorily mandated distribution per Business and Professions Code Section 19556 (c). It provides support to disabled jockeys, as its name implies.

BACKGROUND

Proposals for the Northern California thoroughbred and fair racing calendars for 2014 and 2015 were received in May and June 2013 from Golden Gate Fields, the California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF), the Sonoma County Fair, and Cal Expo. The proposed calendars reflected disagreement among the various stakeholders over the allocation of race dates. The Board postponed action on the northern calendars to give stakeholders additional time to resolve their issues. When the matter was considered again by the Board in September, continuing disagreement among stakeholders prompted then Chairman Israel to ask Commissioners Beneto and Choper to work with the northern interests in an effort to bring about consensus. This led to a series of Ad Hoc Committee meetings conducted by Commissioners Beneto and Choper with northern stakeholders at Golden Gate Fields. Commissioners Beneto and Choper met with northern stakeholders at Golden Gate Fields in early October and again in late November 2013. The resulting proposed calendars were presented to the Board for consideration at the December 12, 2013 Regular Meeting.

The Board at its December 2013 meeting approved the 2014 racing calendar but elected not to approve the 2015 racing calendar due to concerns expressed by a majority of the stakeholders in Northern California. However, included in the motion to approve the 2014 calendar was a commitment to allocate three weeks of State Fair racing to Cal Expo on unspecified dates in 2015. The 2015 calendar was referred back to the Ad Hoc Committee.

Commissioners Beneto and Choper met again with northern stakeholders on January 13, 2014. The report from the Ad Hoc Committee and a discussion of the 2015 calendar, scheduled for the January 16, 2014 meeting of the Board, was deferred and is rescheduled for the February 21, 2014 meeting of the Board.

ANALYSIS

The calendars endorsed by the Ad Hoc Committee are included in this meeting package. There is one primary calendar and two optional calendars providing alternatives for the Sonoma County Fair, Humboldt County Fair, and Golden Gate Fields meets in August.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board hear from the Ad Hoc Committee and interested stakeholders.

Wine Country Racing

The proposal to allow Cal Expo three weeks of racing in 2015 by granting them the additional week of July 22 to July 26 (a race week that has traditionally been ran at Santa Rosa) will be detrimental to the Sonoma County Fair. If the California Horse Racing Board will only grant the 2015 Sonoma County Fair race meet dates of July 29 to August 16, it leaves Sonoma County Fair Board having to make a choice between two evils.


If the Sonoma County Fair board chooses to move their Fair onto these new race dates, the last week of Fair would be held during the first week of school for almost ½ of the students (20,000) in the County. The financial loss to the revenues from all aspects of fair programming would be significant, in the hundreds of thousands of dollars; but more importantly there will be lost opportunities for the Sonoma County youth, especially those that participate in our agriculture programs.

The most likely alternative will be that the Sonoma County Fair accepts these contested race dates and runs the last week of racing without a Fair program to support it. In other words, the 16 day Sonoma County Fair will start without racing, and end on August 9th; followed by another week of racing ran solo. We ran a week of racing without the fair in 2010 and experienced around a 50% decline in our on-track handle. The loss of these commissions, added to the decline in concessions, parking, admissions, reserved seats and sponsorship revenues would be as significant as the first scenario. In addition, not only would the horsemen suffer financially, but our meet would lack the excitement that our stakeholders are accustomed to. Further, in this scenario, other meets will also be negatively impacted. It is assumed that Humboldt County Fair will be moved a week later into their school season and Golden Gate Fields will lose a week of racing.

Overall Points to consider with Proposed 2015 Northern California Fair Racing Schedule:

- The Santa Rosa race meet is one of the most flourishing race meets in California, referred to as the "Saratoga of the West".
- We have made many improvements to our facility including having the only turf course associated with the California fair race circuit.
- The horsemen support our meet for many reasons and more specifically because of our turf course, facility improvements and mild weather.

- This encroachment into our traditional racing date allocation period would have a negative effect on the California racing industry as a whole.
- There is no indication that granting Cal Expo additional racing dates to the detriment of our fair would benefit any other entity but Cal Expo.
- As a matter of historical reference, in 2009, the Cal Expo Board of Directors chose to move its fair/racing dates off of the traditional Labor Day period into its current July timeframe in order to avoid conflicts with school dates. At that time, they agreed to the current schedule and the consequences this move would have on their race dates.
- Even when Cal Expo ran their race meet over Labor Day weekend with Del Mar, Sonoma County Fair's meet still outperformed Sacramento.
- Two other possible solutions to providing Cal Expo with three weeks of racing may be for Cal Expo to move back to their historical Labor Day dates or for Alameda County Fair to move up in the calendar since schools are getting out by early June.
- The most recently concluded horse racing program at the Sonoma County Fair during the historical CHRB allocated dates period created:
 - **More handle than Cal Expo**; 12% more for average daily handle and 46% more for total handle.
 - **More purse money generated and awarded to California horsemen**; 14% on average and 48% for total purses generated and awarded.
 - **Higher thoroughbred field sizes**; 8% more averaged over past four years.
 - **Higher racing attendance percentage**; 8% more of fair patrons attended the race meet.







It has been brought to my attention that the California Horse Racing Board is suggesting that the Sonoma County Fair move its race meet, and ultimately their fair dates, a week later than normally scheduled. This would put the Fair and race meet dates to July 31 through August 17, 2014. This move would put the last week of the fair into our school year.

Four of Sonoma County's School Districts will return to school the week of August 11 - 15. Based on our current information, these four schools are the largest schools in the County, with the number of students enrolled in these districts totaling approximately 19,955. Both teachers and students make up a large portion of the Fair's temporary workforce. For many students, the Fair is a first-time summer job, while others come back to work at the Fair year after year. The experience gained by working at the Fair and the bonds developed is invaluable.

Mr. Israel, I urge you to reconsider your suggestion of moving the dates of the 2014 Sonoma County Fair. This move would seriously impact many of our students and teachers in this County, jeopardizing a valuable opportunity to be involved in our agricultural programs and our community.

Dear Chairman Israel:

We are writing to strongly oppose a proposed change in the horse racing schedule for the Sonoma County Fair's race dates.

In 2011, budget shortfalls forced the Legislature to eliminate state dollars for fairs. The loss of funding and limited resources has left many fairs around the state struggling to continue their operations. In looking at the racing calendar, we need to work together to provide solutions that increase the independence of the fairs and ensure their long term financial stability.

Requiring the Sonoma County Fair to reschedule deeper into August would result in decreased revenue and participation. Youth involvement by 4-H and Future Farmers of America clubs would significantly decrease with school back in session. This would also have a negative impact on the fair's temporary employees, many of whom are local teachers and students. In more rural areas like Sonoma County, this type of participation is vital to the fair's overall success.

Moreover, it is unrealistic and cost prohibitive to expect the fair to reschedule their dates in less than a year. It is our understanding that much of the planning including entertainment and vendor concessions contracts has already occurred. The publicity and marketing efforts to promote the 2014 fair dates have been in place since late July. For these reasons, we urge the California Horse Racing Board to allow the Sonoma County Fair to continue with plans for race dates July 24 through August 10, 2014.

As Legislators who represent the North Bay, we all agree that moving the race dates would not be in the best interest of our community, and we hope that you consider this letter at the October 24th board meeting.





Thank you for your consideration of our concerns. We look forward to continue working on this issue with your staff.







**RE: Request for Support of Three Weeks of Thoroughbred Racing
at the California State Fair, July 10-26, 2015**

Honorable Commissioners:

Thank you for your ongoing efforts to support and enhance horse racing in California. As a fellow State Agency, the California Exposition and State Fair appreciates the Board's consideration of our preceding letters on this issue, dated June 4, July 14, October 16, and December 4, 2013. In addition, we appreciate the Board's establishment of an Ad Hoc Committee to meet with parties in Northern California to work toward a realistic 2014 and 2015 Horse Racing Calendar. **Please accept this letter as formal support of the Committee's 2015 Racing Calendar, as proposed and reviewed in a public meeting on Monday, January 13, that allocates three weeks of racing to the California State Fair, July 10-26, 2015.**

Members of the Ad Hoc Committee requested additional information in response to a letter from the Sonoma County Fair to the California Horse Racing Board. Given that we were not provided with a copy of this letter until late Monday of this week, we will not be able to address all items on such short notice. However, we respectfully offer the information below in partial response.

Historical Racing at California State Fair

As outlined in prior correspondence, for more than 160 years, California Exposition and State Fair has been the home and showcase of some of California's finest horseracing. We operate the only track in California that races harness horses from September to May each year. Thus we are the only Fair track operating a live racing product throughout the entire year. The State Fair has the privilege of operating one of the oldest Horse Racing meets in California, introducing Californians and visitors alike to the excitement and majesty of these cherished equine athletes.

Cal Expo has made a significant investment in racing related capital projects over the last ten years, in the amount of \$4,004,828, as demonstrated in the table below:

2013 Progress and Results

A new management team has come on board at Cal Expo following the retirement of a long-time Chief Executive Officer in December 2012. The new team is committed to horse racing and committed to making horse racing at Cal Expo a flagship event in the Northern California racing calendar. The new team brings a fresh perspective and high level of understanding and recognition of the opportunity to present a quality on and off-track racing product and environment. In the past year alone, this renewed focus has led to:

- Introduction of multiple new races during our 2013 Meet, including two stakes races (Governor's Cup and Fillies Race)
- In working with CARF, the California State Fair Thoroughbred Meet offered higher overnight purses than any other track in Northern California**
- More diverse and improved integration of the Horse Racing product into the annual State Fair's \$1.2 million marketing campaign
- Improved access to opportunities for corporate and box seat customers through online marketing and sales, ultimately provoking broader exposure to our live racing product
- First time multiple page photo feature of our Horse Racing meet in a local mainstream lifestyle magazine (attached)

- Implementation of a variety of educational promotions catering to both established players and new fans including Handicapping Workshops, daily "Let it Roll" handicapping contest, Guaranteed Pick 4 pool, televised Pick 4 selection show and expanded coverage on TVG/HRTV
- Establishment of an interactive "Track Walk" program geared towards exposing youth and families to the sport of horse racing, its basic components and creating a long lasting positive memory around the excitement of horse racing

*** California State Fair has increased its overnight purses by 25% in 2012 and again by 9% in 2013 compared to Golden Gate Fields' overnight purses. Cal Expo participates in the stakes program offered by CARF, which has equaled or surpassed any other in Northern California.*

Improvements to the Quality of Racing at Cal Expo

Cal Expo offers one of the finest race track Grandstands in California. The Grandstand features a full-service Turf Club, Clubhouse and General Admission satellite wagering area, each of which is weatherized and air-conditioned. The Turf Club also features extensive outdoor table seating with full menu and waitstaff service provided by Ovations Fanfare, one of the leading food service concessionaires in the state. In addition, California Exposition and State Fair has committed to a variety of infrastructure upgrades in the 2014 calendar year, including:

Additionally, all staff has been encouraged to make other possible improvements, including enhanced pedestrian lines of sight, widening walkways and additional signage, with the purpose of increased pedestrian flow to experience our live racing product during the annual State Fair.

There was some discussion during the subcommittee meeting about concerns brought to our attention by the State Fire Marshall's Office during our 2013 Thoroughbred Race Meet. These concerns related to egress from the backside tack rooms in particular areas of the barns. Our team moved swiftly to address those concerns and ensure a successful 2013 meet. Since then we have been working hand in hand with their office. We have brought a highly respected architect on board and continue to make progress with the State Fire Marshall. We want the Board to know that we have committed \$400,000 in further enhancement to the living areas in the barns, and expect more updates to follow within the next month.

California State Fair is a full participant in the Track Safety and Maintenance Program managed by the California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF). This program provides Cal Expo with a full complement of specialized equipment and expertise for maintenance of the racing surface at our Fair.

Growth Potential and Exposure

Expanding racing from two weeks to three weeks at the California State Fair will be an investment in the future for horse racing in Northern California. As noted in our previous correspondence, Sacramento is the 27th largest market in America with an estimated \$83.4 billion in annual spending.

As a fully integrated component in our marketing and promotions campaign, we are confident that the investment will pay off for the California racing industry. The State Fair will potentially expose more Fair attendees to live racing and racing at Del Mar, as we are home to the highest total attendance of all Fairs in Northern California:

In 2013, attendance during the third week of the California State Fair was 344,596. Attendance during the last week of the State Fair is more than the total attendance at most Fairs in California, yet Cal Expo did not have racing to feature for these potential new fans.

Additionally, with our year-round harness racing program and successful satellite wagering operation, we look to continue to identify incentives for year round exposure to live racing. Cal Expo is an important participant in the off-site betting network and contributes significant commissions and purses to other California tracks that serve as Host Tracks throughout the year.

Clarification on History of Third Week of Racing at Santa Rosa

The Sonoma County Fair's letter states that a third week has been "traditionally" run at Santa Rosa, however the third week of racing at Santa Rosa was formerly the last week of racing run at the Solano County Fair (Vallejo). In 2007, Vallejo and Santa Rosa ran this as a joint week of racing, adding a third week to Santa Rosa's existing meet. In 2008 and 2009, the week reverted back to Vallejo and Santa Rosa resumed running a traditional two-week meet. When Vallejo discontinued racing, Santa Rosa was hesitant to take on the additional week. In 2010, Santa Rosa added the week of racing, without a concurrent Fair. Thus Santa Rosa had two weeks of Fair with three weeks of racing. In 2011, Santa Rosa decided to add a third week of Fair to run concurrent with three weeks of racing.

Given that the Alameda County Fair and Sonoma County Fair both have three weeks of Racing concurrent with three weeks of Fair, it is prudent for the State Fair to begin operating three weeks of racing with its three weeks of Fair.




TO RUN

All the horses arrived pretty early in the morning, and with the races starting in the afternoon, Pablo still had lots of time to kill before making final preparations and walking each horse to the track for the race."



The Jock's Room is kind of a locker room for the jockeys. They can shower, relax, eat and change their silks (what the industry calls the brightly colored uniforms) depending on which owner they're riding for. Minutes later, Cedillo rode Maggie's Gold to victory in the fourth race on opening day."


"This photograph was taken after an evening race on opening day. I love how the bright color of this red saddlecloth contrasts against jockey Barrington Harvey's shiny boot and the gray and very muscular flank of Erma's First Love. It was crazy to see these jockeys tear around the track on these tall horses while perched in these tiny stirrups."





▲ "I'll admit it. I was a little surprised the first time I saw Marcia Stortz's ponytail bobbing underneath her helmet. In a world dominated by men, Stortz is one of the relatively few female jockeys in the sport and the only one I saw at Cal Expo. Here she quickly hands off her saddle-cloth before heading back to the Jock's Room."

"This is another picture taken with my remote camera. I like how the sun flared into my lens, which was dirtied by the constant dust and water from the tractors that harrow the track surface after every race. I hope that the sunlight, combined with the blurred horses, shows the intensity of these beautiful, powerful animals as they thunder neck and neck down the finishing straight. Photo finishes were a regular occurrence."



 "John Longmire let me peek over his shoulder as he organized his betting slips, bingo card and racing preview sheet, and settled in for the first couple of races on opening day at the State Fair. There's a dizzying array of ways to bet on each race. The payout in horse racing is based on a pari-mutuel system, where all the money goes into a pool and then gets distributed based on the horse you bet on and where it placed."



 "I saw this guy from the winner's circle and couldn't resist shooting him. We were separated by a hedgerow so we couldn't talk, but a few seconds after I shot him, we shared a wink and a nod. He's a classic. I'm new to horse racing, but that's the kind of guy I expect to see at the tracks. He's straight out of central casting. Racing schedule, tall-boy beer and a smoke—he's ready."

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD TO AUGMENT THE FUNDING OF THE
WORKERS' COMPENSATION PROGRAM FOR THOROUGHBRED RACING
ASSOCIATIONS AND FAIRS

Regular Board Meeting
February 21, 2014

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19605.75 provides, in part, that the Legislature finds and declares the existence of high caliber thoroughbred racing in California is important to the state's agricultural economy. Escalating costs of doing business in California, including workers' compensation insurance costs, are causing thoroughbred horses and trainers to leave this state, and discouraging owners and trainers from bringing horses into the state.

In response, the Legislature enacted Business and Professions Code section 19605.75 which authorized 0.5 percent be deducted from the total amount handled in exotic pari-mutuel pools of thoroughbred races. Specifically, the funds were to be collected from thoroughbred racing associations and fairs, satellite wagering facilities within the state, and advance deposit wagering by California residents. In turn, the funds were to be distributed to an organization composed of thoroughbred racing associations and the owners' organization.

Business and Professions Code section 19605.75 ceased to be operative law on January 1, 2014.

ANALYSIS

In order to ensure the continued funding of the thoroughbred workers' compensation program, the Board needs to authorize a 0.5 percent deduction, pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19601.01, from exotic pari-mutuel wagering pools on thoroughbred races. The funding should come from those same sources identified in Business and Professions Code section 19605.75; to wit, thoroughbred racing associations and fairs conducting meets in California, satellite wagering facilities in the state and advanced deposit wagering by California residents. Further, the funding should be retroactive to January 1, 2014 to ensure the continuity of the thoroughbred workers' compensation program.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board act to augment the funding of the thoroughbred workers' compensation program by adopting the following motion:

"The California Horse Racing Board hereby moves to augment the funding of the thoroughbred workers' compensation program by authorizing a 0.5 percent deduction from exotic wagering pools of thoroughbred races and to do so retroactively to January 1, 2014. The funding source is to be the thoroughbred racing associations and fairs conducting thoroughbred racing meets in California, satellite wagering facilities within California and advanced deposit wagering by residents of California."

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) provides that notwithstanding any provision of this section to the contrary, the distribution of market access fees pursuant to this subparagraph may be altered upon the approval of the Board, in accordance with an agreement signed by all parties whose distributions would be affected.

The Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), Del Mar Thoroughbred Club, Fairplex, Los Alamitos, Santa Anita and the California Thoroughbred Breeders Association have requested approval of a modification of the advance deposit wagering (ADW) market access fee distribution as permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E). The requested modification would provide for a deduction of 0.50 percent of handle from market access fees generated from ADW in the Central and Southern Zones on races hosted by thoroughbred associations and racing fairs. The parties state the funds generated by the proposed deduction would be used to offset stabling and vanning expenses incurred by the Fund, which is administered by the Southern California Off-Track Stabling and Vanning Committee (Committee), for the period of March 1, 2014 through February 28, 2015. In conjunction with the request to modify the ADW market access fee the Committee has submitted an agreement signed by all parties whose distributions would be affected.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action.

Dear Jackie,

As you know, the migration of wagering by California residents from brick and mortar facilities to advanced deposit wagering ("ADW") has had a negative impact on the Southern California Stabling & Vanning Fund ("Fund") generation.

Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) which pertains to ADW states that "Notwithstanding any provision of this section to the contrary, the distribution of market access fees pursuant to this subparagraph may be altered upon the written approval of the board, in accordance with an agreement signed by all parties whose distributions would be affected." Market access fees are defined as the monies remaining after the payment of winning tickets and the contractual compensation retained by ADW providers.

The Thoroughbred Owners of California ("TOC"), Del Mar, Fairplex, Los Alamitos, Santa Anita and the California Thoroughbred Breeders Association jointly seek approval of a distribution modification that would provide for a deduction of 0.50% of handle from market access fees generated from ADW in the central and southern zone on races hosted by Thoroughbred Associations and Racing Fairs. The funds generated by the proposed deduction would be utilized to offset stabling and vanning expenses incurred by the Fund, which is administered by the Southern California Off-Track Stabling and Vanning Committee, for the period of March 1, 2014 through February 28, 2015. Attached is a copy of the Agreement signed by all parties whose distributions would be affected.

We respectfully request that the following be placed on the Board's February 21, 2014 agenda:

Discussion and action by the Board regarding approval of the modification of market access fee distributions as permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) for advance deposit wagering hosted by Thoroughbred Racing Associations and Racing Fairs conducting racing in the central and southern zones for the period commencing March 1, 2014 through February 28, 2015.

Southern California Stabling and Vanning Funding Agreement

This Agreement is entered into as of this 31st day of Jan, 2014 by and between the undersigned racing associations ("the Signatory Racing Associations") the Thoroughbred Owners of California ("TOC") and the California Thoroughbred Breeders Association ("CTBA").

IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. The distribution of Market Access fees from Advanced Deposit Wagering, ("ADW") placed on all live and imported races hosted by the Signatory Racing Associations shall be altered by the creation of an additional deduction for a distribution therefrom based upon 0.50% of handle in the Central and Southern Zones that would otherwise be payable as thoroughbred purses and commissions, and such deduction from ADW in the Central and Southern Zones shall be payable to the Fund administered by Southern California Stabling and Vanning Committee.
2. The parties shall immediately file this Agreement with the CHRB for the purposes of securing its approval of the deduction contemplated from market access fees placed on races hosted by the Signatory Racing Associations.
3. Subject to the requisite approval of the CHRB, the deduction from ADW set forth in #1 above shall be effective March 1, 2014 through February 28, 2015.
4. Notwithstanding the distributions from the ADW Deduction set forth hereinabove, the distribution to the Incentive fund administered by the CTBA shall be calculated at the rate of 0.463% of ADW handle in California on races hosted by the Signatory Racing Associations. In addition to the distributions set forth above, there shall be a distribution from the ADW Deduction in order to pay administrative expenses that would otherwise have been distributed to TOC, CTT, and the Backstretch Workers Pension Plan.
5. The Signatory Racing Associations and TOC agree to jointly continue to work toward improving the productivity and efficiency of auxiliary stabling in the Central and Southern zones.







Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES TURF CLUB AT SANTA ANITA APRIL 25, 2014 THROUGH JUNE 29, 2014.

Los Angeles Turf Club (LATC) filed its application to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Santa Anita.

April 25, 2014 through June 29, 2014, or 40 days. The association proposes to race a total of 326 races, or 8.15 per day. LATC did not conduct racing the same timeframe in 2013, Hollywood Park ran a race meeting April 22 through July 16, 2013. The (actual) average daily purse for the Hollywood Park 2013 race meeting was \$466,634. The (estimated) average daily purse for this race meeting is \$482,634.

- The race dates proposed are the dates the Board allocated.

- Racing 4 days per week, Thursday through Sunday with the exception of Monday, May 26, 2014. No less than 7 races weekdays; 9 races weekends with the option to program 10 races on such days.
- First post 1:00 p.m. every day with the following exceptions
 - Twilight Fridays post time 3:00 p.m.
 - Friday, April 25, 2014 (Opening Day) -3:00 p.m.
 - Saturday, May 3, 2014 (Kentucky Derby Day) – 11:00 a.m.
 - Saturday, May 17, 2014 (Preakness Day) – 11:00 a.m.

 - ¢.50 Pick 4 on second race and the last four live races – Alternate runner provision.
 - ¢.50 pick 5 starting first race with a 14% takeout. One tier payoff; 100% carryover.

- \$1 Pentafecta selecting first five finishers in same race – 100% payout on tickets selecting five winners. – No consolation 100% carryover if no ticket has five winners. Super High-5 carded as last race of day.
- The Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) providers are TVG, Xpressbet and Twinpires.

Pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19604, specific provisions must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.

Summary of B&P code 19604

To accept wagers on races conducted in California from a resident of California.

- The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.
- The agreement shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made.



EMT / Paramedic Protocols

The emergency medical services at Los Alamitos Race Course operate under the jurisdiction of the County of Orange Emergency Medical Services Dept. (OCEMS). The OCEMS supervises all paramedic services within the county as well as the licensing of all private ambulance companies.

Orange County regulations stipulate that all paramedic services within the county are provided through the Orange County Fire Authority with no licensing of any private paramedic ambulance services.

The OCEMS has reviewed and approved the protocol for handling on track accidents at Los Alamitos Race Course. This protocol calls for Huntington Ambulance EMT's to respond to any on track accident and stabilize any injured rider. At this point paramedics are called and they respond from the Orange County Fire Station #14 which is located directly adjacent to Los Alamitos Race Course.

Huntington Ambulance crews transport the injured rider to a designated area located just outside a special emergency gate built on the backstretch of the racetrack where they are met by Fire Authority paramedics. This designated area is less than 100 yards from the paramedic station.

The Orange County Fire Authority paramedics evaluate the injured rider and make the determination of whether to transport the rider to a trauma center.

This emergency protocol is in place for both morning training and evening racing accidents.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL PROCEDURES FOR ON-TRACK INJURY TO JOCKEYS

"FIRST RESPONSE"

- In the event of an accident, LATC Trackside Human Ambulance "Unit 41 Paramedics" which is manned by LATC-contracted Paramedics and is following the horses and jockeys in the race will respond immediately to the site of the accident. The attending Paramedics shall arrive equipped with advance cardiac life support (ACLS) and full C-spine equipment.
- An "on-site evaluation" of injuries to the jockey(s) shall be made by Unit 41 Paramedics.



"ON-SITE EVALUATION"

- Based on the Paramedics "on-site evaluation" of injuries, a decision shall be made to either treat the injured jockey(s) on-site or to transport to the hospital.
 - If on-site treatment is deemed sufficient, Unit 41 Paramedics shall transport the injured jockey(s) directly to the First Aid Office where the Track Physician will be primary care provider or,
 - If off-site treatment is deemed necessary Unit 41 Paramedics will contact the Association Gate (channel 1) and have them call the 911 Arcadia Fire Department.



"INJURY TREATMENT"

- If the injured jockey(s) is treated at the First Aid Office the Track Physician shall be the primary care provider unless or until the Track Physician surrenders custody of the patient based on his/her medical evaluation;
 - If deemed necessary the Track Physician will contact the Association Gate to call the 911 Arcadia Fire Department to transport the injured jockey(s) to the hospital.



GAME PLAY NETWORK, INC. FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL
WAGERING HUB, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO TWO YEARS.

Game Play Network, Inc. (GPN) filed its application as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub to provide Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW). CHRB Rule 2072, Approval to Conduct Advance Deposit Wagering by an out-of-state Applicant, allows for a two year license term.

A bond or other form of financial security in the amount of \$500,000 is required to be submitted with an application for license to conduct advance deposit wagering. GPN, has submitted a \$500,000 irrevocable standby letter of credit from East West Bank. The ADW providers currently approved by the Board have submitted bonds as financial security.

GPN has provided that its ADW platform is designed to change the way customers interact with the horseracing industry by emphasizing the entertainment aspects of a winning pari-mutuel wager. Its business model is built on the premise that the best way to attract new customers into the pari-mutuel pools is to create a more enjoyable ADW customer experience that incorporates mobile and video games. The main difference between GPN and traditional ADWs is the way in which the results of the ADW wagers are revealed to the customer. After the races are complete, the results of the customer's wagers are revealed to the customer as cash prizes displayed in their favorite mobile and online games. GPN also offers its customers the ability to engage in traditional ADW wagering where the wagering results are revealed to customers in the same manner as other ADWs.

This application provides for:

- Dates of operation will be Monday through Sunday, 6:00 a.m. – until last post time. CHRB Rule 2071 and 2072 allows for a two-year license term.
- Business and Professions Code section 19604 includes specific provisions that must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers. These include:

19604 (b)(1) and (2)

No ADW provider may accept wagers on **races conducted in California** from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
2. A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.

3. The agreement referenced in subparagraph (2) shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made in accordance with the Interstate Horseracing Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 3001, et seq.), regardless of the location of the ADW provider, whether in California or otherwise, including, without limitation, any and all requirements contained therein with respect to written consents and required written agreements of horsemen's groups to the terms and conditions of the acceptance of those wagers and any arrangements as to the exclusivity between the host racing association or fair and the ADW provider. For purposes of this subdivision, the substantive provisions of the Interstate Horseracing Act shall be taken into account without regard to whether, by its own terms, that act is applicable to advance deposit wagering on races conducted in California accepted from residents of California.

No ADW provider may accept wagers on **races conducted outside of California** from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
2. There is a hub agreement between the ADW provider and one or both of (i) one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing on the breed on which wagering is conducted during the calendar year during which the wager is placed, and (ii) the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which wagering is conducted.

19604 (a)(7)

““Hub agreement” as a written agreement providing for contractual compensation paid with respect to advance deposit wagers placed by California residents on a particular breed of racing conducted outside of California. In the event a hub agreement exceeds a term of two years, then an ADW provider, one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing for the breed covered by the hub agreement, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed covered by the hub agreement shall be signatories to the hub agreement. A hub agreement is required for an ADW provider to receive contractual compensation for races conducted outside of California.”

19604 (d)(1) (B)

“The board shall not approve an application for an original or renewal license as an ADW provider unless the entity, if requested in writing by a bona fide labor organization no later than ninety days prior to licensing, has entered into a contractual agreement with that labor organization . . .”



BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19440 provides that the California Horse Racing Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out the purposes of this Chapter. Business and Professions Code section 19562 states that the Board may prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in California. Business and Professions Code section 19580 provides that the Board shall adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines, and penalties relating to equine medication in order to preserve and enhance the integrity of horseracing in California.

Board Rule 1858, Test Sample Required, currently requires blood and urine samples to be collected from the winner of every race, horses placing second or third in a stakes race with a gross purse of \$75,000 or more, *and not less than six or more than nine other horses selected by the Equine Medical Director, the stewards or the official veterinarian.* Additionally, Rule 1858 provides that every horse within the inclosure or entered to race is subject to testing, and no person having care of a horse shall refuse to submit it for testing when directed by the stewards or official veterinarian.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Board Rule 1858 would eliminate the upward limit of nine additional horses that may be selected each day for testing. The Board's Equine Medical Director provides that the upward limit of nine horses could be exceeded in any number of circumstances. Currently, all claimed horses are also tested. During the Breeders' Cup the first four finishers of Breeders' Cup races are tested. All horses have been tested in certain races at Los Alamitos Race Course. The proposed amendment to Rule 1858 will allow for more than nine additional horses to be selected for testing.

Under the proposed amendment subsection 1858(b) will be amended to provide that "...every horse registered to race at an inclosure, or nominated or pre-entered..." to race is subject to testing. The phrase is added to dispel any ambiguity regarding whether such horses are subject to testing by the CHRB. The Board can test horses meeting these criteria. Adding nominated or pre-entered horses would provide regulatory authority for the Board's out-of-competition (OOC) testing program for the Breeders' Cup and other stakes. Currently, the Board relies on the

Breeders' Cup entry provisions for such OOC testing. The proposed amendment would provide authority to have test samples taken in other states for horses nominated to California stakes, and to sample horses for other states as the CHRB currently does for the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission for the Kentucky Derby.

The proposed amendment to Rule 1858 adds subsection 1858(b)(1) to define "registered to race at an inclosure". Currently, a horse's papers have to be in the racing office if the horse is going to enter and start in a race in this State. The time period for the papers to be in the racing office (prior to entry in the race) is a minimum of two to six days. Under the proposed amendment, if the horse's papers are submitted to the racing office, it will be considered "registered to race at an inclosure".

(a) Blood and urine test samples shall be taken daily from the winner of every race, from horses finishing second and third in any stakes race with a gross purse of \$75,000 or more, and from not less than six ~~or more than nine~~ other horses designated for testing by the Equine Medical Director, the stewards or the official veterinarian.

(b) Every horse within the inclosure, every horse registered to race at an inclosure, nominated, pre-entered or entered in any race is subject to testing and no owner, trainer or other person having the care of a horse shall refuse to submit it for testing when directed by the Equine Medical Director, the stewards or the official veterinarian.

(1) For the purposes of this regulation, a horse is "registered to race at an inclosure" when the horse's registration papers are on file with a racing association under the jurisdiction of the Board.
