MINUTES

Chairman Shapiro asked for approval of the minutes of the Special Teleconference Meeting of May 15, 2006, and the Regular Meeting of May 25, 2006. Vice-Chairman Moretti **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Harris **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACE MEETING OF THE SAN MATEO COUNTY FAIR (F) AT BAY MEADOWS FROM AUGUST 9 THROUGH AUGUST 23, 2006, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the San Mateo County Fair (SMCF) proposed to run 12 days, the same number of days as in 2005, for a total of 114 races, one more race than in 2005. The first post time would be 1:15 p.m., with a 12:45 p.m. post time for the Pacific Classic Day. Ms. Wagner stated the application was complete, and staff recommended the Board approve the application as presented. Commissioner Harris said he did not find a stake schedule for thoroughbreds. Bernie Thurman of (SMCF) stated due to the purse budget there had been no thoroughbred stakes for the past five or six years. SMCF only offered breed stakes. Chairman Shapiro asked what differentiated the fair meeting from race days at Bay

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Meadows. He stated he understood there was a fair next door, and the promotional plans included a booth where patrons could be pointed to the track, or get free passes, but he did not see any effort to do anything that was different. Chairman Shapiro said his question was not directed exclusively at SMCF. He stated he would have similar questions for other fairs, but he did not see anything in the SMCF application that indicated the business would grow or that there was a concerted effort to cultivate new fans. Chairman Shapiro commented he did not see the benefit of SMCF - other than providing ten days of racing at an existing racetrack.

Ms. Thurman said SMCF was initiating a "Dollar Day" program that would give patrons a card with their information scanned on it. The card would get the patron clubhouse admission, as well as a prize - such as a cap. In addition, the patron would be given a coupon to enter a contest with a thousand dollar prize, and everyone who put in a coupon would get Turf Club admission for the fall meeting, a table, valet parking and a program. Ms. Thurman stated she believed SMCF was exposing Bay Meadows for the first time to many fair patrons. Chairman Shapiro asked if SMCF had a tram that took fair patrons to the track. Ms. Thurman said that was correct. SMCF also had a horse that children could have their photos taken with; a handicapping area; and a horse buyer's 101 group where persons involved in the industry answered patrons' questions and talked about horse racing. She added the fair shared its database with Bay Meadows, which gave access to potential customers. Chris Carpenter of SMCF said SMCF was including Bay Meadows in all of its advertising, and in 25,000 cards to be handed out at other events and on the grounds of SMCF. He added SMCF and Bay Meadows were tracking data regarding their patrons, which would be shared. Mr. Carpenter stated SMCF was doing a great deal in its marketing efforts to publicize horse racing. He

stated the relationship between the fair and Bay Meadows had been in existence since 1935. Chairman Shapiro said his questions indicated his belief that the fairs needed to become more productive in providing results for racing, and to become more ingrained in helping the industry build the sport. He stated the application did not articulate the extent of SMCF's promotion of horse racing, and he hoped in the future SMCF would provide a better understanding of why the fair exists for the benefit of racing. Vice-Chairman Moretti asked if SMCF would be able to track patrons who went to Bay Meadows. Mr. Carpenter said patrons would be tracked. Up to 250,000 of the cards would be printed, so everyone entering the fair would receive a card. Vice-Chairman Moretti **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a race meeting of SMCF. Commissioner Harris **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACE MEETING OF THE HUMBOLDT COUNTY FAIR (F) AT FERNDALE FROM AUGUST 10 THROUGH AUGUST 20, 2006, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Humboldt County Fair (HCF) proposed to run ten days, the same number of days as in 2005, for a total of 75 races, the same number of races as in 2005. She stated the first post time would be 1:55 p.m. Saturday and Sunday; 2:25 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Thursday; and 2:55 p.m. Friday. Ms. Wagner said the application was complete and staff recommended the Board approve the application as presented. Vice-Chairman Moretti asked what prompted the various post times. Stuart Titus of HCF said the post time were meant to coincide with other associations running at the same time. Chairman Shapiro said the application requested that horses entered on one day be listed on overnight

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sheets for races scheduled to run 72 hours from that day. He asked if horses were running back three days later at the fair. Mr. Titus said he was not aware of horses running back three days later. He admitted he was not aware of the purpose of the request, and stated it had been in the application for several years. Executive Director Ingrid Fermin said she thought the request was because mules ran back quickly. Chairman Shapiro asked if there was a head-on camera for the stewards. Mr. Titus said there was such a camera. Chairman Shapiro asked if there were any promotional plans for the meeting. Mr. Titus stated the entire community of Ferndale welcomed the industry during the meeting. He commented promoting the event with the public included all of HCF's print and electronic advertising. Commissioner Harris **motioned** to approve the application to run a horse racing meeting of HCF. Vice-Chairman Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACE MEETING OF THE SACRAMENTO HARNESS ASSOCIATION (H) AT CAL-EXPO FROM AUGUST 12 THROUGH DECEMBER 16, 2006, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Sacramento Harness Association (SHA) proposed to run 74 nights for a total of 925 races. The first post time would be 5:35 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday and 6:20 p.m. Friday and Saturday through September 30, 2006, then 5:35 p.m. from October 6, 2006, to the end of the race meeting. Ms. Wagner stated the application was complete and staff recommended the Board approve the application as presented. Chairman Shapiro asked if the requested dates were the dates approved by the Board. John Reagan, CHRB staff, said the allocation of dates simply gave the beginning and ending dates and the number of days, but did not incorporate the structure. He stated at Cal-Expo, new meetings

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usually started on Fridays or Saturdays; however, the current request was a continuation of the current meeting, so SHA decided to start on a Wednesday. Chairman Shapiro said as with other racing associations, the dates were allocated, and at times the process could become contentious, so the Board was not just approving a guesstimate of how the meetings lined up. He stated there was no overlap in the case of SHA, so he had no problem with the application. Chairman Shapiro stated he did not know Cal-Expo would not operate a race meeting during the fair. Mr. Reagan said SHA had an agreement with Cal-Expo to continue the harness meeting through the fair, so there would be no traditional fair race meeting. Commissioner Harris asked if there was a reason for the arrangement. Chris Schick of SHA said it would not make sense for another operator to run a new meeting for such a short period of time. Commissioner Bianco asked if the simulcast facility would be Cal Expo or SHA. Mr. Schick stated the simulcasting would not change. Chairman Shapiro commented the sire stake schedule appeared to be significantly increased in terms of purse value. He stated there were a lot of stakes in the schedule, but he understood only about 100 Cal-breds were born each year. Were the same parties winning the purses, or were the races being filled? Mr. Schick said as of March 15, 2006, there were 157 horses nominated for the two-year-old events, which was significantly more than the year before. He stated there was also one round of three-year-olds on the schedule. Mr. Schick added that as of January 1, 2006, all the breakage was being allocated to the sire stakes, so the stakes were funded at a much higher level. He stated the change had energized breeders. Mr. Schick said SHA was also working with Iowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota on a "Diamond Alliance." The alliance would add another round of stakes races in an effort to get more people racing in California. Chairman Shapiro asked if SHA had

resolved the problems with its photo finish operator. Ralph Scurfield of SHA said the problem was with the employee of the photo finish operator. He stated there was a backup employee being trained. Mr. Schick said he spoke with the operator and there was a plan in place to prevent future mishaps. Vice-Chairman Moretti **motioned** to approve the application for license to run a horse racing meeting of SHA. Commissioner Harris **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF CHARITY RACE DAY PROCEEDS OF THE OAK TREE CHARITABLE FOUNDATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$74,500 TO 25 BENEFICIARIES.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said staff found the request by the Oak Tree Charitable Foundation (OTCF) to distribute charity race day proceeds to be in order. He stated staff recommended the Board approve the request. Chairman Shapiro said the record should reflect that Oak Tree Racing Association contributed a lot to horse racing related charities and the entire horse racing industry. Commissioner Harris **motioned** to approve the request by the OTCF to distribute \$74,500 in charity race day proceeds to 25 beneficiaries. Commissioner Bianco **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE TEMPORARY SUSPENSION OF CHRB RULE 1606 – COUPLING OF HORSES, FOR THE LOS ALAMITOS QUARTER HORSE RACE MEET AT THE LOS ALAMITOS RACE COURSE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said at the Special Teleconference Board Meeting of May 15, 2006, the Board voted to temporarily suspend Rule 1606, Coupling of Horses. The experimental waiver was to apply to the two current thoroughbred race meetings: Hollywood

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Park and Bay Meadows. Racing interests could be uncoupled on the condition that there be at least five separate wagering interests prior to the uncoupling. At the May 25, 2006, Regular Board Meeting, Los Alamitos expressed interest in participating in the experimental waiver of Rule 1606. Ms. Wagner said staff recommended the Board approve the request to allow Los Alamitos to participate in the experimental waiver. Chairman Shapiro said he supported the request, but he would like the association to keep statistics regarding the uncoupling of horses. The Board wanted to know how many times it occurred, and what the effect was regarding handle. In addition, the Board would like to see the odds of the two horses that were uncoupled. Commissioner Harris **motioned** to waive Rule 1606 and associated pari-mutuel regulations for Los Alamitos through the end of the Hollywood Park meeting. Chairman Shapiro **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE TEMPORARY SUSPENSION OF CHRB RULE 1663(B) - ENTRY OF CLAIMED HORSE, AS REQUESTED BY THE CALIFORNIA AUTHORITY OF RACING FAIRS.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said Rule 1663, Entry of Claimed Horse, provided that no claimed horse was eligible to race in any other state than California until 60 days after the close of the meeting at which it was claimed, except in a stakes race. For the purposes of Rule 1663, the California Fair Circuit was considered one race meeting. Rule 1663 was amended in August 2005 due to industry concern about the number of claimed horses leaving California. At that time, the industry stated the number of claimed horses leaving California was a factor in short fields. Subsequent to the adoption of the amendment to Rule 1663, the California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) requested that the 60-day jail time provision be suspended

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effective October 16, 2006, the day after the close of the Fresno Fair. Chris Korby of CARF said the fairs had a successful recruitment program in which trainers from other states were recruited to race on the California Fair Circuit. Currently, under Rule 1663, if a horse was claimed at a California fair it would not be eligible to run in another state until mid-December. Mr. Korby said CARF was requesting a limited waiver of Rule 1663, so the prohibition would end the day after the last day of the Fresno fair. Commissioner Harris said he supported what CARF was trying to do, but the rule was in effect in 2005, and he questioned the extent of the problem. Mr. Korby said it was a matter of the racing environment in California. He stated CARF did not want to discourage or impede out-of-state trainers in their decision to race in California. Chairman Shapiro asked how many horses CARF recruited. Mr. Korby said CARF paid the relocation fee for horses that shipped in from over 600 miles away. In 2005 payments were made for 157 horses that started 445 times during the fair circuit. Charlie Dougherty of California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) stated his organization supported the request. He added CTT heard many complaints from out-of-state trainers at major meetings who felt they were being targeted. Chairman Shapiro said the amendment to Rule 1663 was adopted in an attempt to help California horsemen, but he understood if an out-of-state trainer arrived with ten horses, he should be allowed to leave with the same number. Mr. Dougherty said that was the concern expressed by out-of-state trainers. Commissioner Harris said he thought the overall concept of the 60-day rule made sense. California wanted to keep its horses in-state, but its stock of horses had been "raided" by out-of-state trainers who would come in during the last few days of a meeting and claim numerous horses. Mr. Dougherty said that was correct, but the problem was a bit of a double blind as the industry was trying to

get out-of-state trainers to come to California, but when they did, they left empty handed. George Bradvica of Fairplex Park Pomona said his organization supported the request. Vice-Chairman Moretti asked what “temporary” meant in regards to the suspension of Rule 1663. Ms. Wagner said that would be up to the Board. CARF was asking for a suspension of the 60-day rule at the close of the Fresno fair. If the Board wished the suspension to be permanent, an amendment to the rule would be appropriate. A suspension of the regulation would facilitate immediate implementation. Vice-Chairman Moretti said she was open to considering the request, but she would like to see some results. If CARF believed a suspension would attract more horses from out-of-state she would like some data demonstrating it did happen. Mr. Korby said CARF would be happy to see if there was any measurable impact from 2005, and what would happen in 2006. He added CARF only requested a waiver for the year 2006. Commissioner Harris **motioned** to approve the request by CARF to temporarily suspend Rule 1663(b). Commissioner Bianco **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON CLARIFYING THE REQUIREMENT FOR ASSOCIATIONS TO INSTALL PROPER DRAINAGE WHEN INSTALLING A SYNTHETIC TRACK SURFACE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said at the May Regular Board Meeting the Board adopted an amendment to Board Rule 1433, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting. The amendment to Rule 1433 provided that as of January 1, 2008, thoroughbred racing associations that conducted a race meeting of four or more continuous weeks could not receive a license to run at a racetrack that had not installed a synthetic-type racing surface. In addition, the Board previously adopted an amendment to Rule 1472, Rail Construction and

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Track Specifications, to exempt synthetic racetrack surfaces from the cross slope requirements of the rule. At the April 2006 Regular Board Meeting Chairman Shapiro expressed concerns that the drainage system for synthetic tracks had not been addressed. At that time, the industry suggested the issue could be addressed when the Board reviewed an association's plans to install synthetic tracks. However, concerns persisted regarding exactly what would be required for drainage. Ms. Wagner stated the item was placed before the Board for discussion and clarification. Chairman Shapiro said the issue was to make sure that when the Board talked about installing synthetic track surfaces, it included a system, and not just the top layer the horses ran on. He stated he would like the Board to take action to clarify that any approval of a synthetic surface included the drainage components, as well. Jack Liebau of Hollywood Park said he wondered if the Board should be approving synthetic track surfaces. He stated he did not know what the Board considered a proper subsurface, or what experts it had to make that determination. Mr. Liebau said Hollywood Park would install a subsurface for its new synthetic track, and a geotech engineering firm would design the subsurface, and another engineering firm would do the drawings. Any racing association that installed a synthetic racetrack would receive a warranty from the manufacturer regarding the suitability of the synthetic material. And, with respect to any warranty, it would be necessary for the company that provided the synthetic material to approve the subsurface to guarantee its usefulness over a given period of time. Mr. Liebau stated he believed the economics of the situation would take care of the issue. Chairman Shapiro asked if a case could be made that the current racing surface at Hollywood Park was synthetic. Mr. Liebau said he did not know if one could make that argument at Hollywood Park, but some could consider the racing surface at Bay Meadows

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synthetic. Chairman Shapiro said the Board did not want anyone to claim Bay Meadow's track was synthetic because it had sports grids and stabilizers. The intent of the Board was to state that a synthetic racetrack was a system that included a drainage system to accommodate the materials on top, along with other components. The Board was not trying to define the components, other than stating a synthetic surface was a system. Craig Fravel of Del Mar Thoroughbred Club suggested the Board require that tracks include in their application for license a description of the drainage system and file plans for synthetic racing surfaces. Commissioner Harris said the Board's authority was to approve or deny the racing dates. The Board could state it would refuse dates because a track was not state of the art, but it was difficult to say exactly what that was. Chairman Shapiro said the Board only wanted a general statement that was clear regarding the meaning of "synthetic racetrack." Mr. Liebau said he was leery of putting such a requirement in the application. He stated any racetrack that made such an investment would do the right thing without governmental direction. Chairman Shapiro said the issue could be resolved by including a requirement in the application for license. He added the Board did not want to micromanage the industry; rather, the Board wished to clearly define its intent. Ms. Wagner said staff would act on Mr. Fravel's suggestion and amend the application to include a requirement that associations submit a description of the track, with some type of guarantee regarding drainage from the entity that installed the track.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1582, FORM OF ENTRIES AND DECLARATIONS.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said Rule 1582, Form of Entries and Declarations, provided that entries made by telephone were valid if properly confirmed in writing. In May 2006 a directive temporarily waived the requirement for written verification of telephone entries. At that time, staff was directed to contact the various racing associations to determine industry practice and what technology could be used to make entries. Ms. Wagner said racing associations were contacted and the consensus was that telephone entries were being accepted without written verification, and it was a long-standing practice. The majority of racing secretaries also indicated telephone entries were the preferred electronic method of accepting entries. Ms. Wagner stated the proposed amendment to Rule 1582 provided that racing associations could accept entries by telephone, facsimile, or any other electronic method that they deemed appropriate. In addition, racing associations could require written confirmation of such entries as a condition of the race meeting under Rule 1437, Conditions of a Race Meeting. Ms. Wagner said staff recommended the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period. Commissioner Bianco **motioned** to direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed amendment to Rule 1582. Chairman Shapiro **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON FUTURE RACE DATES AND STRATEGIC PLANNING.

Chairman Shapiro said there were two racetracks that could, in the future, possibly close. Therefore, he thought it would be prudent for the industry to look to the future and plan a

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thoroughbred racing schedule that would allow for a cohesive and ongoing program to perpetuate and enhance thoroughbred racing in California. Chairman Shapiro stated he would like to hear from the fairs, as he believed the industry needed to look at the calendar of fairs to see if there were improvements to be made to use race dates for the maximum benefit of the state. Richard Castro of the Pari-mutuel Employees Guild said he was concerned, as the Board seemed to be encouraging ideas of where the fairs could go if, in fact, Bay Meadows closed. Mr. Castro stated he believed the Board should be looking to enhance racing at the major private tracks rather than the fairs. He asked if the fairs were looking at cutting up Bay Meadows racing days; did the Board already have such discussions? Chairman Shapiro said he personally had not had such discussions. He stated he had met with many persons in the industry regarding their vision of the future, but he had not seen, nor had he put forth a calendar. Chairman Shapiro said it appeared to him it would be more productive if some of the fairs consolidated dates and raced at one venue. The result would be longer race meetings at a venue that would generate more business and retain more horses for the industry. He stated Santa Rosa could be used. The track put in a turf course, and Chairman Shapiro said he was not aware of another fair, other than San Mateo's meeting at Bay Meadows, that had a turf course. Chairman Shapiro stated rather than running two weeks at a remote location, perhaps Santa Rosa should host a six-week meeting at which two weeks were for one fair, two weeks were for another fair and etc. That would provide some consistency and momentum, which would generate more income for the fairs and opportunity for the horsemen. Chris Korby of California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) said the fairs had talked about the future of the racing calendar. Most fairs that conducted live racing were in Northern California, so that was

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were the conversations focused. Mr. Korby commented that most of the fairs were long-standing institutions in their communities, and some had conducted racing for 150 years. To ask the fairs to move their racing dates to another venue was a serious matter. He said one issue that needed to be recognized was the rising real estate value of the privately owned racetracks. Mr. Korby stated there would come a time when the owners of the tracks would realize they could make the best use of their assets in a purpose other than horse racing. CARF would suggest that the racing fairs, as publicly owned entities, could be part of the future. Mr. Korby said Del Mar was an example of a public/private partnership that was among the finest facilities in the world. Vice-Chairman Moretti stated she appreciated Mr. Korby's comments, but she believed Chairman Shapiro was looking at an issue that had been discussed in the past: the notion of consolidating the fairs. She said the idea behind consolidating the fairs was to be creative and inventive, and not necessarily to stick with a venue just because it had 150 years of tradition. Vice-Chairman Moretti said horse racing in California was all about tradition, which she thought was part of its problem. The industry was figuratively stuck in the mud. So far, Vice-Chairman Moretti stated, she had heard nothing new from the fairs. Del Mar was an outstanding example, but was it something new? Would one actually think it would be better to have two weeks of a ho-hum fair, or the same meeting happening for 150 year, or would it be better to have a thriving six-week event that brought more revenue and potentially more excitement and jobs to a community? Vice-Chairman Moretti said she wanted to hear the fairs would be open to talking about longer meetings. Mr. Korby stated the fairs had been discussing longer meetings. Chairman Shapiro said the status quo was not working. The Board was rubber-stamping two week meetings that

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were selling hats and running shuttles, but that were in jeopardy of diminishing income. The money fairs generated from racing was not coming back to benefit the industry. The Board's job was to find a way to make horse racing in California work, and it appreciated the history and tradition of the fairs, but that was not going to pay the bills. The industry needed to be forward thinking and figure out what it could do differently. The fairs were a part of the solution, but Chairman Shapiro stated he did not see revenue being generated by the fairs to benefit horse racing. The Board was asking for the industry to think out of the box, as it was not okay to just do the same old thing. Commissioner Harris said he agreed there needed to be fresh ideas regarding the future of horse racing in California; however, he did not think the problem was entirely with the racing fairs. The fairs were not doing anything different from the rest of the industry. Commissioner Harris said he believed the entire industry was stalemated, and the problem was certain tracks could close and there needed to be some plan to accommodate the changed paradigm. Chairman Shapiro said his comments were not directed solely to the fairs. The entire industry needed to put a better product forward; it needed a racing calendar that worked and was attractive to fans; and it needed to recover its business. Mr. Korby said CARF appreciated the Board's interest, and was stimulated to consider alternatives. He commented that he hoped the Board realized the fairs were institutions that were governed by boards, each of which had deep roots in the community. Those boards had to work through the issues as a group and the pace of such discussions might not be the pace the Board wanted to see. California fairs had a commitment to horse racing for the long term and Mr. Korby said he did not know that all of California's racing institutions had such a commitment. Chairman Shapiro stated he understood the fairs were committed. Santa Rosa

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made an investment and put in a turf course, and he was trying to find a way to thank and help the fairs. Cliff Goodrich, representing Fairplex Park Pomona (FPP), stated it could be assumed that Hollywood Park would conduct horse racing at least through all of 2008. However, it made sense for the Board to look at a long-term calendar. Mr. Goodrich said FPP believed two calendars should be promulgated. The first should be for 2007-2008, and would include Hollywood Park. The second calendar was an unknown, but FPP was ready to provide alternatives to the industry and the Board. Mike Cedar of FPP said his organization was a long-term participant in the thoroughbred industry. FPP provided live and satellite racing, the Barrettes equine sale facility, and year-round training. Income generated from thoroughbred racing was reinvested at FPP. The racetrack was expanded from a half-mile to a five-eighths mile facility, the grandstand had been renovated and a significant investment had been made in Barrettes and related barns. Mr. Cedar gave a Power Point presentation in which he explained the structure of FPP's business model, the history of FPP, and the community surrounding FPP. In addition, he spoke about FPP's plans to expand its facilities. He stated FPP spent a year in conversations with the industry to determine what it would like to see in a new facility. Mr. Cedar commented FPP found the social experience was important to its business, so it was trying to create that experience in its new facilities. In addition, it was soliciting groups and group activities to enjoy the races. He stated FPP calculated the cost of its proposed improvements at one hundred million dollars. How would FPP pay for its expansion? Mr. Cedar said if race dates became available, FPP calculated it needed the equivalent of 20 weeks of racing. FPP was also looking at other methods of financing, or if it could create a Joint Powers Authority. Mr. Goodrich said assuming the racing dates became available; an

important action would be to financially strengthen the tracks that were left. That could be accomplished by expanding their calendars, which would have the effect of immediately increasing purses and conditions to the benefit of the entire industry. The second issue the industry should look at would be moving towards not-for-profit companies. Mr. Goodrich stated such companies did not have shareholders and their charters basically returned profit into the industry. If the industry wanted to prosper, it needed to reinvest in itself. Mr. Goodrich commented that Del Mar, Oak Tree and FPP were examples of such entities. He said the third aspect of horse racing's future was the ability to train on turf courses at major league training centers. That would immediately increase the field size in grass races and relieve the pressure off dirt racing, which would increase their field size. In conclusion Mr. Goodrich stated FPP believed less was better. The industry should consider fewer racing days. That, combined with major league facilities would mean more horses available. Purses would increase, horses would sell for more and fan interest would be generated. Commissioner Harris asked if FPP's 20-week number included the three weeks it already ran. Mr. Goodrich said it was 20 weeks in addition to the current allocation. He stated FPP advocated a contraction to the racing calendar, as it would be in the best interests of racing. If that happened, FPP would probably be the entity to lose dates, so if Hollywood Park closed and FPP ended up with 12 weeks, it would have to find a way to recoup eight weeks of revenue to equate the 20 weeks of economic benefit. Chairman Shapiro said he thought FPP should be commended for presenting such an interesting vision. He stated he thought FPP's presentation was in the spirit of what the Board was looking for. Chairman Shapiro stated he agreed the Board should look at multi-year allocation of dates. That would take the guesswork out of

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where California racing was going, and give comfort to the horsemen, as they would know what the future held. It would also make financing improvements easier. Mr. Goodrich said when an entity proposed spending a hundred million dollars on improvements there had to be some longevity or an indication that the facility would have dates for a number of years. Craig Fravel of Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (DMTC) stated there were a number of challenges in the future – particularly in Southern California. He stated DMTC was working with the Del Mar fair board to develop a master plan for the entire racetrack and fairgrounds property, which would include significant improvements to the backstretch and the racing surfaces. He added the plan also included the ultimate replacement of all the old barns, a horseman's center, and improved backstretch dining facilities. In August, the final stages for approvals for the authorization of funding for the installation of a synthetic racing surface at Del Mar would be completed. Mr. Fravel added he believed Hollywood Park's new track would show dividends in the fall. Ralph Scurfield of Sacramento Harness Association stated he had a background in the fairs. He said he was, at one time, involved in an attempt to try to bring the fair meetings together and maximize the better facilities. Mr. Scurfield related what happened when the Board tried to give ten days to Hollywood Park for a grass festival prior to a Breeders' Cup. He stated he had never received so many facsimiles in his life; most of them from Legislators who indicated that if the dates were granted he and the remainder of the Board would soon be gone. Mr. Scurfield said mandating to political bodies such as fair boards could be difficult. He urged the Board to get such entities involved so they could buy into the process and make the changes on their own. Mr. Scurfield added the Board had a lot of energy, but it did not seem to be engaged with the Legislature. What the Board was talking about would be helpful

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to racing, but every month a different state got slot machines, and horses running for \$10,000 in California could be running for \$15,000 to \$25,000 elsewhere. Mr. Scurfield said horse racing had a great story to tell. It had parity to talk about, and 50,000 employees to talk about, and it ought to be educating the Legislature that California horse racing needed its own method of garnering money and putting it back into the industry. Ron Charles of Magna Entertainment Corporation (MEC) said his organization was involved in numerous meetings in an attempt to figure out the future of racing in California. Mr. Charles said he applauded Hollywood Park's decision to install a synthetic racing surface, as that meant Hollywood Park would be racing for a number of years. He stated he believed the current calendar in Northern California had not worked for a number of years and needed to be reexamined. Mr. Charles added MEC was in California to race and would be in California for the long term. MEC hoped to come back to the Board in the near future with several different options regarding the racing calendar for Northern California. Mr. Charles stated the patchwork of dates in the north did not make sense and the industry needed to arrive at a plan. Chairman Shapiro asked how the Board could make that happen. Mr. Charles said that would be difficult because of the uncertainty over Bay Meadows. Even if Bay Meadows were still racing in five or ten years, the current calendar did not work. It did not make sense that the premier racing in Northern California stopped in the middle of June. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said in September 2005 TOC was meeting with its track partners to discuss the same issue. TOC thought it was important as owners because there was a lot of uncertainty regarding the future of horse racing in California. If owners did not understand what their options were and have contingency plans, the industry would be hurting when one or more

facility closed. Mr. Couto said he thought the Board was taking positive steps by focusing on the future. Commissioner Harris asked what time table was envisioned for the 2007 race dates. Chairman Shapiro said for 2007 only one year should be looked at, while continuing the current discussion. He stated maybe the committee could look at three, four or five years, but he would suggest the item be brought back for further discussion.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE REQUEST BY THE CALIFORNIA HARNESS HORSEMEN'S ASSOCIATION THAT THE HORSEMEN'S HEALTH AND WELFARE MONEY FROM THE "OUTS" BE DISTRIBUTED PURSUANT TO STATUTE.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said the issue related to the outs from the last meeting run by Capitol Racing (CR), which was in 2005. Those outs were maintained in the system until May 15, 2006. The outs were dropped from the system and could be distributed. Mr. Reagan stated the California Harness Horsemen's Association (CHHA) asked that the money be held until instructions were given for distribution. He stated the CHHA was concerned that due to the status of CR, the monies could become mired in other problems if it were given directly to that organization. Mr. Reagan said the monies were very important to the backstretch welfare fund, and if they were delayed or otherwise misdirected, it would be a serious blow. He stated staff recommended the Board direct it to work with Southern California Off-track Wagering, Inc. (SCOTWINC) to ensure the monies were distributed directly to the welfare fund. Dave Cheit, representing CR, said his organization had represented in writing that the monies would be distributed to the welfare fund. He stated there was no reason to follow staff's recommendations. Chairman Shapiro asked if CR would be willing to see the monies transferred directly to the welfare fund. Mr. Cheit said he did not see a reason to depart from

the normal statutory process. Chairman Shapiro said the reason was that the horsemen were concerned CR would use the monies to defray other possible obligations or claims. If that was not the intent, and CR wished the monies to go to the welfare fund, the Board would be happy if CR agreed to a direct payment. Mr. Cheit said staff's analysis suggested that CR was required to make partial payments and had not made them – when the monies were held by SCOTWINC. Chairman Shapiro said the Board was not dealing with who held the monies; it was simply trying to get it to the right parties. Mr Cheit stated CR would pay the monies to the welfare fund and had no other plans for the funds. Jerry Mandel of CHHA said CR would be given \$140,000 and would write a \$70,000 check to California and a \$70,000 check to the welfare fund. However, there was another \$250,000 in SCOTWINC's possession and CHHA would not agree to the release of that money. Mr. Cheit said there were two outs categories. The agenda item related to the outs that went to the backstretch workers fund, the agenda item did not ask the Board to give direction regarding the disposition of the other outs category. Mr. Mandel said the Board needed to make a decision. He stated the parties were already fighting over millions of dollars and would not reach an agreement regarding the \$70,000. The issue started with a letter that asked if CR would agree to release the \$70,000 to the health and welfare fund and the answer was "absolutely not." Mr. Mandel stated he did not understand why CR would not agree to have the monies paid directly into the fund. Mr. Cheit said CR would prefer the transfer of funds be handled the way it had always been done, but if the Board insisted the funds were transferred directly, CR would not object. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** to direct SCOTWINC to pay \$70,000 directly to the CHAA Health and

Wealth and Welfare Fund and \$70,000 to the State of California. Vice-Chairman Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

INFORMATIONAL UPDATE BY A REPRESENTATIVE FROM SCIENTIFIC GAMES RACING ON THE STATUS OF THE SCIENTIFIC GAMES RACING QUANTUM DATA CENTER (QDC) AND THE PLANNED MIGRATION OF CALIFORNIA CUSTOMERS TO THE QDC IN SACRAMENTO, CALIFORNIA.

Dan Keller of Scientific Games Racing (SGR) gave a Power Point presentation regarding the SGR quantum data center (QDC). Mr. Keller discussed SGR's financial investment in the QDC as well as its structure and security measures. He stated SGR was going to work with a working group to determine the specific dates for migration. The migration into the QDC was an overnight event, so when the system shut down on a Sunday evening, the work would be finalized by the next morning – in time for any kind of simulcast wagering the next day.

REPORT FROM RACING ASSOCIATION ON THEIR EFFORTS AND PLANS TO INSTALL NEW TOTALIZATOR TECHNOLOGY AT THE RACETRACKS GIVEN THE NUMEROUS PROBLEMS AND DELAYS AND FAILURES.

Chairman Shapiro said the item was deferred.

PRESENTATION BY THE CHRB STAFF OF A NEW MONTHLY STATISTICAL REPORT AND YEAR-TO-DATE HANDLE AND ATTENDANCE INFORMATION.

John Reagan, CHRB staff, said staff prepared a new set of reports. He stated one report provided a 2005 vs. 2006 look at each month. The current report compared May 2006 to May 2005. In addition, there was a secondary report that looked at the cumulative racing to date:

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from December 26, 2005, through May 2006. Next month there would be a report regarding June, and the cumulative report would be brought forward. Chairman Shapiro said he would like to see the reports in the Commissioners' packets every month. He stated he would like to see the reports refined so they could show purse generation, commission generation, and an indication of where racing was trending. Commissioner Harris said he thought it would be useful to have a report e-mailed every week. Chairman Shapiro commented that was an excellent idea. He elaborated on what he would like to see in a weekly report.

DISCUSSION ON PENDING HORSE RACING LEGISLATION.

Chairman Shapiro said the item was deferred.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Rod Blonien, representing Los Alamitos (LA), said LA would like to change the date upon which the experimental waiver of Rule 1606, Coupling of Horses, ended at LA. He stated LA would like to run the experiment until July 31, 2006. Commissioner Harris suggested a more appropriate end date would be the day of the Regular Board Meeting at Del Mar in August 2006. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** to amend the motion regarding item seven on the agenda to allow LA to conduct an experimental waiver of Rule 1606 until August 17, 2006. Vice-Chairman Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

NOTICE TO APPLICANT: All funds generated and retained from on-track pari-mutuel handle which are obligated by law for distribution in the form of purses, breeders' awards or other benefits to horsemen, **shall not** be deemed as income to the fair and **shall**, within 3 calendar days following receipt, be deposited in a segregated and separate liability account in a depository approved by the CHRB and shall be at the disposition of the Paymaster of Purses, who shall pay or distribute such funds to the persons entitled thereto. All funds generated from off-track simulcast wagering, interstate wagering, and out-of-state wagering which are obligated by law for distribution in the form of purses and breeders' awards, shall also be deposited within 3 calendar days following receipt into such liability account. 

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

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this State where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board. B&P Code Section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include administration and enforcement of all laws, rules, and regulations affecting horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19432 provides that the executive director shall keep a full and true record of all proceedings of the Board, and preserve at the Board's general office all books, documents, and papers of the Board. Assembly Bill (AB) 1180, Statutes of 2005, added B&P Code Section 19481.3(e), which provides that the stewards shall investigate and prepare a report with respect to all on-track accidents involving jockeys that occur during the performance of their duties. Rule 1536, Stewards' Minutes, provides that the stewards shall maintain minutes and records of all proceedings before the stewards.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Rule 1536 will bring the Board into compliance with the provisions of B&P Code Section 19481.3(e), which was added by AB 1180. The proposed amendment provides that a report of all on-track accidents involving jockeys shall be forwarded to the Board as an attachment to the stewards' minutes. The accident report shall be made on form Jockey Accident Report CHRB-201 (New 07/06), which is incorporated into the regulation by reference. The Jockey Accident Report requires the names of the jockey; the horse; the owner and the trainer. In addition, the date, time and location of the accident, and a description of the accident are required. The stewards must provide the circumstances of the accident, the likely causes and the extent of injury to the jockey, if any. Besides attaching the Jockey Accident Report to the stewards' minutes, the report is also distributed to the jockey or his representative, the Jockey Guild, the horse owner and the trainer of the horse the jockey was riding at the time of the accident, as required by law.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to carry out fully the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code section 19504 states that the Board shall conduct an investigation, including at least one public hearing, to determine whether the use of safety reins would provide jockeys and exercise riders greater protection from accidents and injuries than conventional reins. While the Board does not mandate the use of safety reins, there is nothing within the Board's regulations that prohibits their use. Currently, no racing jurisdiction mandates the use of safety reins. The Indiana Racing Commission conducted a hearing on June 7, 2006, regarding a proposed rule to mandate safety rein use. Oral and written testimony presented at the June hearing was overwhelmingly in opposition to the mandate, especially from standardbred horsemen. The objections were largely over the increased cost of safety reins and the lack of scientific research. After hearing the testimony, the Indiana Commission voted against the mandate.

ANALYSIS

If the Board determines that the use of safety reins should be mandated the proposed addition of Rule 1689.2, Safety Reins Required provides that no jockey or apprentice jockey shall ride in a race, nor shall any person be mounted in or riding on a sulky, or exercise, gallop, breeze, work out or ride a horse on the grounds of a facility under the jurisdiction of the Board unless the horse is equipped with safety reins. The use of conventional reins would not be allowed. A safety rein is a rein within a rein. Typical reins are made of leather or nylon that attaches to a ring above the bit. When a conventional rein breaks, control of the horse is lost. With safety reins, a wire or nylon cord is stitched into the traditional leather or nylon reins during the manufacturing process, and this safety cord is attached to the bit with a metal clasp. Should the outer leather or nylon rein break during a workout or race, the jockey or driver should be able to maintain control using the safety cord. Mr. Arthur Gray designed safety reins. He and his partners hold patents under the company name Sure Lines Inc, and charge a patent fee of \$3 to \$5 per unit to manufacturers who incorporate the safety rein design into their reins. Research indicates conventional nylon reins retail for \$28 and \$31 while American leather reins retail between \$71 and \$74, and English leather cost \$180 and more. The added cost of incorporating safety rein design is estimated at \$10 to \$15. The principal concern about mandating the use of safety reins is the fact that one company, Sure Lines, holds the patent on

their design. While the Board currently mandates the use of safety vests and safety helmets, the difference is that several different companies manufacture such products.

RECOMMENDATION

Mr. Gray is available for questions regarding this issue.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this State where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). B&P Code Section 19481 states that in performing its responsibilities, the Board shall establish safety standards governing equipment for horse and rider to improve the safety of horses, riders, and workers in the racing inclosure. Board Rule 1689.1, Safety Vest Required, requires jockeys and apprentice jockeys to wear safety vests when riding in a race. Additionally, the rule provides that jockeys, apprentice jockeys and exercise riders must wear a safety vest when they train or exercise any horse on the grounds of a racing association or racing fair. Rule 1689.1 currently specifies that such safety vests shall meet the British Equestrian Trade Association standard for horse riders' body and shoulder protectors.

ANALYSIS

The British Equestrian Trade Association (BETA) has revised its Standards due to the requirements of the European Personnel Protective Equipment Directive. Originally, the BETA Standard was a two-tiered level of shock absorbency on a scale of 10. The most commonly made levels were five and seven. Board Rule 1689.1 provided that jockeys, apprentice jockeys and exercise riders must wear safety vests with a minimum of shock absorbing protection of a five rating as defined by BETA. The revised BETA 2000 Standard for Horse Riders Body and Shoulder Protectors provides three levels of protection. The Level 1 black label is designed for use by licensed jockeys while racing. The proposed amendment to Rule 1689.1 changes the current BETA level 5 standard to the revised BETA level 1 standard. In addition, at the request of the Jockeys Guild, Rule 1689.1 will also provide that a safety vest may meet the American Society for Testing Materials (ASTM) standard F1937-4. The ASTM F1937-4 standard is the equivalent of the BETA 1 standard. By allowing the two standards licensees will have a greater range of choice in the safety vests they wear.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period.

(a) No jockey or apprentice jockey shall ride in a race unless wearing a safety vest, nor shall a jockey, apprentice jockey, or exercise rider, train or exercise any horse on the grounds of a racing association or racing fair unless wearing a safety vest. Such safety vest shall:

(1) Provide a minimum of shock absorbing protection to the upper body, as evidenced by a label indicating that the safety vest meets either of the following standards: ~~of a five rating as defined by the British Equestrian Trade Association (BETA);~~

(a) “Level 1” under the British Equestrian Trade Association (BETA) 2000 Standard for Horse Riders’ Body and Shoulder Protectors, or

(b) American Society for Testing Materials (ASTM) standard F1937-04 (Specification for Body Protectors Used in Horse Sports and Horseback Riding”);

(2) Cover the entire torso from the ~~collar bone~~ collarbone to a line level with the hip bone allowing a vee opening in the front neckline;

(3) Weigh no more than 2 pounds.

(b) The weight of a safety vest shall not be included in the weight of a jockey or apprentice jockey when weighing out or weighing in or when adding weight to make up a weight assignment.

RULE 1969. WAGERING PROHIBITED

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). B&P Code Section 19440 states that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. The responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Board Rule 1969, Wagering Prohibited, provides that certain classes of licensees, as well as Board employees, shall not wager on the result of a race while on duty. At the March 2006 Regular Board Meeting a proposed amendment to Rule 1969 was heard. The proposal was heard again at the April 2006 Regular Board Meeting. At that time questions were raised regarding the need to include certain license classifications in the regulation. Chairman Shapiro requested that the proposed amendment be brought back before the Board with duty statements.

ANALYSIS

Rule 1969 currently prohibits wagering by certain classes of licensees and Board employees while on duty at a race meeting or simulcast wagering facility. The proposed amendment to Rule 1969 adds security staff, valets, and jockey or driver room attendants to the list of licensees precluded from wagering. Security staff has been added, as they are often the persons responsible for monitoring the stalls of horses that are entered to run. Valet and jockey or driver room attendants have been added because of their ability to place wagers on behalf of jockeys or drivers. Pari-mutuel and totalizator employees have been removed from the list of those precluded from wagering while on duty. At the March 2006 Regular Board Meeting the Pari-mutuel Employee's Guild stated its bargaining agreement contained prohibitions and it would be relatively easy to trace any illicit wagering activity by pari-mutuel employees. In addition, the proposed amendment would provide that no person who falls under Rule 1969 may wager at a facility at which they are employed if they are on duty, which is defined as a period of time from 12:01 a.m. the day a person is scheduled to work until the end of his specified work-period, and includes any authorized rest or meal breaks. Because some employees live at the racetrack, or begin their workday in the early morning hours, "on duty" begins at 12:01 a.m. This helps ensure that such persons, some of whom can affect the outcome of a race, are less likely to have a monetary interest in the result of a race during their

regular work hours. Authorized rest or meal breaks are included in the definition of “on duty” to ensure persons who fall under Rule 1969 will not claim they were on a break if found waging during their workday.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period.

1969. Wagering Prohibited.

(a) While on duty, No no racing official or assistant racing official, ~~pari-mutuel employee, totalizator employee,~~ simulcast facility supervisor or assistant simulcast facility supervisor, ~~official camera operator,~~ assistant starter, security staff member, receiving barn staff, or test barn or detention barn staff member, valet, jockey or driver room attendant, or employee of the Board, ~~while on duty at a race meeting or simulcast wagering facility,~~ shall may wager on the result of a race at a race meeting or simulcast wagering facility at which he is employed.

(b) For the purpose of this rule, "on duty" means from 12:01 a.m. the day an individual is scheduled to work until the end of his specified work-period, and includes any authorized rest or meal breaks.

Racing Secretary

The **Racing Secretary** writes condition books for upcoming race meets; creates stakes program; assigns stalls and other allotments to trainers; works with trainers and other horsemen to help facilitate their needs; sets weights for handicapped races; manages all racing employees including disciplinary and safety issues; creates purse structure for race program. **Supervises the accepting of entries, determines which races are going to be carded.**

Assistant Racing Secretary

The **Assistant Racing Secretary** assists the **Racing Secretary** in his or her stated duties. **Also, is active in recruiting horses to participate in the race meeting and generally is in charge of monitoring the nomination of horses eligible for stake races.**

Simulcast Facility Supervisor

The **Facility Supervisor** is responsible for the oversight of the facility to ensure compliance with the facility's policies and objectives, as well as compliance with the California Horse Racing Board's laws, rules and regulations. The duties could include oversight of marketing initiatives, guest relation programs, filing security and CHRBR incident reports, facility budgets, and staff supervision.

Assistant Simulcast Facility Supervisor

The **Assistant Facility Supervisor** assists **Facility Supervisor** in coordinating and implementing the policies, programs and practices of the facility. **Generally, the contact person if the CHRBR has any questions or concerns about unwelcome attendees and or unusual betting patterns.**

Starter

The **Starter** supervises assistant starters; makes sure the gate is in the correct location for upcoming race; starts the race. **The Starter is in control of the field from the time that they leave the paddock until the horses are dispatched from the gate. He/She must follow proper designated procedures if there is a delay in the start of a race, and must make sure that no horses are approached, tampered with or not carrying the weight of their rider during the post parade.**

Assistant Starter

During post time, **assistant starters** load horses into the starting gate. They help trainers during morning hours school their horses at the gate. **Assistant Starters are in the gate with the horses prior to the field being dispatched and must be skilled in handling a fractious horse for the protection of both horse and rider**

Timer

The Timer is classified as a Racing Official whose responsibility it is to post for the public the official time of each race.

Paddock Judge

The Paddock Judge oversees saddling operations, makes sure equipment on horses is correct as indicated on the program; dispatches the field to the post parade. Additionally, the Paddock Judge is responsible for monitoring the behavior of the horses in the paddock and must maintain a list of horses that need to be “schooled” prior to racing. He/she also schedules the appointments for “schoolers.”

Horseshoe Inspector

The Horseshoe Inspector inspects shoes on all horses before each race He/she shall report to the stewards any horse that is improperly shod for the surface on which that horse is scheduled to run. The Horseshoe Inspector may make minor adjustments on the shoes of any horse, when necessary.

Horse Identifier

The Horse Identifier shall inspect, identify and prepare identification records for each horse within the inclosure at race meeting. Prior to a horse’s first race, the identifier must verify that the horse is properly tattooed prior its first race. He/she is also responsible for the accuracy of the Jockey Club Registration Papers for each horse, and must inspect each horse upon its arrival in the Receiving Barn prior to its competition.

Racing Veterinarian

1560. Duties of the Official Veterinarian.

The official veterinarian shall be responsible to the stewards for the conduct of horses and their attendants in the receiving and detention barn. He shall have authority and jurisdiction to supervise the practicing licensed veterinarians and shall enforce the Board's rules and regulations relating to veterinary practices. The official veterinarian shall recommend discipline for the licensed veterinarians who fail to comply with the rules and regulations and accepted veterinary practices. He shall report to the Board the names of all horses humanely destroyed or which otherwise expire at the meeting and the reasons therefore. He shall maintain a list of all infirm horses on the grounds. No official veterinarian, during his term of appointment, shall directly treat or prescribe for any horse registered to race at any recognized meeting except in emergency, the details of which shall be immediately reported to the stewards.

1561. Duties of the Racing Veterinarian.

The **Racing Veterinarian** shall examine each horse when it is first entered to race at the race meeting and he shall report to the stewards any horse which in his opinion is not of the age or condition which is satisfactory for the type of racing to be conducted at the meeting. The stewards may declare any such horse so reported as ineligible to be entered or started at the meeting until such time as the **Racing Veterinarian** certifies such horse to be raceably sound. The **Racing Veterinarian** shall be present in the paddock, on the race course, and at the starting gate during the saddling, the parade, and until the horses are dispatched from the gate for the race, and he shall examine any horse when there is a question as to the physical condition of such horse. He shall report any horse which in his opinion is incapable of physically exerting its best effort to win to the stewards who may declare such horse from the race. The **Racing Veterinarian** shall examine any horse which appears in physical distress during the race, at the finish of the race and he shall report such horse together with his opinion as to the cause of the distress to the stewards and to the **official veterinarian**. The **Racing Veterinarian** has the authority to treat any horse in event of an emergency, accident or injury, and he is authorized to humanely destroy any horse which in his opinion is so seriously injured that it is in the best interests of racing to so act, and every horse owner and trainer in participating in a race in this State does consent thereto. The **Racing Veterinarian** shall recommend to the official veterinarian those horses which by reason of physical disability should be placed on the Veterinarian's List and he may recommend removal from the list of those horses which in his opinion can satisfactorily compete in a race.

Associate Judge

The Associate Steward is assigned to work as a liaison among the Stewards, CHRB Investigators, Equine Medical Director, and Horsemen. He/she is to be visible in the restricted area and assist with the training of surveillance personnel for graded races. Additionally, the Associate Steward can work on various projects as assigned by the Board.

Jockey Valet

The Jockey Valet assists the jockey in various matters, including the weighing out and in process; carries equipment to the saddling paddock; assists the trainer in the saddling process. **The Jockey Valet is also responsible for maintaining the proper and safe condition of the rider's tack.**

Placing Judge

The **Placing judge** operates tote board and running order of races; once stewards make the race official, the **placing judge** posts the results from the computer; **placing judges** are also in charge of posting photo finishes; may be given the responsibility of taking entries for races, drawing for races, and taking stake nominations.

Patrol Judge

Patrol Judges are positioned at posts around the racing oval; **patrol judges** view the running of the race, maintain contact with the stewards over the radio during the race, and

report any infractions; may be given the responsibility of taking entries for races, drawing for races, and taking stake nominations. **The Patrol Judges review the tapes of day's race card and prepare reports for the stewards and the media as to any irregularities, incidents that may observed by them**

Clerk of Scales

The Clerk of Scales must verify the correct riding rate of each rider for each race on the card. Any discrepancies must be reported to the Stewards immediately. At the conclusion of the race day, the Clerk of the Scales is responsible for submitting the "scale sheet" to the paymaster of purses that indicates the earned riding fees for each rider that day. The Clerk of the Scales is responsible to the stewards for the conduct and professional behavior of the jockeys and the valets in the jockeys room.

Clerk of the Course

The Clerk of the Course maintains the registration papers on each horse within the inclosure for the meet. He/she is also responsible for the proper transfer or sale of ownership on horses' papers. A record of all claimed horses is also maintained by the Clerk of the Course..

Pari-Mutuel Employee

Terminal Operators sell, cash, and cancel pari-mutuel tickets and vouchers, while **Money Room employees**, who also hold a mutuel license, distribute money to employees and perform other functions relating to the collection and distribution of money, as well as verifying the correct balances of **terminal operators** at the end of the day.

Official Camera Operator

The Official Camera Operator shoots the pan shot for each race. **He/She also instructs the proper camera coverage each of the cameramen that cover the race course from all angles.**

Totalizator Employee

The **Track Manager** is the leader of the Track Team, which includes **Computer Operators, TIM Technicians, Helpers, and outside contractors**; the **Terminal Technician** must maintain terminals, field boards, and peripheral equipment; the **Field service manager** supervises **field service technicians**; the **Hub Operator** must operate the Tote System; the **Helper** must maintain terminals, field boards, and peripheral equipment; the Foreman must supervise the **Technicians and Helpers** in the maintenance of terminals, field boards, and peripheral equipment; the **TIM Lead Man** must supervise the **Technicians and Helpers** in the maintenance of terminals, field boards, and peripheral equipment.

Receiving or Detention Barn Staff Member

State Veterinarian's Secretary: Inputs information into CHRIS system and Incompass; **He/she maintains the accuracy of the Bleeders, and Veterinarian Lists, prepares the pre-race examination record cards for the Official and Association Veterinarians. Distributes the information that must be shared between operating racetracks within California.**

Card Secretary: Takes care of health cards; backs up secretary in the afternoon.

Custodian: Is in charge of receiving barn staff; sees to general condition of barn area; calls **horses when they are due in the Receiving Barn** and gets horses to the paddock in time.

Evidence Clerk: Is in charge of test samples; handles paperwork involved in maintaining chain of custody; packs and ships samples.

TCO2 Assistant: Does paperwork involving TCO2 samples.

Front Barn Person: Keeps receiving barn area clean and retrieves head numbers after the race.

Back Barn Person: Checks tattoos on test and claimed horses; assigns water buckets and changes water between horses; takes results after races; keeps test barn area clean.

Washer: Bathes horses **that have been selected for post-race testing. They are bathed in the test barn.**

Testers: Observe test horse while cooling out; obtain and seal samples and complete **chain of custody** paperwork.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). B&P Code Section 19562 states that the Board may prescribe rules, regulations and conditions under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in California. In February 2006 the Board added Rule 1690.1, Toe Grabs Prohibited, to prevent the use of toe grabs over four millimeters in height on thoroughbreds. However, thoroughbred farriers report that only four out of five manufacturers produce low toe grabs that meet the four-millimeter requirement. In addition, farriers stated shoes with jar calks could include toe grabs with a height greater than five millimeters.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Board Rule 1690.1, Toe Grabs Prohibited, would increase the minimum height of toe grabs on the front shoes of thoroughbred horses to five millimeters. In addition, a new subparagraph 1690.1(b) will allow thoroughbreds to wear shoes with jar calks that include toe grabs with a height greater than five millimeters when the track condition is officially labeled as anything other than fast by the track superintendent.

RECOMMENDATION

No comments were received during the 45-day public comment period.
Staff recommends the Board adopt the amendment to Rule 1690.1 as presented.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19590 states the Board shall adopt rules governing, permitting, and regulating wagering on horse races under the system known as the pari-mutuel method of wagering. B&P Code Section 19593 provides that no method of betting pool making, or wagering other than by the Pari-mutuel method shall be permitted or used by any person licensed under this chapter to conduct a horse racing meeting. B&P Code Section 19594 states any person within the inclosure where a horse racing meeting is authorized may wager on the result of a horse race held at that meeting by contributing his money to the pari-mutuel pool. In August 2005 Rule 1976.9, Pick (n) Pool, was amended to provide that if the racing surface changed from turf to dirt or dirt to turf in any race of a Place Pick (n) wager, and such change was not announced to the public before the close of wagering on the Place Pick (n) pool, all wagers on the race would be considered winning wagers for the purposes of the Place Pick (n). After the implementation of the amended rule, the Board determined that the provision for the change in racetrack surface could also be effectively applied to Rule 1976.8.

BACKGROUND

The proposed amendment to Rule 1976.8 provides that if the racing surface changes from turf to dirt or dirt to turf in any race comprising a Place Pick (n), and such change is not announced to the public before the close of wagering on the Place Pick (n) pool, all wagers on the race shall be considered winning wagers for the purposes of the Place Pick (n) pool. The proposed amendment is meant to protect the wagering public who might not have been fully informed regarding the racing surface when they placed their wagers. Horses that perform well on one type of organic course might not perform as expected on a different type of course, so information regarding a change from turf to dirt, or dirt to turf, can affect how a fan might wager. If such information is not promulgated in a timely manner, the proposed amendment will compensate patrons by having wagers on the particular leg of the Place Pick (n) declared winning wagers for the purposes of the Place Pick (n) pool.

RECOMMENDATION

No comments were received during the 45-day public comment period.
Staff recommends the Board adopt the amendment to Rule 1976.8 as presented.

(a) The Place Pick (n) is a separate ~~parimutuel~~ pari-mutuel pool established by the association on a designated number of races. The pool consists of amounts wagered on the a horse to finish first or second in each of the races. It is not a parlay and has no connection with or relation to other pools conducted by the association, except for the provisions in subsection (e), or to rules governing the distribution of other pools.

(b) A valid Place Pick (n) ticket shall be evidence of a binding contract between the holder of the ticket and the association and shall constitute an acceptance of Place Pick (n) provisions and rules contained in this Article.

(c) A Place Pick (n) may be given a distinctive name by the association conducting the meeting, subject to Board approval.

(d) A wager on a coupled entry or field is considered a wager on the remaining part of the coupled entry or field if any part of such entry starts for ~~parimutuel~~ pari-mutuel purposes in accordance with Rule 1974.

(e) If a ticket in any Place Pick (n) race designates a selection that was is scratched, excused or determined by the Stewards to be a nonstarter in the race, the association may designate the actual favorite, which is determined by the amounts wagered in the win pool at the time of the start of the race, or may allow patrons the option of selecting an alternate

betting interest. The actual favorite or the alternate betting interest will be substituted for the nonstarting selection for all purposes.

(f) Except as provided in subsection (f)(1), in a dead heat for win between two ~~(2)~~ or more horses, only the horses in such dead heat shall be considered winning horses.

(1) In a dead heat for win between two ~~(2)~~ or more coupled horses, all such horses together with the horse(s) which finishes next in order shall be considered winning horses.

(2) Except as provided in subsection (f), a dead heat for second between two ~~(2)~~ or more horses, all such horses together with the horse which finished first shall be considered winning horses.

(g) The association shall distribute the net pool to holders of valid tickets that correctly selected the most first or second place finishers.

(h) All tickets shall be refunded if all races comprising the Place Pick (n) are cancelled or declared as no contest. The entire pool shall be refunded if less than four ~~(4)~~ races are completed and if four ~~(4)~~ or more races are completed the net pool shall be distributed pursuant to subsection (g).

(i) After wagering closes on the first race comprising the Place Pick (n) no ticket shall be sold, exchanged or cancelled. No person shall disclose the number of tickets sold in the Place Pick (n) or the number or amount of tickets that selected winners of Place Pick (n) races until the Stewards declare the last race official.

(j) If the racing surface changes from turf to dirt or dirt to turf in any race of a Place Pick (n), and such change is not announced to the public before the close of wagering on the

Place Pick (n) pool, all wagers on such race shall be considered winning wagers for the purposes of the Place Pick (n).

BACKGROUND

At the May 25, 2006, Regular Board Meeting an amendment to Rule 1433, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting, that would require certain thoroughbred tracks to install a polymer synthetic-type surface not later than January 1, 2008, was adopted. An earlier companion amendment to Rule 1433 - an amendment to Rule 1472, Rail Construction and Track Specifications, which exempted polymer synthetic type racing surfaces from the cross slope requirements of organic dirt racetracks, was adopted at the April 2006 Regular Board Meeting. At the April 2006 hearing Chairman Shapiro stated he had concerns that the amendment to Rule 1472 did not address the entire system including the drainage, but was assured by Craig Fravel of Del Mar Thoroughbred Club that the issue could be addressed when plans for installation of synthetic type tracks were submitted to the Board. The drainage issue was discussed again at the June 22, 2006, Regular Board Meeting. Industry representatives proposed that drainage and subsurface issues could be addressed by amending the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting to require applicants to stipulate certain specifics related to the polymer synthetic surfaces installed at their facilities.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Board Rule 1433, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting, addresses concerns regarding drainage for polymer synthetic type racing surfaces by amending the form Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting CHRB-17 (Rev. 06/05), which is incorporated by reference into Rule 1433. The proposed amendment adds a new section 19 to the application that would require an association that has a polymer or wax coated racing surface to provide a complete description of the materials comprising the surface and identify the manufacturer of the surface. In addition, the applicant association must provide the initial date of installation, and a diagram of the subsurface drainage system utilized in the installation of the system and a full description of the water flow calculations for drainage - certified by an independent consulting engineer. The applicant must also certify that the drainage system is adequate for the type of surface installed and projected rainfall for the track during training and racing. Finally, the applicant must indicate whether the manufacturer provided a warranty for the surface and the terms of that warranty.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period.







BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that the Board shall have jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this State where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings. B&P Code Section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19562 provides the Board may prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in this State. A Special Teleconference Board Meeting was held on May 15, 2006. At the meeting the Board voted to temporarily waive Rule 1606, Coupling of Horses, as well as specific subparagraphs of pari-mutuel wagering regulations. The experimental waiver of Rule 1606 would apply only at the two current thoroughbred meetings at Hollywood Park Racetrack (HPRT) and Bay Meadows Race Track (BMRT) on the condition that there be at least five separate wagering interests prior to uncoupling. At the June 22 Regular Board Meeting Los Alamitos Race Course was added to the experimental waiver of Rule 1606 and associated regulations. The California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) has requested to be included in the experimental waiver of Rule 1606.

ANALYSIS

The waiver of Rule 1606 at HPRT and BMRT temporarily eliminates the practice of coupling two or more horses as a single wagering interest when the same person or persons own such horses in whole or in part. The Board's decision to waive the rules permits uncoupling on an experimental trial basis at the two thoroughbred meetings. The temporary waiver was also applied to Los Alamitos Race Course (LARC) in June 2006. LARC's waiver runs until August 17, 2006, the date of the August 2006 Regular Board Meeting. CARF has requested the temporary waiver of Rule 1606 be applied to the racing fairs through the close of the Fresno Fair. Granting the temporary waiver of Rule 1606 and associated regulations to CARF will expand the scope of the uncoupling experiment and provide additional data regarding the effects of uncoupling on California horse racing.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for discussion and potential action.






