STAFF ANALYSIS
PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF
RULE 1843.2, CLASSIFICATION OF DRUG SUBSTANCES

Medication Committee Meeting
June 18, 2007

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code (B&P Code) Section 19440 specifies that the Board shall have all powers, including but not limited to adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horseracing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code 19580 states that the Board shall adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines and penalties relating to equine medication to preserve and enhance the integrity of horse racing in this State. Section 19581 of the B&P Code specifies that no substance of any kind shall be administered by any means to a horse after it has been entered to race in a horse race, unless the Board has, by regulation, specifically authorized the use of the substance and the quantity and composition thereof. B&P Code Section 19582 provides that violations of Section 19581, as determined by the Board, are punishable in regulations adopted by the Board, and that the Board may classify violations based upon each class of prohibited drug substances, prior violations within the previous three years and prior violations within the violator's lifetime.

At the January 2007 Regular Board Meeting staff was instructed to initiate a 45-day public comment period regarding a proposed amendment to Rule 1843.2. The proposed amendment would delete Rule 1843.2's seven drug classifications and reference the document "CHRB Penalty Categories Listing by Classification." The CHRB drug classifications are based on the ARCI recommendations with modifications recommended by the Equine Medical Director. The proposed amendment to Rule 1843.2 is currently at the Office of Administrative Law where it is undergoing a 30-day review process. At the June 18, 2007, Medication Committee meeting an amendment to Rule 1843.2 was discussed.

ANALYSIS

The document "CHRB Penalty Categories Listing by Classification" is incorporated by reference into Rule 1843.2. This means that every time a drug classification is changed, the regulation must be amended. The Board's Equine Medical Director has proposed a number of changes to the CHRB Penalty Categories Listing by Classification, as well as the addition of a new "P-1" classification. Therefore, it is necessary to initiate a rulemaking file if the Board wishes to adopt the new classifications.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for committee discussion and action.

1843.2. Classification of Drug Substances.

The stewards, the Administrative Law Judge or the hearing officer, when adjudicating a hearing for the finding of a drug substance(s) in a test sample taken from a horse participating in a race, shall consider the classification of the substance as referenced in the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) Penalty Category Listing By Classification (~~61~~/07), hereby incorporated by reference, which is based on the Association of Racing Commissioners International (ARCI) Uniform Classification Guidelines for Foreign Substances (4/05).

California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) Penalty Categories Listing By Classification

Class 1: Stimulant and depressant drugs that have the highest potential to affect performance and that have no generally accepted medical use in the racing horse. Many of these agents are Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) schedule II substances. These include the following drugs and their metabolites: Opiates, opium derivatives, synthetic opioids and psychoactive drugs, amphetamines and amphetamine-like drugs as well as related drugs, including but not limited to apmorphine, nikethamide, mazindol, pemoline, and pentylenetetrazol. Drug substances, their metabolites and analogs prohibited in horses under all circumstances under Rule 1843(b) are designated by (P).

**STAFF ANALYSIS
REPORT AND DISCUSSION REGARDING THE
NATIONAL INJURY REPORTING PROGRAM**

Medication Committee Meeting
June 18, 2007

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code Section 19441.2 provides that the Board, in its annual report, shall include a tabulation of injuries, fatalities and comparative accident rates for all racing and training venues within its jurisdiction. Board Rule 1560, Duties of the Official Veterinarian, states the official veterinarian shall report to the Board the names of all horses humanely destroyed or which otherwise expire at the meeting and the reasons therefore. Board Rule 1561, Duties of the Racing Veterinarian, provides that the racing veterinarian shall examine any horse which appears in physical distress during the race, at the finish of the race and he shall report such horse together with his opinion as to the cause of the distress to the stewards and to the official veterinarian. The National Injury Reporting Program (NIRP), which has an official reporting start date of June 1, 2007, is designed to provide information regarding injuries to race horses on a national level, as well as to individual racetracks. The information submitted will be used to generate national statistics, and individual track data will be returned to the submitting veterinarian in a database format for analysis.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for committee discussion.

Thank you for participating in the racing injury reporting program. I'm optimistic that this program will provide useful information to the industry as whole as well as individual racetracks and I am grateful for your contribution of time and energy. BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code Section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper for it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include administration and enforcement of all laws, rules, and regulations affecting horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. Board Rule 1560, Duties of the Official Veterinarian, states that the official veterinarian shall maintain a list of all infirm horses on the grounds. Rule 1561, Duties of the Racing Veterinarian, provides that the racing veterinarian shall examine each horse when it is first entered to race and he shall report to the stewards any horse which in his opinion is not of condition which is satisfactory for the type of racing to be conducted at the meeting. The racing veterinarian shall be present in the paddock, on the race course, and at the starting gate during the saddling, the parade, and until the horses are dispatched from the gate for the race, and he shall examine any horse when there is a question as to the physical condition of such horse. He shall report any horse which in his opinion is incapable of physically exerting its best effort to win to the stewards. The racing veterinarian shall examine any horse which appears in physical distress during the race, at the finish of the race and he shall report such horse together with his opinion as to the cause of the distress to the stewards and to the official veterinarian. The racing veterinarian shall recommend to the official veterinarian those horses which by reason of physical disability should be placed on the Veterinarian's List, and he may recommend removal from the list of those horses which in his opinion can satisfactorily compete in a race.

Racing injuries are currently reported on CHRB form-123, Racing/Training Injury Report (attached). The form is completed and signed by the state veterinarian and forwarded to the Board's headquarters office. The forms are used to compile numbers for the Board's Annual Report.

1560. Duties of the Official Veterinarian.

The official veterinarian shall be responsible to the stewards for the conduct of horses and their attendants in the receiving and detention barn. He shall have authority and jurisdiction to supervise the practicing licensed veterinarians and shall enforce the Board's rules and regulations relating to veterinary practices. The official veterinarian shall recommend discipline for the licensed veterinarians who fail to comply with the rules and regulations and accepted veterinary practices. He shall report to the Board the names of all horses humanely destroyed or which otherwise expire at the meeting and the reasons therefore. He shall maintain a list of all infirm horses on the grounds. No official veterinarian, during his term of appointment, shall directly treat or prescribe for any horse registered to race at any recognized meeting except in emergency, the details of which shall be immediately reported to the stewards.

RULE 1561. DUTIES OF RACING VETERINARIAN

1561. Duties of the Racing Veterinarian.

The Racing Veterinarian shall examine each horse when it is first entered to race at the race meeting and he shall report to the stewards any horse which in his opinion is not of the age or condition which is satisfactory for the type of racing to be conducted at the meeting. The stewards may declare any such horse so reported as ineligible to be entered or started at the meeting until such time as the Racing Veterinarian certifies such horse to be raceably sound. The Racing Veterinarian shall be present in the paddock, on the race course, and at the starting gate during the saddling, the parade, and until the horses are dispatched from the gate for the race, and he shall examine any horse when there is a question as to the physical condition of such horse. He shall report any horse which in his opinion is incapable of physically exerting its best effort to win to the stewards who may declare such horse from the race. The Racing Veterinarian shall examine any horse which appears in physical distress during the race, at the finish of the race and he shall report such horse together with his opinion as to the cause of the distress to the stewards and to the official veterinarian. The Racing Veterinarian has the authority to treat any horse in event of an emergency, accident or injury, and he is authorized to humanely destroy any horse which in his opinion is so seriously injured that it is in the best interests of racing to so act, and every horse owner and trainer in participating in a race in this State does consent thereto. The Racing Veterinarian shall recommend to the official veterinarian those horses which by reason of physical disability should be placed on the Veterinarian's List and he may recommend removal from the list of those horses which in his opinion can satisfactorily compete in a race.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19440 provides that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper for it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19562 provides that the Board may prescribe rules, regulations and conditions under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in this State. Board Rule 1866, Veterinarians List, states the official veterinarian shall maintain a Veterinarian's List of those horses determined to be unfit to compete in a race due to physical distress, unsoundness, or infirmity. Board Rule 1846, Racing Soundness Examination, states each and every horse entered to race shall be subjected to a veterinary examination for racing soundness and health on race day not later than two hours prior to official post time for the race in which the horse is to compete.

ANALYSIS

The high incidence of racing fatalities in California Racing is unacceptable. The total fatalities of horses within CHRB inclosures from all causes have increased approximately 30 percent between the CHRB's 2003 annual reporting year and the 2006 annual reporting year. The CHRB is obligated to explore strategies to reduce the fatality and injury rate. The strategy will be a comprehensive examination time frame and additional authority to protect equine athletes participating in CHRB sanctioned racing and stabled in CHRB inclosures. The official veterinarian and the racing veterinarian are responsible for examining horses after entry. The official veterinarian and the racing veterinarian have no restrictions to more thoroughly examine horses to identify horses at risk. This includes examining horses at times other than after entry. For example, after racing or working would be an optimal time to identify unsound horses. There have also been instances where horses identified as unsound by the official veterinarian or racing veterinarian have been sent to the track to train without a subsequent competent veterinary examination resulting in fatal injury to the horse and serious injury to the rider. The official veterinarian must have the authority to restrict training of any horse placed on the Veterinarian's List until that horse has been examined in a manner approved by the official veterinarian. Lastly, certain medications administered to horses have extended pharmacological activity and drug retention. The official veterinarian should clearly have the authority to prohibit horses treated with certain drugs from racing for times adequate to avoid

racing under the influence of a drug and avoiding post-race drug positives. Fluephenazine is the best example of a long acting, long retention time drug.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for committee discussion and action. A revised text for Rule 1846 and Rule 1866 is provided for discussion.

1846 Racing Soundness Examination

(a) Each and every horse entered to race shall be subjected to a veterinary examination for racing soundness and health on race day not later than two hours prior to official post time for the race in which the horse is to compete. Such an examination shall be referred to as the "Racing Soundness Exam".

(b) The examination shall include but not be limited to close inspection of the eyes, examination of the legs, recording of the temperature of the horse and observation of the horse at rest and while in motion.

(c) All such examinations shall be conducted in or near the stall to which the animal is assigned and shall be conducted by the Official Veterinarian or the Racing Veterinarian.

(d) The Official Veterinarian shall keep or cause to be kept a continuing health and racing soundness record of each horse so examined.

(e) Notwithstanding subsection (a) of this rule, all horses within the racing inclosure are subject to examination by the Official Veterinarian, Racing Veterinarian or their designated representative veterinarian at any time.

1866 Veterinarians List.

(a) The Official Veterinarian shall maintain a Veterinarian's List of those horses determined to be unfit to compete in a race due to physical distress, unsoundness, medication administration or infirmity. When a horse is placed on the Veterinarian's List, the trainer of such horse shall be notified within 72 hours. A horse placed on the Veterinarian's List shall be removed from the List only after having demonstrated to the satisfaction of the Official Veterinarian or the Racing Veterinarian that the horse is then raceably sound and in fit physical condition to exert its best effort in a race. A horse may be required to perform satisfactorily in a work-out or qualifying race to demonstrate its physical fitness, and if so a blood and/or urine post-work test sample shall be taken from the horse and the provisions of this article shall apply to such official work-out in the same manner as to a scheduled race. Any horse placed on the Veterinarian's List may be restricted from training by the Official Veterinarian. Such restrictions shall be in writing and become effective upon notification of the trainer.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions (B&P) Code Section 19420 provides that the Board has jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in California where horse races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings. B&P Code Section 19440 states the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board include adjudication of controversies arising from the enforcement of those laws and regulations dealing with horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code Section 19562 provides that the Board may prescribe rules, regulations, and conditions, consistent with the provisions of this chapter, under which all horse races with wagering on their results shall be conducted in California.

Rule 1658, Vesting of Title to Claimed Horse, provides that title to a horse which is claimed shall be vested in the successful claimant from the time the field has been dispatched from the starting gate and the horse becomes a starter. The successful claimant becomes the owner of the horse whether it is alive or dead, sound or unsound, or injured during the race or after it. However, the claim shall be void if the race is called off, canceled, or declared no contest.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is presented for discussion and action by the committee. This item was placed on the agenda by the Board's Equine Medical Director at the request of a Commissioner.

1658. Vesting of Title to Claimed Horse.

(a) Title to a horse which is claimed shall be vested in the successful claimant from the time the field has been dispatched from the starting gate and the horse becomes a starter; and said successful claimant becomes the owner of the horse whether it be alive or dead, sound or unsound, or injured during the race or after it. Only a horse which is officially a starter in the race may be claimed. A subsequent disqualification of the horse by order of the stewards or the Board shall have no effect upon the claim.

(b) The claim shall be void if the race is called off, canceled, or declared no contest in accordance with Rule 1544 of this division.

BACKGROUND

Business and Professions Code (B&P Code) Section 19440 specifies that the Board shall have all powers necessary and proper for it to carry out fully and effectually the purposes of this chapter. Responsibilities of the Board shall include, but not be limited to adopting rules and regulations for the protection of the public and the control of horseracing and pari-mutuel wagering. B&P Code 19580 states that the Board shall adopt regulations to establish policies, guidelines and penalties relating to equine medication to preserve and enhance the integrity of horse racing in this State. Section 19581 of the B&P Code specifies that no substance of any kind shall be administered by any means to a horse after it has been entered to race in a horse race, unless the Board has, by regulation, specifically authorized the use of the substance and the quantity and composition thereof. B&P Code Section 19582 provides that violations of Section 19581, as determined by the Board, are punishable in regulations adopted by the Board, and that the Board may classify violations based upon each class of prohibited drug substances, prior violations within the previous three years and prior violations within the violator's lifetime. The Board may provide for suspensions of not more than 3 years, monetary penalties of not more than \$50,000 dollars, and disqualification from purses, except for a third violation during the lifetime of the licensee, for a drug substance determined to be class 1 or class 2, which shall result in the permanent revocation of the person's license. The punishment for second and subsequent violations of B&P Code Section 19581 shall be greater than for first violations for violations of each class of prohibited drug substance.

At its April 2007 Regular Meeting the Board adopted the addition of Rule 1843.3, Penalties for Medication Violations. Rule 1843.3 provides penalty guidelines the Board, the stewards or the hearing officer shall consider in reaching a decision on medication violations. The rulemaking file for Rule 1843.3 was submitted to the Office of Administrative Law (OAL) on May 22, 2007. OAL has 30 days to review the rulemaking file. If OAL approves the file it is submitted to the Secretary of State and becomes effective 30 days after such submission. (Approximately the last week of July)

ANALYSIS

The concept of broadening sanctions for medication violations to include continuing education for trainers has been raised. There are several issues connected with this idea

- such as a determination of what constitutes continuing education, and how would compliance with continuing education be monitored? Would continuing education affect a trainer's record in the same manner driver education classes affect those with traffic violations? Staff conducted an informal telephone and Internet survey of several racing jurisdictions (Arizona/Illinois/Kentucky/Louisiana/New York/Ohio/Texas) and found no jurisdiction that imposes a requirement for continuing education for trainers with equine medication violations.

RECOMMENDATION
