MINUTES

Chairman Shapiro asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of March 22, 2007. Commissioner Amerman **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE SAN JOAQUIN COUNTY FAIR (F) AT STOCKTON, COMMENCING JUNE 14 THROUGH JUNE 24, 2007, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the San Joaquin County Fair (SJCF) proposed to run from June 14 through June 24, 2007, or nine days, one day less than in 2006, for a total of 94 races, ten fewer races than in 2006. The first post time would be 12:45 p.m. and the wagering program would use CHRB regulations. Ms. Wagner stated the thoroughbred horsemen's agreement was still outstanding, and staff recommended the Board approve the application conditioned upon receipt of the missing item. Chris Korby of the California Authority of Racing Fairs said his organization was still in negotiations with Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC), but a substantive agreement was in place.

Chairman Shapiro asked if there was anything about the negotiations that could stop or interfere with an agreement being reached by the time the race meeting occurred. Mr. Korby stated there was nothing he was aware of. Drew Couto of TOC said he agreed with Mr. Korby. There was nothing that would interfere with an agreement. Vice-Chairman Harris said he noted there were 695 permanent stalls, and portable stalls would be provided. If Golden Gate Fields were closed during SJCF's meeting, where would additional stalls be found? Forest White of SJCF said arrangements to handle the overflow were made with other Northern California fairs. Chairman Shapiro asked if the projected increases in purses was due to there being no overlap during the SJCF meeting. Mr. White said no overlap would make a difference. He added SJCF would also be celebrating its 75th anniversary. Commissioner Amerman said the promotional budget did not compare with the 2006 budget. He asked why there was a difference in the numbers if it was SJCF's 75th anniversary. Mr. White said the application only reflected the horse racing portion of the budget, which was actually increased considerably. SJCF normally spent between sixty and seventy thousand dollars on advertising, but because of no overlap and the diamond anniversary the budget was increased. Chairman Shapiro asked if all the simulcast agreements were in place, and if anything about the agreements could interfere with the conduct of the meeting. Mr. Korby said every agreement was executed, including the advance deposit wagering agreements. Mr. Couto stated TOC was not aware of any problems with the agreements. Commissioner Moss **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting at SJCF. Commissioner Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE ALAMEDA COUNTY FAIR (F) AT PLEASANTON, COMMENCING JUNE 27 THROUGH JULY 8, 2007, INCLUSIVE.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the Alameda County Fair (ACF) proposed to run from June 27 through July 8, 2007, or 11 days, the same number of days as in 2006. The fair was proposing to run 122 races, the same number of races as in 2006. Ms. Wagner noted the thoroughbred horsemen's agreement was missing from the application. She stated staff recommended the Board approve the application contingent upon receipt of the missing item. Chairman Shapiro asked if there were any issues with the advance deposit wagering or horsemen's agreements that could interrupt the conduct of the race meeting. Rick Pickering of ACF said to his knowledge there were no such issues. Commissioner Amerman stated the discussion of ACF's marketing activities was complete, but there were no funds mentioned. He asked what the marketing budget was for ACF compared to the previous year. Mr. Pickering stated it was the fair's 95th anniversary, so the advertising budget would be increased. He said ACF was depended a lot on corporate sponsors, and was currently working on a deal with Toyota that would bring in approximately one hundred thousand dollars. Vice-Chairman Harris said he noticed that the numbers of stalls on the various fair applications did not match. Mr. Pickering stated the fairs should all have the same numbers. Chairman Shapiro commented perhaps a stall survey should be conducted, as the numbers would become tighter in the north over time. Chris Korby of California Authority of Racing Fairs said his organization would conduct a survey regarding the number of stalls at the fairs. Commissioner Amerman **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting of ACF. Commissioner Moretti **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

PUBLIC HEARING BY THE BOARD ON THE ADOPTION OF THE PROPOSED ADDITION OF CHRB RULE 1843.3, PENALTIES FOR MEDICATION VIOLATIONS AND THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1843.2, CLASSIFICATION OF DRUG SUBSTANCES.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposed amendment of Rule 1843.3, Penalties for Medication Violations, would establish penalties for medication violations. She stated the regulation incorporated the recommendations of the Racing Medication Testing Consortium (RMTC), the Board's Equine Medical Director, the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) and the industry at large. Several meetings were held to develop the proposal and all parties had significant input. However, during the 45-day public comment period the TOC submitted written comments regarding the proposed addition of Rule 1843.3. Ms. Wagner stated the TOC recommended removing all monetary fines for owners, as it felt the loss of purse and disqualification of the horse would serve the purpose of causing owners to monitor their stables more closely and communicating with their trainers. She added another 45-day public comment period would be required if the Board chose to incorporate the changes recommended by TOC. Chairman Shapiro said the proposed regulations were discussed for well over a year and a half. He stated the regulations were examined line by line, and it was important to note they provided for aggravating and mitigating circumstances. Some of the penalties could appear harsh, but the regulations provided flexibility. Chairman Shapiro added the RMTC worked on similar regulations for years. Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, stated the regulations were crafted by the RMTC over a period of five years. He said several horse owner organizations, including the TOC, were involved in the process. Dr. Arthur explained how the owner penalties worked and he commented the TOC actually recommended an increase in fines for owners. He stated language that allowed owners to

present evidence that they took an active interest in drug positives was also added as a mitigating factor that must be taken into account. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding the proposed regulations. Marsha Naify of TOC said the TOC board felt that enacting regulations with stiff fines for owners, while other states had no fines, could be detrimental to attracting new owners to California, and in retaining current owners. California would be at a clear disadvantage if the proposed regulations were adopted as written. Ms. Naify said TOC was requesting that all monetary fines for owners be eliminated from Rule 1843.3. Chairman Shapiro stated the Board agreed with many of TOC's concerns regarding the retention of owners in California. However, TOC had long supported owner penalties, and on numerous occasions its representatives had stated owners needed to take responsibility for understanding their investments by knowing what their trainers were doing. Chairman Shapiro said the penalties for owners did not start until a third offense, and then there were mitigating circumstances. One of the goals of the proposed regulations was to create a level playing field. Chairman Shapiro asked how that could be accomplished if every licensee but owners were held responsible. With regards to being set apart from other states, Chairman Shapiro stated California was apart because it did better testing and had higher standards. He said he hoped owners would recognize that California had the most level playing field and the highest integrity in its testing. Yet, the TOC position seemed to go counter to that ideal. Commissioner Moretti said she was concerned that TOC did not want California to be the first racing jurisdiction to impose fines on owners. It seemed obvious that other states would take the same position and no one would do anything. The proposed regulations were something that took a lot of work to achieve. Commissioner Moretti asked

what educational efforts the TOC would take to ensure its owners understood how the playing field had leveled. Ms. Naify said the TOC endeavored to educate owners regarding medication, drug testing, and other issues. She stated she attended the last RMTC meeting as the TOC medication committee chair, and would attend others. Ms. Naify commented the RMTC should be commended for its work, but it had failed to get its proposals adopted in any state. The problem was that California was already at a disadvantage as other states had purses supplemented with proceeds from slot machines. Owners would want to take their horses to race in other states, and the proposed fines could hurt small owners. Chairman Shapiro said he disagreed with TOC's position. The proposed regulations would provide a level playing field in California and would hold owners responsible for ensuring their trainers did what was right. Ms. Naify said she understood Chairman Shapiro's point, but due to the owner feed back TOC received, its board felt it had a duty to submit the changes. Vice-Chairman Harris stated he requested that TOC provide him with examples of owners who would actually receive penalties under the proposed regulations, but he had not received a reply. He said he did not know if there were any owners who had three class "A" penalties. Vice-Chairman Harris stated TOC should know if there were any owners with such penalties because that was the basis of its argument. Guy Lamothe of TOC said his organization looked at other states with regards to owners' penalties and found that even with TOC's proposed changes California would be way ahead of other racing jurisdictions. The RMTC ideal was to establish national rules to standardize penalties, but the evidence showed that was not happening. Vice-Chairman Harris stated that was the reason the Board wished to take action. The Board did not believe it was appropriate to wait for other jurisdictions that did not have the testing capabilities of

California. While TOC might believe the proposed regulations would keep owners away, the Board felt they would actually attract owners because California had fair, well-policed medication regulations. Commissioner Amerman said the Board was trying to take a leadership position. To compare California with other states might be an interesting discussion, but if no progress was made other jurisdictions could use California's inaction as a reason to do nothing. Owners needed to understand the proposed regulation was not draconian. There was no issue with first offenses or second offenses, and as Vice-Chairman Harris pointed out, who in California had a third offense? Commissioner Amerman stated if California adopted the regulations it would become the catalyst for other states to move forward. Ed Halpern of California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) said one reason for the proposed regulations was that the loss of purse did not seem to be enough to stop owners from employing trainers who had multiple drug positives. The penalties for owners only occurred after serious drug violations, which were very rare. It was unlikely that an owner would see three such violations. He added if an owner saw two "A" or "B" violations, it would be time to take responsibility and change trainers. Mr. Halpern stated the proposed regulations sent a message to the industry that in California one would get a fair shake. Commissioner Andreini **motioned** to adopt the proposed addition of Rule 1843.3 and the proposed amendment of Rule 1843.2. Commissioner Amerman **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

REPORT BY REPRESENTATIVES OF MAGNA ENTERTAINMENT CORPORATION (MEC) ON THE PROGRESS OF THE REDEVELOPMENT OF THE BARN AREA AT THE SANTA ANITA PARK RACE TRACK.

Frank DeMarco of Magna Entertainment (MEC) said the City of Arcadia approved the design of the Caruso project, which would be built in the Santa Anita parking lot. With the development approved, its footprint was finalized and MEC was able to determine the reconfiguration of the gate and road around the barns. That would allow MEC to determine which barns would be affected and which barns could be removed and rebuilt. MEC would prepare a plan regarding the barn area and keep the Board advised. Chairman Shapiro asked if MEC could provide a Gant chart that showed where the project was and when milestones would be hit and when redevelopment of the barn area would commence, as well as a description of how the horses would be accommodated. Mr. DeMarco said the information could be forwarded to the Board. Commissioner Moss asked exactly what would be happening in the barn area. Mr. DeMarco stated ten barns would be demolished and replaced, and the process would continue until the entire barn area was rebuilt. Vice-Chairman Harris asked how many stalls would be in each barn. Mr. DeMarco said the prototype of the barns was Palm Meadows with roughly 45 stalls per barn. Chairman Shapiro asked if there would still be 1,900 stalls at Santa Anita after the renovations were complete. Ron Charles of Santa Anita said a couple of barns could be lost, so there could be as few as 1,700 stalls after the renovation; however, the goal was to maintain the current level of barns as closely as possible. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner spoke about his concerns regarding the barn area at Santa Anita.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1486, TERM OF LICENSE, TO ADD "BACKSTRETCH EVENT PERSONNEL" TO THE CLASS OF LICENSES WHOSE TERM IS ONE YEAR.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the proposed amendment to Rule 1486, Term of License, would add the classification of backstretch event personnel to the classes of license whose term is one year. The proposed amendment to Rule 1486 was necessary because the Board added backstretch event personnel to Rule 1481, Occupational Licenses and Fees, at the March 2007 Regular Meeting. Chairman Shapiro said he thought Mr. Wyatt of Hollywood Park and Mr. Charles of Santa Anita were going to work on job descriptions and what organization would hold the licenses. Ms. Wagner stated Mr. Wyatt and Mr. Charles would make a presentation at the May 2007 Regular Meeting. Chairman Shapiro said the item should be put over, as the Board did not want to add the license classification without understanding what it was going to do. Ms. Wagner stated the license classification was already added under Rule 1481. The proposal to amend Rule 1486 would merely make it a one-year term. Chairman Shapiro said the item would be put over to the May 2007 Regular Meeting.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CHRB RULE 1978, SELECT FOUR, TO PROVIDE OTHER ALTERNATIVES, INSTEAD OF SUBSTITUTING THE OFF-TIME FAVORITE FOR A HORSE SCRATCHED FROM ANY LEG OF THE SELECT FOUR.

Mike Martin, CHRB staff, said the National Thoroughbred Racing Association Player's Panel made recommendations for changes to how fans who had a horse scratched in a multiple race wager were compensated. The Player's Panel recommendations resulted in the proposed amendment to Board Rule 1978, Select Four. Mr. Martin said instead of automatically replacing a scratched horse with the favorite, the proposed amendment would allow fans to

designate alternate selections when they placed their wagers. A Select Four wager would be refunded if a horse were scratched prior to the first leg of the event. If a scratch occurred after the first leg of the event, the designated alternate selection would replace the scratched horse, or if an alternate selection was not designated, the wager would be placed in a consolation pool. Vice-Chairman Harris said the name of the wager should be changed from “Select Four” to “Pick Four” so the public would have a better understanding of the wager. Chairman Shapiro **motioned** to instruct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding the proposed amendment to Rule 1978. Vice-Chairman Harris **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE PROPOSED ADDITION OF: ARTICLE 10.5, MULE RACING, TO PROVIDE AN ARTICLE UNIQUE TO MULE RACING; CHRB RULE 1747, MULE RACING RULES, TO SPECIFY THAT MULE RACES MUST ADHERE TO BOARD RULES IN GENERAL, BUT RULES UNIQUE TO MULES WILL BE PLACED UNDER ARTICLE 10.5 AND CHRB RULE 1748, SHOEING MULES, TO PROVIDE THAT MULES MAY RUN UNSHOD.

Jacqueline Wagner, CHRB staff, said the American Mule Racing Association (AMRA), which was the Board recognized breed registry for mules, recently amended its racing rules. Among the recommendations made by the AMRA was a rule that would allow mules to run unshod. Ms. Wagner stated that was contrary to Board Rule 1853, Examination Required, which stated that no horse would be eligible to start in a race if it was not properly shod. The AMRA asked for a waiver of Rule 1853. The proposed addition of Article 10.5, Mule Racing; Rule 1747, Mule Racing Rules; and Rule 1748, Shoeing Mules, would provide an Article unique to mules within the Board’s rules and regulations. Ms. Wagner commented the rules and regulations currently had articles unique to quarter horse racing and harness racing. Rule 1747 would

state that while Article 10.5 contained rules for mule racing, such races were also subject to Board rules in general. Rule 1748 would provide that mules may run unshod if such information was promulgated in the race program, or announced over the public address system prior to the race. Chairman Shapiro asked what happened to mules when they were shod. Rhoda March of the AMRA stated mules tended to protest vigorously to being shod. Currently, not all mules were running shod per the Board's rules. In addition, there were few farriers who would work with mules that were not heavily sedated. In some cases mules tended to have different withdrawal times from drugs, and if a race were to suddenly come up, the owners of the mules that were sedated might not wish to chance entering their animals. Additionally, if a mule lost a shoe before a race, it was often difficult to have it fixed. Ms. March commented that mules' feet were extremely tough and there were many mules that never wore shoes, so running without shoes was not a handicap. In addition, mules had tiny feet and typically wore size three shoes. That made it doubly difficult to find a farrier to work on a mule, as many simply did not carry such small shoes. Vice-Chairman Harris said as he read Rule 1853, which stated a horse could not be "improperly" shod, and it seemed that mules without shoes were not "improperly" shod, they just were not shod. Unless there was evidence that running a mule absent shoes would dramatically change its performance and cheat the public, it could be done under Rule 1853. Ms. March stated she agreed, but as the breed representative she spent a lot of time in the stewards' office attempting to help trainers that were having difficulties. She said the current stewards were not aware of past practices, and when a concerned horse shoe inspector got on the phone to the stewards, the result would be time spent fixing the problem. Vice-Chairman Harris **motioned** to instruct staff to initiate a

45-day public comment period regarding the addition of Article 10.5, Rule 1747 and Rule 1748. He stated he would also like to stipulate that Rule 1853 might be sufficient. Chairman Shapiro **seconded** the motion. He said the Deputy Attorney General could look at Rule 1853 to see if it would allow mules to run unshod. The motion was **unanimously carried**.

REPORT FROM THE CHRB EQUINE MEDICAL DIRECTOR ON THE CURRENT PROTOCOLS FOR HORSES INJURED AT CALIFORNIA RACETRACKS.

Chairman Shapiro said the item was placed on the agenda because of an incident at Santa Anita that resulted in confusion over whether veterinarians could come onto the track to treat a horse that had gone down for heat exhaustion. Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, stated the situation at Santa Anita was the result of a change in the track veterinarian. Track veterinarians were often the officials who decided how injured horses would be handled. Otherwise, he said, there were no written protocols regarding injured horses at California racetracks; yet, California did have an excellent system in spite of no documentation. California had six state-of-the-art Kimzey ambulances. The field was typically chased with veterinarians, in a manner similar to the human ambulance. With regards to protocols covering specific situations: there were none; it depended on who the track veterinarian was. Chairman Shapiro described the incident at Santa Anita and asked if protocols could be established for such situations. Dr. Arthur said protocols could be established, but they would be unique to each track. However most of the veterinarians were aware of the goal of taking care of horses and getting them off the racetrack.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE STATUS OF RETIREMENT FARMS FOR HORSES THAT HAVE RETIRED FROM RACING, AS WELL AS OTHER EFFORTS BEING MADE TO OUT PLACE RACEHORSES AT THE CONCLUSION OF THEIR RACING CAREERS.

Chairman Shapiro said the industry had a responsibility to care for racehorses after they were no longer able to compete. He stated there were a number of organizations that took care of retired racehorses, and the Board should have a discussion regarding how the industry could better support them. Vice-Chairman Harris said the issue was important and the industry wanted to see racehorses taken care of, but a lot of the problem was simple out- placement. If a horse was not competitive on the track there were still a lot of uses for the animal in other aspects of racing. In addition, there were many other areas where horses were useful – such as police work and show jumping. Owners needed to become more creative in placing retired horses and any owner should realize his responsibility after the horse was no longer competitive. Grace Belcore of California Equine Retirement Foundation said the issue was important. She stated her only concern was that if a source of additional funding were identified, money that could be used for horses would be diverted to administration of programs and into salaries and other expenses. She asked the Board to look at the issue carefully and to do it the right way. Chairman Shapiro said he wondered if there was a way for owners to dedicate a portion of starter fees to racehorse retirement foundations, which would create an ongoing stream of revenue. Marsha Naify of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) said her organization thought the issue was important. TOC was forming an equine retirement committee, exploring a “Ferdinand fee” which was used in New York, and it was also proposing a small allocation for equine retirement from advance deposit wagering. Ms. Naify stated TOC believed every horse that raced in California could be rehabilitated for a

second career, and there were many areas where such horses could be useful and enjoyed. Vice-Chairman Harris said the number of horses and the amount of money required to care for such horses should be quantified. A five-dollar starter fee, or other small contributions probably would not be sufficient. Commissioner Moss suggested that a hotline be established so if an owner or trainer had a horse that needed to be retired, they could identify farms that would take the animal. A price could be placed on the placement so the horse could be safely retired, but at the very least a source of retirement information should be available. Commissioner Amerman said volunteerism was not going to solve the issue. There were a number of people who would give a certain amount of money to the various farms, and the farms would do a good job with limited resources. However, if the retirement farms' budgets were looked at and a total dollar amount could be determined, a mandatory starter fee could help solve the issue for the long term. No one could object because the fee would not be large. Commissioner Amerman stated he could not imagine that any owner, who spent a reasonable amount of money on a horse, and training and veterinary bills, would object to a small fee per start that would take care of the horse in retirement. Commissioner Moretti asked if the TOC website had a link to racehorse retirement farms. Ms. Naify said the website did link to retirement farms. She stated the information would be expanded to make sure it was readily available and thorough. Jerry Jamgotchian spoke about his concerns regarding retired racehorses.

REPORT AND DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD ON THE RECENTLY CONCLUDED TRAINING SESSIONS HELD FOR CHRB INVESTIGATORS AND STEWARDS.

Dr. Rick Arthur, CHRB Equine Medical Director, said in March 2007 a four-day meeting of the Board's investigative staff was held at the Maddy Laboratory at the University of California at Davis. Dr. Arthur stated he, Dr. Scott Stanley and Darrell Vienna were the instructors. Dr. Arthur said he reviewed anatomy and physiology of the horse, pharmacology and the Board's regulations. Dr. Stanley reviewed the laboratory and drug testing processes, and Mr. Vienna reviewed the rulemaking process, investigations, presenting cases and putting investigation packets together. Dr. Arthur stated the training was well received. Chairman Shapiro said he thought the training was terrific and the Board should look towards doing more. Executive Director Ingrid Fermin said a month after the investigator meeting a course for the stewards was given, and the same materials were covered. In addition, some of the concerns of the investigators were discussed. Executive Director Fermin stated another stewards' meeting was scheduled, which would include more film review and information regarding hearings.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE PROGRESS REPORT FROM STAFF ON THE STATUS OF THE JOCKEY GUILD'S HEALTH AND WELFARE PROGRAM.

Bon Smith, CHRB staff, said the Board provided approximately one million dollars annually to fund an agreement between the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) and the Jockey's Guild (Guild) to provide a health and welfare program. Mr. Smith stated since the March 2007 Regular Board Meeting discussions occurred between the Guild and California Jockeys, represented by Mr. Ron Warren. An insurance representative entered the discussion to

propose a funded, defined plan through a major carrier, but to date there had been no formal proposal. Meanwhile, the Guild engaged a CPA firm to conduct its 2006 audits, which should have been completed; however, they were just beginning. Mr. Smith said he held discussions with the Guild and the audit firm to propose some audit procedures to ensure or verify the accuracy and appropriate use of State funds. The TOC and the Guild attempted to meet to discuss a new agreement, but they have been unable to arrive at a date, time or place that would satisfy both parties. Mr. Smith commented the Guild was timely and attentive to all the Board's requests. The information provided so far has indicated the California jockey colony was receiving appropriate benefits in a timely manner. Mr. Smith stated he was arranging a meeting of all the parties prior to the May 2007 Regular Meeting of the Board. Chairman Shapiro asked why the Guild was so late in initiating its 2006 audit. He stated he understood the agreement was between the Guild and TOC, but the Guild had an obligation to conduct an audit, and the Board was a party with some standing in overseeing disbursement of the funds. Drew Couto of TOC said his organization was trying to accommodate the Guild, as it requested some time to put together some materials. A meeting was subsequently scheduled for April 18, 2007, but it was postponed, so another meeting was scheduled prior to the May 2007 Regular Board Meeting. In addition, TOC was not forcing the issue because of the work Mr. Warren was doing with the Guild in exploring the third-party carrier coverage. Chairman Shapiro asked if the census information was available to determine whether a third-party insurer was capable of providing an insurance program. Mr. Couto stated in 2005 such information was promised by the Guild, but TOC has not received any information regarding a jockey census. Chairman Shapiro said the TOC should request the information again, as there

was new management at the Guild, and its agreement with the Board was it would provide any and all information. Chairman Shapiro stated the minimum number of rides required to qualify for the health and welfare program also needed adjusting. Mr. Couto said that was one issue TOC addressed with the Guild. In addition to the minimum number of rides, TOC also suggested that at least 75 percent of the prior year's mounts would have to occur in California. Chris Gibbs, an insurance industry representative, spoke about his concerns regarding the jockey health and welfare fund. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding the jockey health and welfare fund.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION RELATED TO NORTHERN CALIFORNIA RACING CALENDAR AND WAGERING OPPORTUNITIES FOR 2008.

Chairman Shapiro said the item was **deferred**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE STATUS OF THE LETTER OF CREDIT RECEIVED FROM THE CAPITOL RACING, LLC, WHICH IS CURRENTLY ON FILE WITH THE BOARD.

Deputy Attorney General (DAG) Derry Knight gave a brief overview of why the letter of credit was on file with the Board. Executive Director Ingrid Fermin said Capitol Racing (CR) contacted staff and stated the letter of credit was expiring. CR wanted to know if it needed to be renewed. Vice-Chairman Harris said the letter of credit was "evergreen" and would not expire unless CR notified the Board that it would let the letter lapse. At that point, the Board could draw on the letter. Chairman Shapiro said he did not see where any action needed to be taken other than to guarantee the letter was in full force and effect.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Chris Carpenter of the San Mateo County Fair (SMCF) and Event Center stated that due to the pending closure of Bay Meadows SMCF would assume operation of the satellite wagering on January 1, 2008. He stated SMCF intended to provide the same quality service and would work with Bay Meadows to facilitate a smooth transition. Chairman Shapiro thanked Mr. Carpenter for advising the Board on the matter. Jerry Jamgotchian, a horse owner, spoke about his concerns regarding various horse racing related issues. Cliff Goodrich representing Fairplex Park Pomona (FPP) spoke about the difficult issues facing the Board, and saluted the Board on behalf of FPP. Chairman Shapiro said despite recent turmoil the Board did not wish to see Bay Meadows close. He stated the industry needed to try to find a way to come together so that it could do what was best for the industry.

MEETING ADJOURNED AT 1:00 P.M.

This memorandum provides additional detail regarding enhanced security for graded stakes at the 2007 race meet. In 2004, Del Mar was the first track in California to implement enhanced security for all graded stakes. Working in conjunction with TOC and CTT, Del Mar set the stage for further development of security procedures at Fairplex, Oak Tree, Santa Anita and Hollywood Park.

Components of the 2007 plan include the following:

1. Assignment of event security personnel to each graded stakes entry beginning no less than six (6) hours prior to post-time for the race;
2. Training of event security personnel by the Del Mar racing office, Del Mar security supervisors and CHRB investigators;
3. Provision and monitoring of log/surveillance sheets requiring all individuals entering the stall of an entrant to provide license information and purpose of entry;
4. Hand-held digital video cameras for all event surveillance personnel to record activity by persons entering stalls;
5. Total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) level testing of entries in all races consistent with the testing at preceding race meets;
6. Compliance with TCO₂ detention barn procedures, protocols and disciplinary procedures as set forth in agreements with TOC and CTT. A copy of current protocols and procedures is attached as Exhibit 10.
7. Enhanced authority to conduct additional supplementary testing as set forth in Section 22 of Del Mar's 2007 stall application, a copy of which is attached.

Primary consideration for approval of all first-time starters or horses without recent racing records (three-year-olds and upward) will be given to such horses with significant workout patterns by June 6, indicating fitness to run in the first two weeks of the meeting. Stall approvals will be mailed July 2, with all two-year-olds and maidens approved on the basis of a balanced stable.

ELIGIBILITY RULES

For three-year-olds and up which have broken their maiden:

1) Any horse which has started for \$6,500 or less and has not won for \$8,000 or more in 2006-2007 or has not finished second, third, fourth or fifth for \$8,000 or more since running for \$6,500 or less is not eligible.

Eligibility for maidens which have started in a maiden claiming race for \$32,000 or less.

1) A maiden which has started in a maiden race of \$16,000 or less will not be eligible, unless, after such start, that horse finishes 2nd, 3rd or 4th in a race for \$22,500 or greater.

2) A maiden which has started in a maiden race for a value of \$32,000 or less but greater than \$16,000 at ANYTIME, and has not finished 2nd, 3rd, 4th or 5th in a maiden race greater than \$18,000 within its last four starts will not be eligible. Maiden special races and any winners race of \$12,500-\$10,500 or higher will be disregarded when applying this rule, unless the horse places 2nd, 3rd, 4th or 5th. A horse must start in at least four maiden claiming races for this rule to apply.

Once a horse has started at Del Mar, it may not lose eligibility during the meeting. However, any eligible horse which leaves during the meeting and races elsewhere must again satisfy the original eligibility requirements before being approved to return.

**UNIFORM STALL APPLICATION
CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO OCCUPATION OF STALL SPACE AT CALIFORNIA RACING ASSOCIATIONS**

The undersigned Trainer ("Applicant") hereby agrees to each of the following terms and conditions in consideration for and as a condition of the granting of permission by the Racing Association designated on the reverse side of this application ("Track") for the stabling of horses being trained by the undersigned at Track, or at any approved auxiliary training facility, during the race meeting identified on the face of this application (the "Race Meet"):

1. Track reserves the right without notice to the Applicant, (a) to refuse this application for stable space in whole or in part, or (b) to refuse the entry or the acceptance of any entry in any race or (c) to refuse the transfer of an entry for any cause, so long as said refusal is not in violation of the terms of the race meet agreements with either the Thoroughbred Owners of California or California Thoroughbred Trainers.
2. If any horse is denied stable space or the privilege of registration for racing for any reason, all nomination fees and payments for eligibility to stake races that have been paid with respect to the horse shall be refunded and such sum will be deducted from the total amount subscribed for the particular race or races. Allocations of stall space are made only with the agreement of Applicant that Track reserves to itself the exclusive right, in its sole discretion, to enter, modify, alter, or change the physical condition or use of its facilities; that the permission granted to Applicant to use Track's facilities is solely for the purpose incidental to racing, does not constitute a lease of the facilities and Track maintains the sole interest in and exclusive control of its premises and facilities, and the Track reserves to itself the exclusive right and sole discretion to reduce or totally eliminate the number of stalls or other accommodations assigned and/or change the location of stall or accommodations assigned to Applicant.
3. After submitting this application for stalls, the undersigned shall notify Track immediately of any change in stall requirements and, if stalls have been allocated, of any shipping schedules or change in shipping arrangements.
4. Applicant has inspected the stalls and other accommodations at Track, or if applicable at any approved auxiliary training facility, and agrees to accept any stalls or accommodations assigned pursuant to this application in an "as is" condition. Applicant understands that Track makes no representation or warranty as to the condition or use of stalls and other accommodations assigned.
5. Applicant agrees to remove his horses and/or those in his possession, charge, or control together with all personal property belonging to him or of which he has possession, charge or control from Track forthwith upon the expiration of seventy-two (72) hours after Track has given notice in writing to vacate the stabling accommodation, which notice may be given in the absolute discretion of Track without any reason or cause existing or being stated or given; any such notice or any other given hereunder shall be sufficiently given by posting up such notice on some portion of the stabling accommodation allotted to him and such notice shall be deemed to be given at the time when the same is posted up. The Applicant understands that his employees shall leave Track, forthwith upon the expiration of seventy-two (72) hours after notice has been given as aforesaid. Applicant agrees that if upon the expiration of the said seventy-two (72) hours notice hereinbefore mentioned, any horse or horses or personal property belonging to him or in his possession, charge or control, have not been removed from Track, Track shall be entitled to remove the same from Track without further notice to a suitable location at Applicant's expense and Track shall in no event be responsible for any such horse or horses removed as aforesaid. Applicant agrees that in the event of the horses being stabled elsewhere at his expense as aforesaid that the person, firm or corporation stabling the horses or paying for the stabling of same shall have all the rights as provided by law.
6. The undersigned Applicant represents that Applicant is familiar with and has read the Rules of Racing and Regulations of the California Horse Racing Board, and all conditions applicable to the Race Meet, as well as the rules and regulations of Track, and agrees to be bound by and to comply with the same. All stable reservations and entries in stakes and all other races shall be subject to all conditions, rules and regulations of the California Horse Racing Board and Track and in this application contained. Applicant represents that the owners of all horses listed on the reverse of this application have authorized Applicant to sign this application and have agreed that their horses being trained by Applicant will be bound thereby. All references herein to Applicant or to Applicant's horses, equipment, agents or employees, shall include said owners and their horses, equipment, agents and employees.
7. The Stewards of the Race Meet or the California Horse Racing Board shall decide all disputes, claims and objections relating to the conduct of racing, or with respect to interpretation of any rules or conditions of racing or otherwise. Subject to all legal rights of appeal, Applicant agrees to accept and abide by all decisions of such officials pertaining to the presence or conduct of themselves or of their agents and employees on the premises of Track.
8. In all stakes, entries may be made only through the entry box by the usual time of closing of entries, on the day before the race, or at other times when the conditions for the race specifically so state.
9. Subject to any required approval of the TOC, Track reserves the right to cancel any stakes or other race, which has not filled without liability to any person, except for the return of nomination and entrance fees, paid. Track reserves the right to divide the added money for any stakes that is run in more than one division.
10. Horses claimed by, or transferred or sold to, any person or stable which is not registered for racing at Track must be removed from the grounds within twenty-four (24) hours after they are claimed, transferred or sold unless their continued presence is approved by the racing association then conducting racing at Track.
11. Track will in no event be considered to have responsibility for the care, custody or control of horses kept at Track or elsewhere. Applicant assumes full responsibility for the safety and well-being of all horses stabled by Applicant at Track, and agrees to take all reasonable measures for the protection of such horses, including providing adequate supervision for such animals while on the premises, hiring competent personnel to care for such animals at all times, cleaning and maintaining stalls assigned pursuant to this application and removing any hazardous condition from such stalls which is known to Applicant or Applicant's employees, or if Applicant believes that such condition should be remedied by Track, promptly calling to the attention of Track in writing, any such hazardous conditions. Applicant further agrees to properly supervise all Applicant's employees, agents, their express invitees, and other persons known to them to be in the area assigned to them pursuant to this application, and hereby acknowledges that they are responsible for the conduct of their employees, agents and express invitees, and that Track has no obligation to remedy any condition on the Track premises which may be caused by the negligence of or willful conduct of any such employees, agents or express invitees, unless it has prior written notice of the existence of such condition and has had a reasonable opportunity to repair such condition.
12. The Applicant understands that there may be numerous hazards and risks of injury to Applicant, and Applicant's agents, owners, or employees, upon the Track premises at Applicant's invitation and to their property, which hazards, and risks inherently incidental to accepting stalls at, practicing for, and participating in thoroughbred horse racing at Track.
13. Applicant shall maintain an accurate Stable Employee Registration List and shall submit a copy thereof to Track. Applicant shall pay his/her stable personnel at wage rates conforming to applicable laws. Applicant's stable personnel shall continue to be covered under the prevailing and applicable statutory employee benefit programs such as Worker's Compensation, Disability, Unemployment, Social Security and the like. Applicant shall comply with the Fair Employment Practices Act and shall not discriminate by reason of race, color, creed, national origin or sex in hiring employees. Applicant acknowledges that his/her stable personnel are employees of the Applicant and that no employment relationship exists between such stable personnel and Track.
14. In making this application to participate in thoroughbred racing, Applicant understands that an investigative report may be made whereby information is obtained by Track through personal interviews with third parties, such as family members, business associates, financial sources, friends, neighbors, or others with whom he is acquainted. This inquiry may include information as to his/her character, general reputation, personal characteristics and mode of living, which may be applicable. Applicant has the right to make a written request within a reasonable period of time for a complete and accurate disclosure of additional information concerning the nature and scope of the investigation.
15. Each party to this stall application shall be liable for its own acts and omissions as well as those of its agents, employees and express invitees to the same extent as would be provided at law without such provision.
16. Applicant agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Track and its affiliates against any and all claims, liabilities, losses, costs, damages and attorneys' fees incurred by reason of the negligence of Applicant or Applicant's agents, employees and invitees, or resulting from Applicant or Applicant's agents, employees and invitees, violation of this agreement, including, but not limited to, violation of the rules and regulations of the CHRB and Track and violation of city and county fire, health or law enforcement, ordinances, rules and regulations. Applicant's indemnity shall not extend to liabilities, claims, losses, damages or attorneys' fees arising out of the negligence or willful acts or omission of Track or its respective agents or employees.
17. If horses accepted for racing at Track are assigned to an approved auxiliary training facility, then the provisions of this application shall also apply to such other facility.
18. Applicant agrees to be responsible for any damages to rooms assigned to Applicant caused by Applicant or Applicant's employees, agents and invitees. In the event such damage is repaired by Track, the cost of such repairs shall be charged to the Applicant.
19. Emergency Action Plan: Applicant shall be responsible for complying with all OSHA regulations as they pertain to Applicant's employees. Track is not responsible for training or accounting for any employees other than its own during an emergency. Copies of the Track Emergency Action Plan are available in the Operations office upon request.
20. The granting of stalls and other accommodations pursuant to this application in whole or in part shall not constitute a lease of space but a revocable license only and may be revoked at any time by Track in its absolute discretion.
21. The undersigned Applicant acknowledges that each additional starter in a race is projected to produce an increase in mutual handle, which, in turn projected to increase purse revenues. Applicant understands that he/she is expected to average at least one (1) start per month for each stall allotted during the race meet covered by this application.
22. Track is entitled to perform physiological tests consisting of the taking of blood samples from owners' horses entered into races to be conducted at the Race Meet. Such samples will be tested for bicarbonate levels. Trainers of horses showing a total carbon dioxide per liter of plasma in excess of the level specified in the Race Meet Agreement(s) between the Track and the Thoroughbred Owners of California or California Thoroughbred Trainers shall be subject to the disciplinary measures specified in such Agreement.
23. In order to assure the protection of the public, to maintain and encourage confidence in the integrity of horse racing and to safeguard the health and safety of human and equine participants, Applicant acknowledges that Applicant and Applicant's agents, employees and affiliates have no expectation of privacy with respect to stalls and living quarters and appurtenant facilities provided by Track. Detention Barn Plan for Use of Graded Stakes or Overnight Races

1. Assignment of event security personnel to each graded stakes entry beginning no less than six (6) hours prior to post-time for the race;

Track is entitled to perform physiological tests consisting of the taking of blood samples from owners' horses entered in races to be conducted at the 2007 Meet. It is the understanding of the parties that such samples will be tested for bicarbonate levels. Trainers of horses showing a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, and owners' horses within their control, will be subject to the following:

- A. **1st Offense** – For the first test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse may have his/her barn, and all owners' horses stabled therein, subject to "earned surveillance" for a period of 45 days from the date of the infraction. Such earned surveillance will be conducted at TRACK's sole discretion, and may include, but not be limited to, the placing of surveillance cameras with recording devices in any location within that barn that Track deems necessary and appropriate to ensure the integrity of racing. Additionally, owners' horses entered by said trainer anytime within a period of 30 days after notification of the first offense, may be subject to confinement in a detention barn beginning at noon on the day before said horse is scheduled to compete. Such detention barn will be established at management's sole discretion, with the costs of such detention/surveillance including, but not limited to, \$150.00 for security and \$25.00 for stall renovation per horse/entrant, being born by the trainer or owner of such horse.
- B. **2nd Offense** – For the second test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be prohibited from entering any owners' horse within his/her care in a race for a period of 15 race days.
- C. **3rd Offense** – For the third test that results in a total carbon dioxide (TCO₂) of 37 millimoles per liter of plasma or more, the registered trainer of such horse shall be expelled from TRACK's enclosure for a period of one year, and shall further be precluded from entering any owners' horses within his care for the balance of Track's 2007 Meet.

Track further agrees that it shall enforce these penalties when imposed as a result of similar contract provisions with other racing associations in California. By way of example only, Track agrees that should any horse running at its meet be subject to detention barn confinement as the result of a positive at another

association, Track will continue to require detention barn confinement for the remainder of said 30 day period. Also by way of example, should a trainer have a TCO2 positive or positives at a race meet other than its own and a subsequent positive at Track's race meet or at another associations meet, Track will enforce paragraph B, and may, at its discretion, enforce paragraph C above as though the original positive(s) had taken place at its meet.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides the Board shall license all persons, other than the public at large, who participate in a horse racing meeting with pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19510 states no person required to be licensed may participate in any capacity in any horse race meeting without a valid and unrevoked license. B&P Code Section 19520 states every person not required to be licensed under Article 4 who participates in, or has anything to do with, the racing of horses shall be licensed by the Board pursuant to the rules and regulations the Board may adopt. B&P Code Section 19521 provides that an original license issued pursuant to this article shall be issued for a period of the calendar year in which it is issued, and shall be renewable for a period, not to exceed three years, which the Board may, by regulation, establish. B&P Code Section 19704 states the Board shall issue licenses for mule racing. The license shall be limited to mule races only. Board Rule 1486, Term of License, states every original occupational license for groom, stable employee, stable assistant and mule-racing participant expires in the calendar year in which they are issued. Original licenses shall be automatically extended to expire on the last day of the birth month of the licensee, and renewal licenses shall expire on the last day of the birth month of the licensee on an annual basis. At the February 2007 Regular Board Meeting a proposal to add a new class of license for "backstretch event personnel" was adopted. The proposal added the license class to Board Rule 1481, Occupational Licenses and Fees. The new class of license expires on an annual basis, which makes it necessary to add it to Rule 1486, the rule that describes the term of such "one-year" licenses. The proposal to amend Rule 1486 was heard at the April 2007 Regular Board meeting. The Board determined it would defer the issue until it could be heard in conjunction with industry proposals regarding retention of backstretch event personnel licenses and backstretch event personnel job description and training.

ANALYSIS

The proposal to amend Rule 1486 would add "backstretch event personnel" to those classes of license whose term is one year. As with the other classes of occupational licenses under Rule 1486, the initial license would expire on the last day of the year in which it is issued, and would automatically be extended to the last day of the birth month of the licensee in the following year. Each subsequent license would expire on the licensee's birth date.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board direct staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period.

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of Chapter 4, B&P Code. Responsibilities of the Board shall include: adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering, and administration and enforcement of all laws, rules and regulations affecting horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19703 states the Board, in cooperation with American Mule Association representatives, shall adopt rules governing, permitting and regulating mule racing and wagering on the races under the pari-mutuel system. Board Rule 1555, Duties of Horseshoe Inspector, provides that the horseshoe inspector shall make an inspection of the horseshoes of each horse prior to its departure for the post. He shall report immediately to the stewards any horse that is improperly shod. Rule 1853, Examination Required, states the horseshoe inspector shall inspect the horseshoes of each horse, and no horse shall be eligible to start in a race if it is improperly shod. Under Rule 1406, Suspension of Rule, the Board may temporarily suspend the application of its own rules for good cause. At the April 2007 Regular Board Meeting the Board discussed a proposal to add Article 10.5, Mule Racing, Rule 1747, Mule Racing Rules and Rule 1748, Shoeing Mules. The proposal to add Article 10.5 and Rules 1747 and 1748 grew out of a request by the American Mule Racing Association (AMRA) for a waiver of Rule 1853. The AMRA requested the waiver due to a change in its regulations that would allow mules to run barefoot. The AMRA representative testified that mules were notoriously difficult to shoe without tranquilizing, and that few farriers carry shoes as small as a mule's foot (size 3). Additionally, the AMRA representative stated mules' hooves were very tough and it was not a handicap for mules to run barefoot. The Board directed staff to initiate a 45-day public comment period for Article 10.5 and the associated regulations.

ANALYSIS

Although the rulemaking process has begun regarding the addition of Article 10.5 and Rule 1748 – a rule which will allow mules to run barefoot – mules will be running on the racing fair circuit before the proposed regulation can be adopted and implemented. A temporary waiver of Rule 1555 and Rule 1853 is necessary if the Board wishes to allow mules to run barefoot. At the April 2007 discussion regarding the AMRA's request for a waiver it was suggested that Rule 1853 could be interpreted to allow mules to run barefoot, so there may be no need for a waiver or a regulation. However, the Deputy Attorney General determined that Rule 1853 was applicable to mule racing, and as currently written did not easily suggest or necessarily support a conclusion that no shoes is "properly shod."

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board grant the AMRA a waiver of Rule 1555 and Rule 1853.

1555. Duties of Horseshoe Inspector.

The horseshoe inspector shall make an inspection of the horseshoes of each horse prior to its departure for the post. He has the authority to make adjustments and corrections in shoes of any horse as he may deem necessary, subject to the approval of the stewards.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this State where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board. B&P Code Section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include administration and enforcement of all laws, rules, and regulations affecting horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19432 provides that the executive director shall keep a full and true record of all proceedings of the Board, and preserve at the Board's general office all books, documents, and papers of the Board. Rule 1536, Stewards' Minutes, provides that the stewards shall maintain minutes and records of all proceedings and shall submit their original minutes to the Executive Director weekly.

ANALYSIS

The Board's website currently provides Internet access to many documents routinely produced by staff. Such documents include notice of proposals to amend regulations; agendas and supporting documents (packages) for Board and committee meetings; transcripts of Regular Board Meetings; complaints and accusations; statistical reports; and the Board's rules and regulations. In addition to submission to the Executive Director, stewards' minutes are posted at the racing office, and are available via public records requests. It has been suggested that the stewards' minutes be added to the documents routinely posted on the Board's website to enhance public access to the minutes.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board direct staff to post the stewards' minutes on the Board's website.

BACKGROUND

A discussion regarding the status of racehorse retirement farms was held at the April 2007 Regular Board Meeting. The Board heard a presentation by Grace Belcuore of California Equine Retirement Foundation, Inc., as well as testimony from the industry at large. The consensus was that retired racehorses could be rehabilitated and used in a number of capacities, and that owners needed to become more involved. Additionally, a dedicated source of income was needed to finance and expand current voluntary efforts by concerned individuals and institutions. Representatives of Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) stated TOC had formed an Equine Retirement Committee to explore alternative sources of income for racehorse retirement.

ANALYSIS

TOC has proposed to amend Board Rule 1467, Paymaster of Purses. The proposed amendment would direct the paymaster of purses to deduct 3 percent of the net purse earned by any thoroughbred horse at a thoroughbred racing association or fair meeting, which would be deposited into the California Retirement Management Account (CARMA). The CARMA, which is to be established by the TOC, is a charitable trust fund for the benefit of California Thoroughbred retirement/rehabilitation facilities. The proposed amendment defines “net purse earned” and provides a mechanism through which an owner may opt-out of the 3 percent contribution to CARMA. In addition, the amendment to Rule 1467 states the CARMA funds shall be distributed to qualified retirement/rehabilitation facilities as determined by the horsemen’s organization. The TOC version of the proposed amendment (see Draft “A”) would leave the decision regarding what is a “qualified” retirement/rehabilitation facility to the horseman’s organization’s “unbiased, independent judgment.” This does not provide any criteria for such organizations. Draft “B” of the regulation states such facilities must be not for profit, exempt from federal or state income taxes and approved by the Board. The requirements correspond with the current criteria for organizations designated to receive charity race day proceeds. Draft “A” states the horsemen’s organization must provide an annual audited financial statement regarding the CARMA. Draft “B” adds a time frame within which such audit must be submitted by stating it shall be filed with the Board within 90 days of the close of the horsemen’s organization’s fiscal year. This corresponds with Rule 2048, Horsemen’s Organization Welfare Fund, which requires the horsemen’s organization that

maintains a welfare fund to submit a financial report within 90 days after the close of its fiscal year.

RECOMMENDATION

Two texts for the proposed amendment to Rule 1467 have been provided. Draft “A” is the text originally submitted by TOC. Draft “B” is a modified version of the TOC text.

This item is presented for Board discussion and action.

DRAFT A**1467. Paymaster of Purses.**

(a) The association shall appoint a paymaster of purses who shall maintain records as the association and the Board direct. All records shall be separate from those of the Board and are subject to inspection by the Board at any time. The duties of the paymaster of purses or their assistants shall consist of the following:

(1) Maintain records which shall include the name, address, state or country of residence, social security number or federal identification number of each horse owner, trainer, driver, jockey or apprentice jockey participating at the race meeting who has funds due or on deposit in their horsemen's account.

(2) Keep jockey and driver accounts, receive their fees and disburse said fees to the proper claimants.

(3) Verify that the correct claiming price is on deposit with the association before any claim in a claiming race is accepted as official.

(4) Receive and disburse the purses and other awards of each race.

(5) Receive all stakes, entrance money, fines, purchase money in claiming races and other monies that properly come into the paymaster's possession.

(6) Accept money belonging to another association, provided the money is returned within five working days to that association.

(7) Disclose the Cal-bred awards to the respective breed agencies.

(8) Accept and file all required statements of partnerships, assignments of interest, lease agreements, and registrations of authorized agents.

(9) Disburse all monies to the entitled individuals, unless otherwise provided in this section, within 30 calendar days after the meet ends.

(10) Estimate escrow accounts and receive, maintain and disburse funds as directed by the Board.

(11) Deduct from the horse owner's account, and deposit into the account of the horse owner's trainer, 10% of the purse earned on any horse that finishes first, second or third at thoroughbred race meetings. For purposes of this section "purse earned" means all amounts earned except in stakes races in which case "purse earned" means all amounts earned less any nomination, entry or starter fees paid by the owner. Such payments shall be disbursed to the trainer and will be available at the office of the paymaster of purses no later than seven days after the race was conducted. Any amounts so paid shall be repaid to the paymaster forthwith by the trainer upon any order requiring redistribution.

(12) Deduct from the horse owner's account, and deposit into the account of the horse owner's trainer, 10% of the net purse earned on any horse that finishes first, second or third at quarter

horse meetings. Such payments shall be disbursed to the trainer and will be available at the office of the paymaster of purses no later than seven days after the race was conducted. Any amounts so paid shall be repaid to the paymaster forthwith by the trainer upon any order requiring redistribution.

(b) Horse owners may elect not to have 10% of the purse earned deducted from their account by filing with the paymaster of purses at each racing association at which the owner wishes it to be in effect, a form CHRB-134 (New 1/02), Notification of Exclusion To Trainer 10% Program, which is hereby incorporated by reference. The form CHRB-134 (1/02) is available at the office of the paymaster of purses at any race meeting.

(c) A form CHRB-134 may be filed with the paymaster of purses at any time during a race meeting, and

- (1) Shall apply to all horses owned in whole or in part by the owner,
- (2) Shall be binding on all licensed owners with an interest in the horse or horses,
- (3) Shall apply to all trainers employed by the owner, and
- (4) Shall remain in force until written revocation is submitted to the paymaster at the race meeting at which the form CHRB-134 was submitted.

(d) Deduct from the horse owner's account 0.3% of the net purse earned by any Thoroughbred horse at a Thoroughbred racing association or Fair meeting, and deposit into the California Retirement Management Account ("CARMA"), a charitable trust fund to be established and maintained by the horsemen's association representing Thoroughbred horse owners at said meeting, for distribution to California Thoroughbred retirement and/or rehabilitation facilities, which provide livestock care and services to retired Thoroughbred horses that competed in Thoroughbred races in the State. For purposes of this section "net purse earned" means all amounts earned except in stakes races in which case "net purse earned" means all amounts earned less any nomination, entry or starter fees paid by the owner.

- (1.)Thoroughbred horse owners may elect not to have the contribution deducted from their account by filing with the paymaster of purses at each racing association at which the owner wishes it to be in effect, a form CHRB-___ (New ___), Notification of Exclusion of Contribution, which is hereby incorporated by reference. The form CHRB-___ (___) is available at the office of the paymaster of purses at any race meeting.
- (2.)The horsemen's association representing Thoroughbred horse owners that maintains the California Retirement Management Account shall distribute such funds on an annual basis to qualified retirement and/or rehabilitation facilities, as determined by the association in its unbiased, independent judgment.
- (3.)The horsemen's association representing Thoroughbred horse owners that maintains the California Retirement Management Account shall annually submit to the Board an audited financial statement.

BACKGROUND

In 1933 the people of the State of California adopted a constitutional amendment creating the California Horse Racing Board. The measure gave complete jurisdiction and supervision over all racing activities to the State of California, acting through the Board. Pursuant to these powers, the Board passes rules establishing the authority to regulate horseracing in California.

The seven-member board is Governor appointed. Principal activities of the board include: protecting the betting public; licensing of racing associations and industry participants; sanctioning rule violators; designating racing days and charity days; acting as a quasi-judicial body in matters pertaining to horse racing meets; collecting the state's lawful share of revenue derived from horse racing meets; and enforcing laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to horse racing in California.

There are 35 wagering facilities in California, comprising six privately-owned racetracks; nine racing fairs; and twenty simulcast-only facilities. Billions of dollars are wagered on California horse racing, resulting in revenue to the State from which the Board receives its budgetary appropriations and funding.

ANALYSIS

The state and CHRB fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30. For the current fiscal year ending June 30, 2007, CHRB received a support budget of approximately \$10,300,000 to fund all operations. As of March 31, 2007, CHRB has expended approximately \$7 million, with anticipated expenditures of approximately \$3.2 million for the remainder of the fiscal year. This would ensure that CHRB remains within the budgetary constraints placed upon it. Slightly more than 1/2 of the budget (approximately \$5.4 million) funds agency contracts including: UC Davis Maddy Lab, the stewards and veterinarians, the DOJ for DAG support, the Office of Administrative Hearings, and various other service and consultant contracts. The remainder (approximately \$4.9 million) covers staff salaries and benefits, CHRB facilities, and operating expenses for staff and the Board. The current year budget is an increase over 2005-06 in that additional drug testing funds were finally approved and appropriated in February 2007. CHRB has moved to partner with the UC Davis Maddy Lab to procure equipment and communication tools, and to modernize the Board's IT system and infrastructure in order to enhance the CHRB's out-of-competition efforts. The Governor's support budget proposal for 2007-08 includes \$10,800,000 for the CHRB, including the permanent increase for additional drug testing and out-of-competition testing.

On May 9, 2007, through the normal state budgeting process, the CHRB's 2007-08 budget was heard before the Senate Budget Sub Committee 4. The committee unanimously voted to eliminate CHRB's 2007-08 budget. The legislature will again consider the CHRB budget (through a process known as the "Conference Committee") later in May 2007. CHRB staff are taking whatever steps are necessary to proceed, as the administration and legislature deem necessary.

RECOMMENDATION

This subject is presented for information and status update purposes only; no recommendation is necessary at this time.

BACKGROUND

Pursuant to Section 2.06 of the State Contracting Manual, state Boards and Commissions with contracts in excess of \$5,000, must provide a copy of a motion approving and authorizing execution of the agreement/contract.

ANALYSIS

The attached list of service, Steward, Official Veterinarian and out of competition veterinarian contracts is proposed for Fiscal Year 2007/08, with estimated annual costs. Steward and Official Veterinarian contracts are based on assignments for the 2007 racing calendar

At the May 15, 2007 Stewards meeting, CHRB authorized daily rate and health payment increases to both Stewards and Official Veterinarians. The estimated cumulative total contract amount on the attached listing of Steward and Veterinarian names for board approval, include these wage and health increases, effective July 1, 2007. Steward's daily rates were last increased in January 2000, by 4%. Official Veterinarian daily rates, which historically have paid a lower rate than stewards, were also last increased in January 2000, by 7%.

The 2007-08 Steward and Official Veterinarian daily rates have been increased by approximately 25%; and health payments have been increased by approximately 25 %, the cumulative total provided for board approval.

Out Of Competition Testing

Effective February 23, 2007, the \$851,000 out of competition funds were released to the CHRB. The contract with U C Davis is now included within the list of service contracts attached. Out of competition veterinarian contracts are currently in a development stage and contract dollar values as well as the total number of veterinarians collecting samples may need to be evaluated as the program progresses.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board approve the attached list of Steward, Official Veterinarian, out of competition veterinarian, and service contracts for Fiscal Year 2007/08.
