Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE DEL MAR THOROUGHBRED CLUB AT DEL MAR JULY 20, 2005 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 7, 2005.

Del Mar Thoroughbred Club filed its application to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Del Mar:

- July 20 through September 7, 2005, or 43 days, the same as 2004. The association proposes to race a total of 371 races, or 8.6 per day.

- Racing 6 days per week, Wednesday through Monday, with 8 races per day weekdays, 9 races opening day and certain weekend days and 10 races certain weekend days, Labor Day and closing day.
- First post will be 2:00 p.m. daily.
  - 1:00 p.m. Sunday, August 21.
  - 3:30 p.m. Friday, August 19, 26 and September 2.
  - 4:00 p.m. Friday, July 22, 29 and August 5, 12.
- Specific changes from the 2004 license application:

  - Increases – reserved seating stretch run and clubhouse for opening day and Pacific Classic from \$12 to \$15, reserved seating stretch run and clubhouse on Saturday and Sunday from \$6 to \$8, off-track programs from \$2 to \$2.25, Season Turf Club Membership for 2 persons from \$950 to \$1,050, Daily Turf Club Admission for member guests on opening day from \$50 to \$75.
  - New - \$50 Daily Turf Club Admission for non-members [\$100 opening day] and a program with every paid admission.
- Request Dianne Piper be appointed horse identifier pursuant to CHRB Rule 1525.
- Track safety requirements have been fulfilled.

**NOTICE TO APPLICANT:** All funds generated and retained from on-track pari-mutuel handle which are obligated by law for distribution in the form of purses, breeders' awards or other benefits to horsemen, **shall not** be deemed as income to the association; **shall not** be transferred to a parent corporation outside the State of California; and **shall**, within 3 calendar days following receipt, be deposited in a segregated and separate liability account in a depository approved by the CHRB and shall be at the disposition of the Paymaster of Purses, who shall pay or distribute such funds to the persons entitled thereto. All funds generated from off-track simulcast wagering, interstate wagering, and out-of-state wagering which are obligated by law for distribution in the form of purses and breeders' awards, shall also be deposited within 3 calendar days following receipt, into such liability account. In the event the association is obligated to the payment of purses prior to those obligated amounts being retained from pari-mutuel wagering for such purpose, or as a result of overpayment of earned purses at the conclusion of the meeting, the association shall transfer from its own funds such amounts as are necessary for the Paymaster of Purses to distribute to the horse owners statutorily or contractually entitled thereto. The association is entitled to recover such transferred funds from the Paymaster of Purses' account; and if insufficient funds remain in the account at the conclusion of the meeting, the association is entitled to carry forward the deficit to its next succeeding meeting as provided by B&P Code Section 19615(c) or (d). In the event of **underpayment** of purses which results in a balance remaining in the Paymaster of Purses' account at the conclusion of the meeting after distribution of amounts due to horsemen and breeders and horsemen's organizations, the association may carry forward the surplus amount to its next succeeding meeting; provided, however, that the amount so retained does not exceed an amount equivalent to the average daily distribution of purses and breeders' awards during the meeting. All amounts in excess shall be distributed retroactively and proportionally in the form of purses and breeders' awards to the horse owners and breeders having earned purses or awards during the conduct of the meeting.



SUBJECT: Supplement to License Application

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This memorandum is submitted as an addendum to Section 11(B) (1) of the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club's license application in order to provide additional detail regarding enhanced security for graded stakes at the 2005 race meet. In 2004, Del Mar was the first track in California to implement enhanced security for all graded stakes. Working in conjunction with TOC and CTT, Del Mar set the stage for further development of security procedures at Fairplex, Oak Tree, Santa Anita and Hollywood Park.

Components of the 2005 plan include the following:

1. Assignment of event security personnel to each graded stakes entry beginning no less than six (6) hours prior to post-time for the race;
2. Training of event security personnel by the Del Mar racing office, Del Mar security supervisors and CHRB investigators;
3. Provision and monitoring of log/surveillance sheets requiring all individuals entering the stall of an entrant to provide license information and purpose of entry;
4. Hand-held digital video cameras for all event surveillance personnel to record activity by persons entering stalls;
5. Total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) level testing of entries in all races consistent with the testing at preceding race meets;
6. Compliance with TCO<sub>2</sub> detention barn procedures, protocols and disciplinary procedures as set forth in agreements with TOC and CTT. A copy of current protocols and procedures is attached as Exhibit A.
7. Enhanced authority to conduct additional supplementary testing as set forth in Section 22 of Del Mar's 2005 stall application, a copy of which is attached as Exhibit 3.

## EXHIBIT A

Track is entitled to perform physiological tests consisting of the taking of blood samples from owners' horses entered in races to be conducted at the 2005 Meet. It is the understanding of the parties that such samples will be tested for bicarbonate levels. Trainers of horses showing a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, and owners' horses within their control, will be subject to the following:

- A. **1<sup>st</sup> Offense** – For the first test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse may have his/her barn, and all owners' horses stabled therein, subject to "earned surveillance" for a period of 45 days from the date of the infraction. Such earned surveillance will be conducted at TRACK's sole discretion, and may include, but not be limited to, the placing of surveillance cameras with recording devices in any location within that barn that Track deems necessary and appropriate to ensure the integrity of racing. Additionally, owners' horses entered by said trainer anytime within a period of 30 days after notification of the first offense, may be subject to confinement in a detention barn beginning at noon on the day before said horse is scheduled to compete. Such detention barn will be established at management's sole discretion, with the costs of such detention/surveillance including, but not limited to, \$150.00 for security and \$25.00 for stall renovation per horse/entrant, being born by the trainer or owner of such horse.
- B. **2<sup>nd</sup> Offense** – For the second test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be prohibited from entering any owners' horse within his/her care in a race for a period of 15 race days.
- C. **3<sup>rd</sup> Offense** – For the third test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be expelled from TRACK's enclosure for a period of one year, and shall further be precluded from entering any owners' horses within his care for the balance of Track's 2005 Meet.

Track further agrees that it shall enforce these penalties when imposed as a result of similar contract provisions with other racing associations in California. By way of example only, Track agrees that should any horse running at its meet be subject to detention barn confinement as the result of a positive at another association, Track will continue to require detention barn confinement for the remainder of said 30 day period. Also by way of example, should a trainer have a TCO2 positive or positives at a race meet other than its own and a subsequent positive at Track's race meet or at another associations meet, Track will enforce paragraph B, and may, at its discretion, enforce paragraph C above as though the original positive(s) had taken place at its meet.

## Exhibit 3

### UNIFORM STALL APPLICATION CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO OCCUPATION OF STALL SPACE AT CALIFORNIA RACING ASSOCIATIONS

The undersigned Trainer ("Applicant") hereby agrees to each of the following terms and conditions in consideration for and as a condition of the granting of permission by the Racing Association designated on the reverse side of this application ("Track") for the stabling of horses being trained by the undersigned at Track, or at any approved auxiliary training facility, during the race meeting identified on the face of this application (the "Race Meet"):

1. Track reserves the right without notice to the Applicant, (a) to refuse this application for stable space in whole or in part, or (b) to refuse the entry or the acceptance of any entry in any race or (c) to refuse the transfer of an entry for any cause, so long as said refusal is not in violation of the terms of the race meet agreements with either the Thoroughbred Owners of California or California Thoroughbred Trainers.
2. If any horse is denied stable space or the privilege of registration for racing for any reason, all nomination fees and payments for eligibility to stake races that have been paid with respect to the horse shall be refunded and such sum will be deducted from the total amount subscribed for the particular race or races. Allocations of stall space are made only with the agreement of Applicant that Track reserves to itself the exclusive right, in its sole discretion, to enter, modify, alter, or change the physical condition or use of its facilities: that the permission granted to Applicant to use Track's facilities is solely for the purpose incidental to racing, does not constitute a lease of the facilities and Track maintains the sole interest in and exclusive control of its premises and facilities: and the Track reserves to itself the exclusive right and sole discretion to reduce or totally eliminate the number of stalls or other accommodations assigned and/or change the location of stall or accommodations assigned to Applicant.
3. After submitting this application for stalls, the undersigned shall notify Track immediately of any change in stall requirements and, if stalls have been allocated, of any shipping schedules or change in shipping arrangements.
4. Applicant has inspected the stalls and other accommodations at Track, or if applicable at any approved auxiliary training facility, and agrees to accept any stalls or accommodations assigned pursuant to this application in an "as is" condition. Applicant understands that Track makes no representation or warranty as to the condition or use of stalls and other accommodations assigned.
5. Applicant agrees to remove his horses and/or those in his possession, charge, or control together with all personal property belonging to him or of which he has possession, charge or control from Track forthwith upon the expiration of seventy-two (72) hours after Track has given notice in writing to vacate the stabling accommodation, which notice may be given in the absolute discretion of Track without any reason or cause existing or being stated or given; any such notice or any other given hereunder shall be sufficiently given by posting up such notice on some portion of the stabling accommodation allotted to him and such notice shall be deemed to be given at the time when the same is posted up. The Applicant understands that his employees shall leave Track, forthwith upon the expiration of seventy-two (72) hours after notice has been given as aforesaid. Applicant agrees that if upon the expiration of the said seventy-two (72) hours notice hereinbefore mentioned, any horse or horses or personal property belonging to him or in his possession, charge or control, have not been removed from Track, Track shall be entitled to remove the same from Track without further notice to a suitable location at Applicant's expense and Track shall in no event be responsible for any such horse or horses removed as aforesaid. Applicant agrees that in the event of the horses being stabled

elsewhere at his expense as foresaid that the person, firm or corporation stabling the horses or paying for the stabling of same shall have all the rights as provided by law.

6. The undersigned Applicant represents that Applicant is familiar with and has read the Rules of Racing and Regulations of the California Horse Racing Board, and all conditions applicable to the Race Meet, as well as the rules and regulations of Track, and agrees to be bound by and to comply with the same. All stable reservations and entries in stakes and all other races shall be subject to all conditions, rules and regulations of the California Horse Racing Board and Track and in this application contained. Applicant represents that the owners of all horses listed on the reverse of this application have authorized Applicant to sign this application and have agreed that their horses being trained by Applicant will be bound thereby. All references herein to Applicant or to Applicant's horses, equipment, agents or employees, shall include said owners and their horses, equipment, agents and employees.
7. The Stewards of the Race Meet or the California Horse Racing Board shall decide all disputes, claims and objections relating to the conduct of racing, or with respect to interpretation of any rules or conditions of racing or otherwise. Subject to all legal rights of appeal, Applicant agrees to accept and abide by all decisions of such officials pertaining to the presence or conduct of themselves or of their agents and employees on the premises of Track.
8. In all stakes, entries may be made only through the entry box by the usual time of closing of entries, on the day before the race, or at other times when the conditions for the race specifically so state.
9. Track reserves the right to cancel any stake or other race, which has not filled prior to the actual running thereof without liability to any person, except for the return of nomination and entrance fees, paid. Track reserves the right to divide the added money for any stake that is run in more than one division.
10. Horses claimed by, or transferred or sold to, any person or stable which is not registered for racing at Track must be removed from the grounds within twenty-four (24) hours after they are claimed, transferred or sold unless their continued presence is approved by the racing association then conducting racing at Track.
11. Track will in no event be considered to have responsibility for the care, custody or control of horses kept at Track or elsewhere. Applicant assumes full responsibility for the safety and well-being of all horses stabled by Applicant at Track, and agrees to take all reasonable measures for the protection of such horses, including providing adequate supervision for such animals while on the premises, hiring competent personnel to care for such animals at all times, cleaning and maintaining stalls assigned pursuant to this application and removing any hazardous condition from such stalls which is known to Applicant or Applicant's employees, or if Applicant believes that such condition should be remedied by Track, promptly calling to the attention of Track in writing, any such hazardous conditions. Applicant further agrees to properly supervise all Applicant's employees, agents, their express invitees, and other persons known to them to be in the area assigned to them pursuant to this application, and hereby acknowledges that they are responsible for the conduct of their employees, agents and express invitees, and that Track has no obligation to remedy any condition on the Track premises which may be caused by the negligence of or willful conduct of any such employees, agents or express invitees, unless it has prior written notice of the existence of such condition and has had a reasonable opportunity to repair such condition.
12. The Applicant understands that there may be numerous hazards and risks of injury to Applicant, and Applicant's agents, owners, or employees, upon the Track premises at Applicant's invitation and to their property, which hazards, and risks inherently incidental to accepting stalls at, practicing for, and participating in thoroughbred horse racing at Track.
13. Applicant shall maintain an accurate Stable Employee Registration List and shall submit a copy thereof to Track. Applicant shall pay his/her stable personnel at wage rates

conforming to applicable laws. Applicant's stable personnel shall continue to be covered under the prevailing and applicable statutory employee benefit programs such as Worker's Compensation, Disability, Unemployment, Social Security and the like. Applicant shall comply with the Fair Employment Practices Act and shall not discriminate by reason of race, color, creed, national origin or sex in hiring employees. Applicant acknowledges that his/her stable personnel are employees of the Applicant and that no employment relationship exists between such stable personnel and Track.

14. In making this application to participate in thoroughbred racing, Applicant understands that an investigative report may be made whereby information is obtained by Track through personal interviews with third parties, such as family members, business associates, financial sources, friends, neighbors, or others with whom he is acquainted. This inquiry may include information as to his/her character, general reputation, personal characteristics and mode of living, which may be applicable. Applicant has the right to make a written request within a reasonable period of time for a complete and accurate disclosure of additional information concerning the nature and scope of the investigation.
15. Each party to this stall application shall be liable for its own acts and omissions as well as those of its agents, employees and express invitees to the same extent as would be provided at law without such provision.
16. Applicant agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Track and its affiliates against any and all claims, liabilities, losses, costs, damages and attorneys' fees incurred by reason of the negligence of Applicant or Applicant's agents, employees and invitees, or resulting from Applicant or Applicant's agents, employees and invitees, violation of this agreement, including, but not limited to, violation of the rules and regulations of the CHRB and Track and violation of city and county fire, health or law enforcement, ordinances, rules and regulations. Applicant's indemnity shall not extend to liabilities, claims, losses, damages or attorneys' fees arising out of the negligence or willful acts or omission of Track or its respective agents or employees.
17. If horses accepted for racing at Track are assigned to an approved auxiliary training facility, then the provisions of this application shall also apply to such other facility.
18. Applicant agrees to be responsible for any damages to rooms assigned to Applicant caused by Applicant or Applicant's employees, agents and invitees. In the event such damage is repaired by Track, the cost of such repairs shall be charged to the Applicant.
19. Emergency Action Plan: Applicant shall be responsible for complying with all OSHA regulations as they pertain to Applicant's employees. Track is not responsible for training or accounting for any employees other than its own during an emergency. Copies of the Track Emergency Action Plan are available in the Operations office upon request.
20. The granting of stalls and other accommodations pursuant to this application in whole or in part shall not constitute a lease of space but a revocable license only and may be revoked at any time by Track in its absolute discretion.
21. The undersigned Applicant acknowledges that each additional starter in a race is projected to produce an increase in mutuel handle, which, is in turn projected to increase purse revenues. Applicant understands that he/she is expected to average at least one (1) start per month for each stall allotted during the race meet covered by this application.
22. Track is entitled to perform physiological tests consisting of the taking of blood samples from owners' horses entered into races to be conducted at the Race Meet. Such samples will be tested for bicarbonate levels. Trainers of horses showing a total carbon dioxide per liter of plasma in excess of the level specified in the Race Meet Agreement(s) between the Track and the Thoroughbred Owners of California or California Thoroughbred Trainers shall be subject to the disciplinary measures specified in such Agreement
23. **In order to assure the protection of the public, to maintain and encourage confidence in the integrity of horse racing and to safeguard the health and safety of human and equine participants, Applicant acknowledges that Applicant and Applicant's agents, employees and affiliates have no expectation of privacy with**

respect to stalls and living quarters and appurtenant facilities provided by Track. ### Total Carbon Dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) Testing

On behalf of its member Fairs listed above, California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) will manage a program of TCO<sub>2</sub> testing for all Thoroughbred starters and for starters of other breeds as the Board may specify. CARF intends to enter into an agreement with the Maddy Equine Analytical Chemistry Laboratory at the University of California at Davis to perform the actual blood testing. We are presently in discussion with Dr. Scott Stanley as to the particulars of that agreement.


Our testing program will be consistent with TCO<sub>2</sub> testing currently conducted by other racing associations in the state. Please find attached to this letter an excerpt of our Agreement with Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) pertaining to this program.

### Detention Stalls

Each Fair above will designate detention stalls sufficient to stable horses subject to confinement or to "earned surveillance" as specified in the Agreement with TOC. A video surveillance system will be installed to record activities in the area of the detention stalls. At management's discretion, security personnel may be posted to monitor horses in detention. Costs of detention, including, but not limited to, \$150.00 for security and \$25.00 for stall renovation per horse/entrant will be borne by the trainer or owner of such a horse.

*Excerpt from CARF-TOC Agreement  
Pertaining to TCO2 Testing and Consequences  
For Infractions*

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8.15. Track is entitled to perform physiological tests consisting of the taking of blood samples from owners' horses entered in races to be conducted at the 2005 Meet. It is the understanding of the parties that such samples will be tested for bicarbonate levels. Trainers of horses showing a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, and owners' horses within their control, will be subject to the following:

A. 1<sup>st</sup> Offense – For the first test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse may have his/her barn, and all owners' horses stabled therein, subject to “earned surveillance” for a period of 45 days from the date of the infraction. Such earned surveillance will be conducted at TRACK's sole discretion, and may include, but not be limited to, the placing of surveillance cameras with recording devices in any location within that barn that Track deems necessary and appropriate to ensure the integrity of racing. Additionally, owners' horses entered by said trainer anytime within a period of 30 days after notification of the first offense, may be subject to confinement in a detention barn beginning at noon on the day before said horse is scheduled to compete. Such detention barn will be established at management's sole discretion, with the costs of such detention/surveillance including, but not limited to, \$150.00 for security and \$25.00 for stall renovation per horse/entrant, being born by the trainer or owner of such horse.

B. 2<sup>nd</sup> Offense – For the second test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be prohibited from entering any owners' horse within his/her care in a race for a period of 15 race days.

C. 3<sup>rd</sup> Offense – For the third test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be expelled from TRACK's enclosure for a period of one year, and shall further be precluded from entering any owners' horses within his care for the balance of Track's 2005 Meet.

The parties further acknowledge and agree that the balance, or a portion thereof, of any penalties imposed by another licensed California Thoroughbred racing association, pursuant to contract provisions similar to those contained herein in Subsections A through C, shall be recognized and enforced by TRACK at its 2005 meet. For the purpose of this Section, said penalties are deemed to be cumulative, and shall be enforced as if any prior elevated TCO<sub>2</sub> test or tests had occurred at TRACK's 2005 meet. Accordingly, any subsequent offense penalty imposed by TRACK pursuant to Subsections B and/or C may, in its discretion, include and be based upon a violation of similar contractual provisions at any other meet conducted by a licensed California Thoroughbred racing association.

The following language included in the Fair's Horsemen's Agreement with the TOC describes the testing program and sanctions relating to total carbon dioxide testing which will be administered during the 2005 Sonoma County Fair Meet:

**Track is entitled to perform physiological tests consisting of the taking of blood samples from owners' horses entered in races to be conducted at the 2005 Meet. It is the understanding of the parties that such samples will be tested for bicarbonate levels. Trainers of horses showing a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, and owners' horses within their control, will be subject to the following:**

- A. 1<sup>st</sup> Offense – For the first test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse may have his/her barn, and all owners' horses stabled therein, subject to "earned surveillance" for a period of 45 days from the date of the infraction. Such earned surveillance will be conducted at TRACK's sole discretion, and may include, but not be limited to, the placing of surveillance cameras with recording devices in any location within that barn that Track deems necessary and appropriate to ensure the integrity of racing. Additionally, owners' horses entered by said trainer anytime within a period of 30 days after notification of the first offense, may be subject to confinement in a detention barn beginning at noon on the day before said horse is scheduled to compete. Such detention barn will be established at management's sole discretion, with the costs of such detention/surveillance including, but not limited to, \$150.00 for security and \$25.00 for stall renovation per horse/entrant, being born by the trainer or owner of such horse.
- B. 2nd Offense – For the second test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be prohibited from entering any owners' horse within his/her care in a race for a period of 15 race days.
- C. 3rd Offense – For the third test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO<sub>2</sub>) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be expelled from TRACK's enclosure for a period of one year, and shall further be precluded from entering any owners' horses within his care for the balance of Track's 2005 Meet.

**The parties further acknowledge and agree that the balance, or a portion thereof, of any penalties imposed by another licensed California Thoroughbred racing association, pursuant to contract provisions similar to those contained herein in Subsections A through C, shall be recognized and enforced by TRACK at its 2005 meet. For the purpose of this Section, said penalties are deemed to be cumulative, and shall be enforced as if any prior elevated TCO<sub>2</sub> test or tests had occurred at TRACK's 2005 meet. Accordingly, any subsequent offense penalty imposed by TRACK pursuant to Subsections B and/or C may, in its discretion, include and be based upon a violation of similar contractual provisions at any other meet conducted by a licensed California Thoroughbred racing association.**

**The following language, not included in the agreement, further describes the proposed procedures.**

**Blood samples will be taken and tested from every horse in every Thoroughbred race. Detention stalls will be located adjacent to the test barn and in close proximity to the CHRB Offices. Cameras and recording devices will be mounted so as to monitor activities in and around the detention stalls.**



**STAFF ANALYSIS**  
**ADJUSTMENT OF NORTHERN FAIR AND THOROUGHBRED DATES**

REGULAR BOARD MEETING  
MAY 26, 2005

**Background:**

The CHRB Race Dates Committee met on April 27, 2005, to discuss the re-allocation of race dates for Northern California. This meeting was the last of a series of meetings dealing with the change in the racing program at the California State Fair and Exposition (Cal Expo). Cal Expo had been approved to run a harness meet before, during, and after its traditional fair race meet. This left open the question as to the disposition of the fair dates allocated to Cal Expo. As it turns out, the northern fairs and Bay Meadows worked out an arrangement (see attached Plan C) whereby the fair dates at Cal Expo do not change venue but rather disappear for 2005. Bay Meadows will commence earlier on August 26 but go dark during the Fresno Fair on Oct 5, 6, 12, and 13 giving that fair some non-overlap days. Because of that give and take, the total number of races days for Bay Meadows remains unchanged. In addition, this will remove the annual discussion about overlap between Bay Meadows and Cal Expo since there will be none. However, the bottom line is that the twelve days of fair racing at Cal Expo are lost for 2005 for what is to be a one-year experiment.

**Recommendation:**

Staff recommends that the Board hear from the Race Dates Committee regarding this matter.

The Los Angeles County Fair Association is hereby requesting an adjustment in its racing dates for the 2005 racing season. The Fair Association has previously received approval from the CHRB Dates Committee to run 17 consecutive days from September 9, 2005 through September 25, 2005. On an experimental basis, the Fair Association would like to adjust its dates to reflect a 16 day racemeet, beginning on Friday, September 9, 2005 and ending on Monday, September 26, 2005, with dark days on Tuesday, September 13, 2005 and Tuesday, September 20, 2005.

The Los Angeles County Fair event will run this year from September 9, 2005 through October 2, 2005, open Wednesdays through Sundays. Inasmuch as this schedule represents a departure from our historical 17 day Fair event, we believe that this would be an appropriate time to try a new schedule for the racemeet as well. We would like to retain the opportunity to return to our traditional racing schedule in future years if these changes do not prove beneficial for the Fair Association, racing industry, and our customers.

As of this time, we are unaware of any industry opposition to this change in our racing schedule. Please let us know as soon as possible regarding your support for these changes, as we would like to begin marketing of the Fair and the racemeet in the next few weeks.

## BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides that the California Horse Racing Board (Board/CHRB) shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of the Horse Racing Law. Responsibilities of the Board include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19480 states that the Board may issue licenses to conduct horse racing meetings. CHRB Rule 1433, Application for License to Conduct A Horse Racing Meeting, provides that every association or fair that intends to conduct a horse racing meeting must file a completed application with the Board at least 90 days prior to its proposed meeting. Forms CHRB-17, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting, and CHRB-18, Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting of a California Fair, are incorporated by reference in Rule 1433; therefore, any revisions to the applications would necessitate an amendment to the rule. Proposed revisions to forms CHRB-17 and CHRB-18 were discussed at the January 2005 Regular Board Meeting. At that time, staff was instructed to publish a notice of proposal to amend Rule 1433 for a 45-day public comment period.

## ANALYSIS

The proposal to amend form CHRB-17 would require that applicants file an audited annual financial statement of the actual license holder with the application for license. An audited financial statement would provide more information regarding the applicant's financial status than has previously been available. CHRB-17 and CHRB-18 have been revised to collect information about the applicant's electronic security system and emergency lighting system in the case of the night racing industry. In addition, on both forms, applicants must identify steps they may be taking to increase on-track attendance and in the development of new horse racing fans. Questions include advertising budget; promotional plans; the number of hosts/hostesses employed by the association; and facilities set aside for new fans as well as any improvements to the physical facility. Other changes to the forms eliminate redundant words and phrases, and renumbering as needed. (See applications marked "Draft A" CHRB-17 and CHRB-18.)

During the 45-day public comment period staff received comments from the California Federation of Racing Associations (Federation) expressing support for the proposed amendment to Rule 1433 with the exception of disclosing advertising and promotional budget

information. The Federation contends such information might be considered proprietary to the respective associations, and suggested the submission of budgetary information be left to the discretion of the applicant. Similar objections to providing information regarding the percentage an association expected to charge out-of-state sites for simulcasting activity were made by Del Mar Thoroughbred Club. Because of the confidential nature of the requested information, associations are reluctant to disclose the data. Also, under the provisions of the Public Records Act it would be difficult for staff to maintain the confidentiality of such information. Staff suggests the requirement to disclose budgetary information and information regarding percentages charged to out-of-state simulcast sites be amended to reflect that this information be submitted upon request when the Board deems it necessary. (See applications marked "Draft B" section 14 of CHRB-17 and section 13 of CHRB-18.)

Recent applicants for license to conduct a horse racing meeting have used the application marked "Draft A." This has helped staff identify sections that need clarification. Based on the applicants' responses, staff has modified the Security Controls questions in section 11 of the CHRB-17 and section 10 of CHRB-18 (See "Draft B" of each form). The requirement that a written plan for security for graded stakes races was expanded to include races of \$100,000 or more. In addition, applicants must include the number of security guards in the restricted areas during a 24-hour period and a plan for detention barns. New subsections regarding detention barn plans, and plans for TCO2 testing has also been added.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board instruct staff to initiate a 15-day public comment period and modify the proposed amendment to Rule 1433 to reflect the revisions that require promotional budgetary information and fees charged for out-of-state simulcasting activity to be available upon request of the Board, and include the clarification to the expanded Security Control section.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code Section 19580 states that the Board shall adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines, and penalties relating to equine medication in order to preserve and enhance the integrity of horse racing in California. Rule 1887, Trainer to Insure Condition of Horse, states if the Board or its agents fail to notify a trainer of a potential positive test within 18 calendar days from the date the sample was taken the trainer shall not be deemed responsible unless it is shown by the preponderance of the evidence that the trainer administered the prohibited drug substance or caused the administration or had knowledge of the administration.

The proposed amendment will extend the time to notify a trainer of a potential positive test finding from 18 calendar days to 21 calendar days.

ANALYSIS

It can take up to seven days, or more if a holiday falls within the shipping process, for the laboratory to receive the test sample. The Board is notified of a potential positive test finding after the laboratory completes their testing process. When unanticipated delays occur in the shipping or the laboratory testing the Board has, on occasion, received notification from the laboratory of a potential positive finding with only one day to locate and notify a trainer. If it is a dark day at the track and the trainer is not at the track nor can be located at their address of record it can be impossible to notify a trainer.

The proposed amendment of Rule 1887 takes into account the time required to ship samples to the laboratory, which in turn will allow adequate time for the laboratory to analyze the samples and gives the Board or its agents three additional days to locate and notify a trainer of a potential positive finding.

RECOMMENDATION

The proposed amendment was heard February 16, 2005, at the Medication Committee Meeting and recommended for notice. No comments were received during the 45-day notice period.

Staff recommends the Board adopt the proposed amendment of Rule 1887.

1887. Trainer to Insure Condition of Horse.

(a) The trainer is the absolute insurer of and responsible for the condition of the horses entered in a race, regardless of the acts of third parties, except as otherwise provided in this article. If the chemical or other analysis of urine or blood test samples or other tests, prove positive showing the presence of any prohibited drug substance defined in Rule 1843.1 of this division, the trainer of the horse may be fined, his/her license suspended or revoked, or be ruled off. In addition, the owner of the horse, foreman in charge of the horse, groom, and any other person shown to have had the care or attendance of the horse, may be fined, his/her license suspended, revoked, or be ruled off.

(b) Notwithstanding the above, if the Board or its agents fail to notify a trainer of a potential positive test within ~~18~~ 21 calendar days from the date the sample was taken, the trainer shall not be deemed responsible under this rule unless it is shown by the preponderance of the evidence that the trainer administered the drug or other prohibited substance defined in Rule 1843.1 of this division, caused the administration or had knowledge of the administration.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary to enable it to carry out fully the purposes of this chapter. B&P Code Section 19590 states that the Board shall adopt rules governing, permitting, and regulating pari-mutuel wagering on horse races under the system known as the pari-mutuel method of wagering. B&P Code Section 19593 states no method of betting, pool making, or wagering other than by the pari-mutuel method shall be permitted or used by any person licensed under this chapter to conduct a horse racing meeting. Board Rule 1976.9, Pick (n) Pool requires the selection of the first-place finisher in each of a number of races designated by the association. The Pick (n) must be comprised of more than three, but no greater than ten races. The National Thoroughbred Racing Association (NTRA) Players Panel recommendations regarding the Pick (n) wager were heard by the Pari-Mutuel Operations Committee (Committee) in February 2005. At the February 2005 Regular Board Meeting, the Committee recommended the Board adopt the NTRA recommended amendments to the Pick (n). (See "Attachment A" subsection (n).)

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Rule 1976.9 provides that if the condition of the turf course warrants a change of racing surface in a race included in a Pick (n) wager, and the public is not informed of the change prior to the close of wagering on the Pick (n), the race will be declared "no contest" by the stewards for the purposes of the Pick (n) pool. The proposed change is meant to protect the wagering public who might not have been fully informed when they placed their wagers. Horses that perform well on a turf course might not perform as expected on a dirt course. By declaring the race "no contest" all tickets are winners in that particular leg of the Pick (n) wager. The proposal to amend Rule 1976.9 also permits the totalizator to provide information regarding possible Pick (n) payouts for each of the runners when the last race comprising the Pick (n) is the only race remaining. Such information may help build excitement over the Pick (n) wager, and indicate if a carry-over will occur. The association offering the Pick (n) wager would be able to promote the carry-over and perhaps generate more wagers for the next performance.

During the 45-day public comment period it was noted the term "no contest" – as used in subsection 1976.9(n) – could be confused with the provisions of Board Rule 1544, Calling Off Race, which provides circumstances where the stewards may declare the race as "no contest." Staff agreed with the comment and changed the language of subsection (n) to clarify the intent

of the proposed amendment. Rather than declare the race “no contest” all wagers on the race “shall be considered winning wagers for the purposes of the Pick (n) pool.” (See “Attachment B” subsection (n).)

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board instruct staff to notice the amended text (“Attachment B”) for an additional 15-day public comment period.

Such distribution shall include the portion ordinarily retained for the Pick (n) carryover but not the carryover from previous performances.


