

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## SIXTEENTH BIENNIAL REPORT

TO THE GOVERNOR AND THE LEGISLATURE  
OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

(For the Period July 1, 1962, to June 30, 1964)

To EDMUND G. BROWN, *Governor*  
and to the Members of the Legislature :

The California Horse Racing Board herewith presents its biennial report covering the period July 1, 1962, through June 30, 1964, pursuant to the provisions of Section 19441 of the Business and Professions Code of the State of California. This report will be the 16th biennial report which has been made by the racing board since horseracing has been legalized in California.

### COMPOSITION OF THE CALIFORNIA HORSE RACING BOARD

The California Horse Racing Board consists of three members, appointed by the Governor. Each member holds his office for a four-year term, no more than one seat falling vacant during a single year. The members serve without compensation but are reimbursed for their traveling expenses.

The board meets periodically with its meetings open to the public. Normally meetings are held monthly.

## INTRODUCTION

### OBJECTIVES AND FUNCTIONS

The California Horse Racing Board supervises all horserace meetings in California at which there is parimutuel wagering. It promulgates rules and regulations which govern race meetings and the activities of the licensees. It has investigative powers to enforce compliance with the rules and regulations.

The board is a constitutional agency. In addition to its members, the board staff consists of a secretary, an investigative group of 6, a licensing group of 5, plus accounting and clerical for a total of 17 employees. Several of the positions are assigned to be in attendance at northern California tracks. The remainder work out of the board's headquarters office, which is in Los Angeles.

The budget for this agency is presented under four major programs which are necessary to carry out the functions implicit in the department's assigned duties and responsibilities.

#### *I. General Administration and Enforcement*

Jurisdiction and supervision over meetings in this state where horse-races with wagering on their results are held or conducted, and over

all persons or things having to do with the operation of such meetings, is vested in the California Horse Racing Board. (Section 19420 Business and Professions Code.)

General Administration includes the supervisory functions, and the staff, fiscal and business services required for all departmental programs. The area of administration and supervision extends from the board through the secretary of the board.

- A. Licensing of racing associations.
- B. Licensing of others (occupational).
- C. Appointment of officials.
- D. Designation of racing days and charity days.
- E. Acts as a quasi-judicial body in matters pertaining to racing.

## II. Accounting

A. This program is responsible for the state collecting its proper share of the revenue derived from horseracing, in accordance with the Business and Professions Code. Books and records are maintained in the Los Angeles office, with license clerks employed at the racetracks acting as collection agents and depositing the daily proceeds with the State Treasury. Approximately \$46,000,000 will be collected in the 1964-65 fiscal year.

B. The state's revenue from horseracing is derived principally from fees based upon a percentage of the parimutuel wagering pools, breakage and unclaimed tickets. There is also a relatively small amount of revenue for licenses issued to owners, trainers, jockeys and others, fines and miscellaneous. The proceeds from 4 percent of the parimutuel wagering and from the occupational license fees are deposited in the Fair and Exposition Fund. Proceeds from parimutuel fees in excess of 4 percent, and all other revenues, are deposited in the General Fund.

## III. Occupational Licensing

A. This program provides for the licensing of every person who participates in every phase of horseracing. This includes officials, horse owners, jockeys, veterinarians, exercise boys, and grooms, to name but a few of those required to obtain licenses, pursuant to Section 19510 of the Business and Professions Code.

B. The duration of a license issued by the board is one year provided it is not revoked for cause prior to that time. The board maintains files and records to identify each licensee. All applications and copies of licenses issued are filed in the main office of the board.

C. Provides for the collection of state revenue of approximately \$52,000 which more than covers the operating cost of the licensing staff. An estimated 11,000 licenses will be issued in this current year.

## IV. Investigation

A. This program provides for the investigator to determine compliance with the Rules and Regulations of the California Horse Racing Board. They investigate and report any irregularities in the conduct

of a race meeting, affording a protection to the betting public and the state's revenue.

B. Upon receipt of an application, investigates the prospective licensee—to determine whether he conforms to the board requirements, whether he has previously held a license that has been suspended or revoked for cause, and whether he is of good moral character.

## HORSERACING REVENUES

The state's revenues from horseracing are derived from licensee fees on a percentage of the parimutuel pool wagers at each racetrack, breakage of winning ticket amounts to the nearest 10 cents of each dollar, and escheated unclaimed parimutuel tickets. There is also small amount of revenue from occupational licenses issued to owners, trainers, jockeys, and others.

The proceeds from 4 percent of the parimutuel wagering and from occupational license fees are deposited in the Fair and Exposition Fund. Proceeds from parimutuel fees in excess of 4 percent, and all other revenues (i.e., breakage, unclaimed parimutuel tickets, fines and miscellaneous) are deposited in the General Fund.

In accordance with the provisions of the Horse Racing Law, the revenues deposited in the Fair and Exposition Fund are appropriated, first, for support of the Horse Racing Board and for costs incurred by the Department of Agriculture in supervising, and by the Department of Finance in auditing, all fairs. The Horse Racing Law also provides for annual appropriations totaling not to exceed \$8,015,000 for promotion and encouragement of agricultural fairs and citrus fruit fairs and expositions, to be expended in accordance with the specifications contained therein. The law further provides that revenues in excess of the amounts appropriated shall be transferred to the General Fund at the end of each calendar month.

The California Horse Racing Board was responsible for collecting \$41,663,350 and \$43,442,481 in state revenues for the 1962-63 and 1963-64 fiscal years, respectively.

Certified public accountants approved by the board audited and certified all the parimutuel sales, calculations and payoffs.

## APPLICATIONS FOR RACING

During the period covering this report, the California State Fair and Exposition petitioned for quarter horse racing dates.

Hearings on the application, to conduct a program of quarter horse racing in conjunction with the Spring Festival, were held on January 30 and 31, 1963, at the State Capitol. Subsequent hearings were held in Los Angeles on February 19 and July 30, 1963.

After hearing testimony from all parties involved, the board granted the application of the California State Fair and Exposition for quarter horse racing to run 21 days in the spring of 1964.

Applications of Tanforan Co., Inc., Pacific Turf Club, Inc., and the California Jockey Club, Inc., to reschedule each of their respective 1964 racing dates, and the application of the Tanforan Racing Association to transfer the 1964 Tanforan race meeting, was submitted to the California Horse Racing Board. A public hearing was held in the State Building Annex, San Francisco, on February 3, 1964.

The applications were taken under submission. Subsequently, the board ruled that the purposes of the Horse Racing Law will be better served by the granting of said applications upon necessary and desirable conditions.

As the result of the board's ruling, Tanforan Racing Association sold its plant at San Bruno and is now running its race meeting at Golden Gate Fields in the spring and at Bay Meadows Racetrack in the fall. Thus, three race meetings are now being run on permanent dates at two plant sites, rather than revolving racing dates as was the situation prior to the granting of the applications.

The board expresses its gratitude to the Attorney General of California for representation in the person of Conrad Lee Klein, Deputy Attorney General, in the hearings conducted by the board. A total of 24 regular board meetings and five special hearings were held during the two-year period. A total of 105 cases were heard, of which 36 were suspensions or denials and 3 revocations.

## PARTICIPATION IN THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF STATE RACING COMMISSIONERS

The 29th annual convention of the National Association of State Racing Commissioners was held in Phoenix, Arizona, March 19 through 23, 1963, and the 30th annual convention was held in Chicago, Illinois, June 22 through 26, 1964. At the latter convention Mr. Neil J. Curry, Member of the California Horse Racing Board, presided as president of the association.

The association is composed of official representatives of every state and many foreign countries having racing with legalized wagering on the results.

Among the major purposes of the association are: (1) the promulgation of uniform rules and regulations for the effective conduct of race meetings; (2) to formulate uniform procedures and reciprocity in enforcing rules, regulations and penalties; (3) to encourage forceful and honest nationwide control of racing for the protection of the public, and (4) to assemble and disseminate pertinent information and data for the benefit and guidance of state boards and commissions.

As an excellent example of the dedication to these principles, the national association under the guidance of Mr. Neil J. Curry, who was then president, formed and is the chairman of the liaison committee with the Federal Communications Commission. The goal of the committee and the Federal Communications Commission is to formulate rea-

sonable federal rules for the broadcasting and televising of racing information. The stringent rules which were originally proposed would have had a very detrimental effect on the growth of the industry, and would have caused extensive loss of revenue to California. Through the efforts of Mr. Curry's committee in cooperation with the Federal Communications Commission it can be expected that reasonable ground rules can be promulgated that will enhance the growth and popularity of the sport and at the same time protect the public from the use of such medias to encourage bookmaking and other corrupt activities.

Through the years considerable effort has been expended to realize the above purposes with considerable success. The horseracing industry enjoys a high degree of uniformity in rules and procedures throughout the states. Disciplinary action and all rulings concerning licensed personnel are disseminated to all state commissions for their records. Data on all phases of racing is available at the national headquarters in Kentucky for use by state legislatures and commissions for guidance in legislation and board policy determination. These records along with the California board's records and statistics have been extremely useful to various California legislative committees in recent years as well as currently.

Racing is without question an industry which transcends state and national boundaries. Its standards and reputation in one jurisdiction materially affects its success in the others. It is therefore incumbent upon the California Horse Racing Board and its staff to work and cooperate to their fullest ability with the association toward the end that racing maintains the highest possible standards essential for public acceptance.

With this goal in mind, all members of the board, its secretary, and its legal adviser, have attended all association meetings over the past years. At the meetings, and through the efforts of these people, California is looked to for leadership and guidance not only to increase revenue to the various jurisdictions but also to see to it that the interests of the public are best served.

## CONCLUSION

We members of this board, in rendering this report, do so with a sincere desire and purpose of fully meeting its duty and obligations of furthering and preserving the sport and business of racing that it believes has been of great benefit to the people of the State of California.

The board expresses appreciation for the cooperation and service rendered by the Governor, the State Attorney General, the State Legislature and other public officials, as well as the various track operators, law enforcement agencies, the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau, the press, television, radio, and the board employees.
