APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER 24, 2014

Chairman Winner asked for approval of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of September 24, 2014. Commissioner Krikorian **motioned** to approve the minutes. Commissioner Beneto **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

Executive Director Baedeker stated staff had identified a potential backstretch security system provider and was receiving a demonstration of the system in early November 2014. He said in cooperation with the Jockey's Club, InCompass, and Santa Anita there would also be a demonstration at the Breeders' Cup on microchip tracking for horses; it would begin with a live demonstration of the implant process, followed by a detailed explanation of the proposed pilot program. The amendment to Board Rule 1844, Authorized Medication, took effect October 1, 2014. During the weeks leading up to October 1, staff issued 300 courtesy warning letters to trainers whose horses would have tested positive under the new medication thresholds. Executive Director Baedeker said CHRB was in the process of reorganizing its staff, adding a

staff Counsel with expertise in legislation and regulations. He stated he wished to respond to the Board being vilified over the suspension of Doug O'Neil; bloggers who criticized the Board did not have all the facts. He summarized the issues surrounding the suspension and the reasons the Board came to its decision. Executive Director Baedeker stated the 2014 Fresno Fair all source handle was down eight percent over 2013. Year to date, industry wide daytime all source handle was up less than one percent when compared to the same time in 2013; year to date nighttime all source handle was down 11.7 percent compared with 2013.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Kevin Bolling, representing the California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation (CTHF), stated CTHF had started its annual flu vaccination program for backstretch workers. He said Oak Tree Racing Foundation had sponsored the program for 2014 so that it was free for all backstretch workers.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE DISTRIBUTION OF RACE DAY CHARITY PROCEEDS OF THE LOS ALAMITOS QUARTER HORSE RACING ASSOCIATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$33,514 TO FIVE BENEFICIARIES.

Commissioner Auerbach **motioned** to approve the request by Los Alamitos Quarter Horse Racing Association to distribute its race day charity proceeds. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE PACIFIC RACING ASSOCIATION (T) AT GOLDEN GATE FIELDS, COMMENCING DECEMBER 26, 2014 THROUGH JUNE 14, 2015, INCLUSIVE.

Calvin Rainey, representing the Pacific Racing Association at Golden Gate Fields (GGF), stated the 2015 winter-spring meeting consisted of 97 race days from December 26, 2014 to June 14, 2015; and had 12 stakes races, the same as 2014. He said GGF had \$352 million in handle for all race meetings, compared to \$350 million in 2013. Tom Ludt, of GGF, stated the plans for renovations were moving slowly due to complex issues in current litigation. He said GGF expected increases in field size. GGF had a new Racing Secretary: Patrick Mackey. Dan Cirimele, of GGF, stated the 2015 marketing budget would be similar to 2014. GGF planned to heavily promote its El Camino Real Derby, a prep race for the Kentucky Derby, and increase its marketing focus on the local Hispanic market. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked if GGF planned to increase its marketing to any ethnic groups other than Hispanic. Mr. Rainey stated attendance increased on days where the promotion focused on the Hispanic market. He said GGF planned to build on that success by increasing the local advertising on Telemundo. Chairman Winner asked how GGF did with the local Asian market. Mr. Rainey said attendance increased on days which promoted to the Asian market; however, not enough to show a return on investment. Commissioner Krikorian asked what GGF did to attract young customers. Mr. Ludt stated once facility improvements were completed there would be more of a marketing focus on young players. It would be a wasted effort to get them to attend the first time, without having the inviting environment that would keep them coming back. Mr. Rainey said GGF did have a dollar day on Sunday which had a younger demographic. Commissioner Choper asked how handle on dollar days compared to other days. Mr. Rainey said the wagering did not go up with the increase in attendance, but GGF hoped that it was developing a new fan base. Commissioner

Beneto asked if GGF had studied the effects of its field size on its handle. Mr. Ludt stated GGF did much better in handle when the field size was in the eight to ten horses-per-race range. Commissioner Choper asked if that applied to on-track wagering. Mr. Ludt stated it did. Commissioner Beneto asked if it would be worth the risk to try increasing field size by increasing purses. Mr. Ludt said he agreed it could work, but the challenge would be for GGF to remain solvent. He said increasing field size was a complex problem with the decreased horse population, not one that could be solved by just increasing purses. Commissioner Beneto said increased purses would bring in horses from other states. Mr. Ludt said the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) would have to agree to the purse increases. Commissioner Auerbach stated it would be beneficial to receive the horsemen agreements earlier than the rest of the application package so that the Board could better review them. Mr. Ludt said the timing was difficult with race meeting applications for long race meetings at GGF and the Los Angeles Thoroughbred Club at Santa Anita (Santa Anita) due at the same time as the Breeders' Cup was taking place. Commissioner Auerbach said the Breeders' Cup had been run at Santa Anita for three years, long enough for an adjustment period. She stated discrepancies in the stakes schedule should be worked out and agreed upon before being publicly presented to the Board. Chairman Winner asked if there was progress on the outstanding Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) and California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT) agreements. Mr. Rainey said there was still a small issue with the agreements and they had not been finalized. Commissioner Krikorian asked if GGF had put any effort into ensuring its races were simulcast without a delay. Mr. Ludt said a delay in the simulcast was a huge issue; however, getting the states to work together on post times went nowhere. Commissioner Beneto said it was frustrating to be looking for a GGF race on HRTV or TVG and the race begins without warning. Mr. Ludt said GGF simulcast should improve after December 31, 2014 when the Stronach Group takes 100 percent

ownership of HRTV. Commissioner Choper **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting at GGF, commencing December 26, 2014 through June 14, 2015, contingent on the receipt of all outstanding documents. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES TURF CLUB, (T) AT SANTA ANITA, COMMENCING DECEMBER 26, 2014 THROUGH JUNE 28, 2015, INCLUSIVE.

Tom Ludt, representing the Los Angeles Thoroughbred Club at Santa Anita (Santa Anita), stated Santa Anita would host the Breeders' Cup again in 2016, after which the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club would host in 2017. He said Santa Anita had concerns over the length of the the 2014 winter-spring race meeting; however, it was a success. Santa Anita would continue to tweak the use of the facility improvements to further attract the younger crowd; it was an investment which would pay off in the long run. Mr. Ludt said the stakes schedule was not finalized with the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) but there would be a couple of \$1 million dollar races. Commissioner Choper asked if Santa Anita kept a record of its horse populations from year to year. Mr. Ludt said a record was kept of the horses and trainers at Stronach sanctioned facilities; 2014 showed an increase in horse population over 2013 due to the higher purses and the success of Del Mar's Ship and Win program, which brought in horses from out-of-state. Rick Hammerle, of Santa Anita, said there were four facilities stabling horses for Santa Anita race meetings: Santa Anita, San Luis Rey Downs, Fairplex, and Los Alamitos. Chairman Winner asked why Santa Anita did not participate in the Ship and Win program if there was agreement it was such a success. Mr. Ludt said Del Mar, Los Alamitos, and Santa Anita would be meeting with the California Marketing Committee to develop a year-round program. He said

getting the horses to come to California was only part of the challenge, the next issue was finding the incoming horses long-term stabling. Nate Newbie, of Santa Anita, said the two year long renovation finished up in September, 2014, right before the Santa Anita Autumn race meeting; so far the customer response had been overwhelmingly positive. The renovations set out to create a different experience for every level of customer, and Santa Anita launched a new website to showcase the changes especially to new customers. Mr. Newbie said Santa Anita was looking into how to change Twilight Fridays to work around the heavy traffic on Friday evenings; public transportation promotions were being considered. He said the free infield promotion would also be modified to be more effective. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg said there were two marketing budgets listed for the winter-spring race meeting. Mr. Newbie said the marketing budget would be around \$4.8 million. Mr. Ludt stated the improvements were \$30.5 million more, and the investment from Mr. Stronach would not be recouped for many years. He said the improvements include a new track with the same surface as Los Alamitos, and the same surface Del Mar would install after its November, 2014 race meeting. Chairman Winner said having the same track surface at all of the Southern California tracks was absolutely terrific. Commissioner Auerbach said the new website was fabulous, and very inviting for the technically challenged. Chairman Winner stated putting fans in the saddling arena and the barns to get them out of the heat was a great idea. Executive Director Baedeker asked if anything was planned for 2015 to counter the issues with the extra wear on the turf course during the long race meeting. Mr. Ludt stated he did not know the details; however, Dennis Moore, the Track Superintendent, and Bernie Eastridge the Turf Superintendent had tried many different things and would continue to work on it until it was right. Commissioner Krikorian **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting at Santa Anita, commencing December 26, 2014 through June

28, 2015, contingent upon the submission of outstanding items. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE LOS ALAMITOS HORSE RACING ASSOCIATION (T) AT LOS ALAMITOS, COMMENCING DECEMBER 3, 2014 THROUGH DECEMBER 23, 2014, INCLUSIVE.

Brad McKinzie, representing the Los Alamitos Racing Association (LARA), stated this would be LARA's first winter race meeting. In the Fall, LARA was the location of the Los Angeles County Fair (LACF) race meeting which had 26 percent more handle than when it ran at Fairplex in 2013. He said the increase in field size made it more successful than the LARA summer race meeting. Mr. McKinzie said LARA expected its success to continue to grow as owners, trainers and wagerers became more familiar with its race meetings. Commissioner Choper stated the shape of the new track was also something to get used to. Mr. McKinzie said the track had now proven itself and LARA could move forward with its past success. He said for the winter meeting there would be the Los Alamitos Futurity, which was a Grade 1 stakes with appointed points towards the Kentucky Derby. Mr. McKinzie said the LARA added Quick Response Codes to all its print marketing that would take any smart phone user directly to the LARA website. Chairman Winner asked if the partnership with the Orange County Register had been a success. Mr. McKinzie said it was very successful and would be continued; however, LARA was also quadrupling its effort in direct marketing and incentives. He said for the winter race meeting LARA would be partnering with the Cypress Boys and Girls Club, and there had been negotiations for a partnership with an Orange County sports team. Mr. McKinzie said the agreement with the Thoroughbred Owners of California had not been completed because there were still discussions on making room for one more graded stakes in the winter schedule.

Commissioner Krikorian **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a thoroughbred horse racing meeting at Los Alamitos commencing December 3, 2014 through December 23, 2014, contingent upon receiving all outstanding documents. Commissioner Beneto **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF THE LOS ALAMITOS QUARTER HORSE RACING ASSOCIATION (Q) AT LOS ALAMITOS, COMMENCING DECEMBER 26, 2014 THROUGH DECEMBER 20, 2015, INCLUSIVE.

Chairman Winner stated the item would be heard at the November Regular Board Meeting.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD ON THE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF WATCH AND WAGER LLC (H) AT CAL EXPO, COMMENCING DECEMBER 26, 2014 THROUGH MAY 3, 2015, INCLUSIVE.

Christopher Schick, representing Watch and Wager (WAW), stated the 2015 race meeting had four more race days than the 2014 race meeting, but ended a week earlier because of the late loss of horse population to other venues. He said WAW invested \$250,000 into horse recruitment that brought in at least nine new barns. Commissioner Beneto asked how many horses were currently at WAW barns. Mr. Schick said around 320, horses were beginning to come in and the number would swell to around 480 by December 1. Commissioner Beneto asked how Steve Barry was able to get enough horses to run Cal Expo harness racing 4 days a week. Mr. Schick said in 2004 there were more horses available; purses supplemented by slot machines at the east coast tracks slowly took away the local trainers. He said the infrastructure of horse populations was built around successful race meetings, which WAW was in the process of rebuilding. Chairman Winner asked if standardbred populations had decreased nationwide the same way

thoroughbred populations had. Mr. Schick stated they had; he said the Meadowlands, once the Mecca of standardbred racing, was down to two days a week because of the low number of horses. The tracks that subsidized with slot machines were taking what was left, leaving the unsubsidized tracks without any horses. Mr. Schick said WAW was fifth in handle out of 55 harness tracks in the nation, but its purse structure, because it was unsubsidized, was somewhere in the middle. Commissioner Beneto asked what the bottom pot was in a place like Yonkers. Mr. Schick said Yonkers bottom pot was \$8,000 with \$50,000 opens every week; WAW bottom pot was \$2,000. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked how long WAW had requested the 16 percent takeout. Mr. Schick said WAW had requested it since it started running Cal Expo harness in 2012. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked if it had been effective. Mr. Schick said the reduced takeout was considered more of a promotion. Also, WAW had always offered it and had nothing to compare it to. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg asked what other tracks offered the lower takeout. Mr. Schick said it was the unsubsidized tracks looking to increase handle that lowered takeouts. Commissioner Beneto **motioned** to approve the application for license to conduct a horse racing meeting of WAW, at Cal Expo, commencing December 26, 2014 through May 3, 2015, contingent upon the submission of outstanding items. Commissioner Choper **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**. Executive Director Baedeker stated CHRB staff had been working with WAW on issues related to backside security for which WAW had been very responsive and committed to fixing the issues.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE **PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1588, HORSE INELIGIBLE TO START IN A RACE**, TO PROVIDE THAT A HORSE IS INELIGIBLE TO START IN ANY RACE IN CALIFORNIA IF IT IS ON THE VETERINARIAN'S LIST IN ANOTHER RACING JURISDICTION, UNLESS WITH PRIOR APPROVAL OF THE STEWARDS.

Commissioner Auerbach asked if there was a way for California to take horses off another jurisdiction's Veterinarian's List. Dr. Rick Arthur, Equine Medical Director, stated there was not; however, before a steward approved a horse on another jurisdiction's Veterinarian's List to race, the horse would go through the same steps involved with getting off the California Veterinarian's List. Commissioner Auerbach stated it defied logic for a horse to be on a Veterinarian's List in another state but be determined fit to race in California. Dr. Arthur said Oaklawn only ran in the spring; if a horse was put on its Veterinarian's List, they would be stuck on it until the next year. That was why the stewards needed the authority to allow horses that proved to be sound to race. Commissioner Choper said he assumed the stewards would find out why the horse had not been removed from the other jurisdiction's list. Dr. Arthur said that was correct. Commissioner Beneto asked if a horse that shipped to Arizona could be removed from California's list, if it did the required work in Arizona. Dr. Arthur stated the horse would have to be worked in California to be removed from the California list. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek **motioned** to adopt the proposed amendment to CHRB Rule 1588, Horse Ineligible to Start In a Race, to provide that a horse is ineligible to start in any race in California if it is on the Veterinarian's List in another racing jurisdiction, unless with prior approval of the stewards. Commissioner Auerbach **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

PUBLIC HEARING AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO **CHRB RULE 1858, TEST SAMPLE REQUIRED**, TO ELIMINATE THE MAXIMUM RESTRICTION ON SAMPLES THAT MAY BE TAKEN, AND TO ADD HORSES REGISTERED TO RACE AT AN INCLOSURE, NOMINATED TO RACE, AND PRE-ENTERED IN A RACE TO THOSE HORSES SUBJECT TO TESTING.

Commissioner Krikorian asked what the minimum required daily tested currently was. Dr. Rick Arthur, Equine Medical Director, stated the minimum was all winners plus six other horses. Commissioner Auerbach asked why the existing limits were established. Dr. Arthur said the current limits were created to control costs. Commissioner Auerbach said she liked that the horses had to be registered to race; it was very clear. Commissioner Krikorian asked if there were budget constraints preventing required testing. Dr. Arthur said there were not. 2nd Vice Chairman Rosenberg said the rule should state the horses could be tested outside of the inclosure, otherwise it was unclear that a registered horse not yet in the inclosure could be tested. Chairman Winner stated the amendment had already completed its public comment period. Dr. Arthur said he was chairing a national committee that was developing a uniform rule that would specifically address testing outside the inclosure. Commissioner Krikorian **motioned** to adopt the proposed amendment to CHRB Rule 1858, Test Sample Required, to eliminate the maximum restriction on samples that may be taken, and to add horses registered to race at an inclosure, nominated to race, and pre-entered in a race to those horses subject to testing. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek **seconded** the motion, which was **unanimously carried**.

REPORT FROM THE MEDICATION AND TRACK SAFETY COMMITTEE.

1st Vice-Chairman Derek stated Dr. Rick Arthur, Equine Medical Director, provided an update to the Medication and Track Safety committee on the meeting of the International Conference of Racing Analysts and Veterinarians. The conference focused on emerging doping threats and

horse welfare. The Committee discussed the use of cobalt as a performance enhancer, and ketoprofen, a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek stated the Committee discussed further regulating corticosteroids. She said staff was working with the Veterinarian Medical Board on acceptable language for third-party Laix administration. Dr. Arthur reported to the Committee the recommendation of the International Federation of Horse Racing Authorities that more out-of-competition testing was needed to prevent the use of performance enhancing drugs during training off-site. Dr. Arthur reported that UC Davis would begin a cardiology project to study heart disease and sudden death in horses. 1st Vice-Chairman Derek stated the Committee discussed the proposed amendment of CHRB Rule 1843.3.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHRB RULE 1843.3, PENALTIES FOR MEDICATION VIOLATIONS, TO PROHIBIT: 1) SUSPENDED TRAINERS FROM TRANSFERRING HORSES TO EMPLOYEES; 2) THE USE OF ANY SIGNAGE, COLORS OR IDENTIFIABLE TACK OF A SUSPENDED TRAINER DURING A SUSPENSION AND 3) TO CHANGE FROM 60 DAYS TO 45 DAYS, THE REQUIREMENT THAT TRAINERS SUSPENDED FOR SUCH TIME BE BANNED FROM THE ENCLOSURE AND FORFEIT ALL ASSIGNED STALL SPACE AND REMOVE FROM THE INCLOSURE ALL SIGNAGE, ADVERTISEMENTS, TRAINING-RELATED EQUIPMENT, TACK, OFFICE EQUIPMENT AND OTHER PROPERTY.

1st Vice-Chairman Derek stated the proposed amendment to CHRB Rule 1843.3 was not a reaction to recent events; it had been in development for years. She said the complaint process was lengthy, with ample oversight; when a trainer was suspended the trainer should not be able to benefit from horse racing. Commissioner Chopper stated the requirement to ban trainers from the inclosure should be reduced from 60 to 30 days, not 45. Chairman Winner said there were reasons why 45 days was recommended. Executive Director Baedeker stated any suggestions from the Board or feedback from stakeholders should be considered before moving forward with the 45 day comment period. Chairman Winner said there needed to be an effective minimum

penalty, especially when a trainer benefitted financially during suspension, in violation of section 1843.3(i). 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated preventing suspended trainers from transferring their horses to family or employees was not enough; trainers could still transfer their horses to a friend. He said the Board needed to find an effective way to determine if the trainers were benefitting financially from horseracing, no matter how they were doing it. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg said he also had a problem with the proposed amendment being discussed at the Medication and Track Safety Committee meeting a day before the Regular Board Meeting, without enough time for stakeholders to discuss amongst themselves any issues brought up at Committee. Commissioner Auerbach stated the amendment to Rule 1843.3 was important for ensuring that the trainers playing by the rules did not have to compete with trainers who repeatedly violated medication rules; the amendment was also important to the wagering public who trusted the Board to keep horse racing clean. Chairman Winner said the Board should stick with the 45 day threshold to ban trainers from the inclosure to ensure the amendment targeted repeat offenders. A 30 day suspension might be given to a first time offender and was therefore too low of a threshold. Commissioner Krikorian stated he preferred 30 days. He said the opinions of stakeholders should be considered, but firm action should be taken by the Board for the betterment of horse racing. Jacqueline Wagner, Assistant Executive Director, suggested the Board continue developing the amendment with the stakeholders before initiating the 45 day public comment period. After the official 45-day comment period was initiated, any changes to the amendment required a more in depth process which delayed the finalization of the amendment. Commissioner Auerbach asked if there could be an informal meeting to make the necessary changes. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg said the Chairman needed to call for an informal meeting. Chairman Winner stated any informal meeting could not have more than two commissioners present. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated 3 commissioners could be present

at an informal meeting. Robert Miller, CHRB Counsel, said a meeting with 3 or more commissioners was governed by the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act. Chairman Winner stated the amendment could go back to Committee for more input from concerned stakeholders; options could be developed and presented to the full Board at a later Regular Board Meeting. Commissioner Choper said the Board should encourage communication early in the rulemaking process to not slow down an already cumbersome process. Ms. Wagner stated comments made during the 45-day comment period slowed down the process; when comments led to substantive changes in the text, the process had to start all over again. Executive Baedeker stated the Board should seek comments from stakeholders and commissioners, have a Committee meeting, draft optional texts to present at a Regular Board Meeting all before the 45 day comment period was initiated. Commissioner Beneto said he would prefer the 30 day suspension threshold. 2nd Vice-Chairman Rosenberg stated a trainer's first medication violation may not be indicative of an intention to cheat and should not be treated as such. Chairmen Winner agreed. Alan Balch, representing the California Thoroughbred Trainers (CTT), stated it was important that all stakeholders participated in the development of the amendment, and the CTT looked forward to participating in future discussions. He said the CTT was behind the objective one hundred percent.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19550 states the Board shall require each licensed racing association that conducts 14 or less weeks of racing to designate three racing days, and each licensed racing association that conducts more than 14 weeks of racing to designate five racing days during any one meeting, to be conducted as charity days by the licensee for the purpose of distribution of the net proceeds therefrom to beneficiaries through the distribution agent. No racing association shall be required to pay to a distributing agent for the purpose of distribution to beneficiaries more than an amount equal to two-tenths of one percent of the association's total on-track handle on live races conducted by the association at the meeting. Business and Professions Code section 19555 requires that proceeds are to be distributed to beneficiaries within 12 calendar months after the last day of the meet during which charity days were conducted. Business and Professions Code section 19556 provides that the distributing agent shall make the distribution to beneficiaries qualified under this article. At least 20 percent of the distribution shall be made to charities associated with the horse racing industry. An additional five percent shall be paid to a welfare fund and another five percent shall be paid to a nonprofit corporation, the primary purpose of which is to assist horsemen and backstretch personnel who are being affected adversely as a result of alcohol or substance abuse. In addition to the above distributions, a separate 20 percent shall be made to a nonprofit corporation or trust, the directors or trustees of which shall serve without compensation except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses, and which has as its sole purpose the accumulation of endowment funds, the income on which shall be distributed to qualified disabled jockeys.

ANALYSIS

Los Angeles Turf Club (LATC) is requesting approval to distribute race day charity proceeds generated at its 2013 winter/spring/summer meet from December 26, 2013 through June 29, 2014. From the net race day charity proceeds LATC is proposing a total distribution of \$190,658.20. The charitable organizations selected and amount to be distributed is listed on the attachment. Staff notes that 100 percent of the proceeds will be given to 12 horse racing related organizations.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion and action. Staff recommends the Board approve the charity race day distribution as presented.

ADDEMDUM TO REQUEST FOR AUTHORITY TO DISTRIBUTE
2013 CHARITY DAYS PROCEEDS

California Equine Retirement Foundation, Inc. – CERF is an organization that has developed into a full-care ranch to provide a full range of services to former race horses in need of rehabilitation toward retirement or placement in to a new career. CERF maintains 75 plus horses ranging in age from one year to 35 years, each having specific needs to insure proper health and optimal fitness. Each horse has its own paddock where appropriate portions are placed in feeders in the morning and again in the late afternoon. During the day hay is placed in outside feeders for grazing while the horses are turned out. Periodic re-evaluations are made to determine if any changes are needed in any individual's dietary regime. This program provides horses with proper nutrition to maintain health, fitness and longevity.

California Thoroughbred Foundation – CTF is a 503(c)(3) nonprofit organization that provides multiple benefits to individuals involved in the Thoroughbred industry. These include scholarship programs for veterinary medicine students at UC, Davis and maintenance of the Carleton F. Burke Memorial Library.

California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation – CTHF is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit foundation that provides assistance to the low income backstretch community occupied with the care of Thoroughbred race horses at California's major race tracks and fair circuits and CHRB recognized off-track training centers. The organization maintains three clinics throughout the state which see over 10,000 people each year, including numerous children who are prepared medically to return to school each year.

CARMA – The California Retirement Management Account is organized to raise money for retired California race horses. Their mission statement provides that they assist Thoroughbred retirement facilities that care for and retrain horses whose careers have ended after competing in California Thoroughbred races. Their services include tracking of retired California race horses and in working to find homes for retired equines. CARMA also manages a grant request process and distributes funds to qualified retirement facilities caring for such horses. CARMA is dedicated to the goal of providing funding for the rehabilitation, retraining and/or retirement of Thoroughbred horses that have raced in California.

Edwin Gregson Foundation – A nonprofit charitable foundation organized for the purpose of improving the lives of backstretch workers and their immediate family members at California race tracks. The organization provides backstretch workers with many educational programs, including "English as a second language," bible studies and provides numerous programs, including computer training programs at its recreation facility, computer games and various magazines in English and Spanish. It organizes family outings for the workers and their children, including trips to Magic Mountain in Valencia, California, Raging Waters, Galaxy soccer games, Dodger baseball games and excursions to the Long Beach Aquarium. The organization also maintains a recreational hall at Santa Anita Park for the benefit of the backside workers and their children.

Holy Angels Church (Backside Permanent Deacon) – Holy Angels Church is a Catholic Church across the street from Santa Anita Park. A deacon from the church performs a weekly Mass in the recreation room at the track on Monday nights for the workers on the backside. He walks down the shed rows daily in the morning and assists the workers in an endless variety of ways. Examples of the assistance provided include counseling, organizing religious and recreational activities, the collection and distribution of clothing, help with Medicare, Medi-Cal and immigration forms, officiating at holiday gatherings at Santa Anita, etc.

Racetrack Chaplaincy of America (Southern California Council) – The stated mission of the organization is "The overall mission of RTCA, through its councils and chaplains, is to make disciples for Jesus Christ through teaching, preaching, and ministering to the spiritual, emotional, physical, social, and educational needs of those persons involved in all aspects of the horse racing industry."

Southern California Equine Foundation, Inc. – SCEF is a nonprofit charitable organization providing hospital and equine ambulance services on the Southern California Thoroughbred racing circuit. Commonly known as the Equine Hospital, SCEF has a long history of service to the racing industry and the equine athlete. This is an organization "dedicated to the care of the injured horse."

Tranquility Farm – This organization is a 501(c)(3) charity whose principal activity is to accept the donation of Thoroughbred horses from the race tracks and breeding farms and whose goal is to give such horses the best opportunity to find an adoptive home. For those Thoroughbreds that are not readily adoptable, the organization offers comfortable retirement wherever possible, giving priority to horses that were significant competitors or producers. Tranquility Farm requests, but does not require, that owners contribute sponsorship to help defray the costs of rehabilitation and retraining. No horse is denied acceptance at Tranquility Farm based upon its owner's financial contribution.

United Pegasus Foundation – This is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization that aids the rescue of superannuated Thoroughbreds and provides care for such animals at its farm in Tehachapi, California. On occasion the organization purchases older horses at auction and acquires other Thoroughbreds at the request of owners and trainers. The retired Thoroughbreds are maintained in pleasant quarters and peaceful surroundings to live out the balance of their lives. This organization depends entirely upon donations for the purchase of food and other amenities required to maintain the Thoroughbreds.

Winners Foundation – The Winners Foundation provides confidential assistance on a one-to-one basis to employees and family members of California race tracks who are seeking help for alcohol, gambling and drug addiction. Each situation is geared to best support an individual's desire to change his or her life for the better. The Foundation has developed a large referral base and maintains close relationships with community based services such as anonymous 12 step groups, city and county assistance agencies, detox centers, halfway houses and out-patient and in-patient hospital treatment programs. This service is provided to any employee or family member of anyone involved in the California Thoroughbred horse racing community, free of charge. This includes backstretch workers, as well as all employees of Del Mar, Fairplex, Golden Gate Fields, Hollywood Park, Oak Tree, Santa Anita and the California Association of Racing Fairs.

Permanently Disabled Jockeys' Fund – This is a statutorily mandated distribution per Business and Professions Code Section 19556 (c). It provides support to disabled jockeys, as its name implies.





It is a public charity that currently provides financial assistance to approximately 60 former jockeys who have suffered catastrophic on-track injuries. It recently was the winner of the National Turf Writers and Broadcasters prestigious Joe Palmer Award for its exceptional work. Nancy LaSala is the group's president. Race Track Chaplaincy / Southern California (RTCA/SC) – The RTCA/SC is a nonprofit organization that was established in 1971, dedicated to providing excellence for the spiritual, emotional, physical and social/educational needs of horse racing's workers. Issue: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TO CONDUCT A HORSE RACING MEETING OF LOS ALAMITOS QUARTER HORSE RACING ASSOCIATION AT LOS ALAMITOS DECEMBER 26, 2014 THROUGH DECEMBER 20, 2015.

Los Alamitos Quarter Horse Racing Association (LAQHRA) filed its application to conduct a quarter horse racing meeting at Los Alamitos.

At its October 23, 2014 Regular Meeting, the Board deferred the LAQHRA race meet application until November 19, 2014.

- December 26, 2014 through December 20, 2015, or 152 days, three days less than 2014 allocated race dates. The association proposes to race a total of 1,400 races. The (estimated) average daily purse for the 2014 meet is \$90,991. The (estimated) average daily purse for this meet is \$89,780. The 2014 meet has not been completed.







CHRB Item 15.1 – Explanation of lack of paramedic staff

Unlike Los Angeles County, which allows for the licensing of private paramedic services, all paramedic services in Orange County fall under the jurisdiction of the Orange County Health Care Agency, Department of Emergency Medical Services and that agency does not license private paramedic services within the county.

All paramedic services within Orange County are provided by the Orange County Fire Authority and there is no provision within current guidelines that allow for OCFA units to be staged for activities of private events such as horse racing.

Because of this guideline, all racing events at Los Alamitos are covered by two fully equipped ambulances staffed by state certified EMT's. These EMT's and our ambulance service also fall under the jurisdiction of the Orange County Emergency Medical Services and our operations at the track are reviewed on an annual basis. I have included our last review with the suggestions of OCEMS which have been implemented by our track.

It is important to note that while our track is not covered by paramedics, the protocol for having paramedics on the scene in case of an accident has been reviewed and approved by the OCEMS.

The nearest paramedic staffed fire station to Los Alamitos Race Course is literally across the street. This proximity is no accident. The OCEMS will tell you that the site was chosen for the specific reason of its proximity to the race track.

In case of an accident that requires paramedic response, our Huntington Ambulance EMT's will stabilize the patient and will meet the OCFA paramedic unit at the pre-designated location directly across the street from the fire station. This location is accessed through a gate on our backstretch that we have shown on the enclosed graphic.

Not only does the OCEMS approve of this system, as you can see from our latest review, they believe having experienced EMT's handle the initial care of the jockey before handing the patient off to paramedics has benefits.

The health and safety manager may, at the discretion of the racing association, be the person designated to perform risk management duties on behalf of the association.



ON TRACK ATTENDANCE/FAN DEVELOPMENT

A. Describe any promotional plans:

1. Los Alamitos will conduct one state wide mailer featuring a mystery mutuel vouchers. The vouchers are sent to off-track players as well as on-track players. Each voucher is worth at least \$5. Vouchers in denominations of \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100, \$500, and \$1,000 are also mailed. In addition, two \$2,500 vouchers will be mailed. In recent years, a \$10,000 mystery voucher was cashed at the Pleasanton simulcast location. The tentative date for this promotion is California Breeders Champions Night.
2. Premium item giveaway nights will be held in February, April, July, September, November and December. Planned giveaways include beanies and sweatshirts in the winter, hat in July, cowboy hat in July, t-shirt or ear-buds in September, blanket in November and wall calendar or player's carryall in December of 2015.
3. Family days at Los Alamitos will be held in the summer with the running of the popular 18th annual Wienerschnitzel Wiener National. One-hundred dachshunds compete for prize money and trophies. The annual event receives great pre and post event publicity on television newscasts like the top rated Channel 5 Morning News. The event annually attracts over 12,000 people, most of which get exposed to the excitement of horseracing for the first time. This event has been adopted by nearly ALL of the fairs conducting live racing as well as Del Mar and Golden Gate Fields.
4. The Los Alamitos annual Halloween Carnival will be conducted in late fall. This event benefits a local charity, as well as the Los Alamitos Race Track Chaplaincy. A costume contest for kids and adults as well as a ton of carnival games are held in a safe, fun, and family oriented environment. This event provided first-time exposure of horseracing to hundreds of local families each year. Cash prizes are awarded.
5. Los Alamitos will continue its partnership with the Orange County Register's Register Connect subscribers. In 2014, Los Alamitos hosted four events with each event attracting over 1,000 people.
6. Los Alamitos will partner with Living Social, Travelzoo and Amazon to offer Night at the Races packages for its 2015 live racing program. Los Alamitos offers these packages six times per year through these partners. The packages provide a variety of packages with the most popular offering a \$64 value for \$25. The package includes passes for two people to the track's Vessels Club, preferred parking, \$10 food voucher, souvenir Los Alamitos logo glasses, a trip to the winner's circle and an 8X10 photo of that group's winner's circle visit. Los Alamitos sold over 2,000 of these packages in 2014 with nearly all purchases made by first-time visitors to the track. Guests receive VIP treatment, a

brochure designed for first-time guests and track personnel have been trained to answer frequently asked question.

7. Los Alamitos will once again conduct the strongest marketing program of any southern California track specifically aimed for the in-state simulcast facilities. In 2014, Los Alamitos conducted over 30 handicapping contest at satellite facilities for cash prizes in excess of \$17,000. Most handicapping contests are held in conjunction with a premium item giveaway like logo hats, t-shirts, umbrellas, sweatshirt, etc. Racing personality Les Onaka is on hand at each of the contests promoting the nighttime Quarter Horse signal via handicapping seminars and question and answer sessions. Photos of winners are posted on the track's social media pages. Visits were made to the new satellite locations of Firehouse Grill in Bakersfield and Sammy's Original in Lake Forest.

In 2014, Los Alamitos also visited Commerce Casino, Santa Anita, Surfside, Monterrey, Victorville, Lancaster, San Bernardino, Ventura, Barona, Viejas and Santa Clarita. Fan data is gathered at each location. Los Alamitos added over 1,500 new patrons to its mailing list via this program. This program will continue the same level in 2015.

FAN AMMENITIES

1. Los Alamitos night meet is also the only meet that continues to offer race results on the telephone. The line includes Ed Burgart's full race call. The number to call is 714-995-2222.
2. Los Alamitos employs one part-time employee to assist patrons with their Racing Rewards card, which serves as the track's loyalty program. This program rewards its members with cash vouchers for playing the nighttime Los Alamitos racing program with a 1 percent return on their money wagered. In 2014, more than \$15,000 will be awarded to frequent players.
3. Los Alamitos' senior citizen admission prices are \$2 every single day. More than 80% of the Los Alamitos parking lot is now available at no charge as part of its free general parking area.
4. On major race nights, The Vessels Club serves as the set for TVG's "The Quarters" show. The live show adds to the Vessels Club experience, as Vessels Club guests are now part of "The Quarters" and the setting provides added exposure to The Vessels Club.
5. Los Alamitos has made available online video of morning workouts of 2-year-olds. Horseplayers find this a useful tool, as they're able to dissect workouts of horses that have yet to make an official start. In addition to the video footage, the site provides breeding information on each horse.

ONLINE

1. Los Alamitos provides Ed Burgart's tip sheet free on its website at www.losalamitos.com. The page also features a video blog of Burgart's Horses to Watch for the Night. The track's website also features a 22-minute preview show of Friday's races. Burgart serves as the host with analysis provided by Les Onaka.
2. Los Alamitos offers a free nighttime pocket program, which can be downloaded at www.losalamitos.com.
3. The Los Alamitos Facebook pages currently have a combined 30,000 Likes/Friends. The page is updated with handicapping information, race videos, trainer interviews, stakes photos results, etc. Los Alamitos maintains a Twitter Feed @losalracing and a Youtube Channel @ losalqh.

ADVERTISING & TV

1. Los Alamitos markets the night program on TVG with a 36-week advertising campaign throughout the year. Los Alamitos works closely with TVG to promote and encourage viewers to visit the track for live racing. Vessels Club and general concession menu items are often promoted on TVG to show fans what's available at the racetrack.

On major race nights, The Vessels Club serves as the set for TVG's "The Quarters" show. The live show adds to the Vessels Club experience, as Vessels Club guests are now part of "The Quarters" and the setting provides added exposure to The Vessels Club.

2. Los Alamitos buys airtime on Time Warner Cable with :30 spots airing on Angels games on PrimeTicket, Dodgers games on Time Warner with additional spots also airing on the Golf Channel, TBS, Bravo, and Fox Sports' Trackside Live.
3. Los Alamitos markets its night program via the Mike Willman weekly radio shows. In 2014, Los Alamitos also purchased targeted sponsorships in all other major southern California radio shows.
4. Los Alamitos spent over \$75,000 in 2014 in newspaper advertising. This expenditure included sponsoring Terry Turrell's nightly handicapping tip sheet in the Long Beach Press Telegram. Los Alamitos was also successful in bringing back horse racing results and entries to the Orange County Register, not only of the nighttime Quarter Horse races, but also for all of the daytime Thoroughbred tracks.
5. The Replay Show is available on TVG mornings on a Friday through Monday basis.
6. Los Alamitos produces a weekly 22 minute preview show of its weekend races that is available on Friday mornings on TVG and all day on Friday at www.losalamitos.com. The show is hosted by Ed Burgart and it features Les Onaka plus a bevy of top

handicappers. Interviews, human interest pieces with local horsemen and stakes previews are also part of the show.

HORSEMEN

1. Los Alamitos will continue its DVD Scrapbook program designed to reward racehorse owners at Los Alamitos. Every time a horse wins a race at Los Alamitos, the owner will receive one DVD - completely free - featuring the horse's winning performance. Los Alamitos Race Track Maintenance Program

Renovations that are done during the morning training hours will consist of watering the surface if needed. Two tractors will then make a total of two passes each approximately 80ft. in width. The racetrack closes at 10:00am. Once the horses have exited the track the harrowing process will begin. This will consist of harrowing the entire racetrack from rail to rail. At this point all blade work will need to be completed for the day. A concrete curb under the inside rail is used as a grade marker. This is used as a guideline to maintain a uniform and consistent racing surface. The racetrack is now watered if needed and harrowed. In the afternoon water is applied for the evening's races followed by cutting the surface using a California cutting harrow. Additional water will be added if needed and the track will be harrowed once again. The watering and harrowing will continue thru the first few races depending on the first race post time. Under normal conditions once the sunsets there will be no need to continue to water. After the final race the entire surface is harrowed and is now ready for the following morning workouts. The harrows are set daily on level concrete pad, which allows us to maintain an even and consistent racing surface. The racetrack is ripped and rototilled once a week to a depth of six inches then laid back down with roller harrows and watered as needed.



STAFF ANALYSIS

DISCUSSION BY THE BOARD REGARDING THE PROPOSAL TO DEVELOP REGULATIONS REQUIRING GEOGRAPHIC LOCATION TRACKING WHEN USING A WIRELESS DEVICE TO PLACE AN ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGER, WHEN IN THE INCLOSURE OF A RACETRACK

Regular Board Meeting
November 19, 2014

ISSUE

CHRIMS, Inc. (CHRIMS) has submitted a proposal to add a new rule requiring Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) providers to facilitate the collection of geographic location data from ADW wagering patrons, when using a wireless device to place a wager, within the inclosure of a racetrack.

ANALYSIS

CHRIMS submits that from the inception of the legalization of ADW it was contemplated that wagers made at a California racing association, fair, satellite wagering facility or minisatellite would be accounted for and tracked separately. CHRIMS cites Business and Professions code section 19604(f) (5) (e), 19604(g) and 19604(h) as support:

(E) Notwithstanding any provision of this section to the contrary, the distribution of market access fees pursuant to this subparagraph may be altered upon the approval of the board, in accordance with an agreement signed by all parties whose distributions would be affected.

(g) A racing association, a fair, a satellite wagering facility, or a minisatellite wagering facility may enter into an agreement with an ADW provider to accept and facilitate the placement of any wager from a patron at its facility that a California resident could make through that ADW provider. Deductions from wagers made pursuant to the agreement shall be distributed in accordance with the provisions of this chapter governing wagers placed at that facility, except that the board may authorize alternative distributions as agreed to by the ADW provider, the operator of the facility accepting the wager, the association or fair conducting that breed of racing in the zone where the wager is placed, and the respective horsemen's organization.

(h) Any issues concerning the interpretation or application of this section shall be resolved by the board.

CHRIMS provides in the past, due to technical and economic difficulties, the tracking of ADW wagers by geographical location has not been done. However, technology has now evolved to where the ability to geographically locate someone using their mobile device has become much more sophisticated and accurate to the point where tracking of the physical location where an ADW wager is placed can be accomplished.

CHRIMS also provides that the Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) has requested that all ADW companies licensed in California facilitate the tracking of these wagers. The proposal

submitted by CHRIMS is to develop a regulation requiring the geographical location of where a wager is taking place and is intended to provide a method of tracking ADW wagers, while at the same time safeguarding the privacy of the customer and the ADW company. In order to accomplish this objective the regulation would need to provide that:

Any California resident that wishes to make a pari-mutuel wager through a mobile device must activate their geographical location function. CHRIMS submits that the ADW provider will then track their customer wagers via longitude and latitude. CHRIMS will provide a web service that will allow each ADW company to access and obtain a zip code for those wagers that are being placed at a brick and mortar location. Subsequently, the ADW company will flag those wagers and submit them in the standard data file that they currently provide to CHRIMS. This will allow for the tracking of these wagers, while at the same time protecting the anonymity of the customer and the proprietary information of the ADW Company. This proposal provides the means to require this data and information.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California and over all persons or things having to do with such meetings is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). Business and Professions Code section 19440 states responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Business and Professions Code Section 19602 provides that any racing association located in this state may authorize betting systems located outside of this state to accept wagers on a race or races conducted or disseminated by that association and may transmit live audiovisual signals of the race or races and their results to those betting systems, except that any authorization is subject to the consent of the host association and applicable federal laws, including, but not limited to, Chapter 57 (commencing with Section 3001) of Title 15 of the United States Code.

Business and Professions Code section 19604 (g) provides a racing association, a fair, a satellite wagering facility, or a minisatellite wagering facility may enter into an agreement with an ADW provider to accept and facilitate the placement of any wager from a patron at its facility that a California resident could make through that ADW provider. Deductions from wagers made pursuant to the agreement shall be distributed in accordance with the provisions of this chapter governing wagers placed at that facility, except that the board may authorize alternative distributions as agreed to by the ADW provider, the operator of the facility accepting the wager, the association or fair conducting that breed of racing in the zone where the wager is placed, and the respective horsemen's organization.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for Board discussion.

Staff recommends the Board hear from CHRIMS, and refer the proposal to the Pari-Mutuel, ADW and Simulcast Committee for further input and development.

APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW)
BY LIEN GAMES RACING LLC, AS AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL
WAGERING HUB, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO TWO YEARS.

Lien Games Racing, LLC filed its application as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub to provide Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW). It is currently licensed through December 31, 2014 as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub.

A bond or other form of financial security in the amount of \$500,000 is required to be submitted with an application for license to conduct advance deposit wagering. Lien Games Racing, LLC, as a current ADW provider, has a \$500,000 bond continuation certificate on file that will expire January 1, 2015. Lien Games is currently in the process of obtaining a new continuation certificate that will cover 2015.

This application provides for:

- Dates of operation will be 365 days a year, 24 hours a day, with the exception of Christmas day. CHRB Rule 2072, Approval to Conduct Advance Deposit Wagering by an out-of-state Applicant, allows for a two year license term.
- Business and Profession Code section 19604 includes specific provisions that must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers. These include:

19604 (b)(1) and (2)

No ADW provider may accept wagers on **races conducted in California** from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
2. A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.
3. The agreement referenced in subparagraph (2) shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made in accordance with the Interstate Horseracing Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 3001, et seq.), regardless of the location of the ADW provider, whether in California or otherwise, including, without limitation, any and all requirements contained therein with respect to written consents and required written agreements of horsemen's groups to the terms and conditions of the acceptance of those wagers and any arrangements as to the exclusivity between the host racing association or fair and the ADW provider. For purposes of this subdivision, the substantive provisions of the Interstate Horseracing Act shall be taken into

account without regard to whether, by its own terms, that act is applicable to advance deposit wagering on races conducted in California accepted from residents of California.



APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO CONDUCT ADVANCE DEPOSIT WAGERING (ADW) OF CHURCHILL DOWNS TECHNOLOGY INITIATIVES COMPANY DBA TWINSPIRES FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL WAGERING HUB, FOR A PERIOD OF UP TO TWO YEARS.

Twinspires filed its application as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub to provide Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW). It is currently licensed through December 31, 2014 as an out-of-state multi-jurisdictional wagering hub.

A bond or other form of financial security in the amount of \$500,000 must be submitted with an application for license to conduct ADW. Twinspires, as a current ADW provider, has a \$500,000 bond on file that is continuous until cancelled.

This application provides for:

- Dates of operation will be 365 days a year, 24 hours a day. CHRB Rule 2072, Approval to Conduct Advance Deposit Wagering by an out-of-state Applicant, allows for a two year license term.
- Business and Profession Code section 19604 includes specific provisions that must be met before an ADW provider can accept wagers. These include:

19604 (b)(1) and (2)

No ADW provider may accept wagers on **races conducted in California** from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
2. A written agreement allowing those wagers exists with the racing association or fair conducting the races on which the wagers are made.
3. The agreement referenced in subparagraph (2) shall have been approved in writing by the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which the wagers are made in accordance with the Interstate Horseracing Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 3001, et seq.), regardless of the location of the ADW provider, whether in California or otherwise, including, without limitation, any and all requirements contained therein with respect to written consents and required written agreements of horsemen's groups to the terms and conditions of the acceptance of those wagers and any arrangements as to the exclusivity between the host racing association or fair and the ADW provider. For purposes of this subdivision, the substantive provisions of the Interstate Horseracing Act shall be taken into account without regard to whether, by its own terms, that act is applicable to advance deposit wagering on races conducted in California accepted from residents of California.

No ADW provider may accept wagers on **races conducted outside of California** from a resident of California unless all of the following conditions are met:

1. The ADW provider must be licensed by the Board.
2. There is a hub agreement between the ADW provider and one or both of (i) one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing on the breed on which wagering is conducted during the calendar year during which the wager is placed, and (ii) the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed on which wagering is conducted.

19604 (a)(7)

"Hub agreement" as a written agreement providing for contractual compensation paid with respect to advance deposit wagers placed by California residents on a particular breed of racing conducted outside of California. In the event a hub agreement exceeds a term of two years, then an ADW provider, one or more racing associations or fairs that together conduct no fewer than five weeks of live racing for the breed covered by the hub agreement, and the horsemen's organization responsible for negotiating purse agreements for the breed covered by the hub agreement shall be signatories to the hub agreement. A hub agreement is required for an ADW provider to receive contractual compensation for races conducted outside of California."

19604 (d)(1) (B)

"The Board shall not approve an application for an original or renewal license as an ADW provider unless the entity, if requested in writing by a bona fide labor organization no later than ninety days prior to licensing, has entered into a contractual agreement with that labor organization . . ."

Twinspires has notified the Board that it is pursuing an extension to the existing agreement with Pari-mutuel Employees Guild Local 280 (labor organization), extending the terms and conditions of the labor agreement through December 31, 2015.

Monarch Content Management, LLC (MCM), was the negotiating party for the 2014 simulcast wagering agreements between Twinspires, the California thoroughbred racing associations, California Authority of Racing Fairs, Los Angeles County Fair at Los Alamitos, and the Sonoma County Fair. MCM is currently in negotiations for 2015 ADW contracts; however, the negotiations have not yet determined which associations or ADW providers MCM will be representing. To date the 2015 contracts and/or agreements required pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19604 that allow ADW providers to accept wagers on races conducted in and outside of California for the applied license term have not been received.

Twinspires is listed as an ADW provider on the December 26, 2014 through May 3, 2015 Watch and Wager.com, LLC; the December 26, 2014 through June 14, 2015 Pacific Racing Association (PRA) and the December 26, 2014 through June 28, 2015 Los Angeles Turf Club (LATC) race meeting application.

The following **items are outstanding** and will need to be submitted and/or resolved before ADW wagers can be accepted:

1. Hub agreement
2. Contract and/or agreements required pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19604 that allows Twinpires to accept wagers
3. Horsemen's Agreement
4. Labor agreement





RIDING CROP, AND TO PROHIBIT A JOCKEY FROM USING A RIDING CROP ON A
HORSE MORE THAN THREE TIMES IN SUCCESSION WITHOUT GIVING THE HORSE
A CHANCE TO RESPOND

ISSUE

It is a priority of the Board to ensure humane treatment of the horse. In 2010 the Board amended Rule 1685, Equipment Requirement, to update the allowed design of riding crops used by California jockeys. The modifications were intended to eliminate injuries to the horse caused by the riding crop. However, Board Rule 1688, Use of Whips, has not been updated to conform to developments in other racing jurisdictions.

ANALYSIS

The amendment to Board Rule 1688, Use of Whips changes the title and text to replace the word "whip" with "riding crop." "Riding crop" is more specific, and is the word used by the horse racing industry to describe the tool used to encourage and help maintain control of race horses.

The proposed amendment to Rule 1688 also adds subsection 1688(b)(6) that places an additional limit on the jockey's use of the riding crop during a race. 1688(b)(6) prohibits the jockey from using the riding crop more than three times in succession without allowing the horse time to respond. The purpose of the amendment is to curtail and prevent any excessive use of the riding crop. The amendment of Rule 1688 is necessary to clarify what is the acceptable use of a riding crop and update the rule to be consistent with similar changes adopted by other racing jurisdictions.

- Kentucky requires that the jockey show the horse the riding crop and give it time to respond before striking the horse. Having struck the horse, the jockey must give the horse a chance to respond before using the riding crop again.
- New York requires the jockey to show the horse the riding crop before using it again.
- ARCI Model Rule, ARCI-010-035 Running of the Race, states that all riders should show the horse the riding crop, giving the horse time to respond before using the riding crop. Once the riding crop is used, riders should give the horse a chance to respond before using it again.

At its April 2014 Regular Board Meeting the Board discussed the proposal to amend Rule 1688. After discussion, the Board directed staff to initiate the 45-day public comment period for the proposed amendment. During the comment period three comments were received. One comment in opposition was received from the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association

(PCQHRA); however, the PCQHRA changed its position, sending a second comment in support of the proposed amendment. The third comment was from a race horse owner in favor of the proposed amendment. Both favorable comments stated the proposed rule amendment promoted the safety of the horse and jockey.

1688. Use of ~~Whips~~ Riding Crop.

(a) In all races where a jockey will not ride with a ~~whip riding crop~~, an announcement shall be made over the public address system of such fact.

(b) Although the use of a ~~whip riding crop~~ is not required, any jockey who uses a ~~whip riding crop~~ during a race is prohibited from ~~whipping using a riding crop on~~ a horse:

(1) on the head, flanks, or on any parts of its body other than the shoulders or hind quarters;

(2) during the post parade except when necessary to control the horse;

(3) excessively or brutally causing welts or breaks in the skin;

(4) when the horse is clearly out of the race or has obtained its maximum placing; or

(5) persistently even though the horse is showing no response under the ~~whip riding~~ crop; or

(6) more than three times in succession without giving the horse a chance to respond before using the riding crop again.

(c) Correct uses of the ~~whip riding crop~~ are:

(1) showing horses the ~~whip riding crop~~ before hitting them;

(2) using the ~~whip riding crop~~ in rhythm with the horse's stride; and

(3) using the ~~whip riding crop~~ as an aid to maintain a horse running straight.

Dear Mr. Turner,

I write this letter on behalf of my client, Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association (PCQHRA), to express our opposition to this proposed change to Rule 1688. While we fully understand and appreciate the underlying reason for the proposed rule change, it quite frankly is unworkable in the Quarter Horse segment of the industry. In a race that is no longer than 22 seconds at 440 yards and no less than 15 seconds at 300 yards, a rider must maintain the straightest course he can with a quarter horse, who is running at full speed from start to finish. A horse which suddenly alters course often needs a reminder several times with the use of a riding crop. If a rider was restricted to using a riding crop three times or less during a portion of a race, the horse may not react quick enough to run straight.

Additionally, your own Policy Statement Overview on page 5 acknowledges that, "The riding crop is a tool that is used not only to encourage race horses, but also to maintain control. The riding crop is used in certain situations for safety because it provides a measure of control over the horse in critical situations." It's the safety concerns to both jockey and horse that unfortunately leads PCQHRA to feel this proposed rule change should be amended to speak only to thoroughbreds. The Board of Stewards currently has the authority and responsibility to address overuse of a riding crop by a rider as deemed necessary. To arbitrarily limit the use of the riding crop to three consecutive uses places our horses and jockeys in an unsafe situation purely for optics. For this reason, we must remain opposed unless the proposed rule is amended.



Dear Mr. Turner,

I am writing in support of the proposed amendment to CHRB Rule 1688, Use of Riding Crop.

My involvement in horse racing includes many years as a fan, a bettor, and, more recently, a partner in a small racing stable.

Those of us who are lucky enough to participate in the sport share a solemn responsibility to ensure the safety and welfare of our equine athletes. Excessive whipping may not be as serious a problem as medication abuse, but it is one that is obvious to almost anyone who watches a race from the rail. While a whip can be a valuable riding tool, far too many riders seem to act as if there is nothing else in the toolbox. And frankly, far too many of my fellow fans and horseplayers seem to equate excessive whipping with "trying hard to win." But if we hope to grow this sport, we must keep the horses first.

The rule as drafted is straightforward and appropriate. Unlike the rule initially adopted in the UK in 2011, it does not require a jockey to keep a running tally in his or her head, nor does it require consideration of exactly where the horse is on the course. It is simple: no more than three times in a row, then try something else. This just formalizes what is already common-sense horsemanship.

I attended races in England not long after after the whip rules were adopted there. Reading the racing press, one would have thought it was the end of the world. But the jockeys adapted, and British racing is better for it. It is much more exciting to watch a thrilling stretch run when the focus is on the horses and you don't have to cringe.

As with any change to long-held practice, there will be start-up issues with the interpretation and enforcement of this amendment. I encourage the stewards and the Board to listen carefully to all stakeholders through the rollout, and make adjustments as required. But this proposal is a good one and I expect it to become a national model. I also expect that most people's eventual reaction will be "why didn't we do this years ago?"

I appreciate the opportunity to provide comments, and I appreciate all the CHRB is doing on behalf of horse racing in California.

Business and Professions Code section 19420 provides that jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this State where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board (Board). Business and Professions Code section 19562 provides the Board may prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions, consistent with the provisions of this chapter, under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in this State.

Board Rule 1699, Riding Rules, establishes riding rules during the running of the race. A copy of the text for Board Rule 1699 is attached for reference.

1699. Riding Rules.

During the running of the race:

(a) A leading horse is entitled to any part of the course but when another horse is attempting to pass in a clear opening the leading horse shall not cross over so as to compel the passing horse to shorten its stride.

(b) A horse shall not interfere with or cause any other horse to lose stride, ground or position in a part of the race where the horse loses the opportunity to place where it might be reasonably expected to finish.

(c) A horse which interferes with another and thereby causes any other horse to lose stride, ground or position, when such other horse is not at fault and when such interference occurs in a part of the race where the horse interfered with loses the opportunity to place where it might, in the opinion of the Stewards, be reasonably expected to finish, may be disqualified and placed behind the horse so interfered with.

(d) Jockeys shall not ride carelessly, or willfully, so as to permit their mount to interfere with or impede any other horse.

(e) Jockeys shall not willfully strike or strike at another horse or jockey so as to impede, interfere with, intimidate, or injure.

(f) If a jockey rides in a manner contrary to this rule, the mount may be disqualified and the jockey may be suspended or otherwise disciplined by the Stewards.
