APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF OCTOBER 23, 2014

Chairman Winner asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of October 23, 2014.

Commissioner Choper **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Beneto **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

Executive Director Baedeker stated staff was provided a demonstration by the Rancho Cordova Police Department of a server-based surveillance system with both hard-wired and wireless components. The system was effective, portable, and affordable; although, it might be unable to provide complete surveillance of a larger backstretch. He stated the system would be reviewed again by the Security and Licensing Committee, there would be further discussion with the vendor, and a prototype would be developed before the costs could be finalized. Executive Director Baedeker stated staff also received a demonstration of microchip implementation, and a presentation from InCompass on how the microchips could be utilized. He said CHRB had received more than 20 applications for the staff counsel position and interviews would be

conducted shortly. Executive Director Baedeker stated the October all source handle was up 22.2 percent, increased by a day of the 2014 Breeders' Cup which landed in October; both days of the 2013 Breeders' Cup were in November. This made the 2014 all source handle through October up one percent over 2013.

PUBLIC COMMENT

John Bucalo, of Barona Casino Off-Track Betting, stated satellite facilities, with two percent commissions, could not compete with advance deposit wagering (ADW) providers. He asked the Board to make ADW commissions public information; he stated satellites would be competitive with similar commissions. Commissioner Auerbach asked if Barona no longer supported horseracing, siding with Pechanga Resort and Casino to legalize internet poker and sports wagering. Mr. Bucalo said he did not have enough information to answer the question. Chairman Winner stated the situation with Barona Casino was complicated. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated changing the satellite facility commission required legislation. Chairman Winner said the Indian gaming casinos with satellite facilities should work together to push the legislation through. Mr. Bucalo stated the Indian casinos could be an asset to the horseracing industry with sponsorship deals for certain races. Chairman Winner said any sponsorship deals would have to be negotiated with the associations. Rick Gold, a horse owner of Bourbon Lane Stable, applauded the recent policy changes enacted by the CHRB. He said California horseracing would benefit with even stronger out-of-competition testing, full video surveillance of all barns, and 72 hour security and full medication disclosures for all stakes races. He said the only way to eliminate the drug culture was to somehow involve the owners in sanctions imposed for medication violations. Mr. Gold said the cost of leveling the playing field should fall to the

owners. He said he believed the benefits of a level playing field outweighed any possible costs. He also stated takeouts were too high; the industry was shooting itself in the foot.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE DISTRIBUTION OF RACE DAY CHARITY PROCEEDS OF THE LOS ANGELES TURF CLUB, INC. IN THE AMOUNT OF \$190,658.20 TO 12 BENEFICIARIES.

1st Vice-Chairman Derek stated she was grateful that so much of the Los Angeles Turf Club (LATC) charity proceeds would go to actual horse charities and not just horse-related. The Board recognized the request by LATC to distribute its race day charity proceeds.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE DISTRIBUTION OF RACE DAY CHARITY PROCEEDS OF THE DEL MAR THOROUGHBRED CLUB, IN THE AMOUNT OF \$138,009 TO SEVEN BENEFICIARIES.

1st Vice-Chairman Derek stated that throughout her time at the CHRB, Del Mar had been the leader in distributing its charity proceeds to horse-related charities. The Board recognized the request by Del Mar to distribute its race day charity proceeds.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE LOS ALAMITOS QUARTER HORSE RACING ASSOCIATION (Q) AT LOS ALAMITOS RACE COURSE, COMMENCING DECEMBER 26, 2014 THROUGH DECEMBER 20, 2015, INCLUSIVE.

Chairman Winner stated this item had been removed from the agenda.

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSAL TO DEVELOP REGULATIONS REQUIRING GEOGRAPHIC LOCATION TRACKING WHEN USING A WIRELESS DEVICE TO PLACE AN ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGER, WHEN IN THE INCLOSURE OF A RACETRACK.

Joe Morris, representing the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), stated advance deposit wagering (ADW) was convenient for customers who could not get to the race track or an off-track betting (OTB) facility; however, because ADW wagers were so convenient, they were being made by customers while at the racetracks. Because of the difference in purse and commission structure, both purses and commissions were losing funds on every ADW wager placed at a track. He said the TOC was hoping to work with ADW providers so that wagers made at tracks on ADW accounts would follow the same distributions as if they were placed at the track. Mark Thurman, representing CHRIMS, stated the use of the associations Wi-Fi system or cell phone triangulation could be used to locate the place of wagering; however, the data would be passed through an anonymous web service that would track the location and wager data without collecting data on the wagerer. Commissioner Auerbach asked how accurate the cell phone triangulation was. Mr. Thurman said the triangulation could be accurate to 25 to 50 yards. Commissioner Auerbach asked if it was up to the ADW customer to choose whether or not the wager was treated as if it was placed at a brick-and-mortar location. Mr. Thurman said the customer would not choose. He said there would be a separate system that the ADW system would interrogate to determine the location of the wager. Chairman Winner stated information on the wager would be shared but not information on the individual. Mr. Thurman said that was correct. He said where the wager was placed would determine how the takeout would be distributed. Commissioner Krikorian asked if the system would require any consent on the part of the person making the wager on their personal device. Mr. Thurman said the proposed system would need a regulation requiring that mobile device wagers could only be placed with the

devices geolocation turned on. Commissioner Krikorian asked how that could be tracked. Mr. Thurman stated when a wager from a mobile device was placed the ADW provider would have to confirm that the device geolocation was on. Commissioner Krikorian asked if the burden of tracking location could be left up to the ADW providers. Mr. Thurman said leaving it up to the ADW providers would limit safeguards or external audit functionality. Commissioner Krikorian said an easy fix would be to do a survey on the percentage of ADW wagers placed at tracks or OTB facilities and then adjust the distributions. Chairman Winner said suggestions such as Commissioner Krikorian's should be further explored at the Pari-Mutuel, ADW, Satellite, and Simulcast Committee. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked where past negotiations with ADW providers had led. Mr. Thurman stated negotiations would not be effective without a regulation that requires geolocation for ADW wagers. Mr. Morris stated that no one was arguing that ADWs intended on collecting wagers at racetracks, but it had become an issue. Commissioner Krikorian asked if ADW providers were willing to move forward with geolocation. Mr. Morris said ADW providers were willing to discuss it; however, negotiations would not be enough. Mr. Thurman stated one issue that needed to be addressed was to determine the loss of customer base due to individuals not wanting to be tracked. Commissioner Beneto said he would like to see the breakdown on an average ADW wager. Mr. Thurman said it was very complicated with many variables. Commissioner Beneto asked for a breakdown on an ADW wager from a California resident on a Del Mar race. Mr. Thurman said it could be done, but he would have to know other variables such as time of day or what type of race. Chairman Winner said the item would be referred to the Pari-Mutuel, ADW, Satellite, and Simulcast Committee.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF LIEN GAMES RACING, LLC FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO TWO YEARS.

John Ford, representing Lien Games, stated Lien games was first licensed to provide advance deposit wagering (ADW) in California in December, 2013, and reached agreement with Monarch Content Management (Monarch) in May, 2014. Commissioner Choper asked to be reminded what made Lien Games different from other ADW providers. Mr. Ford said Lien Games had a younger customer base from its fantasy sports, that it promoted its ADW services to. Commissioner Choper asked if the percentage of first time horseracing customers had been determined. Mr. Ford said all of the Lien Games horseracing customers were existing fantasy sports customers, but it was possible they were already horseracing customers. Commissioner Choper said it would be helpful for Lien Games to do a survey to find the percentage of first-time customers. Chairman Winner asked what percentage of its fantasy customers had wagered on horseracing. Mr. Ford said around 20 percent. Chairman Winner said he would like more exact data on the horseracing customers. Mr. Ford said that was possible. Executive Director Baedeker said Lien Games provideed a horseracing product that contributed to the wagering pools where other fantasy sports providers had games on horseracing that contribute nothing to horseracing. Commissioner Krikorian asked if other professional sports benefitted from fantasy sports. Executive Director Baedeker said they did not benefit financially. He said other sports did not have legal wagering and the federal laws governing fantasy sports did not take into consideration the impact on legal pari-mutuel wagering. Mr. Ford stated the fantasy games were beneficial to professional sports because they generated interest. He said Lien Games would not produce a fantasy sport on any horseracing that it did not have an agreement with the association. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked what prevented Lien Games from producing fantasy games

on horseracing without negotiating deals with the industry, as others already had. Mr. Ford said the Lien Games business model included promotion and support of horseracing. Chairman Winner asked about the outstanding items. Mr. Ford said they were being worked on. Joe Morris, of the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) and a CHRIMS board member, stated some of the ADW companies were not submitting the required wagering data in a timely manner. He said the CHRIMS administration fees had been \$2000 monthly for several years, but would now need to be increased to \$3000. Mr. Morris stated the ADW hub fees were originally five-and-a-half-percent with the plan that the fee would have been reduced when wagering volume increased and start up costs had been recovered. He said the hub fees were still at five percent and should be reduced to four and a half percent with the remaining half percent going to the Stabling and Vanning Fund to ensure there was room for a healthy horse population. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked if the hub fee reduction and redistribution would require legislation, or was it an internal agreement between the ADW providers and the other parts of the industry. Mr. Morris said the fee could be lowered by the agreements or as a condition of the ADW license. Commissioner Auerbach said the TOC agreement was required for the ADW license; it was up to the TOC to negotiate a change in the distributions, the Board could only approve of the contracted amounts. Scott Daruty, representing Monarch, said that was not true. Chairman Winner said Mr. Daruty would have a turn to speak. Commissioner Auerbach asked if the Board would take a license from an ADW provider if there was a missing required agreement. Chairman Winner said the Board could, it could also require the wagering data be submitted in a timely manner. Mark Thurman, representing CHRIMS, stated Business and Professions Code section 19604 already required that all necessary data be submitted daily. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked what the Board should do about ADW providers not following

the statute. Chairman Winner said he was concerned with punishing all of the ADW providers for late submissions by some of them. Commissioner Auerbach said the Board could fine the ADW providers if they did not stay in compliance. Chairman Winner asked if the ADW providers could be fined for late data submission. Robert Miller, CHRB Staff Counsel, said ADW providers were licensed by the CHRB and could therefore be sanctioned. Commissioner Krikorian stated CHRIMS should be informing the Board on a regular basis if they were not getting what was required from the ADW providers. Mr. Miller said CHRIMS should communicate any issues with the executive director on a regular basis. Commissioner Krikorian said there should be a set time limit for corrections to be made, or the licenses could be made conditional upon them correcting their data submission issues. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg said doing anything other than immediately taking care of the issues was just putting it off and a waste of time. Chairman Winner said he would prefer to take care of the issues immediately if possible. Commissioner Auerbach said it could be a problem with the way the Board operated or a problem with the industry, but these issues always came before the Board in a pile and with very little information to base a decision on. She said she would also prefer to take care of it immediately. Chairman Winner asked if Lien Games was in compliance with its submission of data. Mr. Ford said that he believed it was. He said Lien Games transferred its data daily. When CHRIMS reported there was an issue, which happened only once a month or so, Lien Games responded in the same day. Mr. Thurman said it was way more often than once a month. Commissioner Choper said he agreed that the ADW providers should not be licensed if they do not stay in compliance. Chairman Winner said the parties should have a chance to resolve it between themselves, and the license would be contingent on the data submission issue being resolved. John Valenzuela, representing Pari-Mutuel Employees Guild SEIU Local 280 (Local

280), stated the first ADWs to be licensed gave promises for job creation; however, the jobs had been outsourced to other states. He said Lien Games did not have the required labor agreement for 2014 and did not have one for 2015. Mr. Ford said he had a copy of the 2014 labor agreement. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked what the labor agreement looked like if there were no jobs. Mr. Valenzuela said the agreement stated if there were jobs they would be filled with Local 280 members. Mr. Daruty stated the negotiations on the hub rates were between the ADW providers and the association signing the hub agreement. The Board could make sure the agreements existed but the content was not under the purview of the Board. He said the law gave the TOC the right to request arbitration, but, for example, Xpressbet had a hub agreement with Santa Anita at five percent, an agreement the TOC had been aware of but chose not to request arbitration for. Mr. Daruty said, in reference to the complaint by CHRIMS that the ADW providers had issues with the data submission, there was so much data, mistakes happened. Sometimes the tote information had a mistake and it was the ADW that requested a correction. He said geolocation would make the data submission issues worse, as processing geolocation would require even more data. Commissioner Choper said that the law may have been detailed about hub agreement arbitration, but the Board still had jurisdiction over the license and what was best for the industry. Commissioner Beneto asked why the ADW money was paid weekly when the data was delivered daily. Mr. Daruty said because of the complexity of the settlements, it would be inefficient to pay more often. Commissioner Auerbach said she was surprised to hear Mr. Daruty say that the content of the hub agreement was not under the purview of the Board, when the license to provide ADW was issued by the Board. She said it was inappropriate for Mr. Daruty to say the Board did not have the right to inquire. Mr. Daruty stated Santa Anita was willing to work with the TOC, and was open to other discussions, and

exploring ways to make things better; however, he did not like to hear that the hub fee would need to be lowered to four and a half percent to receive an ADW license. Chairman Winner stated if the TOC wanted to suggest the Board use its influence to lower the hub fee, it had a right to do so, and the Board had the right to discuss and consider it. Mr. Daruty said he only meant to represent another side of the discussion. Commissioner Choper said he was open to the idea that the distributions were too complicated and that the process should be simplified for efficiency. Executive Director Baedeker stated the ADW data collection may have been complicated, but the point by CHRIMS was that some ADW providers, not all, had issues with delivering the data in an accurate and efficient manner. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked how Monarch made decisions for its member associations. Mr. Daruty stated Monarch's goal in all of its negotiations was to get the most money for the producer of the live horseracing. He said Monarch was like an agent acting on the interest of its clients; if there was a particular difficult decision Monarch would consult with the client. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg said the participants retained the right to refuse participation in group negotiations. Mr. Daruty said that was correct. Mr. Thurman said Xpressbet and TVG both provided accurate data in a timely manner, but CHRIMS would continue to work with the other providers on their issues. Chairman Winner stated the Board had an option to licence ADW providers for up to two years. Commissioner Auerbach suggested the license be for one year so that the Board would retain leverage to ensure that the issues with the data submission were fixed. Commissioner Krikorian stated the ADW providers should not be given a year to fix the data submission issues. Executive Director Baedeker said the ADW providers could be sanctioned for non-compliance at any time; the Board did not have to wait until the providers applied to renew their licenses. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked if the license would be for one year for all ADW providers or

just the ones with data submission issues. Commissioner Auerbach said it should be on a case-by-case basis. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated he would rather license all ADW providers for two years and sanction the providers that did not correct their data submission issues. Chairman Winner said that he would prefer to issue two year ADW licenses and work with CHRIMS and staff to ensure that the issues with data submission were corrected. Commissioner Auerbach stated she was willing to make it a two year license. Commissioner Beneto said giving a two year license to an ADW provider that was not in compliance was a sign of weakness. Commissioner Auerbach **motioned** to approve the application for approval to conduct ADW of Lien Games Racing, LLC for an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub, for a period of two years, contingent on the receipt of all outstanding documents. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF ODS TECHNOLOGIES, L.P., DBA TVG, FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO TWO YEARS.

Allison Meyer, of ODS Technologies, L.P., DBA TVG (TVG), stated TVG was requesting the license issued be for two years. Chairman Winner asked about the two outstanding items. Ms. Meyer stated the horsemen's agreements were finalized separately before each race meeting and the contracts were currently being negotiated by Monarch Content Management. Commissioner Beneto **motioned** to approve the application for approval to conduct advance deposit wagering of TVG for an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub, for a period of two years, contingent on the receipt of all outstanding documents. Commissioner Krikorian **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF CHURCHILL DOWNS TECHNOLOGY INITIATIVES COMPANY, DBA TWINSPIRES.COM, FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO TWO YEARS.

Chairman Winner asked why Churchill Downs Technology Initiatives Company, dba Twinspires.com (Twinspires), was having issues with advance deposit wagering (ADW) data submission. Brad Blackwell, representing Twinspires, stated Twinspires was the largest ADW provider in the United States. He said California was the only state requiring a third party for data submission; Twinspires did not have issues in any other state. Mr. Blackwell said the data submission was complicated and “timely manner” was relative; however, Twinspires was willing to work with CHRIMS to work out any existing issues. Commissioner Choper suggested CHRIMS sit down with all of the ADW providers to establish an understanding of what was required by them for compliance. Mr. Blackwell said that was a great idea. Commissioner Krikorian said ideas could be exchanged on how to better handle the data submission, at least where no business secrets were involved. Chairman Winner said the Board appreciated that Twinspires was so large, but the Board only cared about how it did business in California. Mr. Blackwell stated CHRIMS had been requesting information on business outside of California so that it could reconcile the data from California. Mark Thurman, representing CHRIMS, stated we lived in an age where any amount of data was manageable; if the stock market and the banking industry could manage their data, Twinspires, no matter how big it was, could handle its data. He said the issue was more that Twinspires did not willingly address the issues CHRIMS tried to make them aware of. Mr. Blackwell stated Twinspires would continue to agree to disagree. Chairman Winner stated this was the process of licensure, there would be agreement in order for Twinspires to get its license. Commissioner Auerbach **motioned** to approve the

application for approval to conduct ADW of Twinspires for an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub, for a period of two years, contingent on the receipt of all outstanding documents.

Commissioner Krikorian **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF WATCH AND WAGER.COM, LLC, FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO TWO YEARS.

Ed Cummings, of Watch and Wager (WAW), stated WAW started its advance deposit wagering (ADW) operation in 2014, achieving 24 percent growth in the second half of the year. Chairman Winner asked if there were still outstanding items. Mr. Cummings said the labor agreement and bond were in place, the financials were being finalized, and the horsemen's agreement and contracts would be submitted when completed. Chairman Winner asked why WAW had issues submitting data to CHRIMS. Mr. Cummings said the issue WAW had with data submission was different as it processed more international wagers with different data points. He said WAW was working with CHRIMS, which CHRIMS could verify, to correct the issue. Commissioner Choper asked what made WAW different, when compared to the other ADW providers. Mr. Cummings stated WAW was different in that most of its customer base was from outside of the U.S. and WAW drew some of its customers away from unlicensed sports books. Chairman Winner asked how WAW enticed customers from illegal operations. Mr. Cummings said WAW could process the wagers much faster than the illegal sports books, particularly in Asia. Commissioner Choper **motioned** to approve the application for approval to conduct ADW of WAW for an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub, for a period of two years, contingent

on the receipt of all outstanding documents. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF XPRESSBET, LLC, FOR A CALIFORNIA MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO TWO YEARS.

Gene Chabrier, of XpressBet, stated the contracts were outstanding, but they were being negotiated by Monarch Content Management. Chairman Winner asked if XpressBet had the horsemen's agreement. Jacqueline Wagner, Assistant Executive Director, stated they did not submit a horsemen's agreement. Commissioner Beneto **motioned** to approve the application for approval to conduct advance deposit wagering of XpressBet, LLC, for an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub, for a period of two years, contingent on the receipt of all outstanding documents. Commissioner Auerbach **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1688, USE OF WHIPS, TO CHANGE THE TITLE AND TEXT OF RULE, REPLACING THE WORD "WHIP" WITH RIDING CROP, AND TO PROHIBIT A JOCKEY FROM USING A RIDING CROP ON A HORSE MORE THAN THREE TIMES IN SUCCESSION WITHOUT GIVING THE HORSE A CHANCE TO RESPOND. (NOTE: THIS CONCLUDES THE 45-DAY PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD. THE BOARD MAY ADOPT THE PROPOSAL AS PRESENTED.)

1st Vice-Chairman Derek stated the amendment to Rule 1688, Use of Whips, was developed to ensure the riding crop was used as a tool for encouragement and control, and it would discourage a trainer from pressuring a jockey to overuse a riding crop. She said the stewards at the November, 2014, Del Mar race meeting let the jockeys know when they used a crop more than

three times in succession. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek said that no race horse would be disqualified because of the amendment to Rule 1688. Chairman Winner stated the amendment protected the integrity of the sport while ensuring the safety of the horses. He said Darrell Haire, of the Jockeys' Guild, worked hard to educate the jockeys on the issue surrounding the amendment, making the jockeys not only supporters but strong advocates of the rule change. There were issues getting the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association on board, but after discussions the rule change applied to all California horseracing, other than standardbred. Commissioner Beneto asked why the rule did not apply to standardbred. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek stated standardbred horseracing had its own rule relating to the use of the buggy whip which was already consistently enforced. Commissioner Beneto asked why the whip was not just eliminated entirely. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek said the riding crop was used to control the horses and was sometimes needed for safety reasons. Mr. Haire said the riders at Del Mar adapted quickly to the new guidelines for riding crop use. He said it was important for the perception of the public that the jockeys not continually use the riding crop, even if it did not hurt the horse. Chairman Winner stated this rule change was not done overnight, it involved input from many jockeys with many years of experience, and all agreed that the riding crop was needed for controlling the horse. Commissioner Beneto said he disagreed. Using both hands on the reins with a snaffle bit was the best way to control a horse. He said riders on jumping horses did not require a whip, and those riders required more control than riders on racehorses. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek stated Iceland was the only jurisdiction that did not allow the use of the riding crop; to eliminate it in California would require testing it out to see what happened. Commissioner Beneto said more often than it helped, the use of a whip made the horse drift to the side; it could be seen in head shots coming down the stretch. He said the riders that rode

without a whip were always straight as an arrow. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek said a snaffle bit was not enough to control a racehorse at 40 miles-per-hour. Chairman Winner asked what about when the horse bolted. Commissioner Beneto said nothing could be done when the horse bolted. Mr. Haire said the riding crop could be used when a horse bolted. Commissioner Krikorian said the amendment was a great step forward in reducing unnecessary injuries to a horse. He said he would like to see races without the use of any whip on an experimental basis. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek **motioned** to adopt the amendment to Rule 1688, as noticed. Commissioner Krikorian **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD ON CHRB RULE, 1699, RIDING RULES.

Executive Director Baedeker stated Board Rule 1699, Riding Rules, had been discussed at the Stewards Meeting. Potential edits were presented to get feedback from the stewards. It seemed that all stewards were open to trying to improve the rule. He said the extremes of either not changing the rule at all or by stating that any interference meant disqualification were both discussed with the goal of finding a middle ground. Chairman Winner said in taking a look at other jurisdictions, it was seen that over time they had changed their rules in ways that made them more similar to CHRB Rule 1699; no jurisdiction had an existing rule where any interference meant disqualification. He said it was no secret that the Breeders' Cup Classic was the reason Rule 1699 was being reviewed, and he wanted it on record that the Board was not questioning the steward's decision; if there was a problem, it was with the rule. Commissioner Krikorian stated the rule was broken; this was a controversy that came up too many times. He said the problem was when there was potential interference the rule asked the stewards to hypothesize what the outcome would have been without the interference. This was too difficult a

challenge to do the right thing. Commissioner Krikorian suggested one way to change the rule would be to clarify what interference was based on the effect on the horses interfered with, such as a certain distance in loss of stride. He said there should be a nationwide standard; the differences between the rules from different jurisdictions were a cause for concern. Chairman Winner agreed there should be consistency between jurisdictions, and if the definition of interference could be made clearer, it should be. Commissioner Auerbach stated she believed less was more. She said she understood that Rule 1699 was interpreted inconsistently, especially between Northern and Southern California; if that was indeed the case, it was a problem. Commissioner Auerbach stated the Association of Racing Commissioners International (ARCI) Model Rule ARCI-010-035 (E)(3)(b), Running of the Race, succinctly stated: "The offending horse may be disqualified, if in the opinion of the stewards, the foul altered the finish of the race, regardless of whether the foul was accidental, willful or the result of careless riding." She said the ARCI rule required the Stewards discretion; however, if interference was defined with details, such as by the strides lost to the horse interfered with, it involved a greater amount of discretion. Commissioner Auerbach stated the language should say if a horse interferes with another horse or a rider interferes with another rider, the entry was subject to disqualification. She said some of the suggestions for the rule were so finite they lost touch with the purpose of a fair and safe race. Commissioner Krikorian stated there was a problem when it was common to see two different races with the same type of interference where one horse was disqualified while the other was not. He said before the amendment was finalized the Board should reach out to other jurisdictions to see if a standard could be developed. Chairman Winner stated a priority of the Stewards Committee was to find ways to be more consistent. The problem with subjective rules was there would always be disagreement. He said if there was a way to make Rule 1699

clearer it would be beneficial to the stewards and the industry. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg said with all of the calls to the Board over the Breeders' Cup, he was surprised there was only one person asking to speak on the agenda item; when the issue went to Committee he urged all concerned parties to show up or send in their comments. He said no matter if the rule was made completely subjective, such as the ARCI rule, or more of a one-foul-and-you're-out rule, people would still criticize the outcome. Commissioner Choper said determining the level of discretion for a judge was an age old question; even a rule disqualifying for any interference asked the judge to determine what interference was. He said the goal should be to limit the discretion of the stewards as much as possible, without it being too rigid. He suggested a possible solution was to have a separate review body that reviewed close calls, like in professional football or baseball. Chairman Winner stated horseracing was the first sport to use video tape review; the stewards were the reviewing body. Commissioner Choper said even with video review the call depends on the angle of the video camera. Commissioner Beneto said the Breeders' Cup decision was correct; contact out of the gate was not interference. He said jockeys and horses wanted to get to the inside rail as fast as they could. Chairman Winner stated the Board was not discussing whether the Breeders' Cup decision was the right call. Commissioner Krikorian said it was an option to change the rule so that it allowed contact in the area outside of the gate, but the definition of interference would still have to be determined. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated a rule based on where the contact took place was very impractical. Rick Gold, a horse owner, stated one of his horses had been injured by interference at the beginning of a race. The horse that interfered was disqualified and the jockey sanctioned. He said this was a small consolation at the time; however, he felt that his horse's interests were being taken to heart. Mr. Gold encouraged the Board to find a better compromise between a foul-is-a-foul and anything

goes. He said the ARCI model rule may not have been perfect, but it was significantly better than Rule 1699. John Bucalo said the stewards had a difficult job, and they did it well. He said the steward's decision was the right one, whether or not it was controversial. Someone who bets on horses would always want the decision to go their way. Chairman Winner stated the issue on amending Rule 1699 would go to the Legislative, Legal, and Regulations Committee.

REPORT FROM THE STEWARDS COMMITTEE.

Executive Director Baedeker stated the Stewards Committee had discussed the issue of program training, where an owner trained a horse off-grounds and then delivered it to a trainer right before the horse was entered to race. He said that when this was done and there was a medication violation, the trainer was held culpable; the owner, who should be held culpable, was not. Executive Director Baedeker said a solution discussed was to make the owner of a horse shipped-in from an unlicensed facility a co-absolute insurer, along with the trainer, unless the horse had been in the care of a licensed trainer at a licensed facility for a certain number of days. He said it was also suggested to make it mandatory for all ship-ins to undergo out-of-competition testing, with increased medication violation penalties. Chairman Winner stated the trainer got paid just to race the horse, in some cases the trainer had never seen the horse. He said this needed to be discouraged. Executive Director Baedeker stated the Committee also discussed trainers galloping horses without an exercise rider's license. He said this discussion raised the broader question of whether it was being ensured that all employees were licensed appropriately. A sub-committee, headed by Kim Sawyer, would determine what was done in other states, evaluate California protocols, and come back with recommendations. Executive Director Baedeker stated Dr. Rick Arthur, Equine Medical Director, led a discussion on Rule 1843.3. Dr.

Arthur concluded that adopting the uniform guidelines for multiple penalties would solve the issues discussed. Executive Director Baedeker said the end of the Breeders' Cup was discussed and how the stewards could better communicate to the public and the media, when a significant decision on an important race was made. Chairman Winner stated the issue with program trainers should go before the full Board. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked how many days would a horse need to be with a licensed trainer to remove the owner's culpability. Chairman Winner stated suggestions were between a week and two weeks. He said Dr. Arthur would need to be a part of the discussion.

ISSUE

Hollywood Park Horse Racing Association (HPHRA) is requesting approval to distribute race day charity proceeds generated at its 2013 meet from December 26, 2012 through December 24, 2013. From the net race day charity proceeds, HPHRA is proposing a total distribution of \$82,356. The organizations selected and amount to be distributed is listed on the attachment. Staff notes that 100 percent of the proceeds will be given to seven horse racing related organizations

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19550 states the Board shall require each licensed racing association that conducts 14 or less weeks of racing to designate three racing days, and each licensed racing association that conducts more than 14 weeks of racing to designate five racing days during any one meeting, to be conducted as charity days by the licensee for the purpose of distribution of the net proceeds there from to beneficiaries through the distribution agent. No racing association shall be required to pay to a distributing agent for the purpose of distribution to beneficiaries more than an amount equal to two-tenths of one percent of the association's total on-track handle on live races conducted by the association at the meeting. Business and Professions Code section 19555 requires that proceeds are to be distributed to beneficiaries within 12 calendar months after the last day of the meet during which charity days were conducted. Business and Professions Code section 19556 provides that the distributing agent shall make the distribution to beneficiaries qualified under this article. At least 20 percent of the distribution shall be made to charities associated with the horse racing industry. An additional five percent shall be paid to a welfare fund and another five percent shall be paid to a nonprofit corporation, the primary purpose of which is to assist horsemen and backstretch personnel who are being affected adversely as a result of alcohol or substance abuse. In addition to the above distributions, a separate 20 percent shall be made to a nonprofit corporation or trust, the directors or trustees of which shall serve without compensation except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses, and which has as its sole purpose the accumulation of endowment funds, the income on which shall be distributed to qualified disabled jockeys.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action. Staff recommends the Board approve the charity race day distribution as presented.

Los Alamitos Quarter Horse Racing Association (LAQHRA) filed its application to conduct a quarter horse racing meeting at Los Alamitos.

At its October 23, 2014 Regular Meeting, the Board deferred the LAQHRA race meet application until November 19, 2014. At its November 19, 2014 Regular Meeting, the Board deferred the LAQHRA race meet application until December 18, 2014.

- December 26, 2014 through December 20, 2015, or 153 days, three days less than 2014 allocated race dates. The association proposes to race a total of 1,400 races. Pursuant to Business and Profession Code section 19604, specific provisions must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.

Summary of B&P code 19604

To accept wagers on races conducted in California from a resident of California.

- The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.
- The agreement shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made.

To accept wagers on races conducted outside of California from a resident of California.

- The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- There is a hub agreement between the ADW provider and one or both of (i) one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing on the breed on which wagering is conducted during the calendar year during which the wager is placed, and (ii) the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which wagering is conducted.

- A copy of the license agreement between ODS Technologies, L.P. dba TVG Network and Los Alamitos Quarter Horse Racing Association has been provided to CHR.B.
- Simulcasting conducted with out-of-state racing jurisdictions pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19602; and with authorized locations throughout California.
- Request that Juan Garcia is appointed horse identifier pursuant to CHR.B Rule 1525, Racing Officials Appointed by the Board.
- Track safety inspection has been requested and will be completed before the race meeting begins.
- Inspection of backstretch worker housing has been requested and will be completed before the race meeting begins.
- LAQHRA has reported it will have two emergency medical technicians (EMT's) in the on-track ambulance during racing hours.



CHRB Item 15.1 – Explanation of lack of paramedic staff

Unlike Los Angeles County, which allows for the licensing of private paramedic services, all paramedic services in Orange County fall under the jurisdiction of the Orange County Health Care Agency, Department of Emergency Medical Services and that agency does not license private paramedic services within the county.

All paramedic services within Orange County are provided by the Orange County Fire Authority and there is no provision within current guidelines that allow for OCFA units to be staged for activities of private events such as horse racing.

Because of this guideline, all racing events at Los Alamitos are covered by two fully equipped ambulances staffed by state certified EMT's. These EMT's and our ambulance service also fall under the jurisdiction of the Orange County Emergency Medical Services and our operations at the track are reviewed on an annual basis. I have included our last review with the suggestions of OCEMS which have been implemented by our track.

It is important to note that while our track is not covered by paramedics, the protocol for having paramedics on the scene in case of an accident has been reviewed and approved by the OCEMS.

The nearest paramedic staffed fire station to Los Alamitos Race Course is literally across the street. This proximity is no accident. The OCEMS will tell you that the site was chosen for the specific reason of its proximity to the race track.

In case of an accident that requires paramedic response, our Huntington Ambulance EMT's will stabilize the patient and will meet the OCFA paramedic unit at the pre-designated location directly across the street from the fire station. This location is accessed through a gate on our backstretch that we have shown on the enclosed graphic.

Not only does the OCEMS approve of this system, as you can see from our latest review, they believe having experienced EMT's handle the initial care of the jockey before handing the patient off to paramedics has benefits.



1. Los Alamitos will conduct one state wide mailer featuring a mystery mutuel vouchers. The vouchers are sent to off-track players as well as on-track players. Each voucher is worth at least \$5. Vouchers in denominations of \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100, \$500, and \$1,000 are also mailed. In addition, two \$2,500 vouchers will be mailed. In recent years, a \$10,000 mystery voucher was cashed at the Pleasanton simulcast location. The tentative date for this promotion is California Breeders Champions Night.
2. Premium item giveaway nights will be held in February, April, July, September, November and December. Planned giveaways include beanies and sweatshirts in the winter, hat in July, cowboy hat in July, t-shirt or ear-buds in September, blanket in November and wall calendar or player's carryall in December of 2015.
3. Family days at Los Alamitos will be held in the summer with the running of the popular 18th annual Wienerschnitzel Wiener National. One-hundred dachshunds compete for prize money and trophies. The annual event receives great pre and post event publicity on television newscasts like the top rated Channel 5 Morning News. The event annually attracts over 12,000 people, most of which get exposed to the excitement of horseracing for the first time. This event has been adopted by nearly ALL of the fairs conducting live racing as well as Del Mar and Golden Gate Fields.
4. The Los Alamitos annual Halloween Carnival will be conducted in late fall. This event benefits a local charity, as well as the Los Alamitos Race Track Chaplaincy. A costume contest for kids and adults as well as a ton of carnival games are held in a safe, fun, and family oriented environment. This event provided first-time exposure of horseracing to hundreds of local families each year. Cash prizes are awarded.
5. Los Alamitos will continue its partnership with the Orange County Register's Register Connect subscribers. In 2014, Los Alamitos hosted four events with each event attracting over 1,000 people.
6. Los Alamitos will partner with Living Social, Travelzoo and Amazon to offer Night at the Races packages for its 2015 live racing program. Los Alamitos offers these packages six times per year through these partners. The packages provide a variety of packages with the most popular offering a \$64 value for \$25. The package includes passes for two people to the track's Vessels Club, preferred parking, \$10 food voucher, souvenir Los Alamitos logo glasses, a trip to the winner's circle and an 8X10 photo of that group's winner's circle visit. Los Alamitos sold over 2,000 of these packages in 2014 with nearly all purchases made by first-time visitors to the track. Guests receive VIP treatment, a

brochure designed for first-time guests and track personnel have been trained to answer frequently asked question.

7. Los Alamitos will once again conduct the strongest marketing program of any southern California track specifically aimed for the in-state simulcast facilities. In 2014, Los Alamitos conducted over 30 handicapping contest at satellite facilities for cash prizes in excess of \$17,000. Most handicapping contests are held in conjunction with a premium item giveaway like logo hats, t-shirts, umbrellas, sweatshirt, etc. Racing personality Les Onaka is on hand at each of the contests promoting the nighttime Quarter Horse signal via handicapping seminars and question and answer sessions. Photos of winners are posted on the track's social media pages. Visits were made to the new satellite locations of Firehouse Grill in Bakersfield and Sammy's Original in Lake Forest.

In 2014, Los Alamitos also visited Commerce Casino, Santa Anita, Surfside, Monterrey, Victorville, Lancaster, San Bernardino, Ventura, Barona, Viejas and Santa Clarita. Fan data is gathered at each location. Los Alamitos added over 1,500 new patrons to its mailing list via this program. This program will continue the same level in 2015.

FAN AMMENITIES

1. Los Alamitos night meet is also the only meet that continues to offer race results on the telephone. The line includes Ed Burgart's full race call. The number to call is 714-995-2222.
2. Los Alamitos employs one part-time employee to assist patrons with their Racing Rewards card, which serves as the track's loyalty program. This program rewards its members with cash vouchers for playing the nighttime Los Alamitos racing program with a 1 percent return on their money wagered. In 2014, more than \$15,000 will be awarded to frequent players.
3. Los Alamitos' senior citizen admission prices are \$2 every single day. More than 80% of the Los Alamitos parking lot is now available at no charge as part of its free general parking area.
4. On major race nights, The Vessels Club serves as the set for TVG's "The Quarters" show. The live show adds to the Vessels Club experience, as Vessels Club guests are now part of "The Quarters" and the setting provides added exposure to The Vessels Club.
5. Los Alamitos has made available online video of morning workouts of 2-year-olds. Horseplayers find this a useful tool, as they're able to dissect workouts of horses that have yet to make an official start. In addition to the video footage, the site provides breeding information on each horse.

ONLINE

1. Los Alamitos provides Ed Burgart's tip sheet free on its website at www.losalamitos.com. The page also features a video blog of Burgart's Horses to Watch for the Night. The track's website also features a 22-minute preview show of Friday's races. Burgart serves as the host with analysis provided by Les Onaka.
2. Los Alamitos offers a free nighttime pocket program, which can be downloaded at www.losalamitos.com.
3. The Los Alamitos Facebook pages currently have a combined 30,000 Likes/Friends. The page is updated with handicapping information, race videos, trainer interviews, stakes photos results, etc. Los Alamitos maintains a Twitter Feed @losalracing and a Youtube Channel @losalqh.

ADVERTISING & TV

1. Los Alamitos markets the night program on TVG with a 36-week advertising campaign throughout the year. Los Alamitos works closely with TVG to promote and encourage viewers to visit the track for live racing. Vessels Club and general concession menu items are often promoted on TVG to show fans what's available at the racetrack.

On major race nights, The Vessels Club serves as the set for TVG's "The Quarters" show. The live show adds to the Vessels Club experience, as Vessels Club guests are now part of "The Quarters" and the setting provides added exposure to The Vessels Club.

2. Los Alamitos buys airtime on Time Warner Cable with :30 spots airing on Angels games on PrimeTicket, Dodgers games on Time Warner with additional spots also airing on the Golf Channel, TBS, Bravo, and Fox Sports' Trackside Live.
3. Los Alamitos markets its night program via the Mike Willman weekly radio shows. In 2014, Los Alamitos also purchased targeted sponsorships in all other major southern California radio shows.
4. Los Alamitos spent over \$75,000 in 2014 in newspaper advertising. This expenditure included sponsoring Terry Turrell's nightly handicapping tip sheet in the Long Beach Press Telegram. Los Alamitos was also successful in bringing back horse racing results and entries to the Orange County Register, not only of the nighttime Quarter Horse races, but also for all of the daytime Thoroughbred tracks.
5. The Replay Show is available on TVG mornings on a Friday through Monday basis.
6. Los Alamitos produces a weekly 22 minute preview show of its weekend races that is available on Friday mornings on TVG and all day on Friday at www.losalamitos.com. The show is hosted by Ed Burgart and it features Les Onaka plus a bevy of top

handicappers. Interviews, human interest pieces with local horsemen and stakes previews are also part of the show.

HORSEMEN

1. Los Alamitos will continue its DVD Scrapbook program designed to reward racehorse owners at Los Alamitos. Every time a horse wins a race at Los Alamitos, the owner will receive one DVD - completely free - featuring the horse's winning performance. The DVD includes the post parade, warm-ups, race analysis, actual race, and winner's circle.

2. In celebration of Grade 1 stakes races and its participants, Los Alamitos provides a personalized gift to the connections of each horses. Gifts will include wine glasses, horse bridles, wine bottles, full-color participation posters, etc.

Renovations that are done during the morning training hours will consist of watering the surface if needed. Two tractors will then make a total of two passes each approximately 80ft. in width. The racetrack closes at 10:00am. Once the horses have exited the track the harrowing process will begin. This will consist of harrowing the entire racetrack from rail to rail. At this point all blade work will need to be completed for the day. A concrete curb under the inside rail is used as a grade marker. This is used as a guideline to maintain a uniform and consistent racing surface. The racetrack is now watered if needed and harrowed. In the afternoon water is applied for the evening's races followed by cutting the surface using a California cutting harrow. Additional water will be added if needed and the track will be harrowed once again. The watering and harrowing will continue thru the first few races depending on the first race post time. Under normal conditions once the sunsets there will be no need to continue to water. After the final race the entire surface is harrowed and is now ready for the following morning workouts. The harrows are set daily on level concrete pad, which allows us to maintain an even and consistent racing surface. The racetrack is ripped and rototilled once a week to a depth of six inches then laid back down with roller harrows and watered as needed.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) provides that notwithstanding any provision of this section to the contrary, the distribution of market access fees pursuant to this subparagraph may be altered upon the approval of the Board, in accordance with an agreement signed by all parties whose distributions would be affected.

In December 2013 the Board approved a request from Northern California Off Track Wagering, Inc. (NCOTWINC) for an agreement between Pacific Racing Association (PRA) and Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) for the period January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014. The agreement provided for a distribution of market access fees from advance deposit wagering (ADW) at a rate of 2.9 percent as permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) for wagering conducted by thoroughbred associations in the Northern Zone. NCOTWINC did not seek an increase pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19605.7(a)(2)(A) for brick and mortar simulcast wagering in the northern zone. The previous (brick and mortar) increase of 2.9 percent expired on June 30, 2013 and reverted back to a rate of 2.5 percent. NCOTWINC stated that if the funding provided was in excess of the actual pari-mutuel/simulcast costs, the excess would be split between track and purse commissions.

ANALYSIS

NCOTWINC is seeking an approval of an agreement between PRA and TOC for the period January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015. The new agreement provides for a distribution of market access fees from ADW at a rate of 2.9 percent as permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E) for wagering conducted by thoroughbred associations in the Northern Zone. NCOTWINC is not requesting an increase pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19605.7(a)(2)(A) for brick and mortar simulcast wagering in the northern zone, the percentage distributed to NCOTWINC shall remain at 2.5 percent. NCOTWINC has stated that if the funding provided is in excess of the actual pari-mutuel/simulcast costs, the excess would be split between track and purse commissions.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action. Staff recommends the Board hear from a NCOTWINC representative.

Submitted to the CHRB for the December 18th, 2014 meeting agenda:

Pacific Racing Association (PRA) and the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), parties to an existing agreement (which expires December 31, 2014) approved by the CHRB in December 2013, are seeking approval of a similar agreement for the period January 1 through December 31, 2015. Additional funding to Northern California Off Track Wagering, Inc. (NCOTWINC) is necessary to cover the pari-mutuel and simulcast costs incurred in the operation of brick and mortar simulcast wagering in California. Such expenses include the cost of labor for pari-mutuel clerks and charges for totalizator, data lines, signal dissemination and similar costs.

The new agreement between PRA and TOC provides for a distribution to NCOTWINC of 2.9% of ADW wagers generated in the northern zone. The modification of the distribution of market access fees from ADW is permitted under Business and Professions Code section 19604(f)(5)(E).

We are not, in the current agreement, requesting an increase Pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19605.7(a)(2)(A) for brick and mortar simulcast wagering in the northern zone.

If the funding provided by the agreement is in excess of the actual pari-mutuel/simulcast costs, the excess will be split between track and purse commissions.

2015 Expense Fund Agreement

This Agreement is entered into as of this 4th day of December, 2014 by and between Pacific Racing Association ("PRA") and the Thoroughbred Owners of California ("TOC"), with reference to that certain 2014 Expense Fund Agreement among the parties hereto and the need for terms of such agreement to be renewed:

IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. The distribution of Market Access fees from ADW placed on all live and imported races hosted by PRA shall be maintained by the creation of an additional deduction for a distribution therefrom based upon 2.9% of handle in the Northern Zone, that would otherwise be payable as thoroughbred purses and commissions, and such deduction from ADW Northern Zone shall be payable to NCOTWINC.
2. The percentage distributable to NCOTWINC pursuant to Section 19605.7(a)(2)(A) shall remain at 2.50%.
3. The parties shall immediately file this Agreement with the CHRB for the purposes of securing its approval of the deduction contemplated from market access fees placed on races hosted by PRA and modification of the percentage distributable under Section 19605.7(a)(2)(A).
4. Subject to the requisite approval of the CHRB, the modification of the percentage in Section 19605.7(a)(2)(A) as set forth in 2 above shall be effective January 1, 2015 as shall the deduction from ADW set forth in 1 above.
5. Notwithstanding the distributions from the ADW Deduction set forth hereinabove, the distribution to the Incentive fund administered by the California Thoroughbred Breeders Association shall be calculated at the rate of 0.463% of ADW handle in California on races hosted by PRA. In addition to the distributions set forth above, there shall be a distribution from the ADW Deduction in order to pay administrative expenses that would otherwise have been distributed to TOC, CTT, and the Backstretch Workers Pension Plan.
6. The Terms of this Agreement shall be effective from January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2015.
7. PRA and TOC agree to redistribute any funds accumulated in excess of the expense back to purses and PRA Commissions, 50% to each. Such redistribution will be made every six months beginning June, 30 2015. Any redistribution will be made by NCOTWINC within 30 days following the schedule set forth above. A full accounting of any redistribution or deficit will be provided to PRA, TOC, and the NCOTWINC Board on the same timetable.
8. PRA and TOC agree to jointly continue to work toward improving the productivity and efficiency of the off-track satellites and NCOTWINC.







BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this State where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the CHRB. Business and Professions Code section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Business and Professions Code section 19562 states the Board may prescribe rules, regulations and conditions consistent with the provisions of this chapter, under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in this state. Business and Professions Code section 19580 states the Board shall adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines, and penalties relating to equine medication in order to preserve and enhance the integrity of horse racing in the state. Business and Professions Code section 19581 provides that no substance of any kind shall be administered by any means to a horse after it has been entered to race in a horse race, unless the Board has, by regulation, specifically authorized the use of the substance and the quantity and composition thereof. Board Rule 1844.1, Suspension of Authorized Medication provides that the Board may temporarily suspend the authorized administration of a permitted drug, substance or medication after a public hearing has been noticed in accordance with Government Code section 11125(a). The temporary suspension may be for a race, breed, or race meeting, provided all horses in the same race compete under the same conditions. The Board shall notify in writing the racing association and the trainer's organization of any temporary suspension, as specified.

Board regulations prohibit the administration of any drug, substance or medication after entry time with a few specific exceptions. The exceptions were established after due consideration by the Board based on information available at the time the regulations were adopted. Scientific information and practical experience in managing the threshold levels for the exceptions change over time as unintended consequences become apparent. Clenbuterol in quarter horse racing is an example. Clenbuterol is a beta-2 agonist approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in equines as a bronchodilator.

The Board established threshold levels consistent with therapeutic use to treat small airway disease. Clenbuterol, like all beta-2 agonists, has an adrenergic effect on muscle somewhat similar to anabolic steroids. Only the Ventipulmin brand of Clenbuterol is approved by the FDA. Non-FDA approved Clenbuterol at extremely high concentrations is being used in quarter horse racing for the adrenergic effect. The CHRB has confiscated and otherwise obtained samples of this illicit formulation. Clenbuterol violations have occurred at levels unattainable with the FDA approved formulation at FDA approved dosages.

At its February 17, 2011 Regular Meeting, the Board heard from the Equine Medical Director that non-FDA approved Clenbuterol was becoming a problem in quarter horse racing, and that the American Quarter Horse Association, the Los Alamitos Racing Association and the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association were considering asking racing jurisdictions to prohibit Clenbuterol in quarter horse racing. At that time the Board initiated the process to adopt Rule 1844.1, which would allow it to temporarily suspend an authorized medication for horses entered to race. The rule was approved by the Office of Administrative Law and became effective July 21, 2011.

At its August 2011 Regular Board Meeting, the Board approved the Los Alamitos Race Course and the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association's request to enact Rule 1844.1 to suspend the authorized administration of Clenbuterol to quarter horses entered to race at the Los Alamitos Race Course for a period of 12 months effective October 14, 2011. The Equine Medical Director reported that since February 2011 there had been eight confirmed Clenbuterol violations, with one pending. The delay in the effective date of the suspension would allow time for any Clenbuterol that may have already been administered to a horse to "wash out" of its system. The Board agreed and suspended the use of clenbuterol in quarter horses entered to race at Los Alamitos Race Course for one year, effective October 14, 2011 through October 14, 2012.

At its April 26, 2012 Regular Board Meeting, the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association and the California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) requested that the Board consider enacting Rule 1844.1 to suspend the use of clenbuterol in quarter horses at all CARF tracks for 12 months effective June 21, 2012. The CARF tracks affected were: Pleasanton, Cal Expo State Fair, Santa Rosa, Ferndale, Stockton and Fresno. The CARF tracks run mixed breed meetings with quarter horses from Los Alamitos Race Course and from out-of-state. The Board approved the request to suspend the use of clenbuterol at CARF tracks. The suspension covered the 2012 fair circuit; the suspension expired June 21, 2013.

ANALYSIS

The Los Alamitos Race Course in conjunction with the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association requested that the CHRB Rule 1844.1 to suspend the use of Clenbuterol in quarter horses racing at the Los Alamitos Race Course for a period of 12 months effective January 1, 2015.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action.

BACKGROUND

CHRB Rule 1865, Altering Sex of Horse, states in part: (d) A trainer who enters a horse, or who causes a horse to be entered on his behalf, is responsible for ensuring that the true sex of the entered horse is listed on its certificate of registration on file in the racing office. (1) If the true sex of a horse is not correctly identified in the official program for the race in which the horse is entered, the trainer of the horse shall be subject to a minimum fine of \$1,000."

Violations of Rule 1865 have been greatly reduced since the problem was discussed by the Board in 2008. In 2007, the stewards issued 44 rulings against trainers who had not reported the gelding of horses by entry time for their first race after the operation. From April 2010 through November 2011, there were 18 such rulings. In the first few months of 2012 there were two violations. Over the last 12 months there have been eight violations.

In some cases, information about a gelded horse is not made public until the horse reaches the receiving barn about 45 minutes before the horse is scheduled to race. By the time the horse identifier at the receiving barn notifies the stewards of the sex change, it is too late to include that horse in multi-race wagers (e.g. Pick Six) that began with races already run.

When the Board considered this problem in 2008, one option was to increase the penalty to a minimum fine of \$1,000 for a trainer if the true sex of the horse was not listed in the official program. A second option considered was to scratch the horse. After a discussion of both proposed options, the Board opted to amend CHRB Rule 1865, to increase the minimum fine to \$1,000.

In December 2011, the matter was again discussed by the Board. The possibility of amending Rule 1865 to increase the fine to more than \$1,000 and/or scratching the horse was explored. Having the horse run for purse money only by amending Rule 1974, Wagering Interest, also was suggested. The California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) stated it would research each 2011 violation of Rule 1865 to determine what went wrong with the reporting process. The CTT committed to working with horsemen to reduce the number of violations.

The Board referred the matter to the Medication and Track Safety Committee, which convened the following month and allowed for a thorough discussion of the issue. The Committee determined it would make no changes to the current regulation. Instead, the Committee agreed to allow the CTT to continue to work with horsemen and the industry to further reduce the number of violations.

The Medication and Track Safety Committee reviewed the matter again in April 2012. In a report to the full Board, Committee Member Chuck Winner stated the CTT "assured us that owners, trainers and vets, along with racing office personnel, are taking the matter quite seriously and giving it appropriate attention. Based on those assurances, our decision was to allow the stakeholders to continue to work together to resolve the issue."

Recommendation

The matter is before the Board for further review and discussion.

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD REGARDING
THE CHRB STATUS REPORT CONCERNING THE
RODENTICIDE INVESTIGATION

BACKGROUND

Over the period from December, 21 2012 through September 18, 2014 (21 months) six (6) fatal cases of horses dying from massive internal bleeding occurred at four different California racetracks. Four of the horses were thoroughbreds in training and two of the horses were ponies. All six horses died during or after exercise. During necropsy in each case, there was a large, unexplained amount of blood found in the abdominal cavity. The livers from these six animals were subjected to an anticoagulant rodenticide (AR) screening test. All six horses showed trace amounts of AR in the liver tissue. In five of the six cases, the identified AR was Bromadiolone or Brodifacoum; very toxic second-generation anticoagulants. Other causes of massive internal bleeding in horses were ruled out in five of the six cases.

Additionally, 27 horses that had been euthanized due to catastrophic leg injuries (control cases) during this period were also subjected to an AR screen. No traces of AR were found in any of the control horses (0/27). Based on the necropsy results, it was concluded that there may be a clinically significant association between exercise-related internal bleeding in body cavities and the detection of trace amounts of AR in horses.

In October of 2014, an investigation into the potential source(s) of AR was initiated by California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) staff. Initial investigatory meetings and inspections were conducted at Golden Gate Fields, Santa Anita, Los Alamitos, Cal Expo and Del Mar. Three of the racetracks have vendors that are responsible for the pest control program. In spite of these professional control efforts, significant rodent activity persists. The vendors all acknowledged that their bait stations are periodically looted and stolen and that barn personnel sometimes distribute AR products on their own. This suggested problem was confirmed during the barn inspections.

The investigation, to date, points to uncontrolled, unauthorized distribution of second-generation ARs as the source for liver trace amounts in the six cases. Unauthorized distribution most likely occurs because barn personnel do not think that current pest control efforts are effective. No organized activity has been conducted by associations or the CHRB to control this AR 'free-lancing'. It is unrealistic to assume that banning AR use would be practical because the rodent problem would worsen considerably, according to the three professionals that were interviewed.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board hear from staff who is prepared to make a presentation; illustrating its findings and recommendations.

Case Summaries/Observations

- 6 fatal cases of internal bleeding occurred over the period from 12/21/12 to 9/18/2014
- 4 were thoroughbred race horses and two were ponies
- All 6 horses died during or after exercise
- In each case there was a large, unexplained amount of blood in the abdominal cavity
- All six horses showed trace amounts of anticoagulant rodenticide (AR) in their liver tissue post-death

Necropsy Results

- In 5/6 cases the identified AR was Bromadiolone or Bodifacoum; very toxic second-generation anticoagulants
- Other causes of bleeding ruled out in 5/6 cases
- No trace of AR was detected in 27 other horses that died from musculoskeletal injury and were examined post-death
- There may be a significant link between exercise-related, fatal internal bleeding and trace amounts of AR in horses.

Backside Inspections

- Inspections conducted at 5 racetracks
- Three tracks use outside pest-control vendors
- All 3 vendors use bromadiolone or brodifacoum baits
- Rodenticide bait theft is common
- Unauthorized distribution by stable employees is an issue
- Despite legal controls, high-potency products are available

Conclusions

- Most probable AR source is unauthorized use, i.e. 'free-lancing'
- No indication of imported feed or other material contamination
- No evidence that ARs are used for performance enhancement
- There is ample opportunity for contamination of feed bins and other food sources

Recommendations

- Implement an anticoagulant information and control program at all California racing enclosures. Provide guidance to each training operation.
- Work with each association to plan and implement a comprehensive barn clean-up and eradication program.
