MINUTES

Chairman Shapiro asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of March 23, 2006. Vice-Chairman Moretti **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Andreini **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACE MEETING OF THE SAN JOAQUIN COUNTY FAIR (F) AT STOCKTON FROM JUNE 14 THROUGH JUNE 25, 2006, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the San Joaquin County Fair (SJCF) proposed to run 10 days, the same number of days as in 2005, for a total of 104 races, two more races than in 2005. Ms. Wagner stated the proposed race dates were the same dates allocated to the fair. She added SJCF would run concurrent with Bay Meadows the last three days of the Bay Meadows meeting - June 16, 17 and 18, and SJCF would also run concurrently with Hollywood Park. Ms. Wagner said there were no items missing from the application, and staff recommended the Board approve the application as presented. Chairman Shapiro stated he noted SJCF proposed to run 12 races on Saturday and Sunday. He asked if SJCF ran the same

number of races in 2005. Forrest White of SJCF said his organization ran that number of races on the weekend for the past six years. He stated four of the races were for emerging breeds and eight were thoroughbred. Chairman Shapiro said he was concerned with the shortage of thoroughbreds and did not want to see the remainder of the fair circuit depleted. Mr. White said SJCF had horses from Arizona in 2005, and in 2006 it hoped to also see horses from Oregon. Vice-Chairman Moretti **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting of SJCF. Commissioner Harris **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACE MEETING OF THE ALAMEDA COUNTY FAIR (F) AT PLEASANTON FROM JUNE 28 THROUGH JULY 9, 2006, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Alameda County Fair (ACF) proposed to run 11-days, the same number as in 2005, for a total of 122 races, two more races than in 2005. Ms. Wagner commented Hollywood Park and ACF would not be running concurrently on ACF's opening day and on July 6, 2006. She stated the application was complete and staff recommended the Board approve the application as presented. Chairman Shapiro asked why ACF was projecting a decrease in its projected purse revenues. Rick Pickering of ACF said the numbers were not accurate. They should match the previous year's numbers. Commissioner Harris asked if there were more purse funds than projected, would those funds be paid retroactively to the horsemen, or were they carried over to the next meeting? Chris Korby of California Authority of Racing Fairs said the agreement stipulated if the amount were over \$25,000 there would be a retroactive payment. He stated such payments were made on a

week-by-week basis. Chairman Shapiro praised ACF's promotional plans and their presentation in the application. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** to approve the application to conduct a horse racing meeting of ACF. Commissioner Moss **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE REGULATORY AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1544 – CALLING OFF RACE AND CHRB RULE 1658 – VESTING OF TITLE TO CLAIMED HORSE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said Rule 1544, Calling off Race, provided the conditions under which a race could be called off, cancelled or declared no contest. The rule did not address the disposition of claims if a race is called off, cancelled or declared no contest. At the 2005 Del Mar meeting a race was declared no contest under Rule 1544. In addition, the stewards ordered all claims in that race void. An owner of a horse that was claimed appealed the stewards' decision and prevailed. Ms. Wagner stated the proposed amendment to Rule 1544 would clearly state that all claims submitted in a race that was called off, cancelled, or declared no contest would be void. In addition, the proposed amendment to Rule 1658, Vesting of Title to Claimed Horse, would state a claim was void if the race was called off in accordance with the provisions of Rule 1544. Ms. Wagner said staff recommended the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period. Chairman Shapiro said he believed the proposed amendment would provide clarity. Commissioner Harris stated if the Board wished to change the rule regarding claims that was fine but he believed the issue with races declared no contest was that participants should somehow be paid. He said the issue should be addresses at some point, or be made part of the horsemen's agreement. Ed Halpern of

California Thoroughbred Trainers stated he believed the incident at Del Mar was ultimately handled correctly, but what mattered was that the regulation was clear. Mr. Halpern said he agreed with Commissioner Harris. Horsemen who entered a race that was cancelled through no fault of their own could have up to three months without any return. The purse monies for the race should be divided between the participants, or enough of it should be distributed to make horsemen feel they were compensated for their losses. Commissioner Harris said he believed it should be part of the horsemen's agreement as there were different situations, and purses were a matter between the tracks and the horsemen. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) stated his board had not discussed the proposed amendment. However, he personally believed it would provide clarity. He added there was no precedent for paying for horses in a no contest race, as there were few such races. Mr. Couto stated he would rather the Board let the parties decide the appropriate solution by contract. Balancing purse funds over the course of a race meeting was often difficult and a racetrack was frequently overpaid. Mr. Couto said he would bring the issues before the TOC board and perhaps come back with an answer. Jack Liebau of Bay Meadows said from time to time accommodations were made in the north with respect to participants in a race declared no contest. Mr. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, said he believed the regulation should not be amended. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** to instruct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period. Commissioner Harris **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE REGULATORY AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1969 – WAGERING PROHIBITED.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said Rule 1969, Wagering Prohibited, excluded certain classes of licensees and Board staff from wagering while on duty. At the March 2006 Regular Board Meeting a proposed amendment to Rule 1969 was presented. The proposed amendment would have prevented persons who fell under Rule 1969 from wagering at any time at the meeting at which they were employed. Ms. Wagner stated the Board had concerns with the proposed amendment and no action was taken. Staff subsequently changed the language of the proposed amendment to address the Board's concerns. The amended language would prohibit a person who fell under Rule 1969 from wagering at a facility at which they are employed if they were on duty. The term "on duty" was defined as a period from 12:01 a.m., the date a person was scheduled to work, until the end of his specified work period, including authorized rest and meal breaks. Ms. Wagner said staff recommended the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period. Commissioner Harris said the definition of "on duty" addressed his concerns. He asked if the Pari-Mutuel Employees Guild (PEG) had any issues with the proposed amendment. Richard Castro PEG said he believed pari-mutuel clerks should be excluded from the rule. Chairman Shapiro said he agreed. In his opinion, the rule change had to do with licensees who dealt with horses or had some bearing on the outcome of the race, and he did not see where a pari-mutuel clerk or a camera operator could have an effect. Chairman Shapiro said he had difficulty with some of the classifications because the rule was unenforceable in the real world due to modern technology and he did not see how a simulcast facility supervisor could affect the outcome of a race. Mr. Castro said if a pari-mutuel clerk was to do something it was fairly easy for the employer to trace back the infraction.

Commissioner Moss said he agreed that the rule would be difficult to enforce, and he would also exclude pari-mutuel clerks. Chairman Shapiro said that was why the Board could perhaps make other changes to the regulation and limit it to racing officials and assistant racing officials. He suggested the proposal should be reviewed to determine who had an effect on the outcome of a race, and be brought back to the Board at a later date. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his thoughts on the proposed amendment to Rule 1969. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** to return the proposed amendment to staff for further investigation. Commissioner Harris **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

PUBLIC HEARING BY THE BOARD ON THE ADOPTION OF THE FOLLOWING ACTIONS:

A. REPEAL OF CHRB RULE 1606 – COUPLING OF HORSES AND CHRB RULE 1974 – WAGERING INTEREST.

B. REGULATORY AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1420 – DEFINITIONS; RULE 1954.1 – PARLAY WAGERING ON WIN, PLACE OR SHOW; RULE 1957 – DAILY DOUBLE; RULE 1959 – SPECIAL QUINELLA (EXACTA); RULE 1976 – UNLIMITED SWEEPSTAKES; RULE 1976.8 – PLACE PICK (N); RULE 1976.9 – PICK (N) POOL; RULE 1977 – PICK THREE; RULE 1978 – SELECT FOUR; RULE 1979 – TRIFECTA; AND RULE 1979.1 – SUPERFECTA.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposed repeal of Rule 1606, Coupling of Horses, and Rule 1974, Wagering Interest, would eliminate the practice of coupling two or more horses as a single wagering interest when the same person or persons own the horse in whole or in part. If the coupling was eliminated, Rule 1974 would be folded into an amended Rule 1420, Definitions, as the definition of “wagering interest” would no longer include coupling. Ms. Wagner said staff received a large number of comments during the 45-day public comment period. The majority of comments were against the proposed repeal of Rule 1606.

Ms. Wagner summarized the comments in opposition to the proposed repeal, and the comments in favor of the proposed action. She stated in light of the number of comments against the proposed repeal of Rule 1606, staff recommended the Board not adopt the proposed repeal and that the Board continue to review the matter. Chairman Shapiro said he would like to hear from the industry regarding the proposed repeal. He stated he questioned if the issue would be raised if there were an abundance of horses. In addition, he recognized that fans were sometimes left with a wager they might not have made when a horse that is part of an entry was scratched. Chairman Shapiro said there was a shortage of horses, but the Board also had to protect the integrity of horse racing. Commissioner Harris stated he did not believe all the comments from owners and the racing industry were received. He said some people were obviously concerned with the proposed repeal of Rule 1606, but there were some comments in favor of the action. Chairman Shapiro said he agreed. He stated the Board encouraged interested parties to submit comments, but he did not believe a scientific sampling was received. While he appreciated those who wrote, he said he did not think their opinions were indicative of what the true public felt. Commissioner Harris stated a lot of the comments were also against uncoupling horses trained by the same trainer, which was something the Board felt was appropriate. He said if the public comments were relied on, the Board should also revisit that issue. Jack Liebau of Bay Meadows and Hollywood Park stated both racetracks supported the repeal of Rule 1606, as it would help relieve the shortage of horses. In addition, Mr. Liebau said he did not buy into fears of race fixing, as every owner and every trainer was only trying to have their horses perform as well as they could to win many races. Sherwood Chillingworth of Oak Tree Racing said he agreed with Mr. Liebau. He stated trainers had far

more ability to influence the outcome of a race, and they were not required to couple entries. Mr. Chillingworth said only those who were against repealing Rule 1606 made an effort to submit comments. He said he thought the repeal was a “done deal” and there was no point in raising an issue on which the industry was in agreement. Mr. Chillingworth stated he believed the industry could get just as many people to state they were in favor of uncoupling entries. Commissioner Harris said comments were expected on any rule put out for comment, and no one should assume anything. It appeared the horsemen and the tracks were not being proactive and making comments, but hopefully, in the future, comments would be submitted. Chairman Shapiro said that went to the point of what staff interpreted. He stated staff’s recommendation was based on the public e-mails, and that was why tracks needed to be heard from as well. Drew Couto of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said his organization did have concerns that uncoupling could bring into question the integrity of horse racing in certain cases. He stated TOC was proposing that both entries and the horses run individually, so the public would be protected. The public could wager on the entries and the individual owners could have a chance to start their horses. There would be three wagering interests, the shortage of horses would be addressed and the integrity of racing would be protected with coupled entries. Chairman Shapiro asked if Mr. Couto’s concept could be implemented quickly. Terry McWilliams of Scientific Games (SG) said SG would have to look at the scope of the programming, but an estimate would not take long to generate. He added anything could be done with programming. Chairman Shapiro asked how long would it take to do what Mr. Couto suggested. Mr. McWilliams stated if Mr. Couto had anything written, he would forward it to his research and development department and within 24 hours a response to the

question could be given. He said he was not a programmer, so he did not have the ability to answer Chairman Shapiro's question. Commissioner Moss stated the Board could set a minimum of four owners per race or four trainers, which would ease the worries of those who objected to the proposal. He added a lot of comment has been made regarding uncoupling horses. The harness industry indicated it did not want to participate in the repeal, but others from the industry were in support of the idea. Commissioner Moss added he also supported the proposed repeal. Chairman Shapiro said he thought repealing the coupling requirement on an experimental basis would give the industry time to study the idea. Commissioner Harris asked if the Board could waive the coupling rule for a given race meeting. Deputy Attorney General (DAG) Derry Knight said the Board could waive the rule under Rule 1406, Suspension of Rule. Chairman Shapiro said that would be his first choice. He stated an experiment could be conducted at the spring Hollywood Park and Bay Meadows meetings. Ron Charles of Magna Entertainment Corporation (MEC) said it would be nice to form a committee to look at the variables of such an experiment before it was initiated. Chairman Shapiro stated if horsemen, track representatives and Board staff developed a framework for the experiment everyone would know what was happening. In addition, data could be kept so the Board could come back and decide if it wanted to repeal Rule 1606. DAG Knight said if the Board was going to waive the rule, it could not delegate others to decide what the rules should be; the Board would have to come back with a proposal. Chairman Shapiro said the Board could work through the Pari-Mutuel/ADW and Simulcast Committee. Vice-Chairman Moretti asked what Del Mar Thoroughbred Club (DMTC) thought of the proposal. Craig Fravel of DMTC said as long as there was adequate disclosure; and the public was fully aware

of what it was wagering on; and as long as the stewards were doing their jobs, waiving the coupling rule was fine. Greg Badovinac, a horse racing fan, spoke in opposition to the repeal of Rule 1606. He stated coupling was a matter of fairness to the players because where ownership was the same; they would be protected with an entry. Racing fans never knew which horse under common ownership would run better, so the entry provided protection. If there really was full disclosure the issue might be different, but due to the nature of the sport there never would be full disclosure because owners and trainers did not want their opponents to know what they were doing. Jerry Jamgotian, a horse owner, spoke against the repeal of Rule 1606. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** to waive Rule 1606 at the spring Hollywood Park race meeting and the spring Bay Meadows race meeting, effective the day of Bay Meadow's opening through July 16, 2006, and subject to the house rules. Mr. Couto asked Chairman Shapiro to modify the motion to make the waiver of Rule 1606 subject to an agreement of the horsemen's association and the racing association. Chairman Shapiro said his motion was so **modified**. DAG Knight said a waiver of Rule 1606 was not on the agenda. He suggested the Board issue a ten-day notice for a special teleconference meeting that would allow it to be in compliance with the open meeting act. Chairman Shapiro said a ten-day notice for a telephonic meeting of the Board would be issued. Ms. Wagner asked if the Board wanted the repeal of Rule 1606 renoticed after the experiment. Chairman Shapiro said the repeal could be noticed concurrent with the experiment, and **motioned** not to take action on the repeal of Rule 1606, and to have staff renote the proposed repeal. Commissioner Moss **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**. Ms. Wagner said item "B" of the issue was only necessary if the Board adopted the repeal of Rule 1606. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** not to

take action on item “B” and to have staff renote the item in conjunction with the repeal of Rule 1606. Vice-Chairman Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

PUBLIC HEARING BY THE BOARD ON THE ADOPTION OF THE REGULATORY AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1472 – RAIL CONSTRUCTION AND TRACK SPECIFICATIONS, TO PROVIDE AN EXEMPTION FOR SYNTHETIC AND POLYMER OR WAX-COATED SAND TRACK SURFACES FROM THE CROSS-SLOPE REQUIREMENTS FOR STRAIGHT-AWAYS AND TURNS AS REQUIRED IN RULE 1472.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposal to amend Rule 1472, Rail Construction and Track Specifications, would provide that synthetic or polymer or wax-coated sand track surfaces would be exempt from the cross slope requirements of Rule 1472. Ms. Wagner stated no comments were received during the 45-day public comment period, and staff recommended the Board adopt the amendment as presented. Chairman Shapiro said the regulation also talked about drainage systems and a particular base; not just surface material. He stated he was concerned the language of the proposed amendment did not deal with the entire system. Craig Fravel of Del Mar Thoroughbred Club said there was a system requirement and drainage issues. However, those issues could be dealt with through proper inspections and review of plans before a synthetic track was installed. Mr. Fravel stated the reason slope requirements were included in Rule 1472 had to do with the ability of organic dirt tracks to drain properly. Jack Liebau of Bay Meadows and Hollywood Park said not all manufacturers of synthetic material racetracks believed such tracks should be flat. He stated he believed the Board should move with caution on the issue of synthetic track surfaces, as the industry was in an experimental stage. Mr. Liebau added he believed the proposed amendment would not prevent a synthetic track from having a slope. Commissioner Harris said the only purpose of the

regulation was to allow for a flat surface if appropriate. Commissioner Harris **motioned** to adopt the proposed amendment to Rule 1472. Commissioner Andreini **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE REPORT FROM LOS ANGELES TURF CLUB ON IMPROVEMENT PLANS FOR THE BARN AND STABLE AREAS.

Ron Charles of Magna Entertainment Corporation (MEC) said MEC was working on the demolition and rebuilding of two barns at Los Angeles Turf Club (LATC). Mr. Charles said they would be the same barns as those built at Palm Meadows and Gulf Stream. He added the barns would be completed around the end of September 2006. MEC was looking at long-term plans to decide what would happen after the two barns were completed. Chairman Shapiro asked how many stalls each barn would have. Mr. Charles stated one barn had 32 stalls and the other barn had up to 20 stalls. Chairman Shapiro asked how long the master plan for the entire barn area would take to complete. Mr. Charles said there was still some discussion regarding where the remainder of the barns would be placed, as some barns would be lost due to the Caruso project. He stated he could have a master plan ready within 45 days. Chairman Shapiro asked if the project would be completed in phases. Mr. Charles said the project would probably have to be completed in increments of one quarter per year, as the industry did not have the facilities to provide for the displacement of horses. Commissioner Harris asked if there would be a housing component to the new barns. Mr. Charles said dormitories, similar to those at Gulf Stream, would be built. Chairman Shapiro asked if LATC would be taking care of its infestation of rodents. Mr. Charles said LATC thought it would be able to address

the problem when it closed during the Del Mar meeting. However, LATC could not close because Hollywood Park was going to install a synthetic racing surface. Chairman Shapiro said he did not know what Hollywood Park planned for 2006, but if it were to remain open would LATC take care of its rodent problem? Mr. Charles said LATC would do as it originally planned and eradicate the rodents. Chairman Shapiro said the Board would like LATC to appear at a future Regular Board Meeting to talk about its plans for its entire barn area. Commissioner Harris asked about the status of the Caruso project. Mr. Charles said the Arcadia City Council would vote on the project, and then it would probably go to a referendum and potentially a lawsuit, so it would be delayed for a while; however, it was moving ahead. Chairman Shapiro asked if MEC would make a presentation regarding the Caruso project. Mr. Charles said MEC could give a 15-minute presentation at any time. Chairman Shapiro suggested Mr. Charles work with staff to arrive at a date for a presentation.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE MATTER OF: (1) LICENSING AND SETTING OF ADW HUB RATES AND THE OBLIGATIONS OF ADW COMPANIES AND OR RACING ASSOCIATIONS TO HAVE AGREEMENTS WITH HORSEMEN'S OR OWNER'S ORGANIZATIONS; (2) TVG AND TOC HUB FEE RATE DISPUTE RELATING TO IMPORTED TB RACES AND THE PROPRIETY OF AN ADW COMPANY TO IMPORT RACES WITHOUT A CONTRACT IN PLACE WITH A RACING ASSOCIATION OR HORSEMEN'S ORGANIZATION OF THE SAME BREED AS THE IMPORTED RACES; (3) METHOD OF DETERMINING, CALCULATING AND RESERVING FOR RATES IN DISPUTE; (4) ANY OTHER RELATED MATTER CONSIDERED PART OF THE DISPUTE BETWEEN ANY ADW COMPANY AND ANY RACING ASSOCIATION OR HORSEMEN'S OR OWNER'S ORGANIZATION.

Chairman Shapiro said the item was deferred.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON A REPORT OF THE MOLD PROBLEM AT THE SURFSIDE RACE PLACE (SIMULCAST FACILITY) AT DEL MAR.

Chairman Shapiro said the item was deferred until the May 2006 Regular Board Meeting.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE FEASIBILITY OF SPONSORING LEGISLATION TO DIRECT FINES COLLECTED BY THE BOARD TO RACING RELATED ORGANIZATIONS OR PROGRAMS.

Chairman Shapiro said fines levied in horse racing currently went back to the State's general fund. He stated he believed it would be in racing's best interest to see the monies collected as fines or sanctions redirected into racing-related causes. Commissioner Harris asked if there was any precedent for returning fines to an agency's budget. Vice-Chairman Moretti said there was some precedent; however, within the past few years any request to do something similar was turned down due to the State's fiscal crisis. Rod Blonien, a lawyer and industry lobbyist, said there was a legal principle that held an enforcement agency should not benefit from the actions it took to enforce the law and regulations. It would be like the police writing tickets where the fines went directly into a police fund. Mr. Blonien said such an idea might ultimately not benefit the Board. If the Board took \$200,000 in fines, that money would simply be taken out of the Board's budget, and the Board would be expected to pay for an activity with fines.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE DRUG TESTING PROGRAM, INCLUDING A REVIEW OF THE PROGRAM COSTS AND BENEFITS.

Commissioner Harris said the overall CHRB budget was in the approval process at the legislature. He stated there were some questions regarding the drug testing program, which needed to be well funded to have top flight testing. Commissioner Harris said the Board needed industry support on the matter to get it through the legislature. Chairman Shapiro stated the CHRB had a budget of approximately 8.5 million dollars, and to do more and better testing, the Board asked for a budget increase of \$850,000. He said it was important that the industry support the request and educate the legislature regarding drug testing's importance to the over all integrity of the sport. Chairman Shapiro added California was behind other states in terms of dollars spent on drug testing. To be able to do more testing the Board needed the industry's support.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON CHRB RULE 1876 – FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY.

Commissioner Harris said he questioned the amount of time the Board devoted to financial cases. He stated it was a complex issue that probably should be diverted to the Steward's Committee for objective analysis. Chairman Shapiro said he shared Commissioner Harris's view that sometimes the stewards seemed to be bill collectors. He said the item would be sent to the Steward's Committee.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE MATTER OF SETTING BOARD MEETING DAYS AND LOCATIONS.

Chairman Shapiro said he thought the Board should look at moving its meetings to Tuesdays, which were typically dark. He stated he would like to start the meeting at 1 o'clock and hold committee meetings earlier in the day so participants would not have to be inconvenienced by staying overnight. Commissioner Harris said he thought it was a good idea, but perhaps not for every meeting. He stated there was value in being at a track while it was live, as one could look at improvements or the racing program. Chairman Shapiro said he would also like to schedule a meeting at the Maddy Laboratory so the industry could see other parts of the industry. Commissioner Harris suggested a meeting in Sacramento that could be tied into Legislative Day. Vice-Chairman Moretti said she thought it would be a good idea to give the Board the opportunity to meet with legislators. Rod Blonien said it would be difficult for some persons, such as industry lobbyists, to attend a Tuesday Board meeting. He stated the Senate Governmental Organizational Committee met on Tuesdays, and it would be difficult to get to Southern California – especially during the months of January through June. Chairman Shapiro said the Board would look at making revisions to the scheduled Board meetings for the remainder of 2006. He stated he was not looking to disturb meetings where rooms had already been booked. Chairman Shapiro said Legislative Day was on June 19, so perhaps changes could be made beginning in that month.

REPORT OF THE RACE DATES AND STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE.

Chairman Shapiro said the Race Dates and Strategic Planning Committee (committee) meeting was postponed. He stated in 2006 the committee was moving in a different direction and

would look at all the alternatives to direct California horse racing to a bright future. He stated the committee would look at contingency plans in the event one or more of the State's racetracks was lost. The committee wanted to hear the opinion of the entire industry regarding how to fix horse racing. The committee would also deal with normal business such as the race dates calendar.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Ronald Caswell, an interested party, suggested the Board form a neutral oversight panel to monitor claims from licensees that believed they were not treated fairly by the stewards or Board staff. Chairman Shapiro said there were organizations that represented licensees. Owners could go to the breed organizations, such as Thoroughbred Owners of California, if they felt they were not being treated fairly by the Board or its agents, and a trainer could go to the California Thoroughbred Trainers. In addition, Board staff was available to listen to anyone who felt they were being treated unfairly. Chairman Shapiro said he heard many complaints, which he looked into. He stated he found management at the racetracks to be receptive to rectifying situations. Chairman Shapiro said he was also receptive to the idea of forming an ad hoc committee. To illustrate the need for a neutral committee Mr. Caswell related an incident that involved intimidation of a jockey who was to testify before the stewards. Commissioner Harris said he believed licensees should be directed to the organizations that represented their interests. He commented the Jockey's Guild would be interested in the incident related by Mr. Caswell. Chairman Shapiro said he spoke with Jockey's Guild staff and had not heard of the incident. He stated licensees needed to talk to

their representatives rather than contact a lawyer or remain silent. Licensees would find the intent of the Board was to do the right thing. Candace M. Young, a horse owner, spoke about her feelings regarding an incident regarding her daughter who was a trainer. Chairman Shapiro said Ms. Young needed to use the proper channels to voice her complaints as the Board faced the possibility of hearing an appeal and could not discuss the case. Kate Crismani, an owner and breeder, spoke about her experiences with the CHRB hearing process. Commissioner Shapiro thanked Ms. Crismani for her comments.





Two pan cameras located adjacent to the placing judges room in the Press Box cover the entire race. Additionally, we have a pan camera on the 7th floor, which covers the entire race in 16 x 9 format for our video board presentation.



This memorandum provides additional detail regarding enhanced security for graded stakes at the 2006 race meet. In 2004, Del Mar was the first track in California to implement enhanced security for all graded stakes. Working in conjunction with TOC and CTT, Del Mar set the stage for further development of security procedures at Fairplex, Oak Tree, Santa Anita and Hollywood Park.

Components of the 2006 plan include the following:

1. Assignment of event security personnel to each graded stakes entry beginning no less than six (6) hours prior to post-time for the race;
2. Training of event security personnel by the Del Mar racing office, Del Mar security supervisors and CHRB investigators;
3. Provision and monitoring of log/surveillance sheets requiring all individuals entering the stall of an entrant to provide license information and purpose of entry;
4. Hand-held digital video cameras for all event surveillance personnel to record activity by persons entering stalls;
5. Total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) level testing of entries in all races consistent with the testing at preceding race meets;
6. Compliance with TCO₂ detention barn procedures, protocols and disciplinary procedures as set forth in agreements with TOC and CTT. A copy of current protocols and procedures is attached as Exhibit 11.
7. Enhanced authority to conduct additional supplementary testing as set forth in Section 22 of Del Mar's 2006 stall application, a copy of which is attached.

UNIFORM STALL APPLICATION
CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO OCCUPATION OF STALL SPACE AT
CALIFORNIA RACING ASSOCIATIONS

The undersigned Trainer ("Applicant") hereby agrees to each of the following terms and conditions in consideration for and as a condition of the granting of permission by the Racing Association designated on the reverse side of this application ("Track") for the stabling of horses being trained by the undersigned at Track, or at any approved auxiliary training facility, during the race meeting identified on the face of this application (the "Race Meet"):

1. Track reserves the right without notice to the Applicant, (a) to refuse this application for stable space in whole or in part, or (b) to refuse the entry or the acceptance of any entry in any race or (c) to refuse the transfer of an entry for any cause, so long as said refusal is not in violation of the terms of the race meet agreements with either the Thoroughbred Owners of California or California Thoroughbred Trainers.
2. If any horse is denied stable space or the privilege of registration for racing for any reason, all nomination fees and payments for eligibility to stake races that have been paid with respect to the horse shall be refunded and such sum will be deducted from the total amount subscribed for the particular race or races. Allocations of stall space are made only with the agreement of Applicant that Track reserves to itself the exclusive right, in its sole discretion, to enter, modify, alter, or change the physical condition or use of its facilities: that the permission granted to Applicant to use Track's facilities is solely for the purpose incidental to racing, does not constitute a lease of the facilities and Track maintains the sole interest in and exclusive control of its premises and facilities: and the Track reserves to itself the exclusive right and sole discretion to reduce or totally eliminate the number of stalls or other accommodations assigned and/or change the location of stall or accommodations assigned to Applicant.
3. After submitting this application for stalls, the undersigned shall notify Track immediately of any change in stall requirements and, if stalls have been allocated, of any shipping schedules or change in shipping arrangements.
4. Applicant has inspected the stalls and other accommodations at Track, or if applicable at any approved auxiliary training facility, and agrees to accept any stalls or accommodations assigned pursuant to this application in an "as is" condition. Applicant understands that Track makes no representation or warranty as to the condition or use of stalls and other accommodations assigned.
5. Applicant agrees to remove his horses and/or those in his possession, charge, or control together with all personal property belonging to him or of which he has possession, charge or control from Track forthwith upon the expiration of seventy-two (72) hours after Track has given notice in writing to vacate the stabling accommodation, which notice may be given in the absolute discretion of Track without any reason or cause existing or being stated or given; any such notice or any other given hereunder shall be sufficiently given by posting up such notice on some portion of the stabling accommodation allotted to him and such notice shall be deemed to be given at the time when the same is posted up. The Applicant understands that his employees shall leave Track, forthwith upon the expiration of seventy-two (72) hours after notice has been given as aforesaid. Applicant agrees that if upon the expiration of the said seventy-two (72) hours notice hereinbefore mentioned, any horse or horses or personal property belonging to him or in his possession, charge or control, have not been removed from Track, Track shall be entitled to remove the same from Track without further notice to a suitable location at Applicant's expense and Track shall in no event be responsible for any such horse or horses removed as aforesaid. Applicant agrees that in the event of the horses being stabled

elsewhere at his expense as foresaid that the person, firm or corporation stabling the horses or paying for the stabling of same shall have all the rights as provided by law.

6. The undersigned Applicant represents that Applicant is familiar with and has read the Rules of Racing and Regulations of the California Horse Racing Board, and all conditions applicable to the Race Meet, as well as the rules and regulations of Track, and agrees to be bound by and to comply with the same. All stable reservations and entries in stakes and all other races shall be subject to all conditions, rules and regulations of the California Horse Racing Board and Track and in this application contained. Applicant represents that the owners of all horses listed on the reverse of this application have authorized Applicant to sign this application and have agreed that their horses being trained by Applicant will be bound thereby. All references herein to Applicant or to Applicant's horses, equipment, agents or employees, shall include said owners and their horses, equipment, agents and employees.
7. The Stewards of the Race Meet or the California Horse Racing Board shall decide all disputes, claims and objections relating to the conduct of racing, or with respect to interpretation of any rules or conditions of racing or otherwise. Subject to all legal rights of appeal, Applicant agrees to accept and abide by all decisions of such officials pertaining to the presence or conduct of themselves or of their agents and employees on the premises of Track.
8. In all stakes, entries may be made only through the entry box by the usual time of closing of entries, on the day before the race, or at other times when the conditions for the race specifically so state.
9. Track reserves the right to cancel any stake or other race, which has not filled prior to the actual running thereof without liability to any person, except for the return of nomination and entrance fees, paid. Track reserves the right to divide the added money for any stake that is run in more than one division.
10. Horses claimed by, or transferred or sold to, any person or stable which is not registered for racing at Track must be removed from the grounds within twenty-four (24) hours after they are claimed, transferred or sold unless their continued presence is approved by the racing association then conducting racing at Track.
11. Track will in no event be considered to have responsibility for the care, custody or control of horses kept at Track or elsewhere. Applicant assumes full responsibility for the safety and well-being of all horses stabled by Applicant at Track, and agrees to take all reasonable measures for the protection of such horses, including providing adequate supervision for such animals while on the premises, hiring competent personnel to care for such animals at all times, cleaning and maintaining stalls assigned pursuant to this application and removing any hazardous condition from such stalls which is known to Applicant or Applicant's employees, or if Applicant believes that such condition should be remedied by Track, promptly calling to the attention of Track in writing, any such hazardous conditions. Applicant further agrees to properly supervise all Applicant's employees, agents, their express invitees, and other persons known to them to be in the area assigned to them pursuant to this application, and hereby acknowledges that they are responsible for the conduct of their employees, agents and express invitees, and that Track has no obligation to remedy any condition on the Track premises which may be caused by the negligence of or willful conduct of any such employees, agents or express invitees, unless it has prior written notice of the existence of such condition and has had a reasonable opportunity to repair such condition.
12. The Applicant understands that there may be numerous hazards and risks of injury to Applicant, and Applicant's agents, owners, or employees, upon the Track premises at Applicant's invitation and to their property, which hazards, and risks inherently incidental to accepting stalls at, practicing for, and participating in thoroughbred horse racing at Track.
13. Applicant shall maintain an accurate Stable Employee Registration List and shall submit a copy thereof to Track. Applicant shall pay his/her stable personnel at wage rates

- conforming to applicable laws. Applicant's stable personnel shall continue to be covered under the prevailing and applicable statutory employee benefit programs such as Worker's Compensation, Disability, Unemployment, Social Security and the like. Applicant shall comply with the Fair Employment Practices Act and shall not discriminate by reason of race, color, creed, national origin or sex in hiring employees. Applicant acknowledges that his/her stable personnel are employees of the Applicant and that no employment relationship exists between such stable personnel and Track.
14. In making this application to participate in thoroughbred racing, Applicant understands that an investigative report may be made whereby information is obtained by Track through personal interviews with third parties, such as family members, business associates, financial sources, friends, neighbors, or others with whom he is acquainted. This inquiry may include information as to his/her character, general reputation, personal characteristics and mode of living, which may be applicable. Applicant has the right to make a written request within a reasonable period of time for a complete and accurate disclosure of additional information concerning the nature and scope of the investigation.
 15. Each party to this stall application shall be liable for its own acts and omissions as well as those of its agents, employees and express invitees to the same extent as would be provided at law without such provision.
 16. Applicant agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Track and its affiliates against any and all claims, liabilities, losses, costs, damages and attorneys' fees incurred by reason of the negligence of Applicant or Applicant's agents, employees and invitees, or resulting from Applicant or Applicant's agents, employees and invitees, violation of this agreement, including, but not limited to, violation of the rules and regulations of the CHRB and Track and violation of city and county fire, health or law enforcement, ordinances, rules and regulations. Applicant's indemnity shall not extend to liabilities, claims, losses, damages or attorneys' fees arising out of the negligence or willful acts or omission of Track or its respective agents or employees.
 17. If horses accepted for racing at Track are assigned to an approved auxiliary training facility, then the provisions of this application shall also apply to such other facility.
 18. Applicant agrees to be responsible for any damages to rooms assigned to Applicant caused by Applicant or Applicant's employees, agents and invitees. In the event such damage is repaired by Track, the cost of such repairs shall be charged to the Applicant.
 19. Emergency Action Plan: Applicant shall be responsible for complying with all OSHA regulations as they pertain to Applicant's employees. Track is not responsible for training or accounting for any employees other than its own during an emergency. Copies of the Track Emergency Action Plan are available in the Operations office upon request.
 20. The granting of stalls and other accommodations pursuant to this application in whole or in part shall not constitute a lease of space but a revocable license only and may be revoked at any time by Track in its absolute discretion.
 21. The undersigned Applicant acknowledges that each additional starter in a race is projected to produce an increase in mutuel handle, which, is in turn projected to increase purse revenues. Applicant understands that he/she is expected to average at least one (1) start per month for each stall allotted during the race meet covered by this application.
 22. Track is entitled to perform physiological tests consisting of the taking of blood samples from owners' horses entered into races to be conducted at the Race Meet. Such samples will be tested for bicarbonate levels. Trainers of horses showing a total carbon dioxide per liter of plasma in excess of the level specified in the Race Meet Agreement(s) between the Track and the Thoroughbred Owners of California or California Thoroughbred Trainers shall be subject to the disciplinary measures specified in such Agreement.
 23. **In order to assure the protection of the public, to maintain and encourage confidence in the integrity of horse racing and to safeguard the health and safety of human and equine participants, Applicant acknowledges that Applicant and Applicant's agents, employees and affiliates have no expectation of privacy with**

respect to stalls and living quarters and appurtenant facilities provided by Track. Track specially reserves the right to conduct searches of stall areas, offices, tack rooms, and other living quarters assigned to Applicant at any time and without notice and to conduct supplemental testing of horses in training or competition, and Applicant hereby consents to such actions. Track may, in its discretion, establish rules, regulations, testing and security procedures that may limit or eliminate Applicant's ability to participate in racing or training activities at Track or any auxiliary training facility, subject only to the agreement(s) of the Thoroughbred Owners of California and the California Thoroughbred Trainers. Any such rules, regulations or procedures shall be in addition to and shall not supplant or be supplanted by rules and regulations of the California Horse Racing Board or the testing specified in Paragraph 22.

Detention Barn Plan for Use of Graded Stakes or Overnight Races

As with the barn area, surveillance control and viewing will be from the CHRB Investigators' office on the Frontside.

Track is entitled to perform physiological tests consisting of the taking of blood samples from owners' horses entered in races to be conducted at the 2006 Meet. It is the understanding of the parties that such samples will be tested for bicarbonate levels. Trainers of horses showing a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, and owners' horses within their control, will be subject to the following:

- A. **1st Offense** – For the first test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse may have his/her barn, and all owners' horses stabled therein, subject to "earned surveillance" for a period of 45 days from the date of the infraction. Such earned surveillance will be conducted at TRACK's sole discretion, and may include, but not be limited to, the placing of surveillance cameras with recording devices in any location within that barn that Track deems necessary and appropriate to ensure the integrity of racing. Additionally, owners' horses entered by said trainer anytime within a period of 30 days after notification of the first offense, may be subject to confinement in a detention barn beginning at noon on the day before said horse is scheduled to compete. Such detention barn will be established at management's sole discretion, with the costs of such detention/surveillance including, but not limited to, \$150.00 for security and \$25.00 for stall renovation per horse/entrant, being born by the trainer or owner of such horse.
- B. **2nd Offense** – For the second test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be prohibited from entering any owners' horse within his/her care in a race for a period of 15 race days.
- C. **3rd Offense** – For the third test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be expelled from TRACK's enclosure for a period of one year, and shall further be precluded from entering any owners' horses within his care for the balance of Track's 2006 Meet.

Track further agrees that it shall enforce these penalties when imposed as a result of similar contract provisions with other racing associations in California. By way of example only, Track agrees that should any horse running at its meet be subject to detention barn confinement as the result of a positive at another

association, Track will continue to require detention barn confinement for the remainder of said 30 day period. Also by way of example, should a trainer have a TCO2 positive or positives at a race meet other than its own and a subsequent positive at Track's race meet or at another associations meet, Track will enforce paragraph B, and may, at its discretion, enforce paragraph C above as though the original positive(s) had taken place at its meet.

DMTC will offer a variety of promotions this season to appeal to several different target markets including serious racing fans, young adults, families and new fans.

For our regulars we are introducing the Diamond Club, a free loyalty program that allows members to pay half-price admission every day they attend the races. The Diamond Club will not only reward our regulars for their frequent attendance, but it will also allow us to identify who our better customers are so that we may market to them more efficiently in the future. In addition, our regulars will enjoy three giveaway days (Sports Bag Day, Beach Blanket Day and Labor Day Mug Set Day), a \$25,000 Handicapping Contest, various Mystery Mutuel Tickets, Jockey Photo Days and a number of special wagering opportunities including a \$1,000,000 Guaranteed Pick Six on Pacific Classic Day and Guaranteed Pick Four pools every weekend.

Another priority for DMTC is attracting the young adult crowd to the racetrack. Our weekly Four O'clock Friday promotion, which combines a late post time with a post-race rock concert, is the cornerstone of our efforts and continues to draw thousands of young adults to the races each week. Other promotions that target the young adult crowd include the Microbrew Festival, the Reggae Festival and the Closing Day Party in the Paddock.

Although attending the races at Del Mar is primarily an adult activity, we have a number of promotions designed to attract families to the racetrack and make them feel comfortable. Family-oriented promotions include Kids' Weekends on the infield each Saturday and Sunday, Donuts Days during morning workouts and Family Fun Day featuring an appearance by SpongeBob SquarePants.

We also have a number of promotions that may appeal to new racing fans including the Opening Day Hats Contest, Ladies Day, Legends of Volleyball Day, the Chili Cookoff and Bar & Restaurant Day.

A HORSE RACING MEETING

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides that the California Horse Racing Board (Board/CHRB) shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of the Horse Racing Law. Responsibilities of the Board include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19480 states that the Board may issue licenses to conduct horse racing meetings. CHRB Rule 1433, Application for License to Conduct A Horse Racing Meeting, provides that every association or fair that intends to conduct a horse racing meeting must file a completed application with the Board at least 90 days prior to its proposed meeting. At the February 2006 Regular Board Meeting the Board directed staff to notice for public comment an amendment to Rule 1433 that would require certain thoroughbred tracks to install a polymer, synthetic-type surface not later than December 31, 2007.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Rule 1433 provides that as of January 1, 2008, no racing association that operates four weeks or more of continuous thoroughbred racing in a calendar year shall be licensed to conduct a horse racing meeting at a facility that has not installed a polymer synthetic type racing surface. California has five thoroughbred racetracks that run meetings of four or more continuous weeks. The racetracks are: Del Mar Race Track; Santa Anita Park Race Track; Hollywood Park Race Track; Bay Meadows Race Track; and Golden Gate Fields Race Track. The California Fair Circuit, with meetings of fewer than four weeks, would be exempt. In addition, harness and quarter horse racing venues are not affected by the proposed amendment, as the suitability of synthetic racing surfaces for these breeds has not been determined. During the 45-day public comment period staff received several comments. One comment was entirely in favor of installing synthetic racetracks. Another comment suggested current tracks be improved, and suggested that so little is known about the synthetic racetracks that the Board could be introducing an entirely new set of problems. The third comment stated the proposed rule change is a well-intended "recipe for disaster."

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board adopt the amendment as presented.

(a) Unless the Board requires an earlier filing, at least 90 days before the time allocated by the Board for a race meeting to start, the association shall file with the Board an Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting, CHRB-17 (Rev. 07/05), which is hereby incorporated by reference. Note: CHRB-17 incorporates by reference, the Personal History Record, CHRB-25A (Rev. 7/93). A California fair shall file with the Board an Application for License to Conduct a Horse Racing Meeting of a California Fair, CHRB-18 (Rev. 07/05), which is hereby incorporated by reference. Copies of the CHRB-17 and CHRB-18 may be obtained at the California Horse Racing Board headquarters office.

(b) No racing association that operates four weeks or more of continuous Thoroughbred racing in a calendar year shall be licensed to conduct a horse racing meeting at a facility that has not installed a polymer synthetic type racing surface. This Subsection shall become operative on January 1, 2008.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides the Board shall license all persons, other than the public at large, who participate in a horse racing meeting with pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19510 states no person required to be licensed may participate in any capacity in any horse race meeting without a valid and unrevoked license. B&P Code Section 19520 states every person not required to be licensed under Article 4 who participates in, or has anything to do with, the racing of horses shall be licensed by the Board pursuant to the rules and regulations the Board may adopt. B& P Code Section 19521 provides that an original license issued pursuant to this article shall be issued for a period of the calendar year in which it is issued, and shall be renewable for a period, not to exceed three years, which the Board may, by regulation, establish. B&P Code Section 19704 states the Board shall issue licenses for mule racing. The license shall be limited to mule races only. Under Board Rule 1486, Term of License, every original and renewal of occupational licenses for grooms, stable employees, stable assistants and mule racing participants expire in the calendar year in which they were issued. This has traditionally caused delays at Board licensing offices in the months of December and January, as large numbers of persons attempt to renew their occupational licenses.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Rule 1486 provides that every original occupational license as groom, stable employee, stable assistant and mule racing participant shall expire on the last day of the calendar year in which it is issued. This is in keeping with the provisions of B&P Code Section 19521, which states every original license shall be issued for a period of the calendar year in which it is issued. In addition, the proposed amendment states that such original license for groom, stable employee, stable assistant and mule racing participant shall automatically be extended to expire on the last day of the birth month of the licensee. The licenses shall thereafter expire on the last day of the birth month of the licensee on an annual basis. Automatically extending the license, and thereafter having the license expire on the last day of the birth month of the licensee, will cause the expiration date of such licenses to be spread over a twelve-month period, and alleviate the annual December license renewal backlog. The proposed amendment to Rule 1486 retains the one-year term of license for grooms, stable assistants and mule racing participants because grooms and stable assistants may frequently change employer or the track at which they work, and while some racing associations place stickers on licenses to indicate the holder is authorized access to the track, not all associations follow the practice.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board instruct staff to initiate the 45-day public comment period.

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that the Board has jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings. B&P Code Section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the proposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19563 states the Board may adopt rules and regulations of the United States Trotting Association (USTA), not inconsistent with this chapter, for the regulation of harness racing. The USTA has amended its Rule 18 Section 9, which governs the maximum allowable length of a driver's whip. The amended USTA rule was effective May 1, 2006. The California liaison officer of the USTA and the harness stewards requested the Board amend Rule 1733, Whips, to be consistent with the newly amended USTA Rule 18 Section 9.

ANALYSIS

The proposed amendment to Rule 1733 would increase the allowable length of a driver's whip from three feet nine inches, plus a snapper not longer than six inches, to a maximum of four feet, plus a snapper not longer than six inches. The proposed amendment was initiated at the request of the harness industry and will bring Rule 1733 into agreement with the current USTA rule regarding the maximum allowable whip.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board instruct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period.

B&P Code Section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19562 provides the Board may prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in this State. At the December 2005 Pari-Mutuel Operations Committee meeting the practice of coupling was reviewed. The issue was discussed again at the January 2006 Regular Board Meeting where staff was directed to notice for a 45-day public comment period a proposed repeal of Rule 1606, Coupling of Horses; a proposed repeal of Rule 1974, Wagering Interest; and a proposed amendment of Rule 1420, Definitions. The proposal also included the amendment of a number of pari-mutuel wagering rules that would be affected by the repeal of Rule 1606. A hearing for the adoption of the proposed repeal of rules 1606 and 1974, and the amendment of related pari-mutuel regulations, was held at the April 2006 Regular Board Meeting. The Board determined it would not act on the proposal; instead, it proposed holding a Special Meeting of the Board to discuss waiving the coupling requirement by invoking Rule 1406, Suspension of Rule, to conduct an experiment at the spring race meetings at Hollywood Park Race Track (HPRT) in the south and Bay Meadows Race Track (BMRT) in the north. At the same time, staff was instructed to put out a 45-day notice regarding the proposal to repeal rules 1606 and 1974, and amendment of related pari-mutuel regulations. A Special Teleconference Board Meeting was held on May 15, 2006. At the meeting the Board voted to temporarily waive regulations requiring the coupling of horses, specifically for the two current thoroughbred meetings at HPRT and BMRT on the condition that there be at least five separate wagering interests prior to uncoupling.

ANALYSIS

The waiver of Rule 1606 at HPRT and BMRT temporarily eliminates the practice of coupling two or more horses as a single wagering interest when the same person or persons own such horses in whole or in part. The Board's decision to waive the rules permits uncoupling on an experimental trial basis at the two thoroughbred meetings. At the May 2006 Special Meeting,

the Board decided to revisit the issue to determine if additional conditions on the waiver are warranted.



CHRB Rule 1597 (Association to Maintain Records of Horses on the Grounds.)

The investigators conducted random audits of in and out slips for the horses that had entered or left the stable area.

Off Hour Entry to the Backside

The log for off-hour entry to the backside was reviewed periodically. The logs indicated that trainers were the only people that showed entering the backside after hours.

1682 (Weighing Out)

The investigators routinely visited the Jockey's room to conduct audits of the weigh out by the clerk of the sales in the Jockey room.

The investigators also monitored the use of cell phones and jockey conduct in the Jockeys room.

1701 (Weighing In)

The investigators regularly monitored the weigh in at the finish of the race after the jockey had dismounted.

CHRB Rule 1902.5 (Animal Welfare-cruelty, mistreatment, neglect or abuse)

The investigators received and filed their first complaint a complaint of animal abuse/neglect from the State Veterinarian. The new rule was effective February 8, 2006.

CHRB Rule 1922 (Display of license)

The investigators and the Racing Association Security Officers worked together enforcing the display of licenses on the backside, at the receiving barn and in the paddock area.

Starting Gate

The investigators periodically were at the starting gate. They reviewed the procedures used by the starter, the assistant starters and the jockeys.

Lasix Administration

The investigators audited the administration of lasix to horses in the graded races. In addition. The investigators monitored the actions of the security officers assigned to guard the horses in the graded races.

Race Track Inspections

The investigators conducted two off site racetrack inspections:

1. Hollywood Park track room/restrooms were inspected in preparation for the Hollywood Park Meet. The facility was clean and prepared for the future meet.
2. The San Louis Rey Downs Training Center backstretch worker housing was inspected. Present during the inspection were the general manager, HR & Safety Manager, and the North County Fire Protection district specialist. The track has made significant improvements in the housing since the last inspection in November 2005.

Barretts Sale monitoring

The investigators monitored the sale of horses at Barretts Sale at the faiplex.

OTB Simulcast Inspections

Four OTB Simulcast facility inspections were conducted:

Indio Date Festival-Shalimar, Fantasy Springs Resort Casino, Barona Valley Ranch and Viejas Casino. The OTB locations are well established and the operations were conducted according to the CHRB rules..

OTB Surfside Race Place, Del Mar, sustained rain leaks last year that resulted in mold spores developing on and within the walls. The supervising investigator has met with the Environmental Officer, the 22nd District and inspected the location on two occasions. Also involved in the remediation process, CHRB has talked to the General manager of the 22nd. District, the president of the Pari-mutual Guild, and the Off Track Wagering, Inc., Risk Manager. Progress is being made in the elimination of the mold.

Barn Inspections

The investigators conducted four barn inspections and five barn searches during the meet.

Big Event Team

The Big Event Team (BET), sponsored by the TRPB was in town three days before the Santa Anita Derby Day Race. The members of the team, complemented by the investigators, provided extra security for the track and the horses. The team members were well received by the backside community.

Human Urine Testing

There are two licensees that under contract with the CHRB that are tested eight times a month. There are 25 licensees on testing agreements with our office on file on file at this office. Random testing of the licensees are conducted throughout the year.

Background Investigation

The supervising investigator conducted a background investigation and report for a new hire senior investigator.

Additional Information

This office conducted 188 investigations that resulted in 76 complaints filed with the stewards.

CHRB investigators will continue to maintain a strong presence on the backside stable area, increasing inspections on the backside, working with the Race Association security, and working with the private security officers assigned to the graded races.
