MINUTES

Chairman Shapiro asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of April 19, 2007.

Vice-Chairman Harris stated he had a correction to page 13 of the minutes. He said he intended to say retired racehorses could be retrained "in other equine uses" rather than "in other aspects of racing." Chairman Shapiro stated the minutes would be so corrected.

Commissioner Amerman **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT "SONOMA SOLANO WINE COUNTRY RACING," A COMBINED HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE SOLANO COUNTY FAIR (F) AT VALLEJO FROM JULY 11 THROUGH JULY 15, 2007, INCLUSIVE, AND THE SONOMA COUNTY FAIR (F) AT SANTA ROSA FROM JULY 18 THROUGH AUGUST 16, 2007, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Solano County Fair Association (SCFA) and the Sonoma County Fair and Exposition (SCFE) filed an application to conduct Sonoma Solano Wine Country Racing, which would be a combined horse racing meeting. Ms. Wagner stated the first race meeting would commence at SCFA July 11 through July 15, 2007, and continue

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at the SCFE July 18 through August 6, 2007, for a total of 23 days of racing. The combined meeting would hold 244 races, or 55 at SCFA and 189 at SCFE. The first post time for SCFA would be 12:35 p.m. and the first post time for SCFE would be 12:45 p.m. Ms. Wagner stated the staff analysis indicated the vanning and stabling agreement was missing, and staff recommended the Board approve the application contingent upon receipt of the missing information. Vice-Chairman Harris said he was concerned the overall stakes program was fairly light. The fairs historically represented a lot of great stakes opportunities for California horsemen, so the problem needed to be worked out with the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC). In addition, it looked like the number of stakes races designated Cal-bred was below the 10 percent requirement. He added he hoped the fairs, in general, would revisit their stakes program. Chairman Shapiro asked how the \$2,746,000 in purse estimates compared with 2006 when the meetings were not combined. Jim Moore of SCFE said in 2006 there was an overpayment of approximately \$100,000, so the purses were down. The shortfall was primarily at SCFE. Vice-Chairman Harris stated it would seem that combining the meetings could generate more handle. He asked if that was factored into the equation. Mr. More said the fairs hoped that would be the case, but as they had never combined race meetings, the additional week at SCFE was not factored into the purse projections. The fairs believed if they gambled and ended up overpaying purses in 2007, the next year would be much more painful. Vice-Chairman Harris asked if the advertising program was energized to reflect the three weeks of racing at SCFE. Joe Barkett of SCFA said there would be more advertising in San Francisco to lure fans from the Bay Area. In addition, the local population would also see advertising. Chairman Shapiro stated he noticed a win-place-show competition

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after the eighth race. He asked what that was about. Mr. Barkett said there was a drawing to award cash prizes to on-track patrons. He stated the win-place-show drawings were popular over the last several years. Vice-Chairman Harris asked if there would be a difference in the price of admissions and parking during the third week of the SCFE meeting. Mr. Moore stated admissions to the fairgrounds and parking would be free, and the charge for the grandstand would be reduced. Chairman Shapiro asked if the stabling and vanning contract was complete. Chris Korby of the California Authority of Racing Fairs said the fairs would help Golden Gate Fields while it installed its synthetic surface by acting as auxiliary stabling. That required a complete restructuring of the stabling and vanning agreement, which involved a renegotiation of expenses, reimbursement to the fairs and other issues. The parties were near agreement, but a contract had not been signed. Mr. Korby added he expected a signed contract to be in place prior to the commencement of the combined fair meeting. Chairman Shapiro asked if all the advance deposit wagering (ADW) agreements were in place, and if there was anything about the agreements that would impede the ability of the signals to be sent, or cause the cessation of ADW wagering. Mr. Korby stated there were no such issues. Commissioner Moretti asked if a finalized copy of the marketing plan could be forwarded to the Board. Mr. Moore said the fairs would combine advertising with a budget of approximately \$325,000. He stated that due to personnel changes the promotional plans were still in a fluid state, but would soon be consolidated. Commissioner Moretti **motioned** to approve the application by SCFA and SCFE for license to conduct Sonoma Solano Wine Country Racing. Commissioner Andreini **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

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DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE DEL MAR THOROUGHBRED CLUB (T) AT DEL MAR FROM JULY 18 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 5, 2007, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (DMTC) proposed to run from July 18 through September 5, 2007, the same number of days as in 2006. The first post time would be 2:00 p.m., daily; and 1:00 p. m. August 19; 3:30 p.m. August 17, 24 and 31; and 4:00 p.m. on July 20 and 27, and August 3 and August 10. Ms. Wagner stated signed horsemen's and trainer's agreements were received, and staff recommended the Board approve the application as presented. Chairman Shapiro asked if there would be any interruption to advance deposit wagering (ADW) during the DMTC meeting. Joe Harper of DMTC said there would be no issues with ADW during the meeting. Vice-Chairman Harris asked if the money returned to California in purses and track commissions were the same in a TVG state versus a non-TVG state. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California said the return from a non-TVG state was typically greater than the return from a TVG state. Chairman Shapiro asked if DMTC would use a Trakus system at its meeting. Mr. Harper said it was DMTC's intention to use such a system. Chairman Shapiro asked if DMTC would be rolling out new wagering technology after the expiration of the totalizator contract in September 2007. Mr. Harper said that was an ongoing process. DMTC introduced new technology in 2006 and would introduce more wagering technology in 2007. Chairman Shapiro asked about the status of DMTC's synthetic racing surface. Mr. Harper said the synthetic racing surface was installed and tested. He stated it was working well and there was certainly a difference in comparison with a traditional dirt surface. The track was currently being covered with a Hexideck to protect it from automobile traffic during the fair. Commissioner Amerman

commented he thought DMTC's marketing plan was the best he had ever seen in racing. He stated he was impressed with DMTC's customer training program. Vice-Chairman Harris asked if the increase in on-track attendance was mirrored in a growth in handle. Mr. Harper said the handle seemed to be growing. DMTC was attempting to attract patrons by marketing its venue. As long as patrons were attracted to the venue, they would learn about horse racing. Commissioner Amerman **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting of DMTC. Commissioner Choper **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

REPORT BY REPRESENTATIVES OF MAGNA ENTERTAINMENT CORPORATION (MEC) ON THE PROGRESS OF THE REDEVELOPMENT OF THE BARN AREA AT THE SANTA ANITA PARK RACE TRACK.

Chairman Shapiro commented the issue was the subject of many discussions. At the April 2007 Regular Meeting Santa Anita (SA) was asked to return with a time line and elevations and plans for the barn area redevelopment. Frank DeMarco of SA stated the Chief Executive Officer of Magna Entertainment Corporation (MEC) asked him to read a letter expressing the position of MEC regarding the issue. The letter was from Michael Neuman, was dated April 26, 2007, and was addressed to the City Manager of the City of Arcadia.

“Dear Sirs – This letter will clarify both our position and intent regarding the statement made to the California Horse Racing Board at their Regular Meeting on Thursday, April 19, 2007. Mr. DeMarco clearly stated that ‘until now we had no definite plan as to which barns to move and which ones we couldn’t move. We are now going to be preparing the plan and will keep

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you advised of what we are doing.’ The statement is self-explanatory. Mr. DeMarco clearly states we never had a plan and we currently do not have a plan to replace barns at Santa Anita. Mr. DeMarco went on to express his opinion as to what a future plan might entail. This statement does not represent the current intent of Santa Anita. It is also clear from other comments made by Messrs. Charles and DeMarco that there are no plans for new barns. These gentlemen expressed notions as to what new barns might look like, however, these musings do not in any way indicate an intent or formal plan by Santa Anita. The California Horse Racing Board has been urging Santa Anita to upgrade the stable area for some time and Santa Anita may, at some point in the future, decide to make changes to the stable area. If, as, and when that decision is made, a plan will indeed be made and the proper environmental analysis will be undertaken and the appropriate applications will be made to the appropriate authorities. In the meantime, we respectfully request that you disregard the claims made of Mr. Casey’s correspondence, dated April 20, 2007.

Mr. DeMarco stated the letter was the official position of MEC. Chairman Shapiro said at the October 2006 Regular Meeting the Board was informed that SA and MEC intended to rebuild at least ten barns. He stated he and other members of the Board made statements to the effect that if the work had not commenced by the end of 2007 it would be difficult to reward SA with the continuance in 2008 of the number of dates they received in 2007. Chairman Shapiro said California horsemen depended on habitable and safe barn areas for their horses. It was

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unacceptable for anyone to tell the Board they would redevelop the barns when they were not going to follow through. Mr. DeMarco said he could only convey the displeasure of the Board to the proper authorities. Commissioner Choper asked about the scope of the Board's authority to require rehabilitation of the barns, and the scope of the Board's power to take action if the association did not comply. Chairman Shapiro said the Board was entrusted with awarding race dates, and as part of that process it conducted racetrack inspections. He stated since MEC bought SA it promised to rebuild the barn area. Chairman Shapiro said he flew to Palm Meadows to tour its barn area and was told by MEC officials similar barns would be built at SA. He stated the withdrawal of the commitment – based on the MEC letter – came as a great surprise. Commissioner Choper said, as he understood it, the sole incentive the Board could use to seek improvement in the barns was to adjust the number of racing dates. Chairman Shapiro stated he believed the Board could also levy monetary sanctions. Commissioner Choper said it seemed the Board was entitled to a fuller explanation of why nothing had been done, and whether there were any specific plans. Vice-Chairman Harris said although it was not an excuse the letter may have been written to convince the City of Arcadia that SA did not need to redo its shopping center environmental impact report, which might be required if they worked on the barns. Commissioner Amerman said Mr. Neuman of MEC needed to appear before the Board to explain the letter. Chairman Shapiro stated he agreed with Commissioner Amerman and he asked Mr. DeMarco to request Mr. Neuman's presence at the June 2007 Regular Meeting. Commissioner Amerman asked when Mr. Neuman became a factor in the MEC/SA decision-making process. Mr. DeMarco said that was in February 2007. Chairman Shapiro asked Mr. DeMarco to provide Mr. Neuman with copies of Board transcripts wherein

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other MEC/SA employees appeared with respect to the issue. He commented Mr. Neuman might not have the background regarding the issue to understand the Board's concerns. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding capital improvements at SA. Robert Pontelle of the law firm Weston Benschhoff, which represents Westfield Group, spoke about the redevelopment of the SA barn area, and the proposed shopping center at SA.

REPORT BY THE RACING ASSOCIATIONS REGARDING THE PROCEDURES USED BY THE ASSOCIATIONS IN THE RECRUITMENT AND TRAINING OF BACKSTRETCH EVENT PERSONNEL.

Eual Wyatt of Hollywood Park stated he and George Haines of Los Angeles Turf Club worked to develop and formalize the criteria for selection, training, deployment and supervision of backstretch event personnel. He stated they did a self-evaluation regarding the procedures already in place, and they were surprised to see how far the associations had progressed. The associations were insisting that security contractors provide personnel who held California Guard Cards – notwithstanding the new requirement that the Board license such personnel. Mr. Wyatt stated the California Guard Cards were only issued to persons who had undergone a background check. In addition, the associations were given the last say on whom the security contractors provided. Mr. Wyatt said he and Mr. Haines felt they needed more time to develop a backstretch event personnel manual, which would be reviewed and updated after each race meeting. Mr. Haines stated he agreed with Mr. Wyatt regarding the manual, and he talked about the security measures employed at Santa Anita. Chairman Shapiro asked who would hold the backstretch event personnel licenses. Mr. Wyatt stated the associations would hold the licenses. David Stillwell of Service Employees International Union spoke about his

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union's concerns regarding the license classification and the procedures used for contracting with security firms.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1486, TERM OF LICENSE, TO ADD "BACKSTRETCH EVENT PERSONNEL" TO THE CLASS OF LICENSES WHOSE TERM IS ONE YEAR.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said at the February 2007 Regular Meeting the Board adopted an amendment to Rule 1481, Occupational Licenses and Fees, which added the license classification of backstretch event personnel. Since the new license classification was a one-year license, the amendment to Rule 1481 necessitated an amendment to Rule 1486, Term of License. Ms. Wagner stated the proposed amendment to Rule 1486 would add backstretch event personnel to the classes of license whose term is one year. She added staff recommended the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period. Commissioner Moretti **motioned** to direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period. Commissioner Andreini **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING MANDATING THE USE OF SAFETY REINS AT CALIFORNIA RACETRACKS.

Chairman Shapiro stated the item was **deferred**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE TEMPORARY SUSPENSION OF CHRB RULE 1555, DUTIES OF HORSESHOE INSPECTOR, AND CHRB RULE 1853, EXAMINATION REQUIRED, TO ALLOW MULES TO RACE WITHOUT SHOES.

Chairman Shapiro said the Deputy Attorney General (DAG) advised the Board that it needed to amend its rules so mules could run barefoot. The purpose of the item was to create an exemption to allow mules to run barefoot until a regulation could be in place. DAG Peter Kaufman said the Board needed to make it clear the exemption was only for mules. Vice-Chairman Harris **motioned** to suspend Rule 1555 and Rule 1853 for mules only. Commissioner Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD TO CONSIDER POSTING ALL STEWARDS MINUTES ON THE CHRB WEBSITE.

Vice-Chairman Harris said the stewards' minutes were a way the public and racing participants could follow events at a given track from week to week. He stated the minutes were available through the Public Records Act (PRA), and if they were posted on the Board's website, there would be fewer requests for staff to handle. In addition, posting the minutes on the website would demonstrate that the CHRB was an open organization. Chairman Shapiro asked if the website had the necessary capacity. Executive Director Ingrid Fermin said there was enough capacity. It was simply a matter of the Board directing staff to post the minutes. Commissioner Moretti asked if posting the stewards' minutes would infringe on anyone's rights. Deputy Attorney General Peter Kaufman said if the documents were available under the PRA, they were public documents and there were no privacy issues. He stated he was assuming nothing in those minutes that was not available under the PRA would be made

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available on the Board's website. Chairman Shapiro **directed** staff to post the stewards' minutes on the Board's website.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE REPORT FROM THE THOROUGHBRED OWNERS OF CALIFORNIA CONCERNING ITS PROPOSAL DESIGNED TO PROVIDE SUPPORT FOR RETIREMENT FARMS FOR HORSES THAT HAVE RETIRED FROM RACING.

Marsha Naify of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) stated the TOC proposed amending Rule 1467, Paymaster of Purses, to require that .3 percent of the net purse earned by any thoroughbred horse be deposited into a California Retirement Management Account (CRMA), which would be overseen by the TOC. Ms. Naify said the TOC calculated that would generate approximately \$480,000 per year. The TOC equine retirement committee would make recommendations to the TOC Board regarding distribution of CRMA funds; conduct due diligence by issuing guidelines to nonprofits that received CRMA monies; make annual visits to all recipients of funds to ensure the funds were spent on specific programs; and examine the nonprofit's audited financials and other relevant documents. Ms. Naify said the equine retirement committee had a lot of work to complete regarding parameters and operating guidelines, but its goals were clear. An "opt-out" form would be available for owners who did not wish to contribute to the CRMA. Ms. Naify commented the CRMA would not be the only source of monies for retired racehorses; however, it was a good beginning. The TOC hoped to raise money by soliciting private donations from owner and industry partners. She added the TOC believed its grants should not be subject to approval by the Board, as the monies would be collected from purses and private sources. Chairman Shapiro asked how many racehorses retired in California each year, or how many retired racehorses were in California. Ms. Naify

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said the committee had not had time to research the numbers of retired racehorses in California. Commissioner Moretti asked if the TOC was only looking at thoroughbreds. Ms. Naify stated the TOC was talking about thoroughbreds. Vice-Chairman Harris asked what qualified a retired thoroughbred for acceptance at a retirement farm; did the horse actually have to be raced? Ms. Naify said the committee was looking strictly at thoroughbred horses that had raced in California. Farms that took care of horses from other states, or non-racehorses would have to show the delineation between California racehorses and any other work they may do. However, if a thoroughbred was born or sired in California and did not make it to the racetrack, and needed to be retired, that horse would certainly qualify. Vice-Chairman Harris stated he would like to see the program run on a voluntary basis to get a feel for how it would work, as there could be a lot of initial confusion. Ms. Naify said the committee wanted to make the program voluntary, so it included the opt-out clause. She stated it was TOC's obligation to educate owners about the program, and owners' responsibilities regarding equine retirement. Commissioner Amerman asked if the committee knew how many retirement farms were in California, and what their total budgets were. He also asked if the committee had a feel for what might be the percentage of owners who would opt-out, as that could reduce the projected income of \$480,000. Ms. Naify said the committee did not have complete information regarding farms, or how many owners might opt-out. She stated that was why owner education regarding the program and equine retirement was important. Chairman Shapiro asked if there was a way to survey retirement farms to determine the daily cost of caring for a retired racehorse. He stated he did not know if .3 percent would be enough. Commissioner Amerman commented he did not want the proposed program to become a

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message to owners that the problem was solved. Regardless of what the TOC or the Board did, it would not solve the fact that owners needed to provide their own funds. Ms. Naify said she agreed. The TOC was not looking at its program like it was a panacea. The entire industry profited from horse racing, so TOC felt everyone should participate. She stated the committee felt .3 percent was a number owners could live with, and was a number that would also raise enough money for the program. Michael Power, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding the proposed TOC equine retirement program. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner spoke regarding retired racehorses.

DISCUSSION REGARDING THE STATUS OF BAY MEADOWS RACE TRACK AND THE NORTHERN CALIFORNIA RACING CALENDAR. (THIS ITEM IS FOR DISCUSSION ONLY).

Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said Northern California racing interests met in Napa in early May 2007 to continue discussions regarding industry options for the 2008 racing calendar. The parties looked at several different various options for the 2008-racing calendar because everyone recognized the situation was subject to change. Mr. Couto stated the exercises were difficult because Bay Meadows Racing Association (BMRA) chose not to participate. The parties realized all they could do was make assumptions based on the best information at hand. However, TOC wanted the industry to know there were preliminary plans for 2008, and although they would need to be adjusted, there would be something in place that would benefit horseracing in all of Northern California. Chairman Shapiro said he appreciated the industry's initiative. He asked if Golden Gate Fields (GGF) could provide an update on the status of its synthetic racing surface. Robert Hartman of GGF said his

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organization was in the process of purchasing the materials needed to construct a synthetic racing surface; however, it was running into some problems with the municipal authorities. Mr. Hartman commented GGF remained confident the surface would be installed in 2007, but various community groups were stalling the process. Chairman Shapiro stated, as he understood Mr. Hartman, GGF was expecting a decision from the city staff, but the decision could be appealed. Mr. Hartman said that was correct. Commissioner Moretti asked if the civic groups asked for specific mitigation or did they simply want to stop any renovation work? Mr. Hartman said the concerns were very general. The opposition was worried about the ecology of the bay and they wanted to make sure all the facts were out before GGF went ahead with the project. Commissioner Amerman asked what the original timeline was for the installation and what would happen if the dates were missed. Mr. Hartman stated the original plan was to start the installation on June 12, 2007, and conclude the project by Labor Day. He said GGF had the benefit of not starting its racing again until November 2007, so there was room for it to be delayed up to two months. Problems would arise if the process were delayed longer due to continued appeals. Ben Kenney of the California Harness Horsemen's Association said the harness industry had serious issues. Mr. Kenney stated harness horsemen were looking for a long-term home, which would provide stability for standardbreds. He asked that the harness industry not be forgotten when the 2008 race dates were considered. Chairman Shapiro said he appreciated Mr. Kenney's comments and it was important to make sure there was a place for the harness industry to race and prosper. Jack Liebau of BMRA said BMRA racing in 2008 would depend on how many days BMRA received, as it needed a critical mass to be successful. BMRA believed it was hurt in 2007 because the schedule gave GGF ample

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time to install a synthetic track. Mr. Liebau stated he urged GGF to get its permits from the city, but that was not happening. He added there were rumors Santa Anita might not be installing a synthetic surface. If neither track installed a synthetic surface it would be difficult for the Board not to give waivers. Mr. Liebau suggested the Board suspend Subsection (b) of Rule 1433, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting, and he proceeded to outline the reasons he believed the rule was deficient. Commissioner Amerman said when BMRA applied for a waiver to Subsection (b) of Rule 1433, BMRA was asked if it would guarantee running in 2008 and 2009. He asked if BMRA would guarantee it would run in 2008 if it received equitable dates. Mr. Liebau said "yes" – depending on how many days BMRA received, and what the dates were. Commissioner Amerman stated the premise was that the dates would be consistent with past years; the specific weeks could be argued. Commissioner Amerman asked if BMRA was willing to race in 2008 if that were the case. Mr. Liebau said if BMRA received dates that made sense it would run, but he was not saying any more than that. Mr. Liebau added he thought it would be in the best interest of California racing if the Board considered suspending Subsection 1433(b). If Santa Anita did not install its synthetic track he would not place blame. There were a lot of problems with such surfaces, as no one knew the suitability and durability of synthetic tracks over an extended period of time. The tracks in the United States were receiving a lot more use than those in England, and the expected cost savings in maintenance was not happening. Commissioner Moretti asked if Mr. Liebau could be more specific regarding what he meant by dates that "made sense" to BMRA. Mr. Liebau said he could not be more specific. Commissioner Choper asked if BMRA would agree to submit any dispute regarding dates to a neutral third party that the relevant parties would agree

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to, and use the criterion that was stated: decent racing dates consistent with the past. Mr. Liebau said he did not want to make a commitment, but if a schedule was proposed that made sense to BMRA, it would run. He stated BMRA would not be applying for a waiver if it did not want to run. He added it might have been a mistake to ask for a two-year waiver, but there might have been an idea a compromise was going to be reached and BMRA would receive a year's waiver. If the right 2008 dates did not materialize, BMRA would not ask for a waiver. Commissioner Choper said he was trying to follow up in a helpful way. Mr. Liebau stated perhaps it would be helpful to the Board, but not to BMRA. Commissioner Choper said he was not sure there was no mutuality of interest. Mr. Liebau commented the mutuality of interest diverged with respect to the investment in BMRA. Money was invested on the basis of achieving certain returns, and to achieve those returns, the property would be developed. Commissioner Choper said he was only looking at how it might be possible for BMRA to run in 2008. If BMRA agreed to run in 2008, there could be an opportunity to extend a waiver. The racing calendar was not due to be set for another four or five months, and there was a benefit in resolving the issue before that time passed. Commissioner Choper stated he would be uncomfortable if BMRA said "yes" to a guarantee, but had a veto over the calendar five months later. One way to resolve that issue was for BMRA to agree to a neutral third party, which BRMA would have a hand in selecting, to resolve any dispute on the question of a decent racing calendar. If BMRA guaranteed racing in 2008 for a guaranteed series of dates, the issue could be resolved. Mr. Liebau suggested if BMRA and GGF met and arrived at a proposal for a 2008-racing calendar that was acceptable to both parties, there would not be any uncertainty. Vice-Chairman Harris said the fairs would have to be included in such

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negotiations. Mr. Liebau said he would have no problem with all the relevant parties being involved, but if an acceptable calendar was brought to the Board there would be no uncertainty and no time would be lost in arbitration. Commissioner Moretti asked if BMRA had any idea when the permitting process would be completed. Mr. Liebau said the real estate people were optimistic, and that was why he was only talking about a 2008 calendar. Commissioner Moretti said the Board was receiving a lot of mixed messages regarding BMRA's closure. Regardless of the closure date, would BMRA talk to trainers and other persons who worked at the racing facility, so they could be informed and be able to begin planning for the inevitable closure. Mr. Liebau stated the BMRA employees, per se, were informed through company meetings. The problem with making a plan for the closure of BMRA was there were only certain alternatives. Horsemen could go to GGF, or the fairs. Vice-Chairman Harris commented one or more of the fairs needed to make a large investment in upgrading its facilities, and that would take a multi-year race date commitment from the Board. Mr. Liebau stated that was correct, but a large commitment of funds needed to generate a return, and that would require improving the racing product. Chairman Shapiro asked if BMRA would commit to racing the entire year in 2008 if it was granted a waiver and some of its racing dates were in November and December. Mr. Liebau said he did not know about November or December. He stated that was why he suggested the parties should meet and arrive at an acceptable 2008 calendar. Chairman Shapiro said he had no problem with the parties returning in the near future with a calendar. He stated the issue arose because BMRA asked for a two-year waiver rather than a one-year waiver, and then it was unable to commit to racing. The Board was concerned about the people who worked at BMRA and the horsemen, and it wanted to ensure it

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could provide a succession plan. The Board was receptive to the parties creating a plan for 2008; however, it would want to know that BMRA was committed to see that plan through its entirety, and that was why the Board was asking if BMRA would make a commitment. Mr. Liebau said BMRA could not make such a commitment at the current time. Commissioner Shapiro asked if, after having experience with synthetic racing surfaces, Mr. Liebau was no longer a fan of the technology. Mr. Liebau said his concern was with the suitability and durability of such surfaces over an extended period of time. He stated there was no question they appeared safer and there were not as many fatalities. In addition, the surfaces helped field size and attracted horses to California. Michael Corbett of the County of San Mateo presented a resolution of the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors that requested live racing continue at BMRA, as well as simulcast racing. He also presented a second resolution that requested the Board reverse its decision regarding BMRA's request for a waiver of Rule 1433. Michael Power, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding BMRA. Chris Korby of California Authority of Racing Fairs said his organization would welcome the opportunity to join in the proposed discussions regarding a 2008-racing calendar for Northern California. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding BMRA and Northern California horse racing.

REPORT ON THE STATUS OF CHRB'S CURRENT AND 2007-08 FISCAL YEAR BUDGETS.

Richard "Bon" Smith, CHRB staff, said the CHRB received \$10.3 million to fund all operations for the 2006-2007 fiscal year, which would end June 31, 2007. Mr. Smith stated the CHRB would remain within its budget, and explained how the funds were spent. Mr.

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Smith said the Governor's support budget proposal for the 2007-2008 fiscal year included \$10,800,000 for the CHRB. On May 9, 2007, the Senate Budget Subcommittee voted to eliminate the CHRB's 2007-2008 budget. On May 22, 2007, the Assembly Budget Subcommittee passed the 2007-2008 proposal in full. The Legislature would consider the CHRB budget in Conference Committee in late May or early June.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPROVAL OF FISCAL YEAR 2007-08 CONTRACTS FOR STEWARD, OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN AND OUT OF COMPETITION TESTING.

Richard "Bon" Smith, CHRB staff, said the State Contracting Manual requires boards with contracts in excess of \$5,000 to provide a copy of a motion approving and authorizing execution of those contracts. CHRB contracts that would be executed for the 2007-2008 fiscal year included stewards and official veterinarian contracts and a contract with the University of California at Davis for out of competition testing. Mr. Smith stated staff recommended the Board approve the contracts as presented. Commissioner Andreini **motioned** to approve the contracts for the 2007-2008 fiscal year. Commissioner Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE PROGRESS REPORT FROM STAFF ON THE STATUS OF THE JOCKEY GUILD'S HEALTH AND WELFARE PROGRAM AND THE APPROVAL OF AN EXTENSION OF THE CURRENT AGREEMENT UNTIL A NEW AGREEMENT IS EXECUTED.

Richard "Bon" Smith, CHRB staff, said on May 21, 2007, the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) and the Jockey's Guild (Guild) met to discuss the Guild's health and welfare

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program. Mr. Smith commented the discussions were fruitful, and an agreement should be forthcoming. An audit of the current plan for the calendar year 2006 was in process. Mr. Smith stated there were difficulties with previous attempts at an audit, and a new firm was engaged. He said concrete results might soon be forthcoming. Mr. Smith said under Business and Professions Code Section 19612.9(a)(3) the Board needed to consider extending the current agreement so that it could remain in place until a new agreement was reached. He stated staff recommended the Board approve such an extension. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** to extend the current agreement. Commissioner Choper **seconded** the motion. Drew Couto of TOC spoke about the meeting between his organization and the Guild. He stated legal issues regarding the validity of the existing program were discussed. Mr. Couto also summarized discussions regarding third-party insurers and the current self-insured program. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, read a statement by Chris Gibbs into the record. The motion was **unanimously carried**.

REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Commissioner Moretti said the Legislative Committee (committee) met on May 22, 2007. She stated 2007 was the beginning of a two-year session and there were approximately 30 horse racing related bills introduced. Currently, there were around 21 bills that were active. Commissioner Moretti said the committee meeting was for purposes of information only and no positions were taken on any of the legislation. The CHRB was sponsoring three bills, which dealt with the use of stewards and hearing officers; terminology regarding official veterinarians; and Racing Medication and Testing Consortium penalty guidelines.

Commissioner Moretti stated the committee also heard about advance deposit wagering (ADW) legislation. She said the law enabling ADW was about to expire, so such legislation was important. Commissioner Moretti reviewed the other, various, pieces of legislation that would affect horse racing, which included a trust fund for the economic stabilization of racing fairs; the creation of a racing facility improvement fund; expansion of satellite wagering; and a jockey minimum wage bill.

STAFF REPORT ON THE FOLLOWING CONCLUDED RACE MEET:

A. LOS ANGELES TURF CLUB AT SANTA ANITA FROM DECEMBER 26, 2006 THROUGH APRIL 22, 2007

Robert Zavala, CHRB staff, said the Los Angeles Turf Club (LATC) ran from December 26, 2006, through April 22, 2007. The average daily handle increased by 4.72 percent, and the average daily on-track attendance was up .66 percent. Allen Gutterman of LATC said the growth in on-track attendance was up about 1 percent over the previous year. For the first time in ten years LATC produced five race days with 30,000 or more on-track fans, and on the Santa Anita Derby Day, the total attendance was 56,810, the largest derby crowd since 1984. Chairman Shapiro congratulated LATC on its successful meeting.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Vice-Chairman Harris stated he received several email messages regarding the quality of the web cast's sound. He stated there needed to be a standard set for the web casts, so those watching would not have problems. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding horse racing related items.

MEETING ADJOURNED AT 5:10 P.M.



Detention Barn Plan & Number and Location of surveillance cameras in detention barn area:

Barn One, which is the barn mostly frequently utilized by horses shipping in to run at Bay Meadows, serves as the Detention Barn. Barn One is 360' long by 180' wide, and has ten exits and entrances. It contains approximately 162 stalls, and houses the receiving barn area, transit and detention stalls. Surveillance equipment in Barn One includes a 16 camera, 180 GB digital recording system. The installation of surveillance equipment in Barn One enables staff to better monitor the activity of horses and persons entering and exiting Barn One and the stable gate area, which is roughly fifty feet away.

One camera has been strategically placed to monitor the stable gate entrance, two cameras monitor designated detention stalls, and the balance have been placed to provide surveillance of the entrances and exits to the barn.

The recorder is kept in a secure housing in a locked communications room in the Barn building. A password is required before any action can be taken on the recording system.

The cameras are powered from a common power supply located, with the recorder, in the communications room. The entire system is powered with a UPS power back-up, and will continue to operate during a power failure.

All cameras generate their own infra-red light source, so they provide a viewable image even in "total" darkness. They operate in color during the day, and convert to black-and-white in dark lighting conditions.

The digital recorder records all cameras at full frame. Recording options include resolution quality and motion detection. In motion detection mode, video frame recording commences only when motion is detected within selected areas, which saves on hard-drive storage space. The amount of time that can be stored before re-recording over existing material occurs is dependant upon the amount of barn activity. If all cameras recorded 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, at the highest resolution setting, the 180 GB drive would begin re-writing over existing data within about 48 hours. With standard resolution and motion detection engaged, recording time falls between 5 and 10 days before re-writing begins.

Newcomers are met in front of the facility, at the admission entrances, and receive an explanation as to how they would return to the races on their own. The tour includes trips to various areas of the plant, from the mainline to the Turf Club, and attendees are familiarized with where to buy a program or Form, where to purchase reserved seats, etc., during the tour. At the end of the tour, attendees are escorted to a seating area reserved for newcomers which overlooks the finish line. The tour guide walks them through a few simple handicapping techniques and visits them occasionally throughout the remainder of the day to make sure they are comfortable.

Newcomer Mutuel Windows

In the mainline, mezzanine, clubhouse and Turf Terrace areas, betting windows designated as "Newcomers Welcome" are staffed with friendly and helpful mutuel clerks trained to accommodate the needs of novice fans.

Handicapping 101 Center

A large information area on the mainline has been designated as a "Handicapping 101" center. The area features a large banner, and is staffed by friendly marketing aides that are trained to answer questions for any and all fans, including how to read the program, explain odds and payoffs, provide directions, etc.


Please accept this letter as confirming my inspection of the horse barn facilities at the Humboldt County Fair Association, 1250 5th Street, in Ferndale.



Detention Barn Policies & Procedures

1. All horses must report to the detention barn by 12:00 noon race day. Horses late for detention will be requested to be scratched by the Stewards and CHRB.
2. A valid CHRB license is required for detention barn admission. License must be displayed to detention barn security prior to admittance.
3. Only the licensed trainer and the assigned licensed groom are permitted in the detention barn enclosure.
4. CHRB licensed veterinarians will be permitted within the enclosure for lasix administration. Vet must be accompanied by trainer or assigned groom for lasix administration.
5. No therapeutic aids are permitted in the detention barn enclosure.
6. Warmups are permitted on both the front and back track. Horses must return directly to the detention barn or to the paddock following warmup. Horses warming up on back track must use main road only. Violation of any of the above will result in request for scratch.

These policies have been agreed to by contract between the Sacramento Harness Association & California Harness Horseman Association.

Cal Expo Police Department

The Cal Expo Police Department is headed up by Chief Robert Craft. Chief Craft is a retired captain of the Sacramento Sheriffs Department and is one of the highest decorated officers in the history of the department. The Cal Expo police department enjoys a great working and professional relationship with the CHRB staff.

The grandstand and backstretch areas of the Cal Expo facility will be served by our police department. A minimum of 6 police officers, 2 mobile patrol units, 1 armed officer in the detention barn and 4 gatemen will be assigned exclusively to the racetrack, grandstand, and backstretch areas. Our backstretch and detention barn will also be served by unarmed Cal Expo Security Guards.

An organizational chart of our police department is attached and the contact phone numbers are: 916-263-3050 and 916-263-3120

2. Detention Barn-

Sacramento Harness has constructed a new detention barn. All California Sire Stake races and Overnight Stake races with purse of \$15,000 will be a detention barn race. All horses in those races must report for detention by 12 noon. Those horses will be in detention from then until race time.

Each horse in the detention barn will be limited to two caretakers (one groom and trainer) at a time and each person will be identified by CHRB license, checked, and all equipment will be checked. All functions in the detention barn will be documented and the documentation will be securely filed.

In addition, trainers having high TCO2 test(s) will be required to race all of their horses out of the detention barn for thirty days. Those horses must also report by 12 noon.

3. TCO2 Testing

Sacramento Harness will adhere to all CHRB guidelines in conjunction with TCO2 testing. In addition, horses that have previously tested high will be detained and placed under surveillance cameras each race day for no less than 30 days. The number of security personnel assigned to the TCO2 program will be determined on a day-to-day basis.

Sacramento Harness Association will employ the use of four generators that will be strategically placed in locations around the racetrack and be turned on continuously while night racing is occurring. In the event of a racetrack light failure, the generators will provide enough light to ensure the safety of all participants. Also, the patrol judge in the starter's car that tracks each race will illuminate the racetrack with their headlights.



BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). B&P Code Section 19562 states the Board may prescribe rules, regulations and conditions under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in California. In 1996 The California Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory System (CVDLS) at the University of California, Davis, concluded a three-year study of shoeing and catastrophic injury in racehorses. The study compared the shoes of injured horses to those of uninjured horses to identify types of shoes associated with increased risk of injury. The toe grab was the type of traction device found on 90% of the injured horses and 80% of uninjured horses while rim shoes were found on 12% of injured horses and 30% of uninjured horses. The conclusion was that there appeared to be an association between toe grabs and increased risk of catastrophic injury in thoroughbred racehorses. The higher the toe grabs - the greater the risk. The three-year study of shoeing and catastrophic injury released in 1996 was not considered conclusive, so a second study was initiated in late 1999. The study was not complete when the Board heard the issue of toe grabs at its January 2000 Regular Board Meeting. The result of the discussion was a third CVDLS study that would record the type of shoes worn during competition of all thoroughbred racehorses in California for the year 2000. The information would be correlated with injuries sustained to determine patterns related to shoe type. In addition, the CVDLS would collect data from foreign jurisdictions that race on dirt without toe grabs. Subsequent to its initiation, the study was extended for a second year, to be completed in the spring of 2002. In February 2006 the Board added Rule 1690.1, Toe Grabs Prohibited, which prohibited the use of toe grabs over four millimeters in height on the front shoes of thoroughbreds while racing. However, the implementation of the regulation was delayed. At the February 2007 Regular Board Meeting the Board determined it would enforce the regulation, and that quarter horses should be added to the provisions of Rule 1690.1

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Rule 1690.1 would prohibit the use of toe grabs with a height greater than four millimeters on the front shoes of quarter horses while racing. In initiating the requirement to prohibit high toe grabs on thoroughbreds, the Board relied on scientific research conducted on thoroughbreds. Staff is unaware of similar research regarding the effects of high toe grabs on quarter horses that would provide scientific justification for adding this breed to the regulation.

RECOMMENDATION

No comments were received during the 45-day public comment period. Staff recommends the Board adopt the amendment to Rule 1690.1 as presented.

DISCUSSION REGARDING MANDATING THE USE
OF
SAFETY REINS AT CALIFORNIA RACETRACKS

Regular Board Meeting

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code Section 19504 provides that the Board shall determine whether the use of safety reins would provide jockeys and exercise riders greater protection from accidents and injuries than conventional reins. If the Board determines safety reins provide greater protection, it shall adopt a regulation mandating the use of approved safety reins whenever a racehorse is ridden at a racetrack. The Board shall approve any model of mandatory safety rein, if required, in use at a racetrack.

ANALYSIS

Safety reins are essentially a rein within a rein. Typical reins are made of leather or nylon and attach to the bit. Reins provide jockeys and drivers with control of the horse; when reins break, control is lost. With safety reins, a nylon cord is stitched into the traditional leather or nylon reins during the manufacturing process, and the safety cord attaches to the bit independently of the conventional reins. Should the outer leather or nylon reins break, the safety reins allow the jockey or driver to maintain control. However, the safety feature is intended to break if a horse or rider should become entangled in the dangling ends. This is the reason nylon is used instead of wire. Additionally, the nylon only goes as far back as the end of the grip for the same reason. Arthur Gray designed the Sure Lines safety reins. Sure Line reins have a nylon cord that emerges from the outer reins and attaches to the bit using a metal clasp. Brian and Lisa Peck designed a second (loop) type of safety rein. The "Peck" safety reins have a nylon cord that remains inside of the outer reins throughout and can be seen. Both the nylon and outer reins are looped around the bit. It should be noted that while the safety rein designers can provide supporting materials, including laboratory reports on the testing of their reins, there are currently no safety standards established for safety reins.

Nylon reins retail for between \$28.00 and \$31.00 while reins using American leather cost around \$71.00 and \$74.00. Imported English leather reins can cost \$180 and more. Both types of safety reins will add from \$10 to \$15 to the cost of typical leather reins, including the cost of the patent fee, which ranges from \$2.70 to \$9.00 per set. Sure Lines has stated it expects safety reins to increase retail prices for reins by 25 percent.

The Sure Lines states its patent is available to all manufacturers. Manufacturers who have processed orders for Sure Lines safety reins and lines include:

Champion Turs, Los Angeles, CA
Walsh Manufacturing, Brookfield, WI
Stitching Horse Tack, Hemet, CA
Yonie's Harness shop Honey Brook, PA
Feather-Weight Turf, Sheboygan, WI
Smith Worthington, Hartford, CT
Brubacher Tack, Wallenstein, Ontario, Canada
Rich Tack, Oviedo, Fl

Champion Turn, a manufacturer of reins in California, stated a sufficient quantity of Safety Lines safety reins could be produced within six months to meet any demand in this State. The Safety Lines safety feature would add approximately \$13.00 to \$19.00 to the cost of the reins (\$10.00 plus the cost of the patent fee).

The Pecks have a patent pending on their reins. They do not deal with manufacturers other than their own provider, Jason Wade, because they feel that is the best way for them to maintain quality control. Mr. Wade stated he could produce 3,000 sets of reins in six months with the safety feature adding \$15.00 to the cost of the reins.

Two racing jurisdictions have considered mandating safety reins. The Indiana Racing Commission rejected the mandate in 2006 due to opposition from harness horsemen. The standardbred horsemen stated individual riders and trainers should accept the responsibility for ensuring the quality and condition of reins they use. The Ohio Racing Commission adopted a rule requiring the use of safety reins effective July 1, 2008; however, Ohio will reconsider its decision because of opposition by horsemen. Ohio horsemen object to the cost of safety reins, they state they are unnecessary and they state the Ohio rule favors the Safety Lines type of safety rein over the "Peck" safety rein.

The Jockey's Guild has informed staff that it supports mandating the use of safety reins. The California Horsemen's Safety Alliance (CSHA), which oversees the workers' compensation program at California thoroughbred racetracks, has ordered a thousand sets of Sure Line safety reins to distribute to horsemen to use voluntarily as an experiment to determine their effectiveness and to identify any problems. The CSHA has asked that the Board delay mandating safety reins until after the experiment has been completed and evaluated.

STATUS OF THE \$1.5 MILLION DOLLAR SHORTFALL

REGULAR BOARD MEETING
JUNE 19, 2007

BACKGROUND:

Horseracing revenue comes primarily from license fees imposed on the amounts wagered by the public. The state's share of horseracing revenue is either deposited to the state General Fund or to a Special Fund (e.g., the Fairs and Expositions Fund). Special funds consist of governmental cost funds used to account for taxes and revenues, which are restricted by law for particular functions/activities. These Special Funds include the Fairs and Expositions (F&E) Fund 191, the Satellite Wagering Account Fund 192 and the Equine Research Fund 881.

ANALYSIS:

Pursuant to Section 19616.51 of the Business and Professions Code, cash receipts for calendar years 2005 and 2006 to the State of California have fallen short of the \$40 million referenced in Section 19616.51 by a combined total of \$1,528,187. On January 26, 2007, the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) sent letters to each racing association and fair regarding the shortfall for calendar years 2005 and 2006. As such, and in accordance with the code's mandate, each racing association and fair was requested to submit to the CHRB its pro rata share of the shortfall by March 1, 2007. As of this notice, CHRB has received six remittances totaling \$101,367.

Some associations have questioned the dollar amounts reported. They have cited the CHRB Annual Reports that show amounts (based on audited CHRIMS reports) above the \$40 million baseline. Those reports include receipts other than amounts deposited to the F&E, Satellite Wagering, and Equine Research Funds. The intent of the legislation as to what should/must be included in the receipts calculation may be the deciding factor as to the specific liability the racing associations and fairs must bear.

RECOMMENDATION:

Discussion on the F&E Fund shortfall for the 2005 and 2006 calendar years pursuant to Section 19616.51 of the Business and Professions Code. Action may await final determination and legal opinion as to all amounts that should/must be included in the calculation of the \$40 million baseline.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code (B&P Code) Section 19440 specifies that the Board shall have all powers, including but not limited to adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horseracing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code 19580 states that the Board shall adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines and penalties relating to equine medication to preserve and enhance the integrity of horse racing in this State. Section 19581 of the B&P Code specifies that no substance of any kind shall be administered by any means to a horse after it has been entered to race in a horse race, unless the Board has, by regulation, specifically authorized the use of the substance and the quantity and composition thereof. B&P Code Section 19582 provides that violations of Section 19581, as determined by the Board, are punishable in regulations adopted by the Board, and that the Board may classify violations based upon each class of prohibited drug substances, prior violations within the previous three years and prior violations within the violator's lifetime.

At the January 2007 Regular Board Meeting staff was instructed to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding a proposed amendment to Rule 1843.2. The proposed amendment would delete Rule 1843.2's seven drug classifications and reference the document "CHRB Penalty Categories Listing by Classification." The CHRB drug classifications are based on the ARCI recommendations with modifications recommended by the Equine Medical Director. The proposed amendment to Rule 1843.2 is currently at the Office of Administrative Law where it is undergoing a 30-day review process. At the June 18, 2007, Medication Committee meeting an amendment to Rule 1843.2 was discussed.

ANALYSIS

The document "CHRB Penalty Categories Listing by Classification" is incorporated by reference into Rule 1843.2. This means that every time a drug classification is changed, the regulation must be amended. The Board's Equine Medical Director has proposed a number of changes to the CHRB Penalty Categories Listing by Classification, as well as the addition of a new "P-1" classification. Therefore, it is necessary to initiate a rulemaking file if the Board wishes to adopt the new classifications.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for discussion and action by the Board. Staff recommends the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period.
