APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF MAY 21, 2015

Chairman Winner asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of May 21, 2015.

Commissioner Choper **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Auerbach **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Executive Director Rick Baedeker stated several important issues were discussed at the Stewards Committee meeting, including the implementation of the amendment to Rule 1688, Use of Riding Crop. The amendment was effective July 1, 2015, and would prohibit the rider from using the riding crop more than three times in succession without allowing the horse to respond. He said Rule 1699, Riding Rules, was also discussed and the proposed changes to the rule would be presented to the Board for consideration within the next few months. He said Steward Kim Sawyer along with the safety stewards and Philip Laird, CHRB Staff Counsel, worked on modifying the trainers' test and tightening up the requirements for becoming a trainer in California. He stated the proposed changes would be presented to the Board at a later date.

Executive Director Baedeker stated Mr. Laird made a presentation on procedures for conducting hearings for investigators and stewards. He said there was also a thorough discussion on horse welfare issues including the care and treatment of ponies. Executive Director Baedeker said the issue of stewards handling financial complaints was also discussed. He stated the stewards were acting as a small claims court for individuals with financial issues. Stewards would be presented with 20 claims at one time, which required investigation. He stated the process would be revamped so stewards could focus on their primary duties. Executive Director Baedeker said the microchip program was making great strides; Incompass solutions finished the software that would read the information from the scanner. He stated the initial purpose of the program was to automate the counting of horses in California, but eventually it would have the capability of including the medical records of a horse. If an individual claimed a horse for \$50,000, he or she should be entitled to know what medical treatment the horse had received. Executive Director Baedeker stated the financials for the month of May were very strong with handle up. Daytime racing handle was up 7.65 percent; nighttime handle was up 10 percent, with a total of 7.88 percent up across the state for the month.

PUBLIC COMMENT

John Bucalo, Barona Casino, asked the Board to consider allowing satellite facilities to increase the number of races they took; satellites could not compete with Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) that could take full cards. He said one of the most popular bets was the Pick 5 which could not be played because the satellites did not receive the full card. Rather, the simulcast started with race two or race three, and the Pick 5 started at race one. Chairman Winner stated Mr. Bucalo's concerns were a statutory issue. Mr. Bucalo said the satellites were not on an even

playing field with the ADWs. Chairman Winner said the issue was not something that was regulated by the Board; it was in the law, and the law would have to be changed. Mary Ann Breed spoke on behalf of the Kirk Breed Memorial Fund. She said the legislature officially renamed the Cal Expo Race Track to the Kirk Breed Memorial Race Track in 2013. She stated the unveiling of the bust of Kirk Breed at Cal Expo was scheduled for July 10, 2015, the opening day of the State Fair.

PRESENTATION OF THE CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING BOARD RESOLUTION TO BO DEREK

Chairman Winner stated the Board wished to express its appreciation to ex-Commissioner Bo Derek, who created a legacy that would benefit horses and riders for decades to come. He said Commissioner Derek recognized that everyone participating in horse racing shared the common bond of high regard for the welfare of horses and riders, and she built on that bond and forged consensus on health and safety initiatives. Chairman Winner thanked Commissioner Derek for her accomplishments, and unwavering support for improvements to medication rules, making conditions safer for all racing participants and for her service to the state and the California horse racing industry.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF RACE DAY CHARITY PROCEEDS OF THE DEL MAR THOROUGHBRED CLUB IN THE AMOUNT OF \$27,845 TO FIVE BENEFICIARIES

Commissioner Choper commented that he believed the distribution of race day charity proceeds were a tribute honoring ex-Commissioner Derek because she made sure a large amount of proceeds went to the horses themselves. He acknowledged ex-Commissioner Derek frequently

had to settle for less, but the proceeds from this charity that would go to horses were 100%. Commissioner Krikorian **motioned** to approve the distribution of race charity proceeds of the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club in the amount of \$27,845 to five beneficiaries. Vice-Chairman Commissioner Auerbach **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD REGARDING AN UPDATE FROM BARRETS ON THE PERFORMANCE OF ITS INAUGURAL HORSE SALE AT DEL MAR

Kim Lloyd, General Manager of Barretts, said there were legitimate concerns industry-wide regarding the Barretts sale, but Barretts saw the new Del Mar location as an opportunity. The expectation for the inaugural sale at Del Mar was to keep even with the previous sale, but sales were up and the energy and excitement gave Barretts momentum to move forward. The move to Del Mar gave Barretts a chance to hold a select yearling sale August 15, 2015, which was a Saturday night after races, and would be another opportunity Barretts would not have had at Pomona. Mr. Lloyd expected the inaugural sale to be within five or ten percent of last year at Pomona, but the Del Mar sale had 155 entries, compared to 141 entries in 2014 at Pomona. Ninety-four horses were sold for \$4.2 million, compared with 70 sold for \$3 million gross in 2014. He reported the gross revenue were nearly \$4.5 million, a 31 percent increase in gross. Mr. Lloyd stated that not only were the numbers tremendous, but the excitement showed the success and potential for future growth at Del Mar. Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, added that Barretts was cooperative and was a leader in terms of drug testing of horses at its sales. He said there was no indication of corticosteroid use or anabolic steroids. He added that out of all the horses tested, there was only one horse that had clenbuterol, which was related to a respiratory tract infection, and the horse had been treated sometime previously. He stated the

cooperation with the Board paid off in the confidence buyers had in purchasing horses at the sale, and that Barretts, Del Mar, and everyone involved were owed a debt of gratitude by the racing industry. Commissioner Auerbach stated that she was initially opposed to Barretts move to Del Mar, but she had changed her opinion and was happy sales were successful.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE PACIFIC RACING ASSOCIATION II (T) AT GOLDEN GATE FIELDS, COMMENCING AUGUST 19, 2015 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 7, 2015 AND SEPTEMBER 24, 2015 THROUGH OCTOBER 4, 2015

Cal Rainey, Golden Gate Fields (GGF), stated GGF completed its winter-spring meet with positive results; its all source handle was even with its Spring 2014 meeting. He stated GGF's winter season had a slow start and had challenges with its export signal. However, in the second half of the meet out-of-state exports increased by four percent. Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) was up about 3 percent overall, and GGF's purse revenue generation was even compared to 2014. He said it was good news heading into the summer meet where purse levels would remain the same level as last year's after being raised five percent for the 2013 summer meet. He stated GGF's 2015 season would begin August 21 through Labor Day; close for two weeks for the Stockton Fair, and race for an additional two weeks before the Fresno Fair, with the meet a total of 19 days. Chairman Winner stated the chairman's license, track physician's license, and marketing plan were still outstanding. Commissioner Auerbach asked about the letter GGF submitted regarding its marketing plan. Scott Daruty, GGF, said the intent of the letter was to draw attention to the plight of GGF. He stated GGF and the Stronach Group were committed to ensuring GGF would remain a racing facility in the future, however, it was a challenge. He said at several of the Northern California Race Dates Committee meetings GGF discussed the

challenges it faced with running races during the winter and closing during the nicer summer months. He stated GGF submitted the letter in hopes of being open and forthright with the Board in regards to the challenges GGF faced in order to tackle the issue directly instead of submitting an unfeasible marketing plan. He said GGF prioritized its limited resources and decided to focus on the Ship, Run and Win program, increased field size, and increased exposure through the simulcast feed and out-of-state wagering. He stated GGF's marketing strategy was to get more horses to the facility and to improve its simulcast product. Commissioner Beneto said he agreed with Mr. Daruty; spending money on advertising was a waste; it was more advantageous to get additional horses for races. Commissioner Beneto stated Arizona ran races Monday and Tuesday and asked if GGF considered changing its running days. Mr. Daruty said that was something GGF could look at but it was a trade off; was it better to get people in a facility on Thursday through Friday, or attract more out-of-state handle on Monday and Tuesday? Commissioner Auerbach asked about the status of GGF's purse account going into the next meet. Mr. Rainey stated the purse account was positive and was carrying forward \$50,000 to \$80,000. Commissioner Krikorian asked about GGF's rationale for holding seven races on Thursdays, eight races on Fridays, and nine races on the other days; why not eliminate Thursdays in order to have more races on the other days. Mr. Rainey stated GGF wanted to continue racing four days a week; running seven races on Thursday would allow GGF to have more races on Saturdays or Sundays. Commissioner Choper asked if the ADW handle was up for the first five months in 2015 over 2014. Mr. Rainey stated that was correct. Commissioner Choper asked Mr. Rainey if he could explain why, despite GGF's field size, the ADW was up. Mr. Daruty said he believed it was due to the television arrangement between HRTV and TVG; it provided GGF more television exposure, which led to a higher ADW handle. Chairman Winner asked if GGF's

purses in races other than stakes races were projected to go down by \$400,000. Mr. Rainey stated GGF was trying to maintain the previous year's purse structure. Commissioner Choper asked how many people attended the Hispanic music festival. Mr. Cirimeli said over 10,000 people were in attendance on that day; with the handle up 3 percent. Commissioner Choper asked if GGF kept track of customers that returned, if incentives were given. He said Dollar Day Sundays at GGF brought people in, but the handle did not increase. Mr. Cirimeli said the GGF was trying to develop casual fans through the Dollar Days and the Hispanic Heritage Days. Commissioner Choper asked if GGF had a way to track how many people that attended the Hispanic Heritage Days or the Dollar Day Sundays came back? Mr. Cirimeli said GGF had a loyalty program through its Thoroughbreds cards that were swiped at the gate and people were coming back; however, wagering was a lower priority than buying food and watching the races. He stated it would take the new demographic more time to approach the windows to place a bet; however, finding a solution was something GGF would actively pursue. Chairman Winner stated marketing for special days or groups of people provided advantages beyond whether the handle increased, such as the secondary benefits of food and beverage sales and the other ways the fans spent their money. He said it would be impossible to determine how much they were wagering the first time or when they came back. Commissioner Solis asked about Mondays and Tuesdays for GGF. Mr. Daruty said he believed it was too late to make the change for the meet in August, but he would analyze it for later in the fall or early next year by trying a Monday first to see what would happen. Chairman Winner asked about the current meet estimate of \$2,333,000 versus the prior meet estimate of \$2,728,000. He said it appeared to be a purse decrease of \$400,000. Mr. Daruty said GGF would look into it and get back to the Board. Commissioner Solis **motioned** to approve Golden Gate Fields application to conduct a horse

racing meeting commencing August 19, 2015 through September 7, 2015, and September 24, 2015 through October 4, 2015, conditioned on the submission of all outstanding items. Commissioner Auerbach **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE HUMBOLDT COUNTY FAIR (F) AT FERNDALE, COMMENCING AUGUST 21, 2015 THROUGH AUGUST 30, 2015, INCLUSIVE

Richard Conway, Humboldt County Fair, stated the 2014 meeting saw an increase in handle, and the fair was continuing the same recruiting efforts and expanded marketing opportunities. Chairman Winner asked if the attendance of 34,136 was for the fair as a whole, or specifically to the track. Mr. Conway replied that the attendance was counted at the track. The track averaged over 5,000 people on the weekends and on a couple days had 7,000 people in attendance, which was all the track could accommodate. Commissioner Beneto asked about the agreement Humboldt had with Golden Gate Fields in 2014; was it still in effect? Mr. Conway responded that he had spoken with Cal Rainey, Golden Gate Fields, the previous week and he believed the agreement was still in effect. Mr. Rainey stated that Golden Gate Fields agreed it would not run any claiming races under \$5,000 during the Humboldt overlap. Commissioner Beneto **motioned** to approve Humboldt's application to conduct a horse racing meeting commencing August 21, 2015 through August 30, 2015. Vice-Chairman Rosenberg **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE **PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1632, JOCKEY'S RIDING FEE**, TO ADJUST THE NON-WINNING JOCKEY RIDING FEE SCALE FOR LOSING MOUNTS, PURSUANT TO BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 19501(B)(1), TO REFLECT CALIFORNIA'S MINIMUM WAGE INCREASE OF 11.1 PERCENT SCHEDULED FOR JANUARY 1, 2016 AND TO AMEND THE NON-WINNING JOCKEY RIDING FEE SCALE TO REFLECT AN INCREASE OF 11.1 PERCENT FOR THE 2ND AND 3RD PLACE MOUNTS IN RACES WITH A GROSS PURSE OF \$9,999 OR LESS

Executive Director Rick Baedeker stated the proposed amendment to Rule 1632, Jockey's Riding Fee, reflected the minimum wage increase that would be effective January 1, 2016. Commissioner Auerbach asked how often the amendment to Rule 1632 would come before the Board; could a formula automatically kick in instead. Jacqueline Wagner, Assistant Executive Director, stated the amendment to Rule 1632 was a result of the statute that required the jockey's riding fees to be increased whenever the California minimum wage increased. She said it was within the Board's discretion to implement something in addition to that. Commissioner Auerbach asked if there was a way to do it automatically. Ms. Wagner said no. Executive Director Baedeker stated it would require a change in statute. Commissioner Krikorian stated he would be opposed to an automatic system; it would not be realistic due to the economy. He said it would be better to review and approve the amendment each time it came before the Board as an agenda item. Chairman Winner said the Board would refer it to committee for evaluation. Commissioner Auerbach **motioned** to direct staff to initiate 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed amendment to Rule 1632. Vice-Chairman Rosenberg **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE **PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1433, APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING**, TO REVISE THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING, CHRB-17 (REV. 07/11) (CHRB-17), AND APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF A CALIFORNIA FAIR, CHRB-18 (REV. 07/11) (CHRB-18), TO 1) DELETE THE REQUIREMENT THAT ANY THOROUGHBRED RACING ASSOCIATION THAT OPERATES FOUR WEEKS OR MORE OF CONTINUOUS THOROUGHBRED RACING IN A CALENDAR YEAR INSTALL A POLYMER SYNTHETIC RACING SURFACE; 2) COLLECT INFORMATION ON STAKES RACES FOR THE PRIOR TWO RACE MEETINGS; THE NAME, EMERGENCY TELEPHONE NUMBER AND HOURS OF THE RACING VETERINARIAN ONSITE DURING TRAINING HOURS, WORKOUTS AND DURING RACING; INFORMATION ON THE PROPOSED OFFERING OF ANY PARI-MUTUEL WAGERS THAT WERE NOT LISTED IN THE PRIOR YEAR'S PARI-MUTUEL WAGERING PROGRAM; AND CAPTURE THE TAKEOUT PERCENTAGE FOR EACH TYPE OF WAGER

The proposed amendment to CHRB Rule 1433, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting, would delete subsection 1433(b) which required any thoroughbred racing association that operated four weeks or more of continuous thoroughbred racing in a calendar year to install a polymer synthetic racing surface. Additionally, the proposed amendment to Rule 1433 would revise the forms CHRB-17 and CHRB-18, to collect information on stakes, veterinarian contact information, pari-mutual wagers, and takeout percentages. Commissioner Solis **motioned** to approve the proposed amendment to CHRB Rule 1433, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting. Commissioner Krikorian **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1844, AUTHORIZED MEDICATION, TO 1) LOWER THE AMOUNT OF KETOPROFEN THAT CAN BE PRESENT IN A TEST SAMPLE FROM 10 NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM TO 2 NANOGRAMS PER MILLILITER OF BLOOD PLASMA OR SERUM; AND 2) TO ADD ISOFLUPRODONE AND ITS SPECIFIED AUTHORIZED LEVEL TO THE LIST OF CALIFORNIA'S AUTHORIZED MEDICATIONS

The proposed amendment to CHRB Rule 1844, Authorized Medication, would revise subsection 1844(c) by lowering the amount of Ketoprofen that could be found in an official blood plasma or serum test sample. Additionally, the proposed amendment would revise subsection 1844(f) by adding Isoflupredone to the list of drug substances that could be found in an official blood plasma or serum test sample at a specified level. Commissioner Beneto **motioned** to approve the proposed amendment to CHRB Rule 1844, Authorized Medication. Commissioner Auerbach **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE SUBMISSION OF PROPOSED CHRB EMERGENCY RULE 1866.1, PRESENCE OF CLENBUTEROL IN QUARTER HORSES, TO THE OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATIVE LAW (OAL), IN RESPONSE TO THE OAL DETERMINATION THAT THE FEBRUARY 28, 2014 MEMORANDUM "INSTRUCTIONS PURSUANT TO RULE 1885, MEDICATION PROCEDURES AND RELATED INSTRUCTION" ISSUED BY THE CHRB EQUINE MEDICAL DIRECTOR WAS AN UNDERGROUND REGULATION

Philip Laird, CHRB Staff Counsel, stated the Office of Administrative Law (OAL) made the determination that the memorandum that was in effect since February 2014, that provided procedures for placing quarter horses with Clenbuterol in their systems on the veterinarian's list, was an underground regulation. While the memorandum was created and enforced under Rule 1855, Medication Procedures and Related Instructions, OAL determined the memorandum was beyond the permissions of Rule 1855 and declared it an underground regulation. He said because the memorandum was unenforceable it resulted in an emergency situation in quarter

horse racing in California; therefore, CHRB staff created an emergency regulation replicating the original memorandum. He stated the emergency regulation process would be enforceable ten days after submission to OAL and in effect for six months while the proposed regulation went through the formal rulemaking process. Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, stated in Fiscal Year 2013-2014, there were 13 Clenbuterol violations at Los Alamitos. He said with the memorandum in effect, in Fiscal Year 2014-2015 there were no Clenbuterol violations. He stated to satisfy OAL he supported the emergency regulation, and believed it was necessary to eliminate Clenbuterol abuse. Dan Schiffer, Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association, stated the horsemen of Los Alamitos supported the action by the Board. Richard English, Los Alamitos, said Los Alamitos supported the Board taking emergency action. Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated there were prior discussions about hair samples and asked if "official test sample" was defined in the CHRB rules or regulations since hair sampling was not being used by the Board. Dr. Arthur said hair testing and out-of-competition testing were used primarily for surveillance to ensure people were abiding by reporting; there were no thresholds. He stated Los Alamitos had its own hair sampling program which was not part of CHRB; it was a house rule. Commissioner Choper stated he believed there was rule that stated "and other such methods." The new regulation could include hair testing. Mr. Laird said Commissioner Choper was correct, official test sample was not defined in statute or in the rules or regulations, but what constituted a "sample" would be clarified during the formal rulemaking process. Commissioner Krikorian **motioned** to approve the submission of Emergency Rule 1866.1 to OAL. Commissioner Choper **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE REQUEST FROM THE SONOMA COUNTY FAIR AND THE PACIFIC COAST QUARTER HORSE RACING ASSOCIATION, TO SUSPEND THE USE OF CLENBUTEROL FOR 12 MONTHS EFFECTIVE JUNE 1, 2015, FOR QUARTER HORSES AT THE SONOMA COUNTY FAIR RACE MEETING, PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF CHRB RULE 1844.1, SUSPENSION OF AUTHORIZED MEDICATION.

Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, stated the request to suspend the use of Clenbuterol at the Sonoma County Fair would align Sonoma County Fair with the California Authority of Racing Fairs. Chairman Choper **motioned** to approve the request from the Sonoma County Fair, and the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association, to suspend the use of Clenbuterol for 12 months, effective June 1, 2015 for Quarter Horses at the Sonoma County Fair race meeting. Commissioner Krikorian **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPROVAL OF THE 2015/2016 AGREEMENT PROVIDING FUNDING SUPPORT FOR THE BOARD

Executive Director Rick Baedeker stated California Senate Bill 16 (Statutes of 2009) required the racing industry to fund the operations of the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB). Each year, CHRB's budget for the next fiscal year was presented to the Board. He said the significant change to the budget was the additional funding for the Maddy Lab, which was authorized in the Governor's budget. Chairman Beneto **motioned** to approve the 2015/2016 agreement providing funding support for the Board. Vice-Chairman Rosenberg **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD REGARDING AN UPDATE ON THE PROGRESS OF THE SECURITY CAMERA INSTALLATION PROJECT AT CALIFORNIA RACE TRACKS

Joe Morris, Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), stated the issue of installing security cameras on the backside dated back to May 2013, with TOC offering \$150,000 towards the security camera installation project. He said discussions began with Santa Anita, along with the research provided by the Board. He said the challenge of bringing new equipment into a backstretch was that the equipment would need to use an operating system that was already in place. He stated Santa Anita was looking at its current software system and cameras. He said the \$150,000 offer still stood; however, TOC did not own the barn areas, it would have to be a track initiative that would tie into the track's current security protocol and plan. Commissioner Krikorian asked if TOC had determined what kind of system it was looking to install. Mr. Morris said in prior discussions different options were considered, including capturing images from all entrances in barn areas, shed rows, and monitoring stakes horses; however, the option may not remain the same with the current Santa Anita management. Commissioner Auerbach asked if the issue would need to be placed in the race meet applications as a requirement. She stated the Board did the research, developed a cost-effective solution, and provided the information to the racing industry; but it had not been used. She asked if the Board should come up with a timeframe requiring a system to be installed by a certain date; maybe TOC should put it in its race agreement. Mr. Morris stated the issue involved an expansion of the current systems. He said Santa Anita currently had security cameras and surveillance. He stated stakes races of \$100,000 and above had security guards that filmed anyone going in and out of stalls; that was included with the TOC race agreement with Santa Anita. Commissioner Auerbach said the security system recommended by the Board would cover everything, from the stakes races, to

the lowest claimers, to moving ponies in and out, not just certain races. Commissioner Solis stated a big problem that could be helped with the security system was having a camera that would alert the exercise riders and trainers to where the tractors were; it would eliminate 200 horses waiting to go onto the track and could help avoid an accident. Chairman Winner stated if the issue was not resolved between TOC and the racing association, the Board would be required to take regulatory action.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED ADJUSTMENT OF THE 2015 SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA RACING CALENDAR, TO ALLOCATE SEPTEMBER 26TH AND 27TH FROM SANTA ANITA TO FAIRPLEX, AT LOS ALAMITOS

This item was removed from the agenda.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING AN UPDATE ON FUTURE FUNDING FOR THE VANNING AND STABLING FUND

Joe Morris, Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), stated an agreement to fix the vanning and stabling fund deficit was reached at the end of 2014. The agreement closed Fairplex in 2015, which helped the fund's cash flow. He said opening Galway Downs and implementing new vanning procedures also helped the fund's cash flow. The vanning and stabling committee was projecting a \$400,000 surplus for 2015, which would bring its overdraft of \$4.4 million down to \$4 million. He said the committee was working on steps to pay down receivables for Los Alamitos, Santa Anita, and San Luis Rey, and add funding to the current stabling and vanning situation through legislative and Board level solutions. Commissioner Krikorian asked if the receivables were a separate amount of money from the 4.4 million deficit. Mr. Morris said no, the receivables were a part of the \$4.4 million deficit. Commissioner Beneto asked what the

Committee's budget was. Mr. Morris stated the budget was slightly over \$8 million with a \$400,000 surplus for 2015. Commissioner Krikorian asked if the Board would be hearing from individuals seeking increases to their current stabling and vanning. Mr. Morris said that was correct and the committee was working that in as part of the additional funding. Chairman Winner stated substantial increases requested by various associations, over what they were currently receiving, could cause problems in the current process. Mr. Morris said the increases needed to happen at the same time as the additional funding from purses, commissions, and the race tracks. Vice Chairman Rosenberg asked if stabling for race tracks was a reimbursement. Mr. Morris said that was correct. Vice Chairman Rosenberg asked whose responsibility it would be to determine how costs were calculated on a daily basis for off-track stabling? Mr. Morris stated that was audited through the Stabling and Vanning Committee.

REPORT FROM THE MEDICATION AND TRACK SAFETY COMMITTEE

Commissioner Auerbauch stated a Medication and Track Safety Committee meeting was held on May 27, 2015. Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, gave the committee a presentation on the necropsy report. In California, there were 199 fatalities in Fiscal Year 2013/2014 compared to 209 in the previous year; of the 199 fatalities 52 died from non-exercise related injuries. Dr. Arthur reported there was a significant decrease in quarter horse deaths over the last five years. The second item discussed was the proposed addition of Rule 1846.6, Post Mortem Examination Review, to require a postmortem examination review of each equine fatality within the enclosures. She stated Philip Laird, CHRB Staff Counsel, explained the concept of a review panel that would gather and review information from the postmortem examination, as well as from the trainer and owner, and utilize the information to better protect

the horse and rider. He said the purpose of the rule was not to sanction people. The third item was a presentation on emerging threats such as gene doping and the lab's ability or inability to find these threats. Dr. Stanley reported the Maddy Lab was working with other labs, as well as human testing labs, to update the Board on current and emerging threats. Commissioner Auerbach reported that Rick Baedeker, CHRB Executive Director, suggested the Board should consider developing regulations to prohibit gene doping and other emerging threats. The fourth item discussed was track veterinarian examination procedures. Dr. Arthur said the Board did not have as many veterinarians examining the horses at the race tracks as at other locations. He suggested a formula for veterinarians to have time to examine the horses. Dr. Stead had suggested adopting a regulation requiring a minimum number of examining veterinarians; however, Mr. Baedeker preferred that the industry come up with a solution to make sure there were enough veterinarians rather than the Board mandating how many veterinarians. The fifth item discussed was the proposed amendment to allow race secretaries to write races in which horses would not be given Lasix within 24 hours of the race. During the discussion on the item it was determined there was not enough support among stakeholders for the amendment to proceed. The sixth item discussed was pony and rider safety. Due to discussions with pony riders regarding their responsibilities for ponies there had been an improvement; ponies were looking healthier and in better condition. The program started with CARMA, the off track race program that locates homes for horses. Pony riders asked for help; it became apparent that ponies needed as much attention as horses because the economics in the pony community was worse than in racing. Santa Anita started a program where ponies were registered and assigned stalls. The seventh item discussed involved adjustment of penalties for medication violations; specifically the ambiguity concerning penalties for repeated violations, and greater restrictions

on suspended trainers. California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) opposed a proposal for an absolute mandate concerning the transfer of horses by a suspended trainer to another licensee. Dr. Arthur and CTT believed the stewards should make these decisions and talked about reducing the number of trigger days to 45. CHR B staff would amend the language and bring it back to the committee. The final item was scratching a horse from a race if it had been gelded, and the gelding had not been reported. It was determined that the issue of non-report of gelding had to do more with honest and legitimate mistakes than it did with nefarious activity by any of the horsemen; it was less of a problem and the proposal would not move forward.

REPORT FROM THE JOCKEY AND DRIVER WELFARE COMMITTEE

Commissioner Solis stated the amendment to Rule 1688, Use of Riding Crop, would limit the rider from using the crop more than three times in succession without giving the horse a chance to respond, would be effective July 1, 2015. He said the best constructed riding crop was from England and included a soft popper. He believed that jockeys were getting riding crops from all over the world, and some riding crops could look like the soft popper that applied in the rule, but they were not soft enough. He stated a jockey would go through three to four riding crops a month, with up to 15 whips in the jockeys' room. He recommended fining a jockey that did not have the right whip; this would encourage jockeys to purchase riding crops from England that had more cushion. He said in the future, it would be a great idea to use the riding crop for guidance and safety only; two year olds were being pushed to work early. He stated riding crop free racing would allow jockey's to use the crop for guidance and for safety. The committee discussed using a video featuring jockeys to educate other riders on how to use the riding crop without focusing on hitting the horse. He said harness racing was overlooked regarding

whipping, and the Board needed to bring the harness industry to a level field with thoroughbred racing. He stated another point to be addressed was the use of the whip to encourage the horse out of the gate; there were other ways to encourage the horse out of the gate. Commissioner Auerbach stated there was more and more emphasis on running two year olds; there was a segment in the industry that pushed to run horses at two years old. She said eliminating the two-furlong races and pushing back on two year old races would benefit the horses health and the industry in the long run.

REPORT FROM THE NORTHERN CALIFORNIA RACE DATES AND STABLING OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

Commissioner Beneto reported six racing fairs agreed to the 2016 Northern California race dates proposed, with Golden Gate Fields presenting its proposal. Commissioner Choper stated all of the stakeholders agreed that they would meet among themselves. Executive Director Rick Baedeker said the meeting would be held on July 8, 2015 in Sacramento, CA. Commissioner Choper said the main point of the meeting was compromise and everyone that was attending the meeting understood that. Chairman Winner said a series of meetings would take place; the committee would make a recommendation to the Board, and the Board would make a decision regarding both north and south 2016 race dates. He said historically in the south, there were meetings with the stakeholders, including the racing associations, Thoroughbred Owners of California, and California Thoroughbred Trainers. Ultimately, no one would get everything they wanted, but everyone got something. He stated the best example was the 2015 Fairplex/Los Alamitos/Santa Anita and the two race dates they discussed over a period of time. He said with the leadership of Commissioner Krikorian, and the stakeholders, the race dates were worked out

because everyone involved had the intention of doing what was best for racing. Vice- Chairman Rosenberg asked Chairman Winner what the deadline would be for putting the issue on the agenda if an agreement could not be reached. Chairman Winner said August 2015; the stakeholders would meet first and then come back to the committee with their recommendations. The committee would make a decision and it would go before the Board at the August 2015 Regular Board meeting.

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE ALLOCATION OF THE 2016 NORTHERN CALIFORNIA RACE DATES

This item was combined and discussed with agenda item number 21.

REPORT FROM THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA RACE DATES AND STABLING OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE,

Commissioner Krikorian stated several concerns were identified that the committee should be sensitive to, moving forward. They included avoiding Breeders cup racing day conflicts, coordinating turf racing in Southern California with Northern California race dates to avoid gaps in turf races available, and awareness of which tracks generated the biggest handles. He said the committee also discussed being aware of overworking track surfaces, training too many horses on a track for a long period of time, avoiding horse injuries, and shorter race meets to keep patrons interested. The committee discussed coinciding race dates with stabling commitments for the calendar year, so there was not a problem with stabling once the race dates were determined; trainers would know where they stood and what their stabling opportunities were for their horses for the calendar year. The committee discussed a break between the spring and winter meet at Santa Anita to give the surface time to be worked, and moving racing to Del Mar,

or to another track. He said he wanted to emphasize that even though rack tracks were awarded racing dates for 2015, that did not entitle the tracks to the same race dates in the future; that was a Board decision. He stated Santa Anita made a presentation stating it would like to keep the same number of weeks it was awarded in 2014 and 2015. Del Mar said it would like to keep the summer days it had last year. Los Alamitos preferred to have two four-week meets versus the current meets, and it also indicated since no one was racing the last week of December it would like those dates as well. Commissioner Krikorian said Thoroughbred Owners of California thought a spring break from racing at Santa Anita made sense, and could bring extra money into stabling. California Thoroughbred Trainers agreed that a spring break was a good idea, and it thought the Committee should look at the north and south together, and have simultaneous racing at Golden Gate Fields and Los Alamitos. Jim Henwood, Fairplex, said he was pleased with the changes in Fairplex race dates, and its move to Los Alamitos, which was a positive influence on racing in Southern California. Chairman Winner said the committee would come before the Board in August with recommendations for the Southern California race dates.

ISSUE

Pacific Racing Association, doing business as Golden Gate Fields (GGF), is requesting approval to distribute race day charity proceeds generated at its 2014-2015 racing meet from August 15, 2014 to June 14, 2015. From the net race day charity proceeds GGF is proposing a total distribution of \$46,017.25. The charitable organizations selected and amounts to be distributed are listed on the attachment. Staff notes that 100 percent of the proceeds will be given to 11 horse racing related organizations.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19550 states the Board shall require each licensed racing association that conducts 14 or less weeks of racing to designate three racing days, and each licensed racing association that conducts more than 14 weeks of racing to designate five racing days during any one meeting, to be conducted as charity days by the licensee for the purpose of distribution of the net proceeds there from to beneficiaries through the distribution agent. No racing association shall be required to pay to a distributing agent for the purpose of distribution to beneficiaries more than an amount equal to two-tenths of one percent of the association's total on-track handle on live races conducted by the association at the meeting. Business and Professions Code section 19555 requires that proceeds are to be distributed to beneficiaries within 12 calendar months after the last day of the meet during which charity days were conducted. Business and Professions Code section 19556 provides that the distributing agent shall make the distribution to beneficiaries qualified under this article. At least 20 percent of the distribution shall be made to charities associated with the horse racing industry. An additional five percent shall be paid to a welfare fund and another five percent shall be paid to a nonprofit corporation, the primary purpose of which is to assist horsemen and backstretch personnel who are being affected adversely as a result of alcohol or substance abuse. In addition to the above distributions, a separate 20 percent shall be made to a nonprofit corporation or trust, the directors or trustees of which shall serve without compensation except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses, and which has as its sole purpose the accumulation of endowment funds, the income on which shall be distributed to qualified disabled jockeys.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action.
Staff recommends the Board approve the charity race day distribution as presented.

**ADDEMDUM TO PACIFIC RACING ASSOCIATION
REQUEST FOR AUTHORITY TO DISTRIBUTE
2014-2015 CHARITY DAYS PROCEEDS**

California Equine Retirement Foundation, Inc. – CERF is an organization that has developed into a full-care ranch to provide a full range of services to former race horses in need of rehabilitation toward retirement or placement in to a new career. CERF maintains 75 plus horses ranging in age from one year to 35 years, each having specific needs to insure proper health and optimal fitness. Each horse has its own paddock where appropriate portions are placed in feeders in the morning and again in the late afternoon. During the day hay is placed in outside feeders for grazing while the horses are turned out. Periodic re-evaluations are made to determine if any changes are needed in any individual's dietary regime. This program provides horses with proper nutrition to maintain health, fitness and longevity.

California Thoroughbred Foundation – CTF is a 503(c)(3) nonprofit organization that provides multiple benefits to individuals involved in the Thoroughbred industry. These include scholarship programs for veterinary medicine students at UC, Davis and maintenance of the Carleton F. Burke Memorial Library.

California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation – CTHF is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit foundation that provides assistance to the low income backstretch community occupied with the care of Thoroughbred race horses at California's major race tracks and fair circuits and CHRB recognized off-track training centers. The organization maintains three clinics throughout the state which see over 10,000 people each year, including numerous children who are prepared medically to return to school each year.

CARMA – The California Retirement Management Account is organized to raise money for retired California race horses. Their mission statement provides that they assist Thoroughbred retirement facilities that care for and retrain horses whose careers have ended after competing in California Thoroughbred races. Their services include tracking of retired California race horses and in working to find homes for retired equines. CARMA also manages a grant request process and distributes funds to qualified retirement facilities caring for such horses. CARMA is dedicated to the goal of providing funding for the rehabilitation, retraining and/or retirement of Thoroughbred horses that have raced in California.

Edwin Gregson Foundation – A nonprofit charitable foundation organized for the purpose of improving the lives of backstretch workers and their immediate family members at California race tracks. The organization provides backstretch workers with many educational programs, including "English as a second language," bible studies and provides numerous programs, including computer training programs at its recreation facility, computer games and various magazines in English and Spanish. It organizes family outings for the workers and their children, including trips to Magic Mountain in Valencia, California, Raging Waters, Galaxy soccer games, Dodger baseball games and excursions to the Long Beach Aquarium. The organization also maintains a recreational hall at Santa Anita Park for the benefit of the backside workers and their children.

Neigh Savers Foundation – Neigh Savers creates new beginnings for retired racing Thoroughbreds by building relationships, both on and off the track, to help as many horses as possible. Through rescue, rehabilitation and retraining the organization provides the foundation needed for racing Thoroughbreds to successfully transition into new careers. Whether the horse is an Off-Track Thoroughbred (OTTB) ready to end its racing career or one that has been injured on the track or has found itself standing at an auction or on a feedlot with no other options, Neigh Savers strives to make a difference, one OTTB at a time.

Permanently Disabled Jockeys' Fund – This is a statutorily mandated distribution per Business and Professions Code Section 19556 (c). It provides support to disabled jockeys, as its name implies.

Racetrack Chaplaincy of America (Northern California Council) – The stated mission of the organization is "The overall mission of RTCA, through its councils and chaplains, is to make disciples for Jesus Christ through teaching, preaching, and ministering to the spiritual, emotional, physical, social, and educational needs of those persons involved in all aspects of the horse racing industry."

Tranquility Farm – This organization is a 501(c)(3) charity whose principal activity is to accept the donation of Thoroughbred horses from the race tracks and breeding farms and whose goal is to give such horses the best opportunity to find an adoptive home. For those Thoroughbreds that are not readily adoptable, the organization offers comfortable retirement wherever possible, giving priority to horses that were significant competitors or producers. Tranquility Farm requests, but does not require, that owners contribute sponsorship to help defray the costs of rehabilitation and retraining. No horse is denied acceptance at Tranquility Farm based upon its owner's financial contribution.

United Pegasus Foundation – This is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization that aids the rescue of superannuated Thoroughbreds and provides care for such animals at its farm in Tehachapi, California. On occasion the organization purchases older horses at auction and acquires other Thoroughbreds at the request of owners and trainers. The retired Thoroughbreds are maintained in pleasant quarters and peaceful surroundings to live out the balance of their lives. This organization depends entirely upon donations for the purchase of food and other amenities required to maintain the Thoroughbreds.

Winners Foundation – The Winners Foundation provides confidential assistance on a one-to-one basis to employees and family members of California race tracks who are seeking help for alcohol, gambling and drug addiction. Each situation is geared to best support an individual's desire to change his or her life for the better. The Foundation has developed a large referral base and maintains close relationships with community based services such as anonymous 12 step groups, city and county assistance agencies, detox centers, halfway houses and out-patient and in-patient hospital treatment programs. This service is provided to any employee or family member of anyone involved in the California Thoroughbred horse racing community, free of charge. This includes backstretch workers, as well as all employees of Del Mar, Fairplex, Golden Gate Fields, Hollywood Park, Oak Tree, Santa Anita and the California Association of Racing Fairs.

AMOUNT OF \$49,487.98 TO TWELVE BENEFICIARIES

Regular Board Meeting

ISSUE

Los Angeles Turf Club II (LATC II) is requesting approval to distribute race day charity proceeds generated at its 2014 autumn meet from September 26, 2014 through November 2, 2014. From the net race day charity proceeds LATC II is proposing a total distribution of \$49,487.98. The charitable organizations selected and amount to be distributed are listed on the attachment. Staff notes that 100 percent of the proceeds will be given to 12 horse racing related organizations.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19550 states the Board shall require each licensed racing association that conducts 14 or less weeks of racing to designate three racing days, and each licensed racing association that conducts more than 14 weeks of racing to designate five racing days during any one meeting, to be conducted as charity days by the licensee for the purpose of distribution of the net proceeds there from to beneficiaries through the distribution agent. No racing association shall be required to pay to a distributing agent for the purpose of distribution to beneficiaries more than an amount equal to two-tenths of one percent of the association's total on-track handle on live races conducted by the association at the meeting. Business and Professions Code section 19555 requires that proceeds are to be distributed to beneficiaries within 12 calendar months after the last day of the meet during which charity days were conducted. Business and Professions Code section 19556 provides that the distributing agent shall make the distribution to beneficiaries qualified under this article. At least 20 percent of the distribution shall be made to charities associated with the horse racing industry. An additional five percent shall be paid to a welfare fund and another five percent shall be paid to a nonprofit corporation, the primary purpose of which is to assist horsemen and backstretch personnel who are being affected adversely as a result of alcohol or substance abuse. In addition to the above distributions, a separate 20 percent shall be made to a nonprofit corporation or trust, the directors or trustees of which shall serve without compensation except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses, and which has as its sole purpose the accumulation of endowment funds, the income on which shall be distributed to qualified disabled jockeys.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action. Staff recommends the Board approve the charity race day distribution as presented.

ADDEMDUM TO REQUEST FOR AUTHORITY TO DISTRIBUTE
2014 CHARITY DAYS PROCEEDS

California Equine Retirement Foundation, Inc. – CERF is an organization that has developed into a full-care ranch to provide a full range of services to former race horses in need of rehabilitation toward retirement or placement in to a new career. CERF maintains 75 plus horses ranging in age from one year to 35 years, each having specific needs to insure proper health and optimal fitness. Each horse has its own paddock where appropriate portions are placed in feeders in the morning and again in the late afternoon. During the day hay is placed in outside feeders for grazing while the horses are turned out. Periodic re-evaluations are made to determine if any changes are needed in any individual's dietary regime. This program provides horses with proper nutrition to maintain health, fitness and longevity.

California Thoroughbred Foundation – CTF is a 503(c)(3) nonprofit organization that provides multiple benefits to individuals involved in the Thoroughbred industry. These include scholarship programs for veterinary medicine students at UC, Davis and maintenance of the Carleton F. Burke Memorial Library.

California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation – CTHF is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit foundation that provides assistance to the low income backstretch community occupied with the care of Thoroughbred race horses at California's major race tracks and fair circuits and CHRB recognized off-track training centers. The organization maintains three clinics throughout the state which see over 10,000 people each year, including numerous children who are prepared medically to return to school each year.

CARMA – The California Retirement Management Account is organized to raise money for retired California race horses. Their mission statement provides that they assist Thoroughbred retirement facilities that care for and retrain horses whose careers have ended after competing in California Thoroughbred races. Their services include tracking of retired California race horses and in working to find homes for retired equines. CARMA also manages a grant request process and distributes funds to qualified retirement facilities caring for such horses. CARMA is dedicated to the goal of providing funding for the rehabilitation, retraining and/or retirement of Thoroughbred horses that have raced in California.

Edwin Gregson Foundation – A nonprofit charitable foundation organized for the purpose of improving the lives of backstretch workers and their immediate family members at California race tracks. The organization provides backstretch workers with many educational programs, including "English as a second language," bible studies and provides numerous programs, including computer training programs at its recreation facility, computer games and various magazines in English and Spanish. It organizes family outings for the workers and their children, including trips to Magic Mountain in Valencia, California, Raging Waters, Galaxy soccer games, Dodger baseball games and excursions to the Long Beach Aquarium. The organization also maintains a recreational hall at Santa Anita Park for the benefit of the backside workers and their children.

Holy Angels Church (Backside Permanent Deacon) – Holy Angels Church is a Catholic Church across the street from Santa Anita Park. A deacon from the church performs a weekly Mass in the recreation room at the track on Monday nights for the workers on the backside. He walks down the shed rows daily in the morning and assists the workers in an endless variety of ways. Examples of the assistance provided include counseling, organizing religious and recreational activities, the collection and distribution of clothing, help with Medicare, Medi-Cal and immigration forms, officiating at holiday gatherings at Santa Anita, etc.

Racetrack Chaplaincy of America (Southern California Council) – The stated mission of the organization is "The overall mission of RTCA, through its councils and chaplains, is to make disciples for Jesus Christ through teaching, preaching, and ministering to the spiritual, emotional, physical, social, and educational needs of those persons involved in all aspects of the horse racing industry."

Southern California Equine Foundation, Inc. – SCEF is a nonprofit charitable organization providing hospital and equine ambulance services on the Southern California Thoroughbred racing circuit. Commonly known as the Equine Hospital, SCEF has a long history of service to the racing industry and the equine athlete. This is an organization "dedicated to the care of the injured horse."

Tranquility Farm – This organization is a 501(c)(3) charity whose principal activity is to accept the donation of Thoroughbred horses from the race tracks and breeding farms and whose goal is to give such horses the best opportunity to find an adoptive home. For those Thoroughbreds that are not readily adoptable, the organization offers comfortable retirement wherever possible, giving priority to horses that were significant competitors or producers. Tranquility Farm requests, but does not require, that owners contribute sponsorship to help defray the costs of rehabilitation and retraining. No horse is denied acceptance at Tranquility Farm based upon its owner's financial contribution.

United Pegasus Foundation – This is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization that aids the rescue of superannuated Thoroughbreds and provides care for such animals at its farm in Tehachapi, California. On occasion the organization purchases older horses at auction and acquires other Thoroughbreds at the request of owners and trainers. The retired Thoroughbreds are maintained in pleasant quarters and peaceful surroundings to live out the balance of their lives. This organization depends entirely upon donations for the purchase of food and other amenities required to maintain the Thoroughbreds.

Winners Foundation – The Winners Foundation provides confidential assistance on a one-to-one basis to employees and family members of California race tracks who are seeking help for alcohol, gambling and drug addiction. Each situation is geared to best support an individual's desire to change his or her life for the better. The Foundation has developed a large referral base and maintains close relationships with community based services such as anonymous 12 step groups, city and county assistance agencies, detox centers, halfway houses and out-patient and in-patient hospital treatment programs. This service is provided to any employee or family member of anyone involved in the California Thoroughbred horse racing community, free of charge. This includes backstretch workers, as well as all employees of Del Mar, Fairplex, Golden Gate Fields, Hollywood Park, Oak Tree, Santa Anita and the California Association of Racing Fairs.

Permanently Disabled Jockeys' Fund – This is a statutorily mandated distribution per Business and Professions Code Section 19556 (c). It provides support to disabled jockeys, as its name implies.

LICENSE RENEWAL FOR AMTOTE, THE TOTALIZATOR SELECTED BY SOUTHERN
CALIFORNIA OFF TRACK WAGERING, INCORPORATED (SCOTWINC) AND
NORTHERN CALIFORNIA OFF TRACK WAGERING, INCORPORATED (NCOTWINC),
TO PROVIDE CALIFORNIA WAGERING SERVICES AND THE IMPACT THE
SELECTION MAY HAVE ON CALIFORNIA RACING.

Regular Board Meeting
July 17, 2015

ISSUE

In December 2014, California horse racing industry stakeholders awarded AmTote International, Inc. (AmTote) the contract to provide totalizator services in California. AmTote is wholly owned by The Stronach Group, which also owns and operates Golden Gate Fields, Santa Anita Park, and Xpressbet, as well as numerous other entities involved in the horse racing industry.

AmTote presently holds a CHRB issued Totalizator Company license which will be up for renewal in September 2015. Accordingly, the renewal of AmTote's Totalizator Company license is before the Board for discussion and action.

BACKGROUND

The California horse racing industry enters into a contract every 10 years to provide totalizator services, which include providing all wagering equipment, the computer system to record and tabulate wagers, and other resources. The most recent two contracts were with Sportech and its predecessor Scientific Games. The current contract expires at the end of September 2015.

The industry formed a committee in May 2014 to develop a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a new contract. Upon issuance of the RFP, two bids were received—one from the current provider, Sportech, and the other from AmTote International, Inc. (AmTote), an 80-year-old company based in Maryland that develops software, manufactures hardware, and operates systems for pari-mutuel wagering and fixed-odds wagering operations around the world. AmTote is wholly owned by The Stronach Group.

After receiving these bids and hearing presentations, the industry stakeholders involved in the selection process accepted AmTote's proposal to provide totalizator services in California moving forward.

While AmTote's Totalizator Company license history dates back to 2004, the Board most recently received and approved a complete application from AmTote in 2012. On September 30, 2015, AmTote's license will be up for renewal once again. Accordingly, this item is before the Board to discuss AmTote's license renewal, and to decide whether or not to place conditions on its Totalizator Company license that the Board deems are appropriate and/or necessary.

ANALYSIS

Horse Racing Laws & Regulations Affecting Totalizator Providers:

Business and Professions Code section 19420 states jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board. Business and Professions Code section 19440 provides that the California Horse Racing Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out the purposes of this Chapter. Business and Professions Code section 19460 states that all licenses granted by the Board are subject to all rules, regulations, and conditions prescribed by the board and shall contain such conditions as are deemed necessary or desirable by the board. Business and Professions Code section 19433 further states that the board may visit, investigate, and place expert accountants and such other persons as it may deem necessary in the office, track, or other place of business of any licensee for the purpose of satisfying itself that its rules and regulations are strictly complied with. Additionally, Business and Professions Code section 19434 provides that the board may require that the books and financial or other statements of any person licensed under this chapter shall be kept in any manner which to the board may seem best.

In regard to totalizators, Business and Professions Code section 19592 states that the parimutuel system of wagering shall be operated only by a totalizator or other equipment approved by the board; that the board shall not require any particular make of equipment; and that the communications system, technology, and method used to accept wagers and transmit odds, results, and other data related to wagering shall be approved by the board. CHRB Rule 1440.5 describes the process for licensing a Totalizator Company as follows: [A Totalizator Company] shall procure the appropriate license by completing and submitting to the Board, CHRB-87 (Rev. 5/97), Application for License/Contractor or Sub-contractor, Application for Approval/Concessionaire which is hereby incorporated by reference, at least ninety (90) calendar days before the date the entity intends to commence business at live race meetings and/or simulcast wagering facilities and pay the required fee. Subsection (f) of that Rule further states that the Board may deny, suspend or revoke the license on grounds or reasons which include, but are not limited to, the following determinations:

- (1) The contractor/sub-contractor is ineligible to conduct business in this state pursuant to any federal or state statute.
- (2) The contractor/sub-contractor or any of its officers, directors, partners or principal management employees have engaged in any activity which is a grounds for denial, suspension or revocation of a license pursuant to this Division, or has failed, refused or neglected to comply with any Board order, rule, regulation, or order by the Board's Stewards reasonably related to its operations as a contractor/sub-contractor. The license shall remain denied, suspended or revoked until all parties of the licensee comply with the Board conditions. The remaining parties of the licensee shall not be prohibited from applying for a new license if compliance cannot be obtained from the offending party.

Furthermore, Rule 1964, Cooperation of Parimutuel Department, requires that the parimutuel manager and the representatives of any totalizator company or service providing parimutuel

equipment or service at any race meeting, shall cooperate fully in any investigation of the Board or in any proceedings before the Board relating to any parimutuel operation.

Licensing California's Totalizator Provider:

A totalizator company is required to obtain a license from the CHRB by submitting a CHRB-87, Application for License/Contractor or Sub-Contractor and a CHRB-25A, Personal History Record for each individual who is a director, officer, or partner in the application, or an owner of an interest in the applicant of 5% or more.

The initial application documents are received by the Board's administrative office and the documents are reviewed for completeness. Incomplete application documents are returned to the applicant for completion. Once the application requirements are met, the complete application documents are then reviewed and considered for approval by the CHRB Audit Unit, Enforcement Unit and the Assistant Executive Director. If the application is approved, the contractor is granted a one year license term.

If an application is denied, the applicant has thirty (30) calendar days from the receipt date of the Board's denial notification, to request a reconsideration of the Board's decision. The request must be in writing and sent to the Board's Administrative office. The Board shall respond in writing to the reconsideration request within thirty (30) working days from the receipt of the request.

The renewal process for licensing of contractors and sub-contractors requires the applicant to identify if any changes have occurred since the last license approval. If there have been no changes the applicant notes such on the renewal form. If there have been changes since the last license approval, the applicant is required to attach a detailed explanation of all changes. The renewal documents are reviewed for completeness and then forwarded to the CHRB Audit Unit, Enforcement Unit and the Assistant Executive Director for review and approval.

AmTote presently holds a CHRB issued Totalizator Company license, which is up for renewal at the end of September 2015. This date also coincides with the end of Sportech's totalizator contract, and it is staff's understanding that the transition from Sportech to AmTote will occur at this time.

Potential Conditions the Board May Place on AmTote International's License:

CHRB staff notes that AmTote is a subsidiary company of The Stronach Group, which owns and operates multiple racetracks in California, the ADW company Xpressbet, Horse Racing TV, and numerous other entities involved in the horse racing industry. Given The Stronach Group's widespread influence over California horse racing, staff is concerned about the potential for undisclosed and otherwise problematic interactions between the company's numerous subsidiaries and AmTote. In an attempt to address these concerns, staff has identified a number of potential conditions the Board may place on AmTote's license to satisfy itself that all CHRB laws and regulations are being complied with. These options include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Require AmTote to submit current information and documents as required of a first time totalizator license applicant.
2. Require all officers, directors, and employees of AmTote disclose their relationships to each of the various Stronach Group horse racing related entities.
3. Require that certain transparency standards be met by AmTote including, but not limited to, disclosure of Board of Director meeting minutes, financial documents, current corporate structure and all requests by any entities seeking direct access to the totalizator site, as well as any other information as the Board may request.
4. Require that AmTote not have any ownership interest in any robotic wagering company or other similar wagering entity.
5. Require that AmTote report the details of any winning ticket with a certain minimum payoff within a set amount of time, which shall include but not be limited to the origin of the wager (ADW, satellite, on-track, etc.), base amount of the ticket, and any other relevant information.

Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY FAIR AT LOS ALAMITOS RACE COURSE SEPTEMBER 10 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 25, 2015.

Los Angeles County Fair (LACF) filed its application to conduct a horse racing meeting at Los Alamitos Race Course September 10 through September 25, 2015, or 10 days; one day less than 2014. LACF proposes to race a total of 84 races; 22 races less than 2014.

- The proposed race dates are the approved dates allocated to the fair.

Pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19604, specific provisions must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.



The main race track lighting system is comprised of (976) 1000 watt 277 volt metal halogen light fixtures. The emergency lighting system is comprised of (305) 1500 watt quartz light fixtures. If the main system experiences a brief loss or interruption of power the metal halogen lights will fail. Due to the type of fixture they may take up to 20 minutes to reach full illumination. In the event of an interruption of this type the back-up emergency quartz lighting system automatically comes on. This happens instantly and the back-up emergency system can remain on for up to 90 minutes.

CHRB Item 15.1 – Explanation of lack of paramedic staff

Unlike Los Angeles County, which allows for the licensing of private paramedic services, all paramedic services in Orange County fall under the jurisdiction of the Orange County Health Care Agency, Department of Emergency Medical Services and that agency does not license private paramedic services within the county.

All paramedic services within Orange County are provided by the Orange County Fire Authority and there is no provision within current guidelines that allow for OCFA units to be staged for activities of private events such as horse racing.

Because of this guideline, all racing events at Los Alamitos are covered by two fully equipped ambulances staffed by state certified EMT's. These EMT's and our ambulance service also fall under the jurisdiction of the Orange County Emergency Medical Services and our operations at the track are reviewed on an annual basis. I have included our last review with the suggestions of OCEMS which have been implemented by our track.


It is important to note that while our track is not covered by paramedics, the protocol for having paramedics on the scene in case of an accident has been reviewed and approved by the OCEMS.

The nearest paramedic staffed fire station to Los Alamitos Race Course is literally across the street. This proximity is no accident. The OCEMS will tell you that the site was chosen for the specific reason of its proximity to the race track.

In case of an accident that requires paramedic response, our Huntington Ambulance EMT's will stabilize the patient and will meet the OCFA paramedic unit at the pre-designated location directly across the street from the fire station. This location is accessed through a gate on our backstretch that we have shown on the enclosed graphic.

Not only does the OCEMS approve of this system, as you can see from our latest review, they believe having experienced EMT's handle the initial care of the jockey before handing the patient off to paramedics has benefits.

Dear Brad:

After visits to the Los Alamitos horse racing facility, reviewing patient care reports, and using input from jockeys, trainers, track administration, the current ambulance provider, paramedics at the nearest OCFA fire station and agency staff, Orange County Emergency Medical Services is comfortable with the current provider continuing to provide ambulance transportation and medical care at Los Alamitos Race Track.

We would make the following recommendations to improve the track EMS operations:

1. Ensure track personnel activate the 9-1-1 system immediately using the tower observer (steward, etc.) on every call in which a jockey falls at high speed during racing or training.
2. Require that all contract ambulance employees complete and maintain certification in the 16 hour International Trauma Life Support course, or an equivalent, along with their EMT, CPR etc. Statewide, many paramedics and EMTs have not taken this certification but it is especially appropriate for track medical personnel whose main focus will be on patients for whom mechanism of injury is often high speed trauma.
3. Educate the jockeys on Orange County EMS trauma policies that require that all patients who fall at full gallop/racing/training speed be transported to a designated Orange County Trauma Center for evaluation and treatment.
4. Consider that the contracted ambulance provider have on every transport unit an 800 MHz radio available capable of direct communication with responding Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA) personnel. Contract ambulance staff would also receive training on operating this radio.
5. Consider the contract ambulance provider participate in the Orange County Medical Emergency Data System (OC-MEDS) which is a web-based, electronic Patient Care Report system to ensure compliance with OC EMS triage and treatment policies. The current call volume (1-3/month) is low enough that the provider would not have to buy additional hardware. Access and manual data entry of the patient care record can be done on any internet connected computer.
6. The ambulance provider, in conjunction with Race Track management, could coordinate with OCFA an orientation meeting with one of the three OCFA shifts at the closest fire station each month. Initial orientation should include the identification of the entry gate at the parking lot adjoining the track; track operations unique physiological characteristics of the jockeys such as, dehydration, etc.)

7. OC EMS could coordinate an annual safety briefing with jockeys/trainers at which contract ambulance personnel explain (in Spanish, or with translators) the care patients receive on the track, in the ambulance or at the hospital - including a spinal immobilization demonstration, description of the capabilities of a trauma center, etc.)
8. The ambulance provider will have AEDs on the two transport vehicles at the racetrack and EMTs will be trained in their use.

As we discussed at the track, the first 5-10 minutes of most trauma calls are focused on the Basic Life Support skills of stabilizing the patient's airway and spine, evaluating for injuries and packaging them for transport.

At this time, intermediate techniques such as the Combitube are controversial in an urban setting, especially when the nearest Advanced Life Support fire station is less than a half mile away.

We believe there is a benefit to having horse-racing-specific EMS personnel who are familiar with track operations, personnel and geography.





EMERGENCY MEDICAL PROCEDURES FOR ON-TRACK INJURY TO JOCKEYS

FIRST RESPONSE

*In the event of an accident, the LARA Trackside Human Ambulance which follows each race and is staffed by state certified EMT's will respond immediately to the location of the accident. *EMT's will make an evaluation of the injuries and if deemed necessary they will call for the Security Dept. to call for Paramedics. The Security Dept. communications desk is manned at all times during racing hours.

ON SITE EVALUATION AND JOCKEY PROTOCOL

- o If involved in a spill during a race, regardless of how serious the jockey deems the spill to be, they are instructed that if it is safe and they are clear of any loose horses they are to remain as still as possible until instructed to move by the EMT's.
- o If EMT's request that the jockey be stabilized and placed on a backboard, jockeys are instructed to comply with that request or risk disciplinary action.
- o If Paramedics are called the injured jockey will be stabilized and taken to meet Paramedics at the pre-designated location just outside of the Los Alamitos back fence. The OC Fire Paramedics will then evaluate the injuries and determine whether or not the injured rider should be transported to a trauma hospital.
- o If the injuries are not deemed serious by either the EMT's or Paramedics, the rider will be directed either to a local emergency room or the Track Physician for evaluation. It will be the policy of the Track Doctor that with the exception of the most minor accidents the injured jockey be evaluated immediately by an emergency room doctor in a medical setting. Should a jockey refuse treatment recommendations from EMT's, Paramedics or the Track Doctor, they will be required to sign a Refusal of Medical Treatment form and their ability to continue riding on that day's program will be determined by the CHRB Stewards.
- o In the case of multiple injuries in a single race, the two fully staffed and equipped track ambulances that are on site for every race will respond and will immediately call the Security Dept. to call for the necessary number of Paramedic backup. In this case paramedic units will be instructed to enter the track through the backstretch gate which is unlocked at all times.

San Joaquin County Fair proposes to race a total of 70 races, the same number of races as 2014. San Joaquin County Fair will only simulcast racing on September 9, 10, 16, and 17.

Pursuant to the Interstate Horseracing Act and applicable California law, the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) agrees to the use of California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) race signals under the terms and conditions set forth below.

CARF shall be permitted to transmit race signal to California-licensed ADW providers TVG, Xpressbet, TwinSpire (subject to arbitration), WatchandWager and Bet America to accept wagers on CARF and other Thoroughbred races during the 2015 CARF race meeting commencing June 17, 2015 and continuing through October 19, 2015, as follows:

1. **California wagering on CARF races:**
 - a. TVG, XpressBet, and TwinSpire (subject to arbitration), may deduct a Hub Fee of 5.0% of gross handle.
 - b. WatchandWager and Bet America may deduct a Hub Fee of 4.2% of gross handle.
 - c. The remainder of the takeout shall be distributed in conformity with the Market Access Fee provisions of California law (Section 19604 et seq).
2. **California wagering on out-of-state Thoroughbred races:**
 - a. TVG, XpressBet, and TwinSpire (subject to arbitration), may deduct a Hub Fee of 5.0% of gross handle.
 - b. WatchandWager and Bet America may deduct a Hub Fee of 4.2% of gross handle.
 - c. The remainder of the takeout shall be distributed in conformity with the Market Access Fee provisions of California law (Section 19604 et seq).
3. **Out-of-state wagering on CARF races:**
 - a. TVG, XpressBet, and TwinSpire (subject to arbitration), shall pay a Host Fee of no less than 8.5% (plus a 1.25% California Purse Fee per SB 1072) of gross out-of-state handle wagered by out-of-state account holders.
 - b. WatchandWager and Bet America shall pay a Host Fee of no less than 60% of takeout (which includes a 1.25% California purse fee per SB 1072) of gross out-of-state handle wagered by out-of-state account holders.

This agreement in no way binds TOC to the same terms and conditions with respect to future race meetings. TOC's authorization shall not serve, nor should it be construed as, a precedent to future requests for permission to transmit race signals, and facilitate wagering on those signals, to the ADW providers specified herein or to any other ADW provider. TOC reserves the right to cancel or withdraw its authorization for any ADW provider, at any time, upon 48 hours written notice. These terms and conditions are subject to receipt by TOC of written confirmation of these terms, signed by authorized representatives of TVG, Xpressbet, TwinSpire, WatchandWager and Bet America.



Staffing

Two Paramedics, from American Medical Response, are located in an on-track ambulance that follows at a safe distance from the horses racing during each race. This ambulance and crew are present whenever horses are on the track (during both racing and training hours) and are responsible for initiating basic life support measures, including immediate medical stabilization, care, and evacuation to medical care facilities.

The on site first aid facility contains all equipment and supplies necessary for advanced life support of any emergency. The facility is staffed by paramedics and EMT's.

Licensed Physician on duty is responsible for care on an ongoing basis of jockeys, track staff, and allied personnel requiring non-emergency medical care.







A qualified and licensed physician shall be on duty at all times during live racing, except that this provision shall not apply to any quarter horse racing at the racetrack if there is a hospital situated no more than 1.5 miles from the racetrack and the racetrack has an agreement with the hospital to provide emergency medical services to jockeys and riders. An ambulance licensed to operate on public highways provided by the track shall be available at all times during live racing and shall be staffed by two emergency medical technicians licensed in accordance with Division 2.5 (commencing with Section 1797) of the Health and Safety Code, one of whom may be an Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic, as defined in Section 1797.84 of the Health and Safety Code. (b) Each racing association and racing fair shall adopt and maintain an emergency medical plan detailing the procedures that shall be used in the event of an on-track injury. The plan shall be posted in each jockey room in English and Spanish. (c) Prior to every race meeting, the racing association or racing fair shall contact area hospitals to coordinate procedures for the rapid admittance and treatment of emergency injuries. (d) Each racing association or racing fair shall designate a health and safety manager and assistant manager, who shall be responsible for compliance with the provisions of this section and one of whom shall be on duty at all times when live racing is conducted. The health and safety manager may, at the discretion of the racing association, be the person designated to perform risk management duties on behalf of the association.

14F Medical Protocols and Procedures: English

In case of an accident on the racetrack, the following procedures shall be implemented:

Track Ambulance

The track ambulance will travel immediately to the scene of an accident and assume triage and patient care responsibilities and evacuated.

Security

1. As soon as possible, a member of the track security staff shall report to the scene of the accident and thereafter take direction from the EMT responsible for management of the accident scene. The track security representative shall be responsible for keeping bystanders away from the accident scene.
2. A member of the track security staff shall proceed to the Jockey's Room to secure the ambulance transfer area, as well as prevent visitation from bystanders from entering the accident area.
3. A member of the track security staff shall be responsible for escorting emergency vehicles.
4. The security staff shall be responsible for all crowd control activities.

Racing Staff/Track Veterinarian

1. Upon arrival at the scene, the Outrider should hold the injured horse in order to prevent further harm to people, horses or property.
2. Horses with severe injuries should be transported off the track via the horse ambulance, whenever it is practical to do so.
3. The track veterinarian shall make the decision as to the necessity of euthanasia on the track.
4. A screen blocking the public's view of the injured horse shall be set up prior to the euthanasia procedure.
5. Outriders are responsible for the removal of any debris from the racetrack following the removal of the injured person or horse from the track.

Plant Staff

1. The Horse Ambulance shall travel immediately to the scene of an accident whenever it appears that a horse will require transport.
2. Members of the plant department who are near the accident site shall assist in screening the accident scene from the public view and shall take direction from the EMT that is responsible that is responsible for the management of the accident scene.

Announcer

1. The announcer shall make riders aware of the details of the situation (such as the location of a loose horse, the necessity to pull up, etc.), enabling them to take the necessary steps to mitigate additional problems.

Senior Management

1. A senior management representative should quickly proceed to the location on the racetrack where the accident has occurred. The manager should report to other members of the management team as to the accident status.
2. An additional member of the management team should report to the video department in order to monitor the scene and access the extent of video coverage to be transmitted to the public.
3. A member of the management team should provide input as to announcements to be made by the track announcer.
4. A member of the senior management team should be responsible for seeing that information regarding the accident is communicated to the family member of the injurec. Efforts need to be made to escort family members to the hospital, if necessary. In this regard, a current compilation as to who should be notified in the case of an injured jockey is kept on file.
5. All public address announcements and responses to press inquiries are within the sole purview of the senior members of the management team then available.

All Department Heads

All department heads shall communicate to their employees that, although intentions are good, the treatment of the injured rider must be left up to trained personnel, and all other employees must stay away from the scene of an accident.



Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES TURF CLUB II, INC. AT SANTA ANITA SEPTEMBER 26, 2015 THROUGH OCTOBER 25, 2015.

Los Angeles Turf Club II (LATC II) filed its application to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Santa Anita September 26, 2015, through October 25, 2015, or 19 days; four days less than 2014. LATC II proposes to race a total of 160 races, or 8.42 races per day. In 2014, LATC II ran 8.96 races per day with an average of 8.66 runners per race. The average daily purse for the 2014 race meeting was \$508,485. The (estimated) average daily purse for this meet is \$487,977.

The County of Los Angeles submitted a Housing Official Inspection Report (housing report) from an inspection performed at Santa Anita May 26, 2015 through May 28, 2015. The housing report provides that corrective action and a follow-up inspection are required. Board Rule 2102, Backstretch Worker Housing Inspection Required, subsection (c) provides no license to conduct a horse racing meeting shall be issued unless the applicant association's backstretch worker housing is found to be in compliance with the standards established. Los Angeles County is scheduled to re-inspect the facility September 30, 2015.

 - \$0.50 PNP4 Starting the second race and the last four live races. Alternate runner provision.
 - \$0.50 PNP5 starting the first race; minimum wager fifty cents, 14% takeout. One tier payoff; 100% carryover.
 - \$1 Pentafecta selecting the first five finishers in a same race. 100% payout on all tickets selecting five winners. No consolation; 100% carryover if no ticket has five winners. Super High-5 will be carded as last race of the day.
- Business and Professions Code section 19464(b) specifies no application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting shall be granted unless the applicant has deposited with the Board a surety bond in the amount of \$100,000, or a greater amount, as determined by the Board, which is sufficient to ensure payment of employees wages and benefits including, but not limited to, health, welfare and pension plans. The surety bond shall be maintained during the period of the meeting that all payments are made. In the event of a dispute over the amount owed, the dispute shall be resolved through the grievance procedures set forth in the labor agreement of the union representing the class of employees affected.

This subdivision does not apply to any person or association licensed to operate a horse race meeting prior to January 1, 2001, which has conducted a race meeting in each of the immediate three previous consecutive calendar years.

LATC II initial race meeting was conducted after 2001. Therefore, it is subject to the provisions of the Business and Professions Code section 19464(b).

Pursuant to Business and Profession Code 19464(b) LATC II is required to submit a \$100,000 surety bond payable to the Treasurer of the State of California to ensure payment of employee wages and benefits. The LATC II \$100,000 surety bond currently on file will expire September 28, 2015; therefore, an updated bond will be required prior to the start of the race meeting.

- The Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) providers are Xpressbet, TwinSpires, TVG, Watch and Wager, and Bet America.

Pursuant to Business and Profession Code section 19604, specific provisions must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers.

Summary of Business and Professions Code section 19604

To accept wagers on races conducted in California from a resident of California.

- The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.
- The agreement shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made.

To accept wagers on races conducted outside of California from a resident of California.

- The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
- There is a hub agreement between the ADW provider and one or both of (i) one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing on the breed on which wagering is conducted during the calendar year during which the wager is placed, and (ii) the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which wagering is conducted.

Monarch Content Management, LLC (MCM), has shared that “The contracts signed in 2014 with TwinSpires is still in effect. Section 16 of the simulcast agreement states in pertinent part: “In the event Monarch permits Guest to continue wagering on Monarch Content after the expiration of the Term without entering into a new agreement, then the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall remain in effect.”



Electronic Security System

The electronic security system consists of video cameras with the ability to pan, tilt and zoom remotely. Camera monitors and control points are managed from secure locations. Digital recordings are maintained on hard drives.







FOR ON-TRACK INJURY TO JOCKEYS

“FIRST RESPONSE”

- In the event of an accident, LATC Trakside Human Ambulance “Unit 41T “ which is manned by LATC-contracted EMTs and is following the horses and jockeys in the race will respond immediately to the site of the accident. The attending EMT’s shall arrive equipped with basic cardiac life support (BCLS), AED, and full C-spine equipment
- An “on-site evaluation” of injuries to the jockey(s) shall be made by Unit 41T.



“ON-SITE EVALUATION”

- Based on the EMT’s “on-site evaluation” of injuries , a decision shall be made to either treat the injured jockey(s) on-site or to transport to Methodist Hospital Emergency Room.
 - If on-site treatment is deemed sufficient, Unit 41T shall transport the injured jockey(s) directly to the First Aid Office where the Track Physician will be primary care provider or,
 - If off-site treatment is deemed necessary Unit 41 will have the Security Department (channel 1) contact the emergency room and advised them of the situation. Unit 41 will then transport jockey(s) to Methodist Hospital Emergency Room.



“INJURY TREATMENT”

- If the injured jockey(s) is treated at the First Aid Office the Track Physician shall be the primary care provider unless or until the Track Physician surrenders custody of the patient based on his/her medical judgment;





THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO
CHRB RULE 1699, RIDING RULES, AS IT PERTAINS TO THE CRITERIA FOR
DISQUALIFICATION IN A HORSE RACE.

Regular Board Meeting
July 17, 2015

BACKGROUND

CHRB Rule 1699, Riding Rules, reads as follows:

During the running of the race:

- (a) A leading horse is entitled to any part of the course but when another horse is attempting to pass in a clear opening the leading horse shall not cross over so as to compel the passing horse to shorten its stride.
- (b) A horse shall not interfere with or cause any other horse to lose stride, ground or position in a part of the race where the horse loses the opportunity to place where it might be reasonably expected to finish.
- (c) A horse which interferes with another and thereby causes any other horse to lose stride, ground or position, when such other horse is not at fault and when such interference occurs in a part of the race where the horse interfered with loses the opportunity to place where it might, in the opinion of the Stewards, be reasonably expected to finish, may be disqualified and placed behind the horse so interfered with.
- (d) Jockeys shall not ride carelessly, or willfully, so as to permit their mount to interfere with or impede any other horse.
- (e) Jockeys shall not willfully strike or strike at another horse or jockey so as to impede, interfere with, intimidate, or injure.
- (f) If a jockey rides in a manner contrary to this rule, the mount may be disqualified and the jockey may be suspended or otherwise disciplined by the Stewards.

The Stewards' Committee has reviewed Rule 1699, Riding Rules, at its March 2014 meeting, its November 2014 meeting, and then again at its June 2015 meeting. The rule has also been discussed by the Board at its November 19, 2014 Regular Meeting as well as its February 18, 2015 Regular Meeting in an effort to determine whether the current rule could be improved upon, and perhaps provide more clearly defined guidelines for stewards conducting inquiries.

ANALYSIS

Discussions regarding Rule 1699 have almost always focused on the wording that requires stewards to form opinions as to whether interference occurred and, if so, whether the interference cost the horse or horses interfered with a placing. Suggested alternatives to amend the rule have historically included:

- 1) amending Rule 1699 to state that any foul is cause for disqualification regardless of whether it cost a horse a placing;
- 2) eliminating the references to location (i.e. "a part of the race) and changing the "placing" reference to something broader, such as "affecting a horse's performance in a negative way"; and
- 3) adding language that gives the benefit of any doubt to the aggrieved party (i.e. the horse interfered with).

At its June 2015 meeting, the Stewards' Committee again reviewed proposed amendments to Rule 1699 suggested by commissioners as well as the Board's Executive Director. The newest version proposed by the Executive Director received support from the majority of stewards in California, and is attached for discussion and action. These latest proposed amendments seek to better define "interference," and also limit the stewards' ability to disqualify a horse in only those situations where the horse interfered with lost the opportunity for a better placing according to the distribution of the purse or the order of finish in a trial heat. Additionally, the amendments require stewards to issue enhanced penalties against jockeys who commit multiple infractions within a 90-day period or who jeopardize the safety of another horse or jockey.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action.

During the running of the race:

~~(a) A leading horse is entitled to any part of the course but when another horse is attempting to pass in a clear opening the leading horse shall not cross over so as to compel the passing horse to shorten its stride.~~

~~(b)(a) A horse shall not interfere with or cause any other horse. Interference is defined as bumping, impeding, forcing or floating in or out or otherwise causing any other horse to lose stride, ground, momentum or position in a part of the race where the horse loses the opportunity to place where it might be reasonably expected to finish.~~

~~(e)(b) A horse which interferes with another as defined in subsection (a) and thereby causes any other horse to lose stride, ground or position, when such other horse is not at fault and when such interference occurs in a part of the race where the horse interfered with loses the opportunity to place where it might, in the opinion of the Stewards, be reasonably expected to finish, may be disqualified and placed behind the horse so interfered with if, in the opinion of the Stewards, the horse interfered with was not at fault and due to the interference lost the opportunity for a better placing according to the distribution of the purse or the order of finish in a trial heat.~~

~~(d)~~(c) Jockeys shall not ride carelessly, or willfully, so as to permit their mount to interfere with or impede any other horse.

~~(e)~~(d) Jockeys shall not willfully strike or strike at another horse or jockey so as to impede, interfere with, intimidate, or injure.

~~(f)~~(e) If a jockey rides in a manner contrary to this rule, the mount may be disqualified and the jockey may be suspended or otherwise disciplined by the Stewards.

(f) When penalizing a jockey for riding contrary to this rule, the Stewards shall issue a greater penalty for (1) more than one infraction of this rule by the jockey within any contiguous 90 day calendar period or (2) any infraction which, in the opinion of the stewards, jeopardized the safety of another horse or jockey.

WINNERS FOUNDATION

ISSUE

The Winners Foundation is a non-profit organization that for 30 years has provided counseling and referral support to employees in the California horse racing industry and their families. Its purpose is to assist men and women whose personal and professional lives are being adversely affected as a result of substance abuse, compulsive gambling, or mental health issues.

Founded in 1985 by Louis Rowan, a prominent horseman and founder of the Oak Tree Racing Association, who recognized the need for a program to work with backstretch workers with nowhere else to turn, the Winners Foundation began with 12-step meetings in a trailer in the stable area at Santa Anita Park. The organization has evolved into a vital service to the California horse racing industry providing information, support, and referral services for problems with alcohol and drug abuse, uncontrolled gambling, mental health, family instability, and other difficulties faced by employees and their families.

The Winners Foundation works closely with racetrack stewards and investigators with the California Horse Racing Board – in a constructive manner for the benefit of all concerned. With five employees serving an average of two hundred clients a year, and with a presence at all racetracks and training facilities in the state, the Winners Foundation depends largely on donations from individuals and industry organizations to supplement the small portion of ADW revenue it receives pursuant to statute.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19604(f) provides that an amount equal to 0.0003 multiplied by the amount handled on advance deposit wagers originating in California for each racing meeting shall be distributed to the Public Employment Relations Board to cover costs associated with audits conducted pursuant to Section 19526 and for purposes of reimbursing the State Mediation and Conciliation Service for costs incurred pursuant to this section. However, if that amount would exceed the costs of the Public Employment Relations Board, the amount distributed to that board shall be reduced, and that reduction shall be forwarded to an organization designated by the racing association or fair described in subdivision (a) for the purpose of augmenting a compulsive gambling prevention program specifically addressing that problem.

RECOMMENDATION

Representatives of the Winners Foundation are prepared to provide a status report on their finances and ongoing operations.

ISSUE

The Northern California Race Dates and Stabling Oversight Committee (Committee) met on June 19, 2015 to discuss the allocation of the 2016 Northern California race date allocations and related issues. Prior to the meeting the industry was asked to submit proposed 2016 Northern California race dates in preparation for discussion regarding 2016 Northern California race date allocations. The California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) submitted a 2016 Northern California racing calendar for its member fairs, with inclusive date requests for the fairs. The CARF proposal included proposed 2016 race dates for Pacific Racing Association (PRA) at Golden Gate Fields. Sonoma County Fair at Santa Rosa submitted its proposed 2016 race dates request. Cal Expo Harness Racing Association (Cal Expo Harness) and California Exposition and State Fair (Cal Expo) also requested 2016 race dates. PRA submitted a 2016 Northern California Race Dates request that also included proposed fair race dates. In addition, Commissioner Beneto submitted two proposals for 2016 Northern California race dates.

At the June 25, 2015 Regular Board Meeting, Chairman Winner urged the northern stakeholders to continue their discussions in an effort to reach consensus.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19530 provides the Board the authority to allocate racing weeks to an applicant pursuant to the provisions of the horse racing law and to specify such racing days, dates, and hours for horse racing meetings as will be in the public interest, and will subserve the purposes of the law. Business and Professions Code section 19531 states the Board shall make allocations for racing weeks, including simultaneous racing between zones as it deems appropriate. The maximum number of racing weeks that may be allocated for horse racing other than at fairs, shall be as follows: (a) For thoroughbred racing: 44 weeks per year in the northern zone; 42 weeks per year in the central zone; and seven weeks per year in the southern zone. (b) For harness racing: 25 weeks per year in the northern zone. (c) For quarter horse racing: 25 weeks per year in the northern zone. (d) For harness racing and quarter horse racing: a total of 77 weeks per year in the combined central and southern zones. Business and Professions Code section 19532(a) specifies any association licensed to conduct thoroughbred racing in the northern zone may receive no more than 35 weeks of that racing. (b) Any association licensed to conduct thoroughbred racing in the central zone may receive no more than 17 weeks of that racing, except that any association which conducts a split meeting may receive up to 20 weeks of that racing. No more than one such split meeting may be licensed in any one year. Business and Professions Code section 19549 provides the maximum

number of racing weeks that may be allocated to a fair shall be four weeks each, except under specified conditions.

Board Rule 1430, Allocation of Racing Weeks and Dates, states the Board shall allocate racing weeks and dates for the conduct of horse racing in this State for such time periods and at such racing facilities as the Board determines will best subserve the purposes of the Horse Racing Law and which will be in the best interests of the people of California in accord with the intent of the Horse Racing Law.

RECOMMENDATION



On behalf of the California Exposition & State Fair, we fully support the letter from CARF dated May 5, 2016, outlining a desired calendar for 2016. By way of further clarification we respectfully request the below listed dates for California State Fair Racing and Watch & Wager LLC Harness Racing for 2016.

1. California State Fair Racing- July 13 to July 31, 2016

The above requested inclusive period would be concurrent with the three weeks of the 2016 State Fair and would consist of approximately 11 Live Race days. This 11 day format is consistent with the State Fair's 2015 Race Dates. The State Fair race meet promotional, advertising and marketing efforts will again be part of the overall State Fair package which includes expenditures in excess of \$1,000,000. Of particular note, the 2014 State Fair recently was recognized with the "Best Marketing Campaign Award" for the 16 county Northern California region.

2. Possible Thoroughbred Racing at Cal Expo outside of the State Fair Dates

As noted at last month's Board Meeting, the potential sale of Golden Gate Fields for private development has been in the news at least four times in the past 10 years. Since two of California's four privately owned tracks have been sold for commercial development in recent years, as suggested by CHRB Commissioners, it is prudent that the racing industry develop "what if Golden Gate Fields closes" options for Northern California racing calendars. While Cal Expo recognizes and appreciates the valuable role that Golden Gate Fields plays in California racing, we agree with the wisdom of the CHRB Commissioners in suggesting that futuristic alternative racing calendars be explored whereby Fairs might be the only facilities left in Northern California. So that the industry can better plan for an unknown future, Cal Expo is open to hosting additional Thoroughbred racing dates in the Spring and Fall, in addition to its three weeks of racing in July as part of the Annual State Fair.

Of note is that Cal Expo's Racing Grandstand is winterized and already accommodates thousands of fans each winter during inclement weather. Cal Expo's race track also has night lighting around its track to accommodate racing after dark. Additionally, Cal

Expo has invested over \$1,200,000 in beneficial improvements to its racing infrastructure in the past two years.

3. Cal Expo Harness Racing- December 26, 2015 to December 24, 2016

As the landlord of the current Harness Racing Meet, operated and managed by Watch & Wager LLC, and on their behalf, we are requesting the allocation of harness racing dates at Cal Expo for the above listed inclusive period.

This request consists of two separate Racing Meetings for the approximate periods of December 26, 2015 through May 15, 2016 and October 1, 2016 through December 25, 2016.

Our request includes approximately 80 Live Harness Racing days on a Friday and Saturday night schedule. We respectfully request your approval to readdress this request dependent upon the overall California racing schedule.

Watch & Wager LLC has indicated that its overall promotional, marketing, and advertising efforts will consist of increased on track participation and fan support, along with increased visibility at off track and ADW platforms.

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE ALLOCATION OF THE
2016 SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA RACE DATES
AND RELATED ISSUES

Regular Board Meeting
July 17, 2015

ISSUE

The Southern California Race Dates and Stabling Oversight Committee met on June 25, 2015. The industry was asked to submit proposed 2016 Southern California race dates in preparation for discussions regarding the 2016 Southern California race date allocations. Los Angeles Turf Club (LATC) and the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (DMTC) submitted a joint 2016 Southern California racing calendar. The joint proposal provides that DMTC would not run the day after Labor Day, which will allow Los Alamitos Race Course (LARC) to open its September 2016 race meeting one day earlier. The submitted calendars differed primarily in their proposed allocations of daytime thoroughbred dates to LARC.

At the June 25, 2015 Regular Board Meeting, Chairman Winner urged the Southern California stakeholders to continue their discussions in an effort to reach consensus. Since the June 2015 Regular Board Meeting, the various stakeholders have continued their discussions. LARC has withdrawn the proposed racing schedule it originally submitted and has provided a new 2016 Southern California racing schedule. LARC stated its new proposed 2016 racing schedule is based on a racing schedule submitted by California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT), and addresses the concerns of the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), specifically that a 2016 racing schedule should not contemplate a four week period without turf racing. Thus, the four week LARC meeting in June and July 2016, suggested by CTT, has been reduced to three weeks, and the extra week ceded to LATC. The LARC proposed 2016 racing schedule also has LARC racing for two weeks following the DMTC fall meeting and Christmas.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19530 provides the Board the authority to allocate racing weeks to an applicant pursuant to the provisions of the horse racing law and to specify such racing days, dates, and hours for horse racing meetings as will be in the public interest, and will subserve the purposes of the law. Business and Professions Code section 19531 states the Board shall make allocations for racing weeks, including simultaneous racing between zones as it deems appropriate. The maximum number of racing weeks that may be allocated for horse racing other than at fairs, shall be as follows: (a) For thoroughbred racing: 44 weeks per year in the northern zone; 42 weeks per year in the central zone; and seven weeks per year in the southern zone. (b) For harness racing: 25 weeks per year in the northern zone. (c) For quarter horse racing: 25 weeks per year in the northern zone. (d) For harness racing and quarter horse racing: a total of 77 weeks per year in the combined central and southern zones. Business and Professions Code section 19532(a) specifies any association licensed to conduct thoroughbred racing in the northern zone may receive no more than 35 weeks of that racing. (b) Any association licensed to conduct thoroughbred racing in the central zone may receive no more than 17 weeks of that racing, except that any association which conducts a split meeting may receive up to 20 weeks of that racing. No more than one such split meeting may be licensed in any one year. Business and Professions Code section 19549 provides the maximum number of racing weeks that may be allocated to a fair shall be four weeks each, except under specified conditions.

Board Rule 1430, Allocation of Racing Weeks and Dates, states the Board shall allocate racing

weeks and dates for the conduct of horse racing in this State for such time periods and at such racing facilities as the Board determines will best subserve the purposes of the Horse Racing Law and which will be in the best interests of the people of California in accord with the intent of the Horse Racing Law.
