CHAIR FERRARO: Let's get started. Ladies and gentlemen, this meeting of the California Horse Racing Board will please come to order. Please take your seats.

Okay, can we get rid of the cricket? So where did that run out of?

COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Yes, the vet euthanized it. Set it free.

CHAIR FERRARO: I like that one better. Open the window, set it free.

This is the regular noticed meeting of the California Horse Racing Board on Wednesday, March 11th, 2026, at the Cannabis Control Appeals Panel, Hearing Room 330, at 400 R Street in Sacramento, California.

Present at today's meeting are: myself, Dr. Gregory Ferraro, Chair; also Oscar Gonzales, Vice Chair; Damascus Castellanos, Commissioner; Brenda Washington Davis, yet to arrive; Thomas Hudnut, Commissioner; Peter Stern, Commissioner; Dennis Alfieri, Commissioner; and Scott Chaney, Executive Director.

You guys have all heard this before. Before we go to the business of the meeting, I need to make a few

1 comments.

2 The Board invites public comment on the matters
3 appearing on the meeting agenda. Procedurally, the Board
4 will first hear from those directly involved in the agenda
5 item. I will then invite public comment on the agenda item.

6 The Board will not answer questions since this item is for
7 comment only, not questions. Unsolicited speakers are
8 limited to two --

9 Welcome, Brenda.

10 CHAIR FERRARO: I will invite public -- oh, wait a
11 minute. The Board -- unsolicited speakers are limited to
12 two minutes. During all public comments, a tone will sound
13 to indicate the speaker's time is up. The Board may ask
14 questions of individuals who speak, which may extend their
15 two-minute time limit.

16 There are public comment sign-in sheets located at
17 the designated table for each agenda item on which the Board
18 invites comments. There is also a sign-in sheet for those
19 wishing to speak during the public comment period for
20 matters not on the Board's agenda if it concerns horse
21 racing in California. Please print your name legibly on all
22 sign-in sheets as I can barely read.

23 When a matter is open for public comment and you
24 come to the podium, introduce yourself by stating your name
25 and organization. This is necessary for the court reporter

1 to have a clear record of all those who speak. When your
2 two minutes are up, I will ask you to return to your seat so
3 that others can be heard.

4 I will insist that all speakers stay strictly on
5 topic for each agenda item. If a speaker strays off topic,
6 I will ask to move the next speaker. If a speaker repeats
7 themselves, I will ask if the speaker has any new comments
8 to make. If there are none, the speaker will be asked to
9 let others make comments to the Board.

10 If anyone has comments of a more general nature
11 that are not applicable or are not specific to earlier
12 agenda items, those comments must wait until agenda item
13 number 10, Public Comment. There will be a 30-minute time
14 limit for public comment. In order to allow as many
15 individuals to speak as possible within that half hour, I
16 will strictly enforce a two-minute time limit for each
17 unsolicited speaker.

18 And with that, we move to the meeting agenda,
19 which starts out with approval of the minutes of January
20 14th, 2026. Was everyone present?

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Mr. Castellanos, I
22 think, was absent in January.

23 CHAIR FERRARO: Okay. Can we have a motion to
24 approve?

25

1 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: With that correction, I move
2 the agenda -- I move approval of the minutes of the January
3 meeting.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Davis seconds.

5 CHAIR FERRARO: Okay. Commissioner Peter Stern?

6 COMMISSIONER STERN: Yes.

7 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Damascus?

8 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: I was not present, sir,
9 so I will abstain.

10 CHAIR FERRARO: Hudnut?

11 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Yes.

12 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Gonzales?

13 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes.

14 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Alfieri?

15 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yes.

16 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Davis?

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

18 CHAIR FERRARO: Okay. Item number two,
19 discussion, consent calendar items. Consent items are
20 expected to be routine and non-controversial. It is
21 recommended that the Board adopt these items without
22 discussion. If any interested party member of the Board or
23 staff member requests that an item be removed from the
24 consent calendar, it will be considered separately.

25 Mr. Chaney?

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Sure. Good morning,
2 Commissioners. We are trying something a little bit new,
3 which the law allows us to do with consent calendar items,
4 as the Chairman just described.

5 As the Board may recall, about a year and a half
6 ago, you passed the regulation regarding satellite
7 applications and licenses, before which we never had. Like
8 satellites just existed. And what had happened over time is
9 some of them existed for a long time, and we didn't have a
10 ton of information on them, making regulatory oversight less
11 than ideal. That regulation required all of the satellites
12 to submit applications January 1st. And so there are about
13 20 in total. You're hearing the first three. I anticipate
14 the rest will be in May.

15 So we thought this was a good item to use for
16 consent calendar, as they're fairly routine. The three that
17 we're considering today are Los Alamitos, which obviously
18 operates a satellite year-round, and then two for L.A. Turf
19 Club, technically, it's Turf Club I, Turf Club II, which
20 also operates a satellite year-round.

21 So unless there's discussion, you can probably
22 leave the industry presenters seated. And the Board always
23 has the option of teasing any of them out separately, if you
24 so desire.

25 CHAIR FERRARO: Comments from the Board? There

1 are none. Do we have any? No? Should we have a vote,
2 then?

3 COMMISSIONER STERN: Stern. Motion to approve.

4 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Hudnut. Second.

5 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Davis?

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

7 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Alfieri?

8 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yes.

9 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Gonzales?

10 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes.

11 Commissioner Castellanos?

13 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Hudnut?

15 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Stern?

16 COMMISSIONER STERN: Yes.

17 CHAIR FERRARO: Action items. Approval by the

18 Board regarding the following renewal applications for

19 licenses to operate simulcast wagering facilities for a

20 period of five years, Los Alamitos Race Course, Los

21 Alamitos, California, Los Angeles Turf Club, Arcadia,

22 California, and Los Angeles Turf Club --

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: (Indiscernible.)

24 CHAIR FERRARO: These were included in the one

25 above?

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Correct, exactly.

2 CHAIR FERRARO: Oh, sorry.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: No, it's okay, you're
4 giving me a chance. I don't know that you voted for the
5 record on number two, Mr. Chairman.

6 CHAIR FERRARO: Oh, well, maybe I was thinking
7 about it. I vote yes. I vote yes.

8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Number three now.

9 CHAIR FERRARO: Discussion and action by the board
10 on the application for a license to operate minisatellite
11 wagering facility at Sahara Dunes Casino, LLP, dba Lake
12 Elsinore Casino in Lake Elsinore, California, for a period
13 of five years.

14 Rick?

15 MR. BAEDEKER: Good morning, Mr. Chairman,
16 Commissioners, Director Chaney. Is this on? There it goes.
17 Thank you. Well, good morning again, everyone.

18 Unfortunately, Ted Kingston, the operator of Lake
19 Elsinore, had flight trouble this morning, wouldn't have
20 gotten here until about 10:15 to the airport. By the time
21 he got here, it would have been too late. So I talked to
22 Director Chaney, who suggested that I could represent him.

23 So Lake Elsinore, they're back for renewal. We've
24 never had a problem with Lake Elsinore Card Club. Good
25 thing about these entities, minisatellites at card clubs, is

1 that there's all the infrastructure there already.
2 Obviously, food and beverage and so forth, but also
3 security, 24-hour security. So very solid location.

4 They do about \$5 million a year in handle. And so
5 that's pretty decent. And that drops about a million
6 dollars down to the industry for all those distributions.
7 Half of those distributions go to purses and commissions.
8 So SCOTWINC recommends to the Board that they renew the
9 license.

10 CHAIR FERRARO: Comments or questions from the
11 Board?

12 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: I move approval.

13 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: I second.

14 CHAIR FERRARO: No? Nothing? Okay. All right,
15 we have a vote.

16 Davis? Commissioner Davis?

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

18 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Alfier?

19 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yes.

20 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Gonzales?

21 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes.

22 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Damascus?

23 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Yes.

24 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Hudnut?

25 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER STERN: Commissioner Stern?

2 COMMISSIONER STERN: Yes.

3 CHAIR FERRARO: Chairman votes yes. I guess
4 that's okay if I vote; right?

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Yes, sir.

6 CHAIR FERRARO: Okay. Item number four,
7 discussion and action by the Board on the application for a
8 license to operate a minisatellite wagering facility at 557
9 Arden, LLC, dba The Derby Room at Glen Arden Club in
10 Glendale, California for a period of five years.

11 Rick?

12 MR. BAEDEKER: Yeah, once again, Mr. Chairman,
13 Commissioners, Rick Baedeker representing SCOTWINC and --

14 MR. SENNEDJIAN: Greg Zenedjian. Thank you guys
15 for your time, Chairman and Commissioner.

16 MR. BAEDEKER: Yeah, so Greg Zenedjian is Armen
17 Zenedjian's son. Unfortunately, we lost Armen to cancer
18 last year, but Armen was the first application for a
19 minisatellite in Norco. And not only that, but he's one of
20 those individuals that is indefatigable. And once he got
21 that location, he constantly searched for others.

22 And just a quick anecdote about the kind of person
23 he was, he was helping with the food and beverage at the
24 minisatellite in Lake Forest at Sammy's. And one of the
25 things that he was doing, he was coordinating with a

1 supplier of cheesecakes for the menu. And he went there one
2 day, and they said they were out of the cheesecakes. Well,
3 the supplier was in Palm Desert. He drove to Palm Desert,
4 picked up the cheesecakes, and brought them back so that
5 they would be there for the evening clientele.

6 And that's just a snippet of what Armen was like.
7 And I've never met anyone like him. Like I say, he was
8 indefatigable. He had the most goodness, day in and day
9 out, in any individual I'd ever met. And we got a chip off
10 the old block here, and we call him Kiko. So --

11 CHAIR FERRARO: Great.

12 MR. BAEDEKER: -- Kiko's involved, one of the
13 partners in Glen Arden. And Glen Arden does ,double what
14 Lake Elsinore does. They do about \$10 million a year, close
15 to the top minisatellite. So again, you can do the numbers
16 there, but it's very significant for the industry.

17 CHAIR FERRARO: Any questions or comments from the
18 Board?

19 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: I'll make a comment, Mr.
20 Chairman. I recently went to The Derby Room and checked it
21 out and everything, and talked to the staff. It's very
22 clean, very well-run. You do a great job, Kiko. And, you
23 know, the staff couldn't have been nicer, showing me around.
24 I just happened to pop in there one day, and unannounced,
25 really. But you had a good crowd in there. And, you know,

1 it's obviously locals that are, you know, frequenting the
2 club. But great, it was terrific.

3 MR. SENNEJIAN: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: So congratulations, you do
5 a good job. So --

6 CHAIR FERRARO: Do you want to --

7 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: -- I'll make a motion to
8 approve.

9 COMMISSIONER STERN: Stern seconds.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Davis seconds.

11 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Davis?

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

13 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Alfieri?

14 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yes.

15 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Gonzales?

16 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes.

17 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Castellanos?

18 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Yes.

19 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Hudnut?

20 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Yes.

21 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Stern?

22 COMMISSIONER STERN: Yes.

23 CHAIR FERRARO: Chairman votes yes. Good luck.

24 Thanks a lot.

25 MR. BAEDEKER: Thank you.

1 MR. SENNEJIAN: Thank you.

2 CHAIR FERRARO: Number five is discussion and
3 action by the Board regarding distribution of race day
4 charity proceeds of the Los Angeles Turf Club II from its
5 2025 race meeting.

6 Go ahead, Eric.

7 MR. SINDLER: Thank you. Good morning, Eric
8 Sindler on behalf of Los Angeles Turf Club II.

9 As the Chairman just noted, we are requesting
10 approval to distribute \$14,836.88 to charities. Again, this
11 is just the statutory distributions. We have significant
12 charitable contributions. This is just a portion that law
13 requires the Board to approve.

14 CHAIR FERRARO: And it's essentially the same,
15 it's pretty much the same institutions that you're giving to
16 as you have in the past; right?

17 MR. SINDLER: It is.

18 CHAIR FERRARO: Yeah, very little change.

19 Any questions for the Board?

20 Rita?

21 CHAIR FERRARO: Do we have a motion?

22 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Motion.

23 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Approval. Hudnut.

24 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Davis?

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

1 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Alfieri?

2 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yes.

3 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Gonzales?

4 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes.

5 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Castellanos?

6 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Yes.

7 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Hudnut?

8 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Yes.

9 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Stern?

10 COMMISSIONER STERN: Yes.

11 CHAIR FERRARO: The Chairman votes yes.

12 Congratulations. Thank you very much.

13 MR. SINDLER: Thank you very much.

14 Let's see, discussion and action by the Board
15 regarding proposed amendments of Board Rule 1481,
16 Occupational Licenses and Fees, Rule 1483, Application for a
17 License, Rule 1486, Terms of a License, and Rule 1487,
18 Addresses of Licensee.

19 Mr. Chaney, can you explain all this, please?

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Thank you, Mr.

21 Chairman. As the Board might recall, you've seen this a few
22 different times. It's amendment to several regulations
23 involving a whole licensure kind of overhaul that we're
24 involved in.

25 And just the 30,000-foot view is that we

1 consolidated categories to comply with Department of Justice
2 background check regulations, as did a bunch of state
3 departments in California. So we narrowed the license
4 categories, therefore had to reset the fees, and then also
5 created a new license application. I think it's a lot
6 simpler and easier for stakeholders to use. And so this is
7 sort of -- we've had a lot of back and forth with OAL, and
8 this is the latest incarnation.

9 Happy to answer any questions. Don't make them
10 too detailed or I'll have to call my licensing person. But
11 it's one of the pieces of a larger licensing overhaul that
12 we've been working on for some time.

13 CHAIR FERRARO: Does the Board have any questions?

14 Rita, no?

15 Can we have a motion?

16 COMMISSIONER STERN: Stern. Motion to approve.

17 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Hudnut. Second.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Davis. Second.

19 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Stern?

20 COMMISSIONER STERN: Yes.

21 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Hudnut?

22 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Yes.

23 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Castellanos?

24 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Yes.

25 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Gonzales?

1 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes.

2 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Alfieri?

3 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yes.

4 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Davis?

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

6 CHAIR FERRARO: And the Chairman votes yes.

7 Okay, item number seven, discussion and action by
8 the Board regarding comments received during the comment
9 period for proposed amendments to CHRB Rules 1588 and 1878,
10 Maximum Age of a Horse May Race, or Work Out, respectively.

11 Mr. Chaney? And I think Dr. Blea has some
12 comments as well; is that right?

13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Yes, Mr. Chairman. As
14 the Board might recall, you originally passed the set of
15 regulations that apply to both racing and working out this
16 past summer. We did receive some public comment during the
17 45-day comment period. The Board entertained those comments
18 in January and tabled this discussion and possible action
19 until today.

20 The public comments centered around the fact that
21 mostly the maiden restriction was limiting opportunities for
22 owners and breeders in California. As the Board may recall,
23 we set the max age at 10 for racing and working out, and
24 then the max age for maidens at five.

25 As the Board also may recall, there was a split in

1 the tracks that are currently running between Los Al, Santa
2 Anita, and Del Mar between setting it both at five and six.

3 We included the research and information that we
4 originally included in the summer, and then Dr. Blea and
5 CHRB staff did a little bit more research based on the Board
6 discussion and based on that, plus both Commissioner and
7 public feedback, we're recommending that the max age be six.
8 Everything else would remain the same.

9 DR. BLEA: Commissioners, Dr. Jeff Blea, Equine
10 Medical Director.

11 regarding this rule change, first thing I did was
12 went into the backside of the racetracks and talked to
13 trainers. So I did an informal poll of about 10
14 thoroughbred trainers primarily, and all but one was in
15 unanimous support of allowing six-year-old maidens to race.
16 The one who was opposed was opposed because he felt it
17 diluted the racing product at Santa Anita. But all the
18 other trainers that I spoke to, like I said, about a dozen,
19 were in unanimous support of allowing six-year-old maidens
20 to race. We left the older horses alone and just focused on
21 the maiden age.

22 Looking through data from 2020 through currently,
23 today, there have been zero catastrophic musculoskeletal
24 injuries in six-year-old maidens. In that five-plus year
25 period, only two six-year-old maidens suffered fatalities.

1 Both were related to sudden death episodes, one of which
2 actually turned six on January 1 when it had suffered a
3 sudden death, so bad timing. The second one was in December
4 of its six-year-old year and was about to turn seven.

5 Moving it from five to six allows and encourages
6 more rest periods without pressure on owners and trainers to
7 keep these horses in training, especially in light of our
8 effects of welfare and training and racing. It allows this
9 population to continue safely competing in California rather
10 than leaving the state. Currently, they typically have to
11 go to Arizona or other states to compete when their five-
12 year-old year ends on January 1 of their six-year-old year.

13 Inventory and participants are likely to be very
14 insignificant due to increased cost of training a six-year-
15 old maiden. However, there will be some who will be
16 afforded the opportunity if you pass this rule change.

17 And lastly, second to last, there's a lack of
18 scientific data looking at age of maidens and how it
19 corresponds to catastrophic musculoskeletal injury. There's
20 a lot of data based on race, class, dirt, turf, but not very
21 much scientific data to indicate an age where it's five
22 versus six versus seven. So in the literature that I
23 provided in your staff report, it indicates that six-year-
24 old maidens would be safe to race from a musculoskeletal
25 standpoint.

1 And lastly, I will assure you that six-year-old
2 maidens, if this is approved, will receive increased
3 scrutiny by the California governor's mandated panel after
4 entry.

5 If you have any other questions, I'm happy to
6 answer them.

7 CHAIR FERRARO: Questions from the Board?

8 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Did you say receive?

9 DR. BLEA: On the governor's panel, any horse
10 that's nine years old or older receives increased scrutiny.

11 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Yeah.

12 DR. BLEA: If this passes, a six-year-old maiden
13 will also receive heightened scrutiny --

14 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: I see.

15 DR. BLEA: -- from the governor's panel, the
16 review panel.

17 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Thank you.

18 CHAIR FERRARO: Can we have a motion.

19 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: So moved. So moved.

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Davis seconds.

21 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Stern?

22 COMMISSIONER STERN: Yes.

23 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Hudnut?

24 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Yes.

25 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Castellanos?

1 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Yes.

2 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Gonzales?

3 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes.

4 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Alfieri?

5 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yes.

6 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Davis?

7 CHAIR FERRARO: And the Chairman votes yes.

8 Number eight is discussion and action by the Board
9 regarding the proposed amendment of Rule 1843.2,
10 Classification of Drug Substances, to up-to-date -- to
11 update the Alphabetical Substances List to align with the
12 Association of Racing Commissioners International, ARCI,
13 Uniform Classification for Foreign Substances.

14 Mr. Chaney?

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Sure. As the Board
16 knows, we base our medication and drug classification on the
17 ARCI model, and what flows from that are penalty guidelines.

18 Obviously, ARCI, based on RMTTC recommendation, changes
19 those guidelines from time to time, adding drugs and
20 medications, subtracting, or even changing the category. So
21 we cannot legally, automatically, just mirror those changes.
22 It has to be a change in our regulation based on the Board.

23 We haven't done this in some time, but there have
24 been a few changes, and so recommending updating that
25 categorization now. If you have specific questions about

1 medications, Dr. Blea is probably in a better position to
2 answer than I am.

3 I should point out to the Board that we do depart
4 from the ARCI classification system on a few medications,
5 mostly where we occasionally choose to be stricter. Cobalt
6 comes to mind with respect to a medication that we treat in
7 that way. So it's presented to the Board for passage.

8 CHAIR FERRARO: Comments or questions from the
9 Board?

10 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Oh, yeah, I got a quick
11 question here.

12 Scott, is there any outstanding cases or
13 complaints related to any of the medications that are going
14 to be part of this? I just, I bring that up, because I know
15 several years ago we had the CDB issue that was kind of
16 quietly slipped in there that kind of caught my attention.
17 So I just want to make sure that nothing is being --

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Right.

19 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: -- slipped in like the last
20 time.

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Not that I know of. I
22 will note two things. You know, with the advent of HISA,
23 you know, the thoroughbred medication positives are governed
24 by, you know, the HISA guidelines. So this only applies to
25 Quarter Horses and Standardbreds at this point. The only

1 one I can think of is maybe carmoterol, which is a Class 1
2 and not, therefore -- I mean, it's not categorized, because
3 we didn't have a test for a long time and is therefore
4 categorized as 1. Is carmoterol classified in this new
5 system? I guess that would be my question.

6 DR. BLEA: Dr. Blea, Equine Medical Director.

7 Yes, it is. It's classified as a 1 penalty A.

8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Oh.

9 DR. BLEA: Carmoterol was brought to the RMTC
10 Scientific Advisory Committee, as were several of these
11 other medications to review classifications. Those
12 recommendations went to ARCI, which is what you have in your
13 packet. That's how it was reviewed. Other than --
14 carmoterol has since been classified as a one A in this
15 packet. Other than that, there are no other conflicts with
16 medications that we have cases pending with.

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: So it's a good
18 question, Vice Chairman Gonzales. So we're prosecuting
19 currently under 1a and it's being categorized as a 1a, so no
20 current conflict. And that's because it doesn't have any --
21 it's not approved for human use, much less equine use;
22 right?

23 DR. BLEA: It's not even approved for any use.
24 But prior to the categorization of 1a, it would have been a
25 default 1a, nonetheless.

1 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: And can you remind the group
2 what a 1a, the penalty for that is? It's pretty severe, so
3 I just --

4 DR. BLEA: Very severe. 1a is any drug that's not
5 FDA approved and has absolutely no business in the horse.
6 An A penalty is the strictest, depending on what you're
7 looking at, the erythropoietins or morphine-type drugs,
8 you're looking at a significant penalty financially, as well
9 as time served.

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: If memory serves
11 correctly, I think our penalty guidelines are a minimum 60-
12 day suspension and \$5,000 fine, if I'm not mistaken. In
13 practical terms, it's much longer than that.

14 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Thanks for the reminder on
15 that. Appreciate that.

16 CHAIR FERRARO: Any other comments from the Board?

17 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Question. Scott, if
18 you could answer, or Dr. Blea, in regards to these
19 medications that are on this list, do they get changed
20 periodically as we discover how they, you know, how they
21 treat people -- I mean, not people, I'm sorry, treat the
22 horses?

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Yeah, I mean, I can do
24 mechanically, and maybe you can follow up, Dr. Blea.

25 So obviously, ARCI, of which we're a member and

1 sit on the executive board, is the organization that creates
2 the list. They get all of their scientific information for
3 RMTC, which is their Scientific Advisory Committee and from
4 time to time update it based on both new tests and new
5 drugs, frankly.

6 Is that a fair assessment?

7 DR. BLEA: It is. And to your point, exactly
8 right, it's based on new drugs. A lot of times, we will get
9 requests from industry stakeholders when there's a new drug
10 that's been discovered by the labs and that will go through
11 the process. Higenamine is one, for example. Different
12 ones in the last several years have come across that have
13 been reviewed and categorized.

14 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: So it could be, it's
15 fair to say that it will change throughout the, you know --

16 DR. BLEA: It could change --

17 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: -- as it goes it
18 changes.

19 DR. BLEA: -- on an annual basis, yes.

20 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Okay. Thank you.

21 CHAIR FERRARO: Anyone else? No?

22 No public comments?

23 Can we have a motion?

24 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: So moved. Hudnut.

25 COMMISSIONER STERN: Stern. Second.

1 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Davis?

2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

3 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Alfieri?

4 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yes.

5 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Gonzales?

6 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes.

7 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Castellanos?

8 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Yes.

9 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Hudnut?

10 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Yes.

11 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Stern?

12 COMMISSIONER STERN: Yes.

13 CHAIR FERRARO: The Chairman votes yes.

14 Moving on, reports, Executive Director.

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Thank you, Mr.

16 Chairman, and again, good morning, Commissioners.

17 I will begin with the handle report for the month

18 of January. Day racing was down -- was up, I'm sorry, 3

19 percent, night racing handle was down 17 percent, and total

20 handle was even as compared to January of 2026. For the

21 month of February, night racing was down 17 percent, day

22 racing was down 7 percent, and total handle down 9 percent

23 for February. Year to date, night racing was down 17

24 percent, day racing was down 2 percent, and total handle was

25 down 4 percent. As the Board probably recalls, there are a

1 bunch of cancellations in both January and February due to
2 rain.

3 I have some personnel changes to highlight since
4 the last meeting. I'd like to welcome Amber Gill, who
5 started last week. Amber will be serving as an analyst for
6 Accounting and Business Services.

7 Next, I'd like to congratulate Vitto Racowski,
8 who was named CHRB's next Chief of Enforcement. He's
9 actually sitting in the audience. I want to first thank
10 Hunter Bartholomew, who I think is also here, yeah, there
11 you go, who acted as CHRB Interim Chief for the better part
12 of a year. Being an interim is never easy, and Hunter did
13 the job with dedication and grace, and he has my thanks for
14 that.

15 Chief Racowski has been an investigator at Los
16 Alamitos since 2021. Before that, he held various positions
17 in law enforcement, including deputy sheriff at the Los
18 Angeles County Sheriff's Department and lieutenant at the
19 Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office.

20 Welcome aboard, Vitto. I look forward to working
21 with you.

22 Just one other note, I'm kind of freelancing here,
23 it's not on my -- what I've written down, but just want a
24 reminder to stakeholders, licensees, and so on, that with
25 Board meetings scheduled every two months, paying attention

1 to deadlines is exceedingly important. We had a requester
2 to be on the agenda after we had noticed it this month. So
3 just be aware that with every two months, there's less
4 flexibility in just sort of adding things to the agenda, and
5 so a little planning would go a long way and certainly would
6 be helpful to staff.

7 And that, Mr. Chairman, is my report.

8 CHAIR FERRARO: Thank you.

9 Any questions from the Board?

10 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Mr. Chairman, I do have one
11 question for Scott.

12 Scott, there was a set of steward minutes that
13 caught my attention last week, and it was action taken
14 against a Northern California trainer who was unable to pay
15 his bill to vendors. And I really appreciate the steward's
16 write-up and how they did it in describing the fact that
17 this particular trainer was not getting paid by, you know,
18 his owners. And I don't want to give the trainer's name.
19 But I do know that typically steward's rulings can be very
20 black and white. You know, you make this infraction, you
21 don't pay this, you're put in that bucket.

22 But I just really would hope that as things really
23 start to materialize and flesh out as it relates to the true
24 impact of Northern California, that stewards, especially if
25 it involves a trainer in coordination, perhaps, with the

1 California Thoroughbred Trainers, and if necessary, bringing
2 it to our level, because I just don't think that a trainer
3 should have his license removed, access to the backstretch,
4 just because Northern California racing does no longer
5 exist.

6 So I don't know if you read that particular
7 action, but I just really would like to show some
8 understanding. I did share it with Mr. Alfieri,
9 Commissioner Alfieri, just so he can get a sense of the
10 impact that I think for the first time made a set of
11 stewards' minutes.

12 So I don't know if you want to react to that, but
13 I just really feel we need to be a little bit more
14 understanding and perhaps empathetic to what's going on.

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Yeah, I don't know the
16 specific case about which you're speaking, but I'll
17 certainly talk to Chief McHargue, who's also in the
18 audience. And I think this will be an issue probably coming
19 up more than it has in the past.

20 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Right.

21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: Because oftentimes
22 when a race to meet, and you see it in Southern California,
23 owners, trainers, vendors, and so on will kind of let that
24 slide for a while because there's ongoing.

25 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Right.

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: But with the cessation
2 of racing in Northern California, I think folks are looking
3 for, you know --

4 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Right.

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: -- to get paid, and so
6 I think it's probably not an issue that's going to go away.
7 So I'll talk to Chief McHargue about it.

8 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Sure thing. And I did
9 forward it to Mr. Balch, and thank you for being here as
10 always, Alan, just so that the trainers get an idea. And by
11 the way, this particular trainer was one of the top three
12 Northern Cal, and now he's just completely financially
13 ruined. So I think it just caught my attention, and I'm now
14 elevating this because if it's got to come before here, I'm
15 willing to do whatever I can to help, at least give the guy
16 some access so he can get back on his feet if that's the
17 route he wants to go.

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: And for complete
19 transparency, like a suspension in California has, you know,
20 a greater effect, obviously --

21 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes, it does.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: -- if you're suspended
23 in California --

24 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Right.

25 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: -- or if you're

1 suspended in other states as well.

2 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Precisely.

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: So it's not just, I
4 mean, just mechanically --

5 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: You're right.

6 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: -- it can be quite
7 onerous.

8 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yeah, but thanks for keeping
9 the steward minutes coming. They're important. I look at
10 them. So stewards out there, keep doing what you're doing.
11 And then, you know, Chief, you have a really good team
12 that's on top of this stuff, and how they write things out,
13 you know, so thank you.

14 CHAIR FERRARO: Any other comments?

15 Rita, do we have any comments, public comments?

16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: I think just Dr. Blea.

17 CHAIR FERRARO: Well, we're --

18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: He gets a chance.

19 CHAIR FERRARO: Well, I'm giving up on it.

20 No, go ahead, Jeff.

21 DR. BLEA: Good morning, Chairman Ferraro, Vice
22 Chairman Gonzales, Commissioners, and Executive Director,
23 Mr. Chaney.

24 Before I start, I meant to give a shout-out to
25 staff member Brooke Tuchman, if I pronounced that wrong, and

1 I apologize, for all the work she did on the ARCI packet and
2 the proposal. That was a lot of work, so -- and there's a
3 lot of small print that she was able to decipher for me, so
4 I wanted to recognize her.

5 The first thing I'd like to bring your attention
6 to today is the ongoing vesicular stomatitis virus situation
7 currently taking place in Arizona. As of last week, they
8 continue to find new cases in new counties in Arizona.

9 As such, the California Department of Food and Ag
10 has informed us that the current requirement here in
11 California for any horses coming to or returning to
12 California from Arizona is that within seven days of travel,
13 they must have a certificate of veterinary inspection
14 examination and a VSV statement on that CVI reflecting the
15 VSV status to travel into California. We certainly want to
16 keep it contained in Arizona. The requirements were shared
17 with horsemen and can be shared and can be found on the CDFA
18 VSV page.

19 As a reminder, vesicular stomatitis virus is an
20 insect-borne arbovirus predominantly transmitted by black
21 flies, sand flies, and biting midges, and is highly
22 contagious among susceptible species, as well as potentially
23 zoonotic. The susceptible species includes cattle and
24 equine.

25 This past couple days, I recently attended the

1 RMTC Regulatory Vet Continuing Education Meeting hosted by
2 Los Alamitos. It was a two-day event with 60 regulatory
3 vets registered and included multiple presentations and
4 several hands-on wet labs. Topics included unsanctioned
5 racing and the risk to regulated racing, wearable technology
6 updates, advancing safety and welfare in horse racing from
7 an international perspective, mortality reviews and how to
8 utilize the diagnostic laboratory as a valuable resource,
9 and cardiac workup and considerations for the collapsed
10 horse, to mention a few.

11 Moving on, from information gleaned in the Los
12 Alamitos Safety Meeting, which by the way are occurring on a
13 regular basis at this time, Mr. Chaney requested the ARCI
14 set up a call with State Racing Commission leadership from
15 the Quarter Horse states to discuss recent joint injection
16 changes for Quarter Horse racing in California and possibly
17 align these rules amongst Western states in particular.

18 This gathering triggered a meeting suggested by
19 Vice Chairman Gonzales of the CHRB for a high-level
20 discussion with various Quarter Horse State Racing
21 Commission members and executive directors to discuss the
22 cultural change that everyone agrees must occur if
23 professional Quarter Horse racing is to reduce the rate of
24 catastrophic injuries that is plaguing the sport.

25 The meeting, Joint Injections, Breakdowns, and

1 Possible Remedies in Quarter Horse Racing, was held
2 yesterday and attended by Vice Chairman Gonzales and myself.

3 It was difficult to read the room, especially on the Zoom
4 screen. However, I believe we clearly shared our concerns
5 and solutions to improve horse welfare and facilitate a
6 cultural change in Quarter Horse racing.

7 Moving on to fatalities, in the month of January,
8 there were six musculoskeletal fatalities; three occurred in
9 racing, two occurred in training, and one was a result of a
10 stall incident. In February, there were three
11 musculoskeletal fatalities; two occurred in racing and one
12 in training. There were zero, and I repeat, zero non-
13 musculoskeletal fatalities in the month of January or
14 February.

15 In CHRB testing at the Maddy Lab in January, 77
16 paired blood and urine samples, 4 blood-only samples and 1
17 hair sample underwent routine post-race testing. Moreover,
18 111 post-race samples underwent supplementary analysis for
19 anabolic steroids, EPO, or cobalt. Six out-of-comp blood,
20 hair and urine samples were also submitted for routine
21 testing, including EPO. Five official vet lists or bloods
22 were also tested and there were no adverse analytical
23 findings in CHRB testing in January.

24 In CHRB testing at the Maddy Lab in February, 78
25 paired blood and urine samples, 1 blood-only sample and 1

1 hair sample underwent routine post-race testing. Moreover,
2 109 post-race samples underwent supplementary analysis for
3 anabolic steroids, EPO, or cobalt. Twenty-five out-of-
4 competition blood, hair or urine samples were submitted for
5 routine testing, including EPO. Six official work bloods
6 were also tested and again, there were no adverse analytical
7 findings in CHRB testing in the month of February.

8 This concludes my report and I'm happy to answer
9 any questions.

10 CHAIR FERRARO: Questions or comments?

11 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

12 Just a quick comment on the meeting that Dr. Blea and I were
13 part of and previous meetings that Chairman Ferraro and
14 Scott participated with some of the other jurisdictions, I
15 mean, you know, anywhere from eight to 10 states.

16 I just want to commend you, Dr. Blea, for really
17 being prepared, presenting the measures that we took in the
18 aftermath of the Los Alamitos situation. And what really
19 stood out, in my opinion, was how Ed from ARCI recognized
20 the leadership of Los Alamitos for really instituting a
21 house rule, because we knew that if we wanted to do anything
22 on the rule-making, it would have just taken forever.

23 And I believe that there's interest. The
24 statistics that you shared were very profound. And our
25 offer to assist really came from Los Alamitos leadership

1 communicating to us that they can't be an island as it
2 relates to how joint injections are handled at Los Alamitos.
3 But I think that what we have done with horses that are
4 coming into an enclosure that we have jurisdiction over is
5 to institute some important parameters.

6 But I was able to read the room, Dr. Blea, and I
7 know there was a lot of interest. And hopefully that our
8 offer to them, whether it's Commission, smaller-scale
9 discussions, or even with the racetracks themselves, want to
10 take us up on our offer to provide any of the data or
11 statistics.

12 But I just really also want to say to the Chairman
13 and to Scott, the multiple meetings that came about from the
14 Los Alamitos situation really, I believe, put up some
15 important guardrails. And now we feel that we have
16 something that we can share with some of the other states.
17 Nobody asks us to do this. Nobody tells us. This is just
18 good horsemanship and good leadership.

19 So, Dr. Blea, A-plus work on your part and just
20 keep it going. Really, we're very fortunate to have you,
21 sir. Thank you.

22 CHAIR FERRARO: Thank you, Oscar.

23 Any other comments from the Board?

24 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Was that house rule, was it
25 Los Alamitos that actually came --

1 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: It was.

2 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: -- their leadership came up
3 with it?

4 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: That's correct.

5 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Otherwise, it wasn't our
6 suggestion?

7 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: It may very well be some of
8 these rules could very well be instituted --

9 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: That's great.

10 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: -- you know?

11 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: No, that's great.

12 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: But I think what Los Al did,
13 they heard this Board loud and clear and they got right to
14 work.

15 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Perfect.

16 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: And it did take some
17 adjustment. There may be some connections that choose not
18 to come to California as a result, but because of, you know,
19 what Los Alamitos does in terms of its investment in purses,
20 hospitality, welcoming, we think that that is not going to
21 be a barrier.

22 I don't know if you want to, you know, address
23 what Commissioner Alfieri said, or is asking.

24 DR. BLEA: It's a big sea change in that industry.
25 And the horsemen and management of Los Alamitos have

1 embraced it.

2 What was interesting, I think, in the meeting
3 yesterday was we laid it out for them, what we're doing.
4 And, you know, I think a lot of those stakeholders are
5 sitting back wishing they could do this, and wanting to do
6 this, and maybe they will do this in time, but it's a big
7 sea change.

8 And, you know, over the weekend, there was a major
9 race at Los Alamitos. And, you know, they were adhering to
10 the new rules and regs. And even including diagnostics.
11 And there was an example that diagnostics were used,
12 advanced diagnostics, and the horse was allowed to run. The
13 horse ran well. But they recognized that advanced
14 diagnostics are not a death sentence. It's a means of
15 providing information so you can make good decisions --

16 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yeah.

17 DR. BLEA: -- for the welfare of the horse. So it
18 was nice to see that. It was a little bit of opening the
19 drapes and seeing the sunshine, quite frankly.

20 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Awesome.

21 DR. BLEA: So I was pretty pleased to see it.

22 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yeah.

23 DR. BLEA: And again, the horsemen at Los Alamitos
24 have embraced this, and I've got to give them a lot of
25 credit. Not only the trainers, but the veterinarians and

1 management is monitoring this very astutely.

2 CHAIR FERRARO: Any other comments or questions?

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I want to thank Dr. Blea for
4 your involvement. And I'm very happy to hear about that,
5 and even happier to know that we didn't receive any fatality
6 reports relating to this, so --

7 DR. BLEA: My goal is not to have to say anything
8 one of these days.

9 CHAIR FERRARO: Anybody else? No comments?

10 Can we have a motion to approve the staff reports
11 and Medical Director's Report.

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Davis moves.

13 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Gonzales seconds.

14 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Stern?

15 COMMISSIONER STERN: Yes.

16 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Hudnut?

17 COMMISSIONER HUDNUT: Yes.

18 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Castellanos?

19 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Yes.

20 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Gonzales?

21 VICE CHAIR GONZALES: Yes.

22 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Alfieri?

23 COMMISSIONER ALFIERI: Yes.

24 CHAIR FERRARO: Commissioner Davis?

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

1 CHAIR FERRARO: The Chairman votes yes.

2 Public comment period. Do we have anybody?

3 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: I should point out to
4 the Board that there's also written public comment in the
5 packet, so pointing that out to acknowledging that is
6 required by the law.

7 CHAIR FERRARO: Nothing? Okay.

8 So we have a closed session coming up; right?

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: We do.

10 CHAIR FERRARO: So I have to ask everyone to
11 leave, please. It's not --

12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHANEY: We actually have a
13 room we can retire to, Mr. Chairman. So we don't have to
14 have anybody leave unless we want to kick them out.

15 CHAIR FERRARO: Well, whatever works. They don't
16 want to hang around here anyway. So we have the closed
17 session. Then we'll -- the only thing, we'll go back to
18 adjourn the meeting.

19 (The Board convened closed session from 10:15 a.m.
20 until 10:33 a.m.)

21 CHAIR FERRARO: Can I have a motion to adjourn,
22 please?

23 COMMISSIONER CASTELLANOS: Castellanos. Motion.
